

Getting Elected Is Only the Beginning

This letter from Thomas Cole gives information about the Negro in genera!.

Bro. Johnson:

Presuming that some of my friends would like to hear from me occasionally during my absence from the city, I take the liberty to request the insertion of a few words in the Liberator.

Providence, and arrived at the latter place in less than two and a half hours. The accommodations upon this route for persons of color are tolerably good-much better than they formerly were. The proprietors have appropriated seats for colored people in the first class of cars. The accommodations, in themselves, are good enough -for the seats are as well cushioned as any in the whole train; but my objection lies against the exclusive principle which prevails-the principle which colonizes us without our consent, as if we were not fit to ride in company with others on terms of equality. This is not as it should be. The day is coming, I trust, when these paltry distinctions will be done away. The wrongs which we as a people softer, are enough to make even the angels bow their heads and weep. We are hunted and despised, and like the Son of Man, have not where to lay our heads. Our condition reminds me of the exiled Israelites, who sat and wept on the banks of their lovely streams. The iron heel of oppression is crushing the hearts of many colored Americans to the earth. Our spirits, however, can never be subdued, if we are only united and true to our interests. Our souls, like the mountain's crest, will yet tower high above surrounding difficulties.

The first of August, the anniversary of British emancipation, was observed in Providence in a very appropriate manner. An address was delivered at Masonic Hall by James

He depicted the horrors of American slavery in glowing colors. August 2d, I left Providence for Newport at 8 o'clock, A.M. This is one of the most beautiful places in the whole Union. It has a noble harbor studded with beautiful islands and lined with shipping. A whale ship arrived on Wednes-Newport, R. I., Aug. 7, 1840 day last, which brought 2,500 bbls. of oil-a cargo valued at \$80,000. What is called the old town of Newporn is simated on a gentle acclivity sloping down to the water in the form of a semi-circle. The population is 8000. The colored inhabitants number about 350 or 400. They have a very neat little church, where the great body of them worship. A few, however, have seceded and set up worship by Saturday afternoon. Aug. 1, I took the cars at Boston for themselves. The people of both sexes to whom I have been introduced are very intelligent and affable, and display a becoming raste in their dress.

On Sunday I had the pleasure of listening to two sermons from Rev. Peter Williams of New York. He proached in the church where the colored people mostly worship. He, as well as myself, is staying at the house of friend Remond, the father of C. L. Remond, now in England. Friend Remond has a very pleasant location, and an interesting

Your readers are doubt'ess aware that Newport was settled in 1639 by William Coddington, a Quaker, and seventeen others. Mr. Coddington was afterwards governor. It has been the scene of many a bloody war. The British held possession of the island during three years of the Revolution. The remains of old forts and entrenchments are yet to be seen. Fort Adams has been seventeen years in building, and will not be completed in less than five more. It is a stupendous work. There are several places here of fashionable resort—among them a 'Purgatory,' a 'Paradise,' and the 'Spouting Rock.' Many strangers resort here to spend the summer in a quiet and healthy retreat.

Excuse me for spinning out such a 'long yarn,' and allow me to subscribe myself.





SURGEON GENERAL SHOULD RECANT OR RESIGN

Not since the bubonic plague swept over Europe during the Dark Ages, has the Western World faced an epidemic as deadly as AIDS. During the 1300's, one fourth of the population of Europe was destroyed by this plague. It became known as the black death. There has been many outbreaks of this deadly disease during the last 1800 years. In the yeare 262 A.D., 5,000 died each day in Rome from its effects. In London more than 150,000 persons died of plague between 1603 and 1665. During a 20 year period of the 19th and 20th centuries, 10 million people were killed by the plague in

The bubonic plague was caused by man's ignorance concerning the laws of sanitation. When man found out that the plague was caused by leas carried by rats, then they were in a position to do something about it. Each outbreak of the busonic plague has been quickly stamped out in the U.S., because the United States Public Health Service would immediately impose quarantine. and sanitation measures. Why has not something similar been done to solve the problem of AIDS? There is no excuse for the ravaging fires of AIDS, as it sweeps over our land, taking the lives of countless numbers of victims. We know the cause of AIDS, and we know how to stop the spread of AIDS. The one thing that we lack, is the national courage to do something about it while there is still time.

Unless something drastic is done very soon, the present AIDS crisis will make the bubonic plague look

The U.S. Surgeon General

It is the business of the Surgeon General of the U.S., to look after the health and welfare of the citizens of our nation. It is his business to advise the President, our Congress, and the American people coreera ing matters of health.

