



As the end of the year of 1979, let's look back as to why we have a Lubbock Digest. Let's go back in history to Rev. Samuel Cornish and John Russwurm, and before their time and see what the white press did to and for Blacks! The first news report of a lynching appeared in *Freedom's Journal*, the first recognized Black newspaper. Crisis Magazine (NAACP) constantly reported lynchings during the early 1900's at a time when Associated Press and New York newspapers ignored or justified them. In an 1859 article on "The President's Message: Fredrick Douglas took James Buchanan to task. He said Buchanan's "points" with unerring certainty to the South.

"It knows no north, no cast, no west." He called Buchanan "the plain tool of pro-slavery propogondist, the subsidiary of southern despotism, a consummate hypocrite."

"The Rams Horn" was started in 1847 in response to attacts on Afro-Americans and activities of the "New York Sun's" (a penny newspaper). The "Sun", in 1846, printed editorials proposing the curbing a in 1846, printed editorials proposing the curbing of Negro Voting Rights in New York state. A Black man. Willis Hodges, wrote a reply which was printed only when he agreed to pay \$15.00 and run it as an ad." Even then, the article was modified. When Hodges protested, he was told "The sun shines for all white men and not for colored men. If he wanted the Afro-American cause advocated, he should have found his own paper. He did and the paper got up to 2.500 subscribers (a large number than Garrison's letters known Liberator before ti died in 1848). The "New Orleans Tribune" started in 1862 by Dr. J. J. Roudency and was the first Black owned daily newspaper. It fought for the right to vote for Blacks and was branished a "sick vanity" by a white New Orleans paper. It denounced efforts of whites to drive a wedge between the light-skinned and the dark-skinned Blacks and successfully opposed efforts to define quiardroons as "white" ..... a procedure that would have set up a South African type system in the U.S.



would encourage mass mailings by Individuals from each, group to which you belong. This would be a perfect opportunity, for example, for our state Councils of Churches across the nation.

The Martin Luther King holiday bill is a richly deserving cause. It should occasion little controversy for us to muster the greatly needed support which we can bring about.

The other major bill concerning Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Calls for a bust or statue of the civil rights hero to be placed in the U.S. Capitol. The bill has been introduced by Representative Jonathan B. Bingham (D-NY). Representative Bingham noted, in introducing the bill, that of all black Americans who have contributed to the nation's greatness, not one is featured among the 681 works of art in the halls of the Capitol.

Calling this a shame and a disgrace, Representative Bingham says a memorial to Dr. King presents a perfect epportunity to begin to correct this injustice, and to appropriately honor a man who so effectively altered the racial course of our Nation.

Representative Bingham said: "Although Dr. King's violent death is a tragic blot on our recent history, his life is a shining example for us all. For over a decade, his hopes and dreams guided the Nation in the struggle for justice...opportunity, and basic rights. He carried that struggle as far as any man or

woman in the country. "A permanent memorial to Dr. King, in the Capitol, would remind America and the rest of the world over the years to come of the inspiring leadership of this great man." Mr. Bingham also noted: Dr. King began his fight for civil rights in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955. His philosophy was one of changing inequality by nonviolence. A firm believer in Christian ideals and Gandhi's principle of peaceful nonviolent protest, he set out to fulfill a dream, to give life to the country's highest ideals. He spoke for the present and

the future, of 'getting to the mountaintop' and 'reaching the Promised Land."" In his introductory remarks concerning the bill for a Martin Luther King Jr. holiday on January 15th each year, Representative John Convers (D-Michigan) noted: "Nearly eleven years have passed since Dr. King's tragic death in Memphis, yet affection and respect have grown tremendously for his work and ideals. Each passing year millions of Americans recommit themselves to his dream for racial, political, and economic justice in our nation by celebrating his birthday. Thirteen states, as well as most of the major cities across the country, already have declared his birthday a

time of formal observance. "Dr. King's life and work exemplify the striving of Americans for equality, peace in the world, and reconciliation at home. His unshakable faith in human beings, his indomitable courage in public life, his extraordinary steadiness of character and self-discipline have come to be admired and honored by peoples throughout the world. To make Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday a national holiday would be a way to commemorate his life, and at the same time, to enable citizens to reflect upon the high ideals that he lived and gave his life for.

"Each year since Dr. King's assassination, J have introduced a bill in Congress to make his birthday a national day of observance. I hope this year that the Congress will swiftly pass the bill. "Martin Luther King, Jr.

gave his life to improve the lives of us all. National recognition of this hero is long overdue. A national holiday in his honor would not be merely the observance of a single man. It would be recognition of the moral force of his character and the vast imprint that he has left on our history. We need a day for all Americans to pause in honor of his life and contributious to mankind."


The collage is made in




