

Squeeze Toy Recall

D.C. -- In coporation with the Consumer Product Safety Commission, Fluctro-Plastics, Inc. of Port Newark, New Jersey, today announced a voluntary recall of four "Happy-Mates" squeeze toys because they are small enough to lodge in the throat of a child and obstruct the airway thus causing choking and/or suffocation. Although these particular toys have not been involved in any choking incident known o CPSC, similar shaped toys have been involved in choking deaths. Between 8 and 9 thousand of these toys have been distributed primarily in the northeastern states during La lest 2 years.

"The Board's decision remains an affront to my constituents, to all Black Americans and to all Americans of good will who deplore South Africa's racist policies. Where we go from here will be decided after we have reviewed today's decision in detail with our attorneys. If there is a way to force the Board to reverse its sorry decision, I will find it," Leland said.

About Social Security

Q. I have been to the doctor three times in 1982 out haven't submitted any bills to Medicare yet. I undersland Medicare will not reimburse the first \$75.00 worth of bills. Should I send the next bill I have in to Medicare?

A. You should submit each bill to Medicare even if you haven't met your \$75.00 deductible. Medicare will keep a record of your bills and start reimbursing you when the allowable charges total \$75.00.

Q. I was in the hospital in May of this year at which time I paid \$260.00 to the hospital, I have been told I must go back into the hospital. Will I have to pay the \$260.00 deductible again.

A. Yes, if it has been more than 60 days since your first hespital stay, you will again be responsible for the \$260.00 deductible. If you are discharged and readmitted within a 6c day period, you do not have to pay the \$260.00 deductible again.

Q. I have been receiving a disability check the past 7 years. About 2 months ago, I took a light job. My wife thinks I should report this to social security. I don't think I should since I'm still disabled to do the work I used to do. What should I do?

A. You must reper? any work to social security. If you have not medically recovered, you might be entitled to a trial work period and continue to receive your disability check while you work. At the end of the 9-month trial work period, your work will be evaluated. If it is determined that you are able to do substantial work, your check will be terminated.

Q. My weighbor is drawing a social security check but he isn't disabled because he works every day. believe his check should be stopped. Can you do this? A. If you can furnish your neighbor's rame, some identifying information, and more details concerning his work, we will be glad to investigate the matter.

Black Farm Population Down

blacks remained on the ration's farms in 1981, according to a report from the Commercial Department's Census Bureau and the U.S. Department Agriculture.

The 222,000 lacks on farms represented 3.8 percent of the total farm population and was a sham drop from 350,000 in 1978. The black total dropped 67 percent from 1970 while the white total declined 25 percent.

In many instances, counselors are not versed in cross-cultural courseling. Ingram believes this can be dangerous as far as seiting a negative pattern for future counseling sessions.

"Cross-cultural counseling as a disclipine has not quite earned legitimacy," Ingram said. "There are many beneficial effects, such as trust, which can be established when counselor and client come from different cultures and have a successful session. Unfortunately, there is a greater danger of having r negative experience when a counselor is not trained in cross-cultural counseling."

Ingram said a black child is often taught not to trust white people and vice versa.

"This proconceived idea can create a parrier when there is a white counselor," he said.

Language is the number one vehicle in building apport between client and counselor who come from different cultures, Ingram noted. "If a counselor isn't