We applaus his efforts to clean up the air, by his campaign against

Dr. C. Everett Koop, is ou. present Surgeor General. He was sold to the conservatives in the nation, as a born-again evanguical Christian. We are told that he was converted to Christ, under the ministry of the late Dr. Donald Grey Barnhouse, a popular radio speaker and pastor of the Tenth Presbyterian Church, Philadelphia, PA.

Surgeon General's Report On AIDS

In November 1986, Koop came out with his report on AIDS. From what we have gleaned from that report, and the susequent public statements of the Surgeon General, we are completely horrified by the inadequacy of that report. Koop is guilty of misinforming and misleading the people, and he should either repent and recant, or he should resign.

The public health, the lives of millions of people, and the survival of our nation is at stake. The people should be told the truth about this horrifying piague.

Safe Sodomy, Not Good Enough

When a patient needs major urgery, he needs more than a Band-Aid. The Surgnon General has offered us a Band-Aid. His remady is comparable to trying to out out the fires of a burning oil well, with a toy souirt gun. It is unlikely that the use of condoms, as he suggests, will have any appreciable affect upon the spread of AIDS. It is quite likely that it will make it worse, since the homosexuals will think they are eafe in their perversion.

Koop's plan to educate the chil-

dren, beginning at the ages of 9 and 10, is more likely to increase the number of homosexuals than anything we know. Anyone that believes that the majority of them will be taught from a moral and biblical standpoint, would likely be a candidate for buying the Brooklyn bridge. To believe that this will stop the increase of AIDS, or slow the spread of homosexuality, is to believe a fairy tale. Sex education in public schools has been a woeful failure. It has produced more fornication and teenage pregnacy than ever before.

Koop may we well be a born-again Christian, for we cannot judge his heart in this matter, but he is a woeful failure as Surgeon General. If America is to be saved, there must be a facing of the facts. There must be a wave of repen our land, and a turning back to God. This country was not built on homosexuality, but unless this awful sin is repudiated, and dealt with by our nation, it will destroy our land.

The Surgeon General's Report A number of people have taken in hand to point out the inconsistency

of the Koop report. Some of our quotations are taken from the Eagle Koop srid: "Some persons with

hemophilia (a blood clotting disorder that makes them subject to bleeding) have been infected with AIDS virus either through blood transfusion or the use of blood products. ... This group represents a very small percentage." But why doesn't Koop tell us that this "very small percentage" is 9,000 hemophiliacs now infected with the AIDS virus? This means that 9,000 innocent people will die, because that homosexuals have polluted the blood supply of our nation.

Koop said: "Some people may have had a blood transfusion prior to March 1985 before we knew how to screen blood for safe transfusion and may have become infected with the AIDS virus. Fortunately there are not now a large number of these cases." Why didn't Koop tell us that these infected prople whom he describes as not "now" a large number are already at ! sast 29,000 (the 9,000 hemophiliacs plus 20,000 others??

Koop admitted that the current AIDS test used by blood banks cannot detect newly-infected persons because it takes the antibodies some months to form. Koop said: "This might occur less than once in 100,000 donstions." Why doesn't Koop tell us that doctors estimate this to be 2,000 persons per year, and that, in addition, a new strain of /IDS virus in undetectable by the blood-screening test?

The blood blanks have no safe blood supply. Anyone that tells you that they do, is either lying, or is ignorant of the truth. Earlier this year, I told that I might be required to have a supply of blood, when facing surgery. (I am thankful that this did not occur). Three doctors advised me not to take blood from the local blood bank. They suggested that I get a donor from some happily married man that I had known for a number of years. If you have to have blood, sither store your own blood, or yet donations from people that you know. Anything else is simply plcying Russian roulette with your

When Koop guts to his "look to the future," he opposes requiring AIDS cases to be reported, or their sex or J.V. drug contacts to be traced, as is the practice with other sexually transmitted dissaus. Koop wants to protect the "privacy" and confidentiality" of the A)DS carriers. Koup doesn't even mention

closing the homosexual bathhouses. Sex Education For Children

He does, however, come out with the bizarre idea that "early elemontary" schoolchildren "who do not yet know they will be homosexual" must be "taught the risk behaviors that expose them to infection with the AIDS virus." How are they to be

taught to avoid getting AIDS?

