Downing stressed the usefulness of the small communities in the economy and advancement of the area and nation. "To keep your community, use it and be proud of it," he said. "The strength of the morals of America lie in the small communities and rural areas. Keep them alive, don't let them die."

"In 25 years we have lost 530 postoffices in Texas. I wonder if in the next 25 years we will lose another 530 communities," Downing continued.

"We must keep our communities alive, and the way to keep the communities alive is to use them. Patronize the merchants." He urged his listeners to develop pride in the fact they can "Get It At Earth, rather than wholesale somewhere." He reminded merchants that the women in your community are reading the same fashion magazines that women in Lubbock and Amarillo are reading and they will know when the merchandise is up to par.

"To many people are concentrating on science and are ready to boast of spectacular achievements, when we should brag a little about the average people, who are developing and growing food. The most important thing in the world is something to eat. It is these small communities that produce the major portion of our crops, he said.

Downing said America should be proud that its school children are learning how to sing, pray and respect their parents and never feel inferior because school children in some European countries are taught more science.

In making the presentation of the plaque to Mann, Jarvis Angeley, toastmaster, said he was "one who had gone beyond the duties of his position in working on community projects."

The students were honored for outstanding activities in citizenship, scholarship, sports, cooperation and diligence.

The banquet was opened with invocation led by Rev. Cecil Meadows. Sue Neal played piano selections preceding the program.

A reading was given by Jane Branscum, 7 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thurlo Branscum. The Trail Blazers, composed of Freddie Maxcey, Carlis Bills, Tuffy Dent and Kenneth Boone, sang several numbers, accompanied by Mrs. W. C. Maxcey at the piano. 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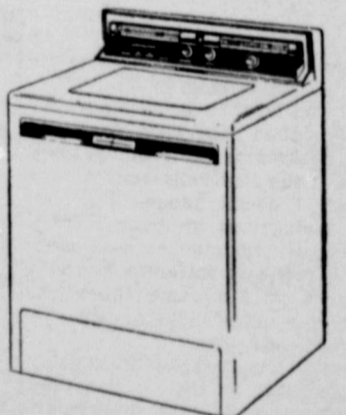

## Plains Cotton Guide To Be Available Soon

LUBBOCK — The Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in cooperation with the Texas Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has drafted a "Plains Cotton Guide."

Personnel of the Extension Service, Experiment Station and other organizations have met with the PCG and planned a coordinated cotton educational and promotional program for the High Plains area.

The new guide will be used for the educational program, which is to be aimed at helping High Plains farmers grow quality cotton and have it processed and marketed for greater profit.

The guide is divided into three sections: production, processing and marketing. It is to be made available to county agents and others who work with farmers throughout the High Plains. All members of the PCG will be mailed a copy. The guide analyzes the Plains cotton situation and sets forth steps to help producers in the production of higher quality cotton that has more uniformity and good character and in the marketing of such quality cotton for greater profit.

W. H. Jones, District Extension Service Agent, Lubbock, pointed out that production practices in general govern quality and yield. Processing procedures are problems of the farmer in harvesting and of the ginner in ginning cotton.

"The cotton farmer has a greater opportunity to improve his pro-

duction and harvesting practices than to better the ginning and marketing procedures, but an understanding of how cotton is processed and marketed may enable him to realize more net return from his investment and labor," Jones said.

Earl Hobbs, New Deal, President of the Plains Ginner's Assn., sat in on several planning sessions and urged the cooperation of ginner's with the farmers in this effort to raise the quality of Plains cotton.

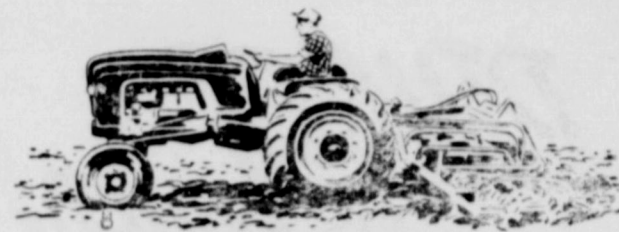

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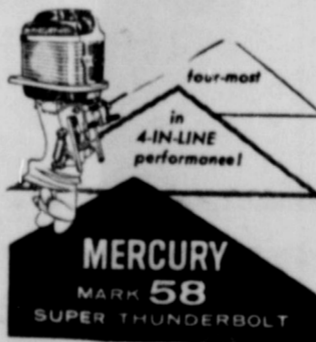

