The 1.200 guests who attended the gale reception included top White House staffers, Secretary Ray Donovan of the U. S. Department of Labor, severai members of Congress and some 20 ambassadors. Several mayors were on hand.

A standing-room only crowd saw Mayor Johnny Ford of Tuskegec, Alabama and NCBM's President, make Miss Williams an honorary member of the organization while her first runner-up, Suzette Charles - Miss New

Jersey - watched.

"In each city where black mayors rule, you will receive the red carpet treatment and the keys to the city," Ford declared. He drew merry approval from the assembled guests as he quipped, "But as pretty as you are, you'll have to come and get each and every one of them." 

Social Security is more than paying taxes and more than getting checks every month. It's a partnership between you and the Government. To find out the role you have in this partnership, ask any Social Security office for a free copy of the pamphlet "Your Social Security. ******

If you get monthly Social Security or SSI checks, here's some important information. You can have your check sent directly to wherever you have a checking or saving account. Then you won't have to watit in line every month to cash your check, or worry about it getting lost or stolen. To have your c'eck


deposited directly to your account, just fill out a direct deposit form where you do your banking.


There's an open enrollment period every year from January I to the end of March for the medical insurance part of Medicare. You can enroll at that time if you no er had medical insurance protection of if you had it and canceled it. Any Social Security office will be glad to help you.

If you don't get Social Security retirement benefits at age 65 because of work, your payments will be higher when you do get them. You'll get an extra 3 percent for each year between 65 and 70 that you were eligible for benefits but didn't get them. This is called delayed retirement credit.

We All Want What Is Good For All Of Us!!

Last week, we got our punches in over our heart attack, but let's face the facts, no matter what our differences or methods, we all want the best for our city. The City of Lubbock, Texas, no matter which team we play on, we all have the same ultimate goal—a better Lubbock. Right, Ken—Kenneth May that is of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. No matter how we push in our own way, we want the same end resulsts—a better Lubbock for all of us.

A good reference to this is the letter last week by Byrne Bass. Brother Bass said, in essence, a newspaper that does not have a constant editorial opinion is not worth its salt, but the readers have the right to disagree with the editorial opinion. As well as the paper has its right to its opinion. Those looking for a reason to critize with such things as mispelled words, mistakes, typos, etc., are in a fact, petty and have nothing better to do.

Our friend John Logan at the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce says "I do not agree with most of the editorials you write, but you have your right to your opinion and I as a reader have the right to disagree and the right to write a letter to the editor and tell you so. You have the right, as an editor, to publish or not publish my letter. That's your right," John, hope we can get together with a plan to help stimulate some economic progress and development in the Black community of Lubbock. We have been planning and talking for many years now.

It is time for us to now get some action in the Enterprize Zone or something which can help. Or whatever!

Lubbock cannot spend one hundred dollars on minority set aside contracts for minorities' goods and services, but, on the other hand, Lubbock can spend some 650 thousand dollars for studies. Yes, studies, not for goods and services, but studies for white non-

Lubbock consulants. For example 300 thousand for the River Walk study; 150 thousand for future River Walk studies; and 150 thousand dollars for a Lubbock Fire Department study. This is not new, nor is this the only studies the City of Lubbock has wasted money on. The biggest goof was the transportation study and the acquisition of those Gruman kiddle buses. What a waste at a large cost. Not one dime was spent according to the 1986 Surface Transportation Act.

Color does make a difference, especially if that color happens to be Black. All of Africa is concerned about the excuses coming from Washington for not helping that continent, by finds the time and money to help all nations of non-Black without a thought. Even Brown nations are getting new money and other aid. Even when fighting the U.S.A. or their Al es. Brazil owes banks in the U.S.A. 94 billion dollars; Mexico owes 91 billion; Argengina ows 41 billion; Korea another 40 billion; Venzueia 31 billion: Indonesia 26 billion; Turkey owes 22 billion. The list goes on and on, including. Philippines owes 22 billion and Chili owes 18 billion. Not one of them can pay on same and some may default on the debt completely and there is noting may default on the debt completely and there is nothing the U.S.A. can do but lend them some more. Hoping at they get back on their feet!!

