# Reagan Administration Charged

"For 'Foisting' Climate of Racial Bigotry on Nation"

New York -- NAACP Executive Director Benjamin L. Hooks charged that Reagan Administration's response to the "mounting catastrophe" of rising black unemployment "has been to drastically cut or eliminate most of the federally-funded programs which helped the underemployed, the working poor, the aged

and the infirm." In one of the sharpest attacks that the NAACP has launched in recent years on the Executive Branch, Mr. Hooks, in the NAACP's 1981 annual report charges that, "The new Administration mirrors a growing mood in the country, a mood which is at once hard-hearted and increasingly resentful, if

not hostile, toward the needy." He further charges: "A climate of racial bigotry is being slowly foisted upon us, of which the tip is the growth of the Ku Klux Klan in various sections of the nation. If this trend continues, we of the NAACP gravely fear that racism will again be rampant." Thus, Mr. Hooks

concluded that despite past progress, these are the worst of times for most black Americans." Also noting the administration's hostility toward civil rights and social programs, Althea Simmons, director of the NAACP Washington Bureau, reports that the "the attitude of the day" is best summarized by comments of Budget

Director David Stockman, who testified before a congressional committee last year that "I don't believe that there is any entitlement, and basic right to legal services, or any other kind of services... I don't accept equality as a moral principle." Despite the bleak civil rights climate, the NAACP report was upbeat. The reason is to be found in Mr. Hook's view that, "We operate on the assumption that in our democracy, if the voters can make their voices heard, their interests will be protected."

The report covers all the programmatic activities of the veteran civil rights organization. It reflects not only the historical concern for civil rights but also the expanded thrust of the NAACP under the

leadership of Mr. Hooks. Included in the report is also a special tribute to former Executive Director Roy Wilkins, who died September 8 last year.

cerated for more than a year, was illegally implemented. Before they can be released, the judge stated, that the Haitians must be

sponsored by both an individual and a voluntary agency. After being freed they must report each week to a third party appointed by the court.

Haitians are incarcerated at immigration camps in Florida, West Virginia, Texas, New York, Kentucky and Puerto Rico.

President Reagan signed the 25-year extension of the Voting Rights Act last Tuesday with civil rights activists looking on.

The bill, often called the most effective civil rights bill of the century, bars discrimination in voting and requires nine states and parts of 13 others to gain federal approval before changing any election law.

## Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

The cost of blood components, and the cost of blood processing and administration, can add appreciably to the cost of medical care. For patients covered by Medicare, however, the program can help meet these costs.

With one exception, the hospital insurance portion of Medicare can pay for the cost of blood received by an individual while a patient in a hospital or skilled nursing facility. The one exception is the nonreplacement fees charged in each benefit period for the first three pints of whole blood or units of packed red cells. The nonreplacement fee is the charge that some hospitals and skilled nursing facilities make for blood that is not replaced.

The patient is responsible for the nonreplacement fees for the first three pints of blood furnished by a hospital or skilled nursing facility. However, a patient who is charged nonreplacement fees has the option of either paying the fees or having the blood replaced. If he or she chooses to replace the blood, it may even be done through a blood assurance plan such as is sponsored by a number of employers and religious and fraternal organizations.

The medical insurance part of Medicare can help pay for blood and blood components a person receives as an outpatient or as part of other covered services, with the exception of any nonreplacement fees charged for the first three pints or units received in each calendar year. After a patient meets the \$75 annual deductible, medical insurance will pay 80 percent of the charges of blood, beginning with the fourth pint in a calendar year.

Medicare does not cover the cost of blood needed in connection with self-dialysis at home unless it is provided as part of a physician's services or is needed to prime the dialysis equipment.

