Small Businesses: **Our Silent Crisis**

In recent months there have been increasing reports about adverse economic conditions in the business community. Naturally, much of this attention has been given to the major industries such as steel and auto; and for good reasons.

Many of the working families in our communities have jobs related to steel, and the rise and fall of steel prices has become a barometer for the economy since the production of many goods are tied directly to steel cutput. The auto industry is also critically important to the overall state of the economy. It's estimated that one of every five Americans has a job which is related to the automobile in some way.

However, we tend to overlook a problem which has become overshadowed by all the gloom from big business. The plight of small businesses remains a silent crisis.

The Small Business Administration is now predicting that the failure rate for small businesses will continue to lag behind any general recovery for the economy. Small businesses have suffered from the tight monetary, high interest rates policy of Reaganomics, and the end result has been consumer uncertainty and declining response. Since the president's budget proposals went into effect, 50,000 small businesses have gone

Large firms, as pointed out above certainly are facing hard times also. However, these companies can use tax breaks and profits from investments as cushions to make a rough ride a bit easier. Small businesses do not have this luxury to rely on. In fact, bankruptcies for small businesses increased by 32 percent between 1980 and 1981.

We must guard against the further demise of small businesses because these ventures go to the very heart of our private enterprise system. However, because of the economic policies from the Reagan administration small businesses have and will continue to take it on the chin.

While small businesses are struggling to survive, the president managed to cut taxes for the rich and profitable corporations by a staggering \$750 cillin over the next five years.

Small businesses need reasonable interest rates, allowances for start up capital, tax breaks and additional monetary incentive to remain in business so they can be active in helping to revive our sluggish economy.

Reagonomics as an economic medicine has proven to be fatal for too many small businesses. Business failures were heaviest for small construction firms. From 1980 to 1981, the rate of failure for these firms increased by 49 percent. In retail trade the rate of failure jumped by 41 percent; for wholesale trade the rate was 32 percent; and for services the increase was 27 percent.

For minority-owned enterprises the picture is even more bleak. A report from the Department of Commerce recently said that unless there is assistance from the private sector, minority businesses could very well be "extinct" by 1990.

As a member of the Small Business Committee in Congress, as well as subcommittees ranging from minority anterprise to tax, access and equity capital, i encouraged my readers to help me with the business that needs to be done: economic resuscitation for small business.

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
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

Automobile executives think the American auto industry ought to have a new lock. Change: to make different in some particular, to give a different position, course or direction, us defined in the dictionary. "New style" is the name of the game in autos and all other industries in America in the 1980s, Senior management at the world's largest auto manufacturer threw a curve at the concerned members of the Commonwealth Club of California the day after April fools day.

A delicious looking dame detailed the new direction of the American automobile direction of the American automobile industry. Anyone who is a believer in the paraphrase that "so goes General Motors, so goes the country," was easily sold by the female dean of American economist Dr. Marina von Newmann Whitman, Vice President and Chief Economist, General Motors Corporation. She claims when automakers come back, "It is going to be almost impossible to find a 100% built U. S. car ... Calling her address to the august members "The American Response," answers flowed freely as to the tactic General Motors, thus the U.S. will take to overcon e foreign competition. Cutting wages is one of the first steps. Start thinking foreign made parts as permanent components of cars and other consumer products is second. Put simply, some part of all products will be produced somewhere else in the world if GM has got anything to say about the product. Bad naws for Black American workers, where low skills are highly paid in U. S. versus almost free foreign

Dr. Whitman, is a prime example of the new product look, a female senior executive elected up from the ranks. Regal in her looks and outlooks, Dr. Whitman is extremely well educated and well respected across the country and around the world. Prior to joining G.M., she was a distinguished public service professor or economics at the University of Pittsburgh. In the early 1970s she was a senior staff economist with the Council of Economic Advisors, a member of the National Price Commission and one of three economists serving on the Council of Economic Advisors under Infamous President Nixon. Associated with a number of academic, governmental and private advisory organizations, including the Trilateral Commission, better known as the Carter, Kissinger, Rockerfeller, etc worlwide movers and shakers club.

Dr. Whitman calls for restoring and enhancing the country's "ability to stay one step ahead of the competition." Black Teen-Agers And Unemployment

The unemployment statistics for Marcy 1982, particularly as they pertain to black teen-agers. constitute a shocking indictiment of the Reagan Administration's employment programs and policies and of its attitudes toward the black

Not only does the overall unemployment rate stand at nine percent - the highest rate since World War II and hearly two percentage puints above the rate during this Administration's first full month in office -- but the rate for black teenagers is a mind-blowing 46 percent, an almostfour percentage point increase in a month and a staggering increase of close to fan points since February 1981. For black teen-age males, the increase it nearly ten points just since last month! Given the fact that the rates for white teen-at ira have actually come down from last month. -although they are camewhat higher than a year Administration is stortshanging these createst, and that its priorities are resplaced. These worsening statistics and the multilude to human tragedies behind them are directly traceable to rollbacks of the very programs which offered black teen-agers hopes of some rest progress in moving into he economic