Koop's message is mixed. In one place, he seems to urge that teenage boys be taught they should 'not have rectal intercourse with other males-it may result in AIDS." In another part of the report, he appears to urge the teaching of "safe" sodomy by the use of condoms. If American parents have any spark of decency left in them, they will never tolerate this kind of

sex education. Koop's most ridiculous statement is that "unrea onable fear can be as crippling as the disease itself." He admitted that 12,500 Americans have already died from AIDS, and predicted that 179,000 will die by 1991, but he failed to cite one person who ever died from fear of AIDS. Koop's report sounds as though it were written or edited by

the National Gay Task Force. Immediately after Koop's report was issued, a number of homosexval organizations and publications endorsed it. This should immediately make us wary of the report.

Why did not Koop suggest that a law be passed, which would make it a felony, for anyone to give blood who is infected with AIDS? Why are we not told by Koop and the prime time news, that the Center for Disease Control said that "in many areas the number of persons infected with AIDS is at least 100 times greater than that of reported cases of AIDS? Why are we not told that 70 to 90 percent of the homosexuals in San Francisco and New York City are AIDS-infected and AIDS-infectious?

Koop, the medical profession, the news media, and political leaders have failed to give the American people the facts and the remedy for this awful plague. Koop should either recant and do his job, or he should resign, so the president can nominate a Surgeon General who will have the welfare of our nation as his first interest. This is not a political issue. Democrats, Republicans, and Independents should want the truth. All races, and religions should want this issue

What Others Are Saying

The Christian Anti-Communism Crusade Newsletter for April 15, 1987, has an interesting article entitled The Origin Progress And Prognosis Of Aids. It was written by Dr. Fred Schwarz, who is a medical doctor. He says, "One of the sad paradoxes of the present situation is that the advocates of unrestrained civil liberties have effectively robbed thousands, and threaten to rob millions, of all civil liberties. The dead have lost all civil liberties. By protecting the so-called rights of homosexuals, bi-sexuals, and drug addicts, to engage in practices which will transfer the AIDS virus to others, they have caused untold suffering and death."

Dr. Schwar, stass, "An essential element in the treatment of any disease is the recognition of the prognosia. The prognosis refers to the future course of the disease. All history testifies that when knowledge conflicts with powerful human passion (in this case the sex drive), the passions prevail. If this were not so, there would be few alcoholics or drug addicts, and little venereal discase

The Catastrophic Results

Gene Antonio, in his amazing book The AIDS Cover-Up?, outlines the terrible disaster we face with AIDS. He says, "Ninety percent of all AIDS patients thus far have been between the ages of twenty and forty-nine." He projects that 4 to 5 hundred thousand persons in this age bracket dying over the next several years will cripple the tax base of workers necessary to provide for present and future recipients of Social Security. AIDS patients are eligible for Medicare or Medicaid, and the average expense per patient amounts to \$147,000. AIDS can easily destroy our already weakened Social Security system.

Hospitals and health care facilities will be overburdened by the mass of AIDS patients. Remember that the number of people with AIDS is doubling every year, and there is no cure for AIDS in sight. There may never be a cure for

All this will make America ripe for Communist conquest. Of course AIDS will be no problem for the Communists, as they will simply kill the AIDS patients.

A Plan For Effective Action

Dr. Fred Schwarz presents an effective plan of action, if we can find the courage as a nation, to implement it. He says, "The objective must be: (1) To locate the AIDS virus; (2) To isolate the AIDS virus; (3) To destroy the AIDS virus.

"This war will involve a great sacrifice and great expense. It must be fought on many fronts. Battles must be fought in medical, legislative, moral, social and spiritual realms.

"Once the AIDS virus is discovered, it must be isolated so that it cannot be transfrorred to others. This may involve the isolation of the host (the person infected with AIDS). In many cases this will be unjust but injustice is inescapable in war.

"If the AIDS virus is isolated and its transfer prevented, the spread of the epidemic will be halted and ultimately it will start to recede. Prevention, not persuasion must be the goal. The millions threatened with torture and death demand

The Crisis Is Upon Us

"As of May 4, 1987, AIDS had been diagnosed in 35,219 people in the U.S. and claimed 20,352 lives. according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta. The CDC estimates the disease will strike 270,000 people and kill 179,000 by the end of 1991." (Evening Journal, Lubbock, TX, 5-(2-87)

Remember that the above figures only cover a fraction of those who are infected with the AIDS virus. CDC only our nts those who have a full blown case of AIDS. Many medical authorities predict that all who have the virus, will eventually gut AIDS.