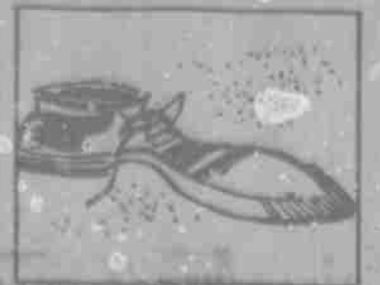

Accordingly to eliminate these burdensome needs from within Black America, our new emphasis or priority, will have to involve getting all of our Black community organizations and institutions together to encourage our economic builders. This means new forms of massive training to take over our Black Community's needs for Black Policemen, Black Teachers, Black firemen, Black Doctors, Black Lawyers, Black Merchants, Black Businesses and Black Professionals in general working together collectively for the good of all of us and our communities, spending and retaining our money in our community. It also calls for new forms of partnership whereby we, simultaneously, can encourage the Black Community to selectively support those white-owned businesses and institutions which have policies that tend to build over long-denied communities in an equitable manner.

Likewise, we must withhold our dollars from those white businesses and institutions who fail to support our communities and help us to build our long denied communities in an equitable manner. We have no other recourse but to use selective buying spending our money where it is appreciated in other words educating our money and not supporting those who refuse to help us build and rebuild our communities.

We are not asking for aid, just trade if people take money from our community they should leave an equitable share there. We can no longer tolerate those white leeches from across town draining our communities.

This new priority of rebuilding our communities from within, calls for new roles for all in the Black community. It means that the Lubbock Digest and others will have to examine every possible way we can "pull up our communities by what ever bootstraps" we have, as we seek the long-overdue and deserved support required of the white community.

However, the leadership to make our communities the responsible and self-sustaining market places must come from within our communities. Remember the creed we should all live by us "If it is to be it is up to me."

### People's Problems

#### Nuclear Hits the Pocketbook

There is going to be high-level nuclear waste as long as the present administration's policies are in power. Naturally, nuclear weapons are not the end all and be all of the nuclear problem of the world. But keep it in the back of your mind. Much of the U. S. foreign policy is predicated on a nuclear weapon superiority over the Soviet Union. Unless this madness is made clear, any discussion of the commercial use of nuclear energy is so clouded as to confuse even the most educated environmentalist, namely, my brother-in-law. Nuclear energy reactor plants for producing electricity for the public is not exactly a by-product of our nuclear weapon program, but its not a bad argument. As long as you are going to have the bad news about nuclear energy, why not take some of the good? Government currently controls the waste disposal programs, such as it is, of both public and private use of nuclear energy for good or evil. Hot stuff can kill the harmless.

The management of nuclear waste is in the hands of the U. S. Department of Energy (DOE). They are awaiting this administration's long-term policy for the proper disposal or storage of nuclear waste. The question of permanent disposal or storage for later use is key to the public's interest. Storage means reuse of the radioactive material with a greater degree of risk of leakage and public harm. Hanford Reservation, Idaho Falls and the Nevada Test Site facilities of the DOE have adequate plans for disposal of low level waste.

Low level waste is anything that has been exposed to high level radioactivity and if you hang around it for too many months your hair might start to fall out. A couple of years your teeth might drop, then a few more years you drop, assuming constant exposure. Cancer you know. High level waste can do the death trick in 17 seconds.

So, considering the risk why mess around with radioactive hot stuff? Suppose you could save life rather than take life away with nuclear energy, would you be interested? Sure, if it was your life. Have you ever had an X-ray, it may have saved your life already, so don't be so quick to cut-off your nose to spite your nuclear face.

Everyone wants electricity cheap. Country after country around the world has revised its energy policy to pay its petroleum bill. Believe it or not they have increased their use of nuclear energy. Nuclear generating capacity outside the U. S. jumped nearly 22 percent during 1981, with the new poor people's

I know that Ernest Butler Park is in a residential area, but if you stop to think that there have been no shootings, stabbings, or any other acts of violence du shootings, stabbings, or any other acts of violence during the tenure that Blacks have been going to this park, then you may see that there is no harm in having Good Clean Fun on a Sunday evening.

France leading the growth. After France, the countries depending most on nuclear energy for electricity, as of 1980, are Switzerland (28%), Sweden (27%), Belgium (23%), Taiwan (19%), Finland (17%), Japan (16%) and West Germany (14%).

U. S. nuclear power plants will generate 15% more than a year ago, accounting for a record 13.4% of U. S. electricity by the end of the year. People will support policies which provide cheap energy. This country is blessed with an abundance of oil and gas, not so for other countries. Coming to grips with the expense of the environment, as in beach destruction and land loss (off shore oil rigs and strip mining) versus nuclear harm is the hot issue, not just radioactivity in the atmosphere.