On the local level, the same prevails if you are Black as far as money is concerned. Stand back and there is always good reasons for being turned down if you are Black. But on the same day at the same bank, a white that is a lot worse risk can get money. Funny, but its true color does make a difference especially if that color happens to the Black. We got so many games olayed on us. For example October 2nd was Minority Enterprise Development Week while the SBA and other sources of help has been cut back or off!



\$25,000 World's Toughest Triathlon Muscles, Mountains, and Money

South Lake Tahoe ... A see thru emerald green lake, pearl of the North, snow capped mountains, skiers delight, warm breeze weather, a hint of nudity and a lot of money will either you put in ecstacy or drive you mad. Spectators like myself enjoyed every moment of the maddest of the World's Toughest Triathlon. The athletes were just plain mad, as in crazy, or at least it seemed that way. First they swam 2.4 miles, then rode a bike for 120 miles, follwed immediately by a marathon of 26.2 miles, making the Hawaii "Iron Man" race a teddy bear by comparison. "That's Incredible" TV filmed this thing, why not?

Since I was living it up at the Sahara Tahoe, hot tubs et al, it was difficult to either feel sympathy for the competitors or slip past the slot machines in the lobby. Sheana Easton was singing in the special room and Lionel Richie was warbling across the street at Caesar's Tahoe. It was a tough race but I made it across the street.

Oh, yes, back to the other \$25,000 plus purse contest. Competitors were first given gold for winning, over all singles, men and women, equal prize monies, let's hear it for women's lib in the state of Nevada. Five thousand dollars for getting back to Caesar Tahoe parking lot first. In the event you could find two other fawns, and being young and innocent helped, then entering as a relay team taking one of the three legs was worth \$500 for the winning team. Prizes worth over \$10,000 were given to mixed teams, male and female, as well as, for all women teams.

Why man or woman would want to corture their bodies in this race is still undecided since 20% of the athletes fail to get out of the water for the first part. By the time they had pedaled their bikes from the 6,000 foot level to almost 8,000 foot level, little more than half remained in the race. At Caesar's Tahoe during the awards banquet, I sat next to an Austin, Texas competitor who actually fell out of the race — twice! They pulled him out of the water — it was 56 degrees — COLD adn then he crashed his bike later going 38 miles per hour down a mountain. Mad. He would have had better luck at the slot machine where some woman won \$1 002,048 that week at the Sahara Tahoe.

It took Runnar Boman, a 24-year-old "climber" as he calls himself, exactly 11 hours, 55 minutes and 19 seconds to finish the 148.6 mile course which includes running a round skunks on an old lumber company service run along the Ponderosa Ridge Trail. Bonanza for Boman was getting his butt back to Caesar's Tahoe's health club for a bot bath.

Seriously folks, South Tahoe has found its fountain of youth. You will be hearing more about this mucho money race in the years to come, espeically since the South Tahoe Marketing Council and tasty Tahoe beer are backing the most humanly demanding race in the country with real big money. You could be a winner witnessing this race.

witnessing this race. Black Americans goe a bit of the bucks, too, the first person to cross the finish line just happened to be a soul brother, born and raised in South Tahoe, 30-yearold, John Gailson. John an accomplished marathon runner, Hawaii, San Francisco and Seattle, was the final leg of the urst place relay team, completing the 26.2 mile marathon in just two hours, 57 minutes and 58 seconds. Since the Olympic record for the marathon is two lours, nine minutes and 55 seconds. on relatively flat terrain, G'. son's mountain climbing at 6,006 plus altitude with 1800 foot swing on pavement, dirt and gravel roads was nothing short of sensational. Caesar's Tahor and Sahara Tahoe missed a good bet, Harrahs gave John a hat. It hit the finish une across the street from the Sadara in Caesar's parking long.

The Law and Legal Services Termination of Parental Rights

One type of lawsuit in Texas that affects the parentchild relationship is a suit for involuntary termination, or a suit to terminate the rights of parents against their will. "Any person with an interest in the child" may bring a termination suit.

"Any person with an interest in the child" first includes the government. Usually this is Children's Protective Services of the Department of Human Resources ('welfare") or any authorized adoption

Second, an important new provision of the Texas Family Code effective in September of this year specifically states that any person who has had possession and control of the child for six months is a person with an interest in the child.

