
Double standards galorell! When the raciai stereotype cartoon was published in a state funded institution, that is supported by all taxpayers of Texas. the response was a down play and business as usual attitude: But when the same thing is done by a minority in reverse, all hell breaks loose. Why? It is wrong on both sides, equally so. But for some reason minorities are always on the bottom of everything and it's taken for granite, reverse the issue still not making it proper or right, and let a minority do the put down and it becomes a major disaster, as was the case with State Rep. Froy Salines, it has been headlines for almost two weeks out the Texas Tech cartoon was very much played down. Both had bad timing and bad taste in a special sensitive time with the sentiments running high over the appeal issue. Something does not fit!!! All of this happened in the same week. State Rep. Salinas' statement and the University Daily's cartoon. The cartoon was downplayed while the State Rep's, who happened to be a minority, was played up to the highest level.

The City Council and Mayor did not help the city with their recent decision to appeal the decision endered by Judge Halbert O. Woodward for a six. member district for electing City Council members. They had that legal right to appeal as well as we would have had to right to appeal if the decision had gone the other way, however, we feel their decision was wrong and split the city and the longer the appeal rides the worse it's going to be. The majority of Lubbock citizens disagree as for as all indications show, eg. letters to the editors of local papers, the latest indication being the TV poll by Channel 11 showed by a very large majority of Lubbock taxpayers that they disap-proved the council's appeal. The Mayors announcement before the Channel 11 poll that a group was forming to back their stand, what took them so long? and who are they? why now? Why haven't they come forward sooner and let their feelings be known? One thing for sure is the appeal will be overturned by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals. The most important thing now is for the Mayor and Council to get back to the business of running our city. This has dragged on long enough. Now we need to get back to business. The longer this thing rides the deeper the wedge is driven which is bad for all of us. The judge's decision proved the present system is outdated, outmoded, discriminatory and unworkable so while the appeal is in New Orleans, which will be overturned, let's get back to the business of legislating our city in a positive and aggressive manner. ******** Take a look around the Black community and you will see tht there is not a franchise there eventhough Black people eat chicken, hamburgets, pizzas ond other fast foods but there is not a franchise in the area fast food or otherwise in the eastern part of Lubbock. No pizza, taco, or any fast food franchise, something has to be wrong, when one drives across town you see fast food franchises continuously being built on loop 289 heading west one can see two fast food Institutions one on each side of the street. More food for the thought, there is not a branch of any financial Institution in the eastern section of Lubbock, not even a Liveup window or machine maybe just maybe if there was a person from this section on the City Council, some of these kind of things may not be overlooked in the future because of lack of knowledge on what the community needs and the problem of non-sensitivity and lack of empathy may be resolved.

We can never occupy that place comfortably until we acquire and believe in our own dignity, self respect and dignity and assurance that we are a part and parcel of the American way of life and there are many signs of progress on the horizon. Don't you agree? Let's keep marching and as my late sainted Mother used to tell me often: "Climb the mountain, black boy, climb the mountain". It was a speech she taught me in early childhood. to the industry's golden era in the 1920's Part III of this examination of the history of Black independently produced movies and the establishment of a Black film era, "The Middle Years," picks up during the depression years as independent filmmakers struggle for survival.

TONY BROWN's JOURNAL, the nation's topranked, longest-running Black-Affal stelevision series. has been sponsored by Pepsi-Cola Company for eight consecutive years and is televised nationally on public televison (PBS). It can be seen in this area on KTXT, Channel 5 at 9:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 19.

In 1929, America's economy was crippled by the stock market crash. The Great Depression dealt a staggering blow to the independent Bia film industry. The depression economy and straig completition from Hollywood studios forced all-Black cast movies to take a back seat. It is this period and the industries subsu quent revitalization that are examined on the next editon of "Black Hollywood: The Way It Was,"

Dr. Henry Sampson, author of Blacks in Black and White: A Source Book on Black Film (The Scarecrow Press), explains the resurgence of Black independent films in 1937. "With few exceptions, the pictures produced by blacks and whites during this period was musicals, gangster films,westerns, or comedies, and the plots were subservient to the dancing, singing, car chases, shooting, riding or comedy routines. In short, most of these films were merely Black versions of gangster and musical comedy films which were being produced by major Hollywood studios." says Dr. Sampson. He continues: "The racial themes which frequently appear in the early films are absent from the films produced during this period." Film clips on the program include: Oscar Micheaux's "The Girl From Chicago", "Harlem Is

Heaven," starring Bill "Bojangles" Robinson; Paul Roberson's "The Emperor Jones"; and "Symphony In Black," featuring Duke Ellington. Next Week: "Fading Out."

Friedman, as in Milton, says cut spending. Nondefense spending for sure, "maybe" military defense spending. Sounds of joy jets up from the assembled acolytes.

While in Washington the White House has made a laughing stock out of Laffer theory of supply-side economics, another act is being promoted in San Francisco. Both clubs owned by the President. It is the growth of the welfare state, which has increasingly aborbed the taxable capacity of the nation and is inexorably driving the United States into the tate of impotence in International affairs" In his political graph, Dr. Friedman compares the percentage of non-defense spending at a demonstrative higher figure of 24 percent in 1982 having constantly climbed since 1958, being well over only 8 percent for defense spending when compared to the national income.

Dr. Friedman falled to remove the critical payments

of social security, railroad retirement, etc. out of his non-defense expenditures, since these hards are merely returning to workers their own dollars. If you've ever rented a house or apariment. chances are that at some point you wished you knew Texas law. Whether it's a security deposit or major repairs. both tenants and landlords are often confused about their rights and duties under the law,

In general, it is important to have the terms of your lease in writing. If there is a written lease. read it carefully and make any changes youi and the landlord can agree on by putting your initials by the change. Make sure all blanks are filled in or marked "N A" for not