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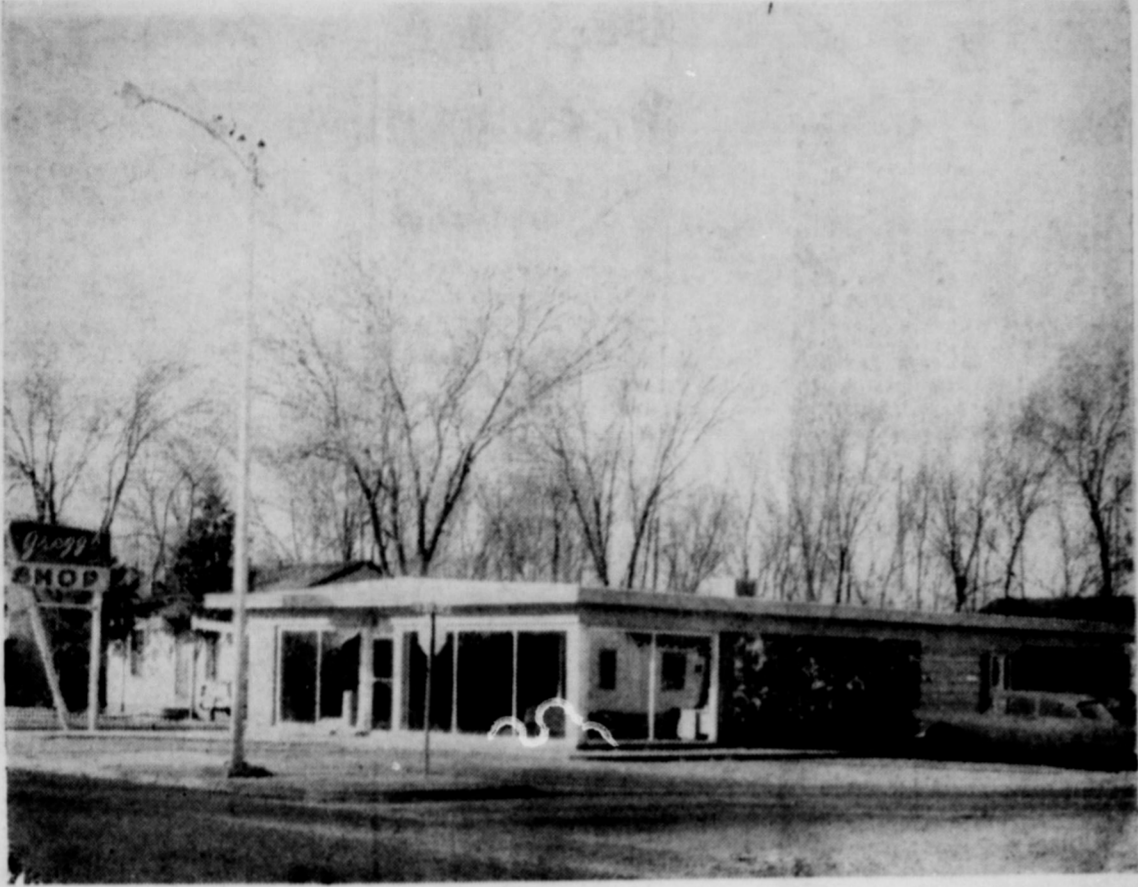

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## Series of Driving Tests Given By F. B. Safety Dept. Official Monday

Students of Springlake and Earth school will have an opportunity at 1:30 p.m. on April 21st to see for themselves how the false impression and sense of security that a driver of a modern automobile gets, can and does, often lead into the danger zone and trouble, when they participate in a series of driving tests.

The tests which will be in two parts, will be given under the direction of Vernon Gayle, Director of Safety of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

The first section will be lecture, while the second will be a demonstration. Gayle will also demonstrate the correct and incorrect driving habits.

High point of the demonstration will come, however, when driving tests are made with various students and faculty members in the specially equipped car. An electric detonator which is mounted on the front bumper of the car will fire yellow paint bullets to indicate the distance required to stop the car in an emergency.

The driver being tested will be signalled to stop by the report of the first shell. The second will be fired automatically when the brake is applied and the third when the car halts. Distance between the spots of paint will then be measured to determine the reaction and braking distances.

Tests will be limited to 20, 30, and 40 miles per hour speeds because of the danger in making emergency stops at higher speeds. Police officers will be used as drivers in the high speed tests.

As part of a program for safety on highway, the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department is presenting this driving demonstration and test before the high schools of this state. The program is being brought to Springlake-Earth under the sponsorship of Lamb County Farm Bureau. The public is invited to attend the lecture as well as the demonstration.
