





you're in good shape.' Slowly available nutrients which are not available now but will be in the feture are important as well as readily usable nutrients, Bennett pointed out. Fertilizer recommendations based on soil tests take both forms into consideration.

Farmers should plan now to take inventory of their soil by getting a soil test, Bennett advised. Local county agents can provide advice and assistance in taking a soil sample and submitting it for test-

THE LORD'S CHURCH? By W. E. IRVINE

BUT WHICH IS




