**Corner on Cotton**

**.34 To \$100**  
We just get mad . . . and every cotton man should, too . . . when we think about how little money is being spent to get rid of the boll weevil once and for all . . . we have an average annual loss of about 292 million dollars (that includes the money spent on fighting the pest) and we've spent an average of \$67,000 per year looking for a solution . . . figure it this way: We've been spending four cents in research for each \$100 of boll weevil loss!

There is a growing concern in the cotton trade over the handling of Choice "A" cotton . . . the law says the CCC must purchase the "A" cotton to support it . . . this puts the government in business as never before . . . prior to this the farmer always had the choice of withdrawing his supported cotton from the loan if he wished . . . now there is no choice on "A" cotton . . . much of the concern centers around the destruction of the competitive marketing system

Hot Planting  
You may be missing a bet by planting your cotton when the ground is too cool . . . some research indicates that you can get better emergence and better yields by putting the seed in the ground when a 10-day average soil temperature of not less than 60° has been reached . . . suggest you talk to your county agent about it.

Bravo!  
We know of a gentleman in Texas whose livelihood is tied closely to cotton . . . whenever a salesman calls on him the Texan takes a close look at the visitor's shirt . . . if it isn't cotton, the salesman doesn't sell a thing.

Council to Meet  
National Cotton Council will hold annual meeting in Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 9-10 . . . over 1,000 persons expected . . . Cotton's research department quotes garment manufacturers as saying wash-and-wear finishes have done more to boost sales of cotton fabrics than anything since sanforization.

if normal trade channels are not maintained the farmer may wake up some morning to find he has no place to sell his cotton except to the government and there'll be no chance of selling it for the "best" price because there'll only be one price: The one set by the government . . . remember the story about the camel that sticks his nose in the tent? . . . then the first thing you know he's all the way inside . . . surely there is a way to preserve normal trade channels and it's worth any amount of trouble to keep as much of the wool out of the tent as is possible

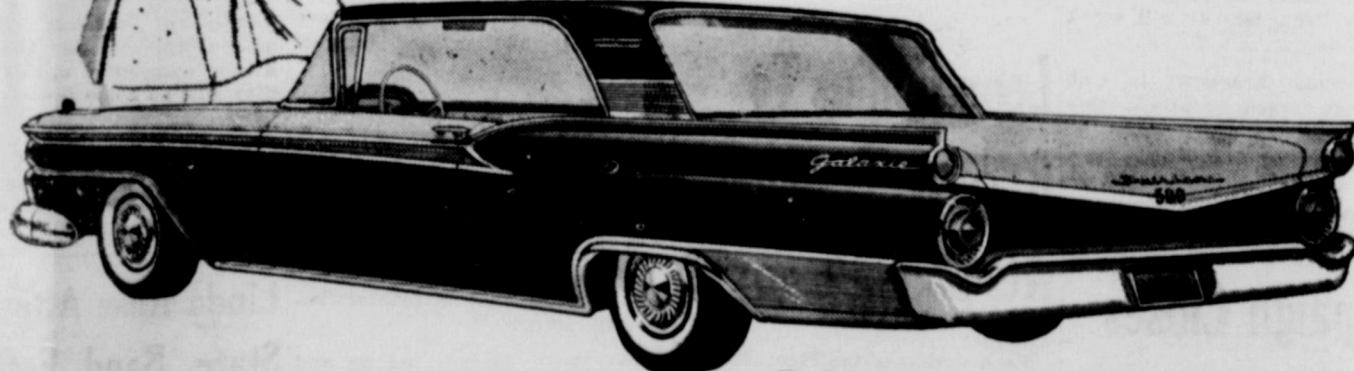

## XIT Study Club Enters Member In Sewing Contest

The needles and thread of local clubwomen were flying today as plans to enter a nation-wide Fashion - Sewing Contest were announced by the XIT Study Club Women of Springlake. Designed to select the "Ideal Costume for the Clubwoman's Wardrobe," the National Contest is being sponsored for the second consecutive year by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, Washington, D. C., with the cooperation of Vogue Pattern Service and the Woman's Club Service Bureau, New York City. All entries must be made and modeled by club members.

Mrs. Tommy Alair is being sponsored by the XIT Study Club.

Selections of the winning outfit will be on the basis of versatility and appropriateness for club occasions, over - all fashion effect, becomingness to wearer, and workmanship. In addition to being awarded a one - year subscription to Vogue Pattern Book, the winner will become eligible for participation in the second round of the contest when judgments at the

District level of the Federation are held later this year.

Third round of the contest will take place in the form of State Federation Judgings, where cash awards of \$100 and \$25 will be given the first and second place winners. A bronze plaque will be awarded the club represented by the first prize winner of each state contest.

A three week trip to Paris and London for two people, provided by the international travel service, Thos. Cook and Son, is the grand prize in the final, National Judging, with cash awards of \$500 and \$250 going to the second and third place winners. First and second place winners will also receive trips to the 1959 GFWC Convention in Los Angeles as part of their awards.

Other special awards will be

made to the clubs represented by the winners and to the State Federations with the highest percentage and highest number of member - clubs participating in the nation - wide contest.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Mrs. Green. Mrs. Calvin Wood gave the program, "Religion In The Home."