We have a lot of years in the Black press of America. We are the oldest, on going, Rlack business in this country. Most of you probably know that the Black press started in 1827 with Samuel Coulish, the originator of the first Black Presbyterian Congregation. Cornish participated in many reform movements and he was an active member of the Anti-Slavery Society. The publication he founded was Freedom's Journal with John B. Russwurm. Later Russwurm. became involved with the Colonization Movement but Cornish continued to publish the paper for the next 20 years. Freedom's Journal played a major role in shaping a social and economic philosophy for Blacks. Such gifted person such as James McCune Smith, Alexander Chummell, Martin R. Delany, and David Ruggles used the journal to express their opinions. Comish, as the editor, fought relentlessly for full rights to citizenship and equality of Blacks. As a trustee of the free schools for Blacks in New York, he energetically promoted higher education for Blacks. participating in many reform movements, he was an active member of the American Anti-Slavery Society. On one occasion, he voiced his contempt for a group of prominent Philadelphia Blacks who at that time urged the free people of color to drcp the adjective "colored" which at that time was used and preferred by Biacks from and identification standpoint and used the term "oppressed Americans." We still, at this time, have the same term preferred by the masses "Black" being rejected by the same type today. More Black publishers have been lynched, mobbed, beaten and killed than any other profession that Blacks have undertaken. The Black press is still in there. We have our ups and downs and it gets tough sometime but most of the pressures we receive come from within through misunderstandings of what we are really about and petty jealously and envy. As stated earlier, we have our ups and downs but all businesses have their ups and downs but we are beginning to understand more and more as we become involved in mainstream America, that we are involved in theis capitalistic system as a business and we are endeavoring to convert our newspaper from a sociological phenomenon to a marketing tool to keep pace with the times and still do the job that was set out by Cornish and Eusswurm in 1827. As we do this we will understand more about the profit motive so that we will be able to survive and we won't have so many downs with the ups. We'll just keep going up. The Black press, church and community organizations will have to take the leadership and initiative in this upward move. It takes us all working collectively for the survival adn good of all of us. The advent of the Black press is a many splendid things. If you do not believe it, check history. Certainly we make our mistakes and certainly you don't like a lot of the stuff we pring, certainly you criticize us and you give us a tuff time but we want you to know we are hanging in there and we are doing the best we can for the quality of life for Black, minority and poor people. We will continue to image build those that could not otherwise be recognized. We will continue to imorm you of things that affect us that is not good in the best interest of us. That's our duty, that's our creed. *********



In 1981, Weaver made 50 drunk-driving arrests, 250 accident investigations and 720 traffic citations. Nationwide, the average police officer makes about two drunk-driving arrests a year, according to John Moulden of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Age Before Bullets White House Recommends Waste

Two hundred fifty billion dollars is enough money to operate the state of California for a decade without one cent in taxes. It is also the mir imum amount of money to be spent by the swords of war in the White House this fiscal year. Fighting a war is expensive even If no shots are fired by either side. Since the U.S.S.R. is committed to protecting its Interests it is hopeless to magine frightening the victors of the Germany Fuherer to falling to its feet at the very sight of new weapons. Especially a "dune buggy.

The U.S. Army's newest fast attack vehicle is a \$25,000 "dune buggy" job. Fat tires to match fat heads no doubt. It is doubtful this four wheel co traption could compete with a \$2,000 three wheel Honda "big red" on rough open ferrain. To be taken seriously the Defense Department requires a reorganization of the U.S. Army, Navy and Air Force at the very top of command. Otherwise, a continuing waste of tax payers money will make a mockery of the U.S. military. A single soviet rifle shot could cause the loss of \$25,000 and the life of an individual hopping around in one of these unprotected skeleton cars.

Concern is center in the White House not on military spending waste but cuts in social security benefits. Before the blood letting of programs to benefit the poor the people who operate the White Prouse only wish they could cut social security benefits. But the President has now pushed them to the point of no return. He has foreclosed many options for dealing with a projected budget deficit of \$200 billion by ruling out both any cutback in his defense buildup and any new taxes. To take funds from any other part of the federal budget means to fool with social security benefits. By this time even the most conservative middle-class white voter can see whom s ox is going to be gorged.

It is suspected that much of the \$65 billion weapons budget to pay workers are exorbitant wages. Wages not subjected to the social security tax which would contribute to the strength of the social security plan. Wait, there's worst news. The projected cost of 39 major weapons systems for all three military services has escalated to a total of \$452 billion at mid-year - \$1.6 billion above estimates made just three months earlier. Enough money to make ends meet for at least six years, based on a short fall projection of \$250 million in social security revenues. Reasoning and reconsidering the books recommend a change in White House rhetoric if not residents.