Third, some ten different categories of persons entitled to receive notice of the shit being filed are persons with an interest. These include all persons who have an interest in a child by virtue of a court order, parents whose rights have not been terminated, and biological fathers.

Lastly, since any adult may adopt a child and since termination is a prerequisite to adoption, arguably any adult person filling an adoption may have standing to

Experience has shown that poor parents are most likely to face a termination of their rights by a suit for termination brought by welfare or a suit for adoption brought by some private person, frequently but not always a relative, who has had possession and control of the child or children for at least six months.

must be proved by clear and convincing evidence before a judgement of termination is proper. One of thes elements that is required to be proved in all termination cases is that "termination is in the best interest of the child."

Regardless of who brings the suit, certain elements

In addition to the best interest of the child, some other ground for termination must be proven. Both best interest and other grounds will be discussed in the next column.

WASHINGTON -- The \$3.5 billion public service jobs bill passed the first hurdle in its uphill Congressional fight recently when the House version was carried by a 246-178 vote. The legislation, which was introduced by Congressman Augustus Hawkins, chairman, of the Subcommittee on Employment Opportunity, has been given strong endorcements by the Congression! Black Caucus and a broad coalition of over 80 national organizations.

The bill provides 500,000 jobs to be created through a program of grants to local governments for community improvement projects and public school repairs. It also provides jobs primarily for people out of work for more than 15 weeks or who have exhausted their unemployment benfits.

Democrats and Republicans argued over the bill in two days of vigorous, often emotion-charged debates. Rep. Robert Walker, a conser alive Republican said during the debate that "people do not want government-sponsored jobs. They want real jobs and a productive economy."

Congressman Parren Mitchell, out spoken Baltimore Democrat responded, "people in my district are saying 'Get me any kind of job you can get me. Sweeping floors, hauling garbage, anything."

"They are not worned about going back into productive jobs in the private sector. They never have had them. Black people in my district have been

The National Bankers (black-oriented) Association recently convened its 56th Annual Convention in Tulsa, with Rev. Benjamin L. Hooks, executive director of the NAACP as the speaker for the Awards Luncheon: Noted political activist. Dick Gregory, who gained fame as a comedian spoke to the group in its. 56th convention. The National Bankers Association is the trade group of the National Banks which are owned by blacks, Hispanics and other minorities. The association's national office is located in Washington, D. C.

Gregory emphasized health as of particular concern to blacks. He said that stress is built into living in a racist society. "No other race on this earth are living under as much stress as blacks in America," he added.

700,000 people and 250 buses couldn't get into the city and the recent march on Washington was a demonstration to the world that cannot be ignored. Gregory told the bankers that blacks have made progress. Things are moving, 20 years ago we were at the back of the bus - today at the front of a space capsule. "We will never lose what we have gained. The change is in the mind. We are not arraid of the Klan anymore, so the Klan is dying."

However, he cautioned the group to make use of their economic power. He said that blacks spend \$100 million a year on paper towels. \$193 million on chewing gum and \$300 million on Pampers, with a white baby on the box. The day is over for apologizing to a white system. "The NBA is powerful and respected — but make yourself felt and seen in the black community," Gregory concluded.

Black Methodist Again Talk Merger! There can be little doubt that the Black Methodist churches in the emaller towns and rural areas of our country are in trouble insofar as growth is concerned. Reports at several annual conferences of Black Methodists in Northwest Texas and in areas of Oklahoma and Louisiana reveal recently that a number of these "missions" are closing their doors or they are on the "brink."

One of the greatest problems facing these churches is increased taxation with fewer people to report budget money and other special askings. The current recession is causing a lot of black Methodists to seek greater apportunities in larger cities of the nation. The Big 3 Black bodies are: The C. M. E., the A. M. E. and the A. M. E. Zion. All of these bodies support their own theological and other institutions of higher learning, as well as their own foreign mission and other speical programs and their budgets are growing slimmer each year.

Meeting in merger talks in Charlotte, North Carolina, Bishop William M. Smith, senior bishop of the A. M. E. Zien Church stated:

"Banks, Savings and Loan institutions, colleges, big corporations and others are merging all over this world. Can't we see the hand writing on the wall. The trend is in this direction, We must move up, or move out!!"