At any dinner party during the winter we wish for cheaper utility rates, not a lower radioactivity rate. Nuclear energy is substantially cheaper in the short term than oil, gas or coal. The nation's 72 operating nuclear power plants today provide electricity for approximately 32 million Americans and their work places. Whether or not to favor nuclear power for peaceful purpose presents a problem for rich and poor people.

Bellinger Writes: "Dear Bob— Just about everyone who will be paying college tuition cost next year could probably use some extra to help defray skyrocketing expenses. Tuition, room and board, books and just about every other college expense is on the rise. But Bellingers instead of throwing up your arms in despair, there may still be another way to get some help to college. More than \$100 million in nongovernment student financial aid goes mostly unused every year. Incredible as it may seem, there are more than 250,000 nongovernment sources of funds—most unable to give away all the money they have. According to the president of a national scholarship search company, more people than ever before are seeking nongovernment help. Yet millions of dollars are never used.

"Ed Rosenwasser, who heads Student College Aid, a computer search company says that may corporate and foundations are adding to their college help coffers this year. Rosenwasser matches students to available nongovernment funding sources.

"The grants are not necessarily distributed on the basis of financial need or academic excellence. Students may qualify for many private grants according to their academic interests, special skills, ethnic oric origins, or religious affiliations. He added that prospective electric or computer engineering students have the greatest number of options available, although there is money for students of almost every vocation. ## Democratic National Party Conference

I attended the first part of the Democratic mid-term National Party Conference in Philadelphia last weekend. I forsook the opportunity to vote to override a Presidential veto in the House last Thursday to attend what I consider to be an opportunity to make a greater contribution to the welfare of Blacks at the Party Conference.

I knew that even if the House overrode the President's veto of a program to subsidize the interest on mortgages for new homes, the Senate would not. As it turned out, of course, even the Democrat-controlled House could not muster the necessary 289 votes to override the Presidential veto. The Democrat-controlled House could muster only 253 votes to override and they had to win the votes of 53 Republicans to do that.

However, as the only Black Member of Congress in attendance at Thursday's preliminary Democratic National Committee (DNC) Black Caucus' meeting in Philadelphia on last Thursday, I was permitted to suggest an amendment to the DNC's proposed Resolution on Accountability. The original Resolution stated as follows:

"In that many people of this nation have expressed outrage at the Republican Administration's economic policy and its blatant assault against the poor, disadvantaged and working Americans; and

"In that this Party has continually reiterated its support of the principles of justice and equality of opportunity, economic freedom and dignity of the human quality of life for all Americans; "Let the record show that the sense of the DNC Executive Committee is that elected Democrats must be held accountable, not merely in rhetoric—but in action—to the principles of this Party and its leadership."

I was in sympathy of this Resolution's proposal which was to pressure the "Boil Weevils."

Democrats who support Reagan's programs in Congress. Yet, I believe that it was too uncritical of the Democratic Party's national leadership.

While, by implication, it criticized the gap between the leadership's advocacy and its action, it failed to point out that even its advocacy was inadequate to the needs of Blacks.

Therefore, I suggested amending the second paragraph to read, "... this (Democratic) Party has continually reiterated more support than has the Republican Party for the principles of justice."

The point of this modification was to make it clear that the Democratic Party had advocated these principles merely more than the Republican Party but no necessarily sufficiently. The other modification I proposed was to add after that paragraph the following new paragraph:

"And, in that this Party's action on the national level has failed to match its advocacy, even though its advocacy has been insufficient to the need to substantially and immediately alleviate the gross discrimination suffered by Blacks in the United States."

On the next day, Friday, I was permitted by my friend and staunch civil rights advocate, Mayor Richard Hatcher of Gary, who was chairing the official Black Delegates meeting, to present this amendment to the vote of the Black Delegates. After I did so, labor leader and equal rights spokesperson, Addie Wyatt, moved its adoption, and it was adopted by unanimous voice vote.