The regulation - nicknamed "the squeal law" by its opponents — is viewed by the Reaganauts as an assault on men-age sex. Marjorie Mecklenburg, the department's acting

deputy assistant for population affairs, also seen that the federal government should not provide "dangerous" birth-control drugs and devices to young women without their parents' knowledge But the respected Alan Guttmucher Institute argues on the basis of a 1980 study that the squeal law would result in more — not fewer — youthful pregnancies and little reduc-tion in youthful sexual activity. The study focused on women under 18 who had visited family-planning clinics.

The institute also argues that prescription contraceptives are safer than pregnancy for women in this age group. Complications from the use of birth-contractions are concentrations. ed in women over 35 who smoke. In fact, the institute ways that the pill actually provides certain health benefits — such as protection from pelvic disorders, from deficiency apernia and other problems.

The squeal law would force more young women to seek birth-control information from less reliable sources and would make it more difficult to reach the 1.4 million mong women who do not use any sort of contraception.



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

This is the first in a series of five articles provided by Social Security in Lubbook, Texas. The articles are intended to provide some basic information about Social Security, highlighting recent changes, and give some insight into the future of the very important program. They are published as a public service by this newspaper.

There has been a tremendous amount of public attention focused on Social Security in the last five years. This is proper because Social Security directly fouches the daily life of virtually every American and is of critical importance to the nation. Social Security is America's basic method of providing a continuing income when earnings are reduced or stop because of retirement,

disability or death.

Just two generations ago, only a tiny percentage of Americans had protection against the loss of earnings. Only 15 percent were covered by any sort of retirement system. Many had to depend upon relatives or on welfare for basic support. The development of the Social Security system had changed this situation dramatically. Almost every American now has a direct stake in the system as either a beneficiary, a contributor building protection for the future, or the dependent of a contributor. Ninety-three percent of people 65 and older are eligible for Social Security bunefits. Ninety five out of 100 young children and their mothers are protected by Social Security survivor's insurance. Four out of five people of working age have protection against the loss of income due to long-term

More than 35 million -- one out of every six Americans -- receive a Social Security benefit each month. About 114 million people paid into

the program in 1980.

In almost every discussion about Social Security, come concern is expressed about the financial soundness of the system. Persons who work for SSA are very keenly aware that the fear that the system will become insolvent is a very real one to many people. However, among persons involved in studying or administering Social Security, there is virtually no doubt that the system will continue to pay benefits.

This is not to say that there are not financing issues which must be faced, because there are. The benefits will be paid because Social Security is such a fundamental part of the economic, social and political structure of this nation that would be virtually unthinkable to not fund it.

During its entire forty-seven year history, Social Security has never defaulted on any

More Than Ever!

A FIRST THAT WAS NEVER LAST

There is a brillant and charismatic person in the politicial arena of the U.S. Virgin Islands that Americans should know about. Although hers is a story which should have long since been told by Ebony, Essence or Sepia, her achievements even fits the mould of the Lady's Home Journal, Time, Red Book or even Vogue. Also the talk, talk ear beaters and any other print or electronic media used to transmit the greater human activity. The subject of this write approach is an American patriot, a person of ideals, and obviously a unique hutnan being. Her name is Ruby M. Rouss and she is president of the 14th Legislature of the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Her total career is intimate with "firsts" and pregnant with determination and purpose. She is the first black woman to head a legislative body in the United States, or its territories, in our history Not to gate the lady but her phenomenon of irsts started back in 1943. That was the time she became the first Virgin Islander to enlist in the Women's Army Corps. Natch she became a Master Sargeant. As expected she served on the staff of General Diright D. Eisenhower, the then Supreme Allied Commander. So she became the first black woman enlisted person to be assigned to SHAPE headquarters in Paris. Still adding number uno she became the first member of the Women's Army Corps to be assigned to infantry headquarters, Fort Dix, N'Jersey. She gave the armed so vice 21 good years, therefore it wasn't strange when she became the first member of that military body to retire.

Returning to her Virgin Islands home on St. Croix, she added another first when she was empoyed by the Harvey Alumina, the Island's first major industry which later became Martin Marietta. However, perhaps with an insight on things to come, she became the first parole and probation officer for both the Federal and Territorial courts on St. Croix. In 1974 she really became political ambitious and added to the record as the first woman to seek the office of Lieutenant Gov. However she was denied, but the next vote time around her bid for the 10th. Legislature met with greater acceptance and she became the first woman to be elected from St. Croix. In January 1981 she became Senate President Ruby M. Rouss. For the now, this caps a glorious career history of achievements of a remarkable human being. 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

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
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
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