It was pointed out that an enormous amont of money would be saved in publications, world representation, colleges and that "we cannot afford the luxury of separation in these days of escalation of prices and high cost of doing business." Speech Heard Around World

Furrenton, Ca - (KNS) The lecture hall was buzzing with bits and pieces of coversation as Black students at California State University, in Fullerton, gathered to hear Dr. Mattrhew Jenkins, the distinguished Veterinarian who discovered rabies in Greenland in 1958 and retired to become one of te most prominent Black businessmen in the United States.

"I just want to thank you for inviting me here to speak today," said Dr. Jenkins, who went on to publish a paper on the discovery, treatment and elimination of rables in Greenland in the Journal of American Veterinary Medical Assn.

Lectures are normal for college students. Some have a tendency to sort of half-listen when they know that one of their diligent friends will take notes.

"I chose the subject of functioning in the American economic system because somehow I feel we, as a group, do not understand it." Dr. Jenkins said, solemnly waiting for the students to quieten in their seats.

Black uemployment figures in America remain unbelievably high; even college graduates are finding it difficult to plan for any kind of stable future.

Dr. Matthew Jenkins is no oddity in the Black race. Thousands of other Black men and women have successfully figured out the system of American capitalism and they have carved niches for themselves in the archives of business achievment in this nation.

Metthew Jenkins was an honor student and president of the student chapter of the American Veterinary Medical Assn. (AVMA) when he was presented with his degree at Tuskegee Institute in

He served in the U.S. Air Force from 1957 to 1960 and attained the rank of Captain while discovering and eliminating Greenland's rabies.

Dr. Jenkins came to Catifornia in 1960 and worked for the Veterinary Department of the state. He started a private practice in Compton, California and watched as his business grew to a four-man practice and a staff of 18 people with modern offices in Compton and Long Beach, California.

In the early 1960s, Dr. Jenkins attended night school to study Real Estate and currently has substantial college credits in real estate principles, practices, law and investment

In 1967, Dr. Jenkins was elected > trustee of Compton College, became president of that board in 1968, and was recently honored by that school for his commitment to the proper motivation of young Blacks. In 1970, Dr. Jenkins

appeared before the American Veterinary Medical Convention. introduced and was responsible for the passage of resolutions which resulted in the dismissal of any state that practices discrimination against minority Veterinarians from membership in the AVMA; placing Blacks in position placing Blacks in positions of authority in that organization; and, the establishment of a program for the recruitment of minority

Dr. Jenkins developed a new anesthetic combination for cats, the results of which were published in Modern Veterinary Practice in February, 1972. This drug is now being used in many different countries


around the world. In 1973, Dr. Jenkins was elected to the Board of Trustees of his alma mater and he has served as chairman of the Advisory Board to the School of Veterinary Medicine at Tuskegee. He also has served as a n ember of the recruitment committee to the University of California, Davis School of Valerinary Medicine.

And though Dr. Jenkins retired and sold his practice to two fellow Tuskegee Veterinarians in 1979, he continues to receive awards for his many educational and financial contributions and his astute business and humanitarian acumen.







When asked about the single member district. which may become a reality early next year, the Bluefield, West Virginia native said, "I think the single member district will create more problems. If you look at the demographics, you'll see that the figures don't gurantee that a Black will be elected to the city council. On the other hand, 26.1% of the eligible voters are Black and they can make a difference in any local election."

.. "We may not be able to see that a candidate is elected, but we can keep one from being electedQ. Even when Mexican Americans interests are different from ours, let them (Mexican Americans) go their way. A joint effort, however, on the part of Blacks and Mexican Americans will be a political threat and could change Lubbock drastically."

"Let's face it, there are some drawbacks in politics when it comes to a minority running for office here. There are very few minorities in Lubbock who can participate in the governmental process. This is because they (Blacks and Mexican Americans) are dependent rather than independen. A person would have to be independent while serving in any local political office," he said. "Many Blacks and

Mexican Americans are not politically literate. Many act mostly on emotions rather than demographics; voting patterns and other vital areas," said Saunders.

"In Lubbock," according to Saunders, "there are gate keepers here. These are people who are restricted in certain areas and are limited to the access of the political structure. Most are selfserving. This is one of the fears I see in the single member district, but only under new manage-