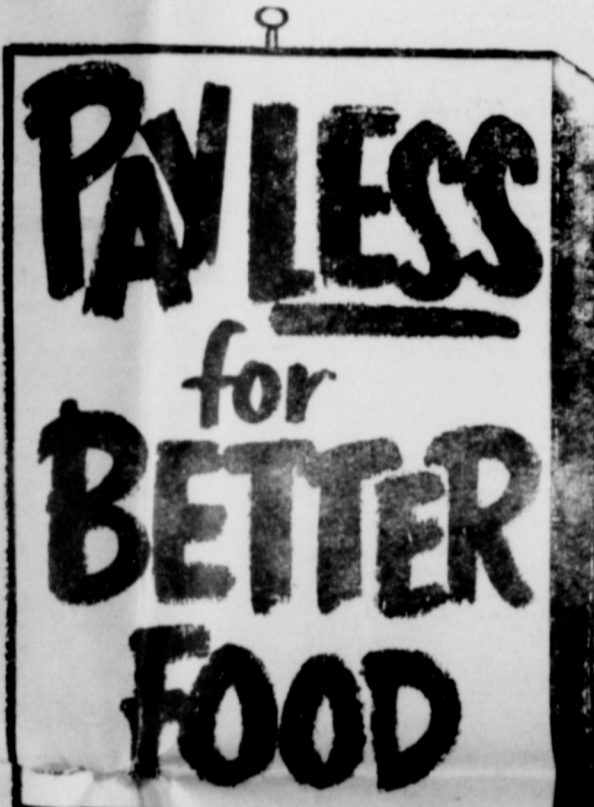
The club voted to endorse the Drivers Education Bill. Two dollars was donated to the fund to assist in sending a director of the Junior Study Club to the convention in Manila in July.

### Opportunities in the Smaller Steel Companies

Steel shares have performed excellently in the rising market of the past year. This reflected the industry's maintenance of a fair measure of earning power even when the operating rate declined substantially (at one point below 50% of rated capacity). As might be expected the industry leaders' profits held up best and their stocks have now regained or surpassed former price levels in many cases. At present a number of the leading steel issues have reached prices where there appears to be little room for further near-term appreciation.

Among the smaller companies on the other hand the opportunities appear more promising. Their earning power slumped more sharply and the prices of their stocks, despite good recovery in recent months, are in many instances still well below 1957 levels. Earnings have been improving steadily since the summer and should be at attractive levels during the first half of 1959. The producers of specialty and stainless steels are likewise now enjoying expanding operations and even greater operating rates are indicated in the coming months. The stainless and alloy producers, while having a changeable earning picture, have demonstrated an impressive growth pattern in recent years, easily double the growth in usage for the normal grades of steel.

**Wheeling Steel:** Close to \$3 per share was earned in 1958 and current operations are at a high rate. \$2 a share for the first quarter appears to be a possibility, with galvanized, tin plate, and cold rolled sheet lines in good demand.

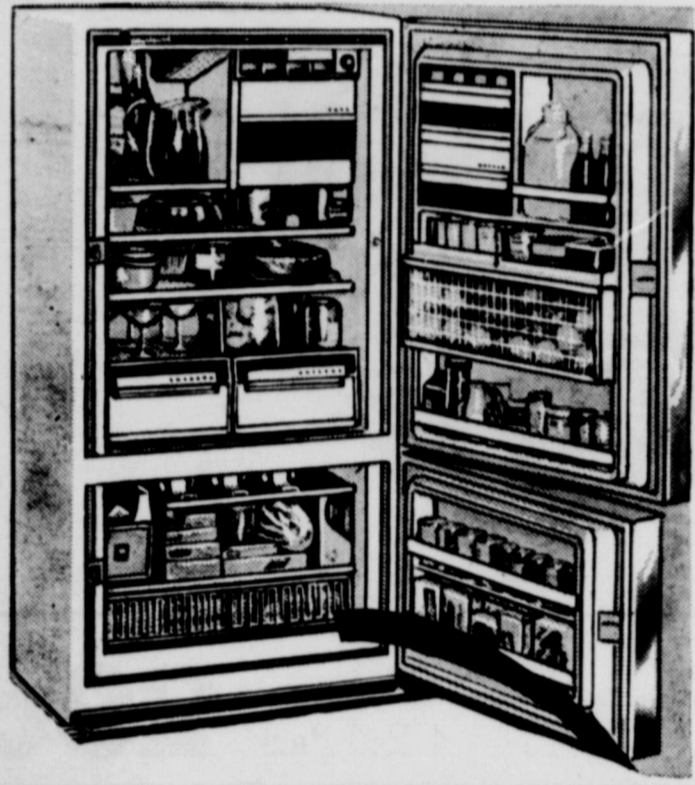

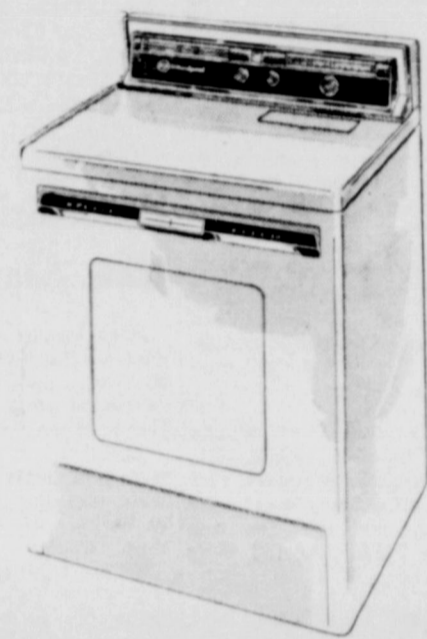

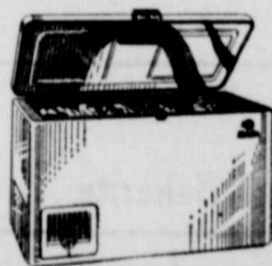