Now is the time for God's people to wake up. We need some old fashioned prayer mestings. Homorexuality and AiDS may be a nign that God has already given this nation up. We urge averyone to read Romans chapter L

Summer Party Hors D'oeuvres

At's always fun to get together with friends and what better time to celebrate than the first days of summer. Invite the gang to a get-together after aerobics class or throw a Friday night "come-as-you-are" party.

When entertaining space and preparation time are limited, serve satisfying finger foods you can prepare ahead of time and set out on a coffee table or dining room buffet. Pecan Cheese Crock, Molded Salmon Pate and Marinated Carrot and Cucumber Sticks make a perfect menu for a casual summer get-together.

PECAN CHEESE CROCK

1 (8 oz.) package cream cheese, room temperature 1 (9 oz.) can Frito-Lay's brand Mild Cheddas Elegand Cheese Din

Mild Cheddar Flavored Cheese Dip 10 ounces blue cheese, room temperature 1 small onion, grated

I garlic clove, minced I teaspoon horseradish

teaspoon horseradish
cup toasted and broken pecans

3 tablespoons sherry (optional) 1 (8 oz.) bag Fritos® brand King Siz

I (8 oz.) bag Fritos® brand King Size Corn Chips Red and green apple slices

In a medium bowl, combine three cheeses and mix until fluffy with electric mixer or in food processor. Add onion, garlic, horseradish, nuts, and sherry. Blend well. Place in favorite crock and let ripen in refrigerator for at least 24 hours. Serve on party tray surrounded with corn chips and red and green apple slices.

Makes about 3 cups.

MOLDED SALMON PATE

2 ounces cream cheese, softened 1 can (7 3/4 oz.) salmon, drained 1 teaspoon lemon juice

1/2 teaspoon horseradish 2 tablespoons finely chopped green onions

I tablespoon finely chopped fresh dill or parsley Pinch cayenne pepper

1 tablespoon chopped walnuts Lettuce leaves

Lettuce leaves Dill sprigs (optional)

In medium bowl, beat cream cheese. Blend in salmon, lemon juice, and horseradish. Stir in green onions, chopped dill and cayenne pepper; mix well. Line 1 1/2 cup straight-sided bowl with plastic wrap. Sprinkle nuts over bottom; spoon in salmon mixture and pack firmly. Cover and refrigerate until firm, about four hours or overnight. Remove from mold and place on lettuce leaves. Top with fresh dill sprigs.

MARINATED CARROT AND CUCUMBER STICKS

Serve these tangy regetables with a rich pate such as Molded Salmon

Pate. Raspberry vinegar is available in specialty food shops and some supermarkets or you can make your own. It keeps indefinitely in a cool dry place.

3 cucumbers*
1 pound carrots (about six)

1/3 cup Raspberry Vinegar (recipe follows) 1/2 cup olive oil

Freshly ground peppe

Halve cucumbers lengthwise and remove seeds. Cut in half crosswise; cut each piece into four lengthwise sticks. Place in 13 x 9-inch dish and set aside. Scrub carrots; peal, if desired. Cut in half crosswise, then into four pieces lengthwise. Drop into pot of boiling salted water; cook just until tender-crisp, four to five minutes. Drain; combine with cucumbers. Sprinkle with vinegar; toss to coat. Drizzle with oil. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for about four hours or overnight, tossing occasionally.

To serve, drain vegetables and sprinkle generously with pepper. Makes 20 servings.

*Peel cucumbers only if skins are tough.

Raspberry Vinegar:
1 cup raspberries, fresh or frozen unsweetened (thawed)

2 cups white wine vinegar

Place raspberries in screw-top bottle; pour vinegar over. Cover and store in cool dark place for two weeks. Strain and store flavored vinegar in cool place. Makes 2 cups.

Note: For a delicious salad dressing, blend I cup of sour cream and two tablespoons raspberry vinegar.

1. Notice is hereby given that City Transit Management Co., Inc. d/b/a Citibus proposes to continue to provide charter service as follows: Monday through Sunday, 24 hours a day, within 50 miles of the Lubbock urbanized area, with GMC RTS II buses, Grumman buses, and lift-equipped vans.

II. Any private charter operator that desires to be considered willing and able to provide this charter service should provide the necessary evidence to the City Transit Management Co., Inc. d/b/a Citibus, P. O. Box 2000, Lubbock, Texas 79457, within at least 30 days from the date of this notice. The necessary evidence shall include: (1) a statement that the private charter operator has the desire and physical capability to provide the categories of revenue vehicle specified, and (2) documents to show that the private charter operator has the legal authority to provide the proposed charter service that the operator meets all necessary safety certifications, licensing and other legal requirements to provide the proposed charter service.