While the convention may not approve it, at least I succeeded in getting the Black Delegates to go on record as criticizing the inadequacy of our Party's commitment to racial justice.

examinations at no charge to the patient. A reservation is necessary and can be made for time slot between 5 and 8 p.m. Call Volunteer Services at 795-9301.

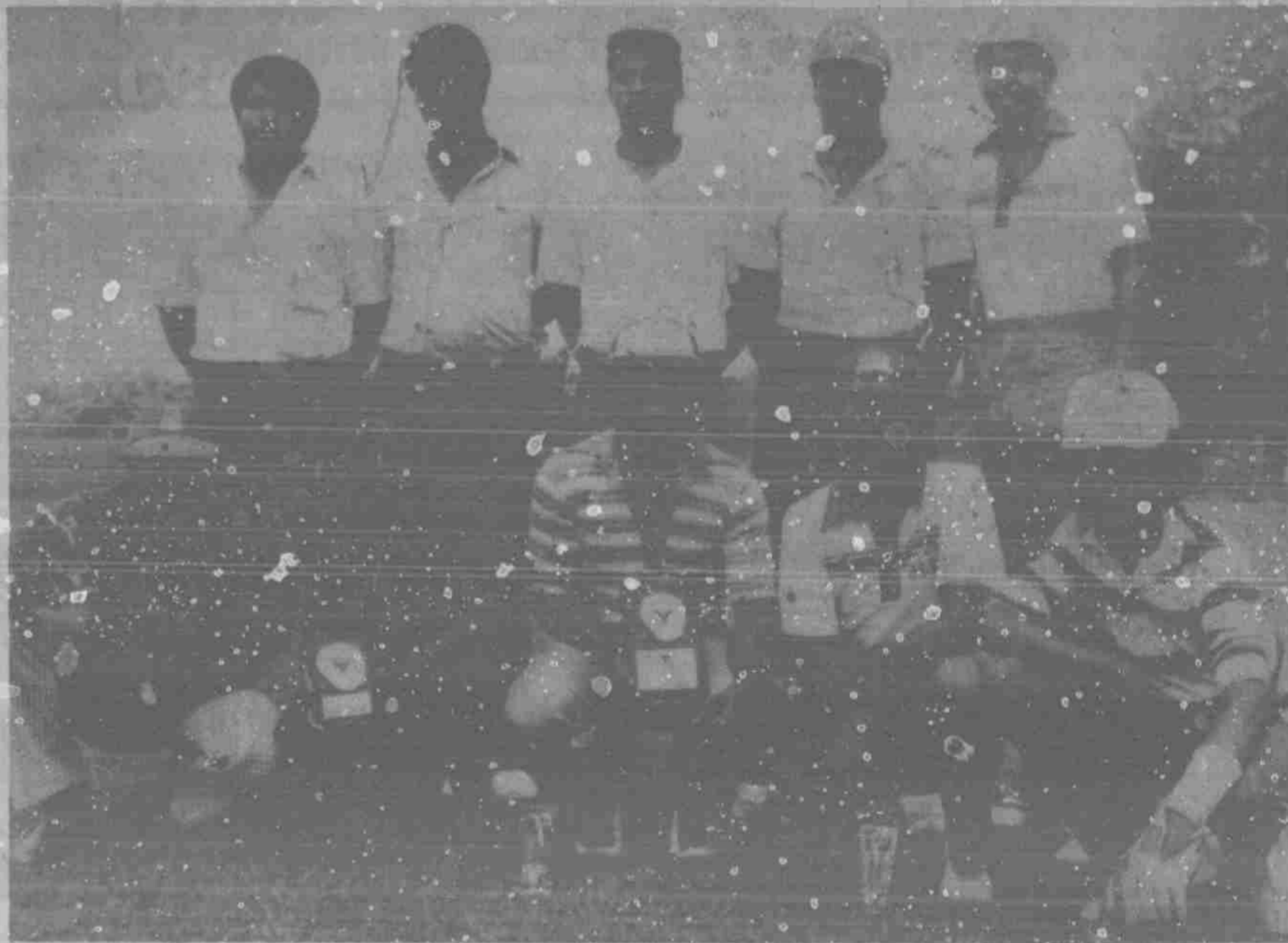
