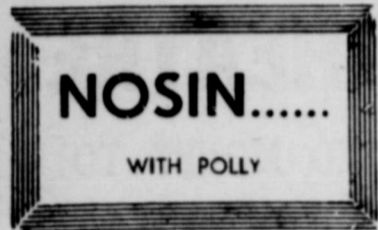

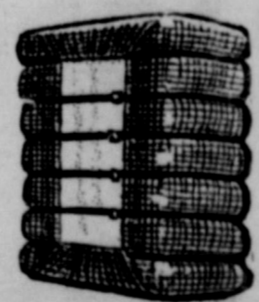
The Corner Cafe is located on Main and South Amherst Road, at the caution light.

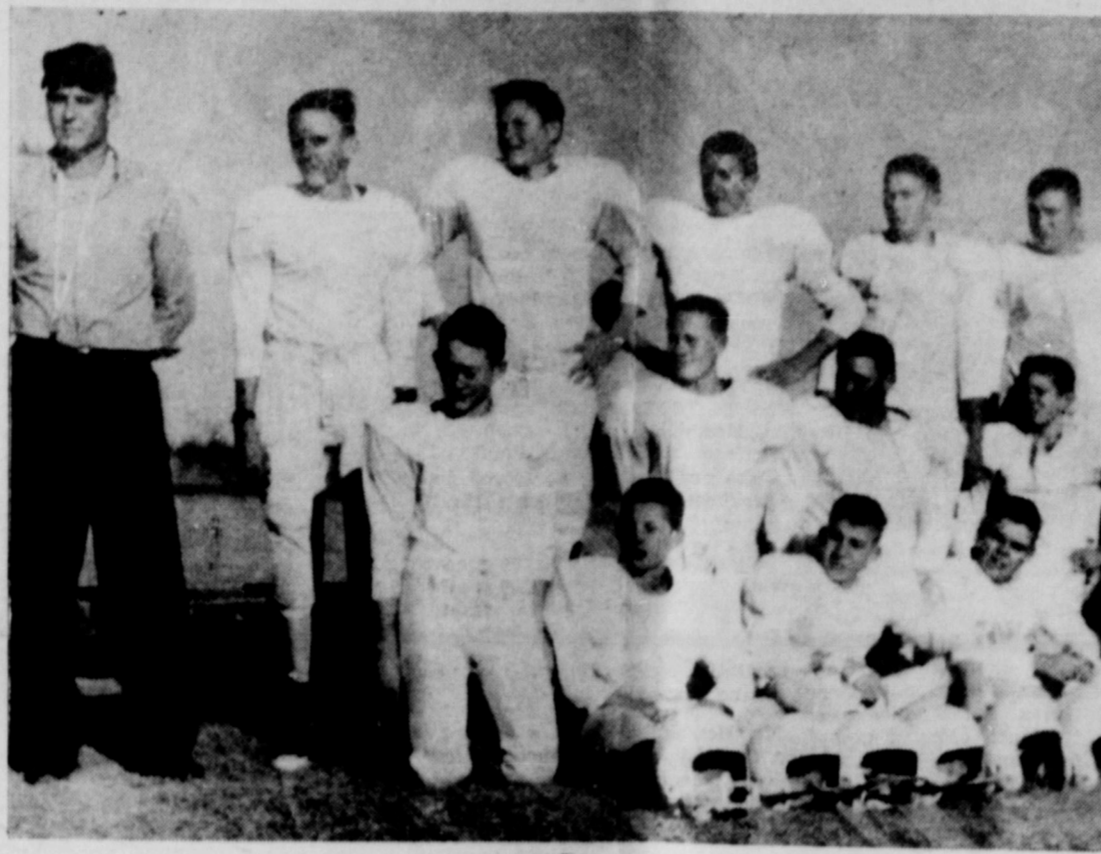

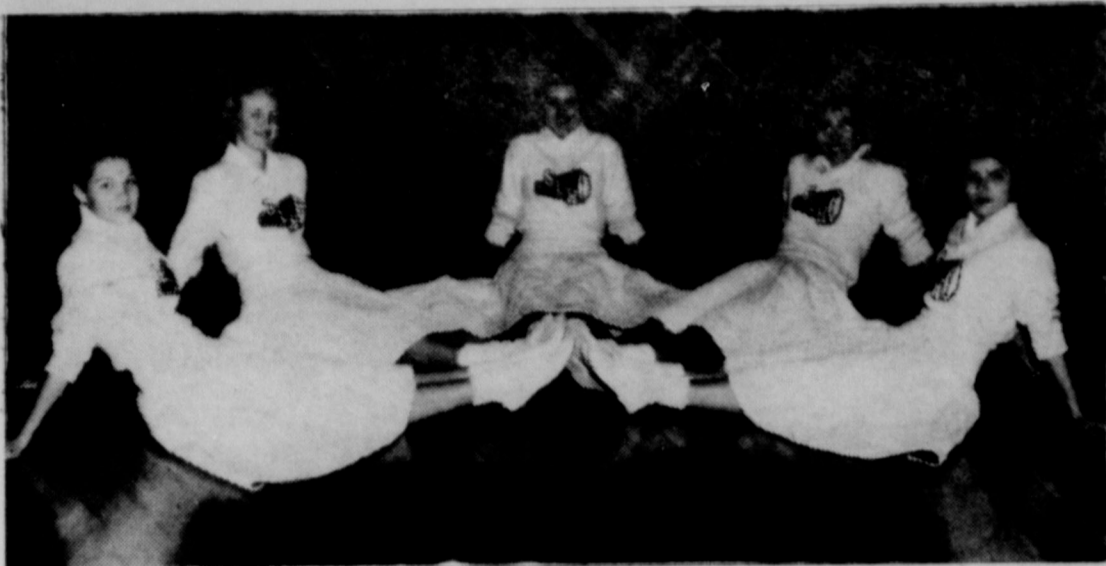

## New Law Will Qualify More Disabled Earners

Congress has removed the requirement that a severely disabled wage earner has to have some recent work prior to becoming disabled in order to be eligible for disability insurance benefits or the freezing of his social security wage record. The new amendments to the social security law will enable many more disabled wage earners to qualify than was previously possible.

The law as stated before provided that a severely disabled person must have worked in employment covered by social security at least five years out of the ten years prior to becoming disabled, and at least one and one half years of this time must have been in the three year period before becoming disabled. The new law has dropped the latter requirement of one and one half years work within the last three years.

Now a wage earner who otherwise meets the disability requirements under the law may have his social security record frozen, or if he is age 50 or over may receive monthly disability benefits as long as he is fully insured and has worked five years out of the ten before becoming disabled.

Some persons who will be affected by this change had previously filed claims under the old provisions of the law and were denied because they didn't have the recent work required. These individuals should again file a claim at this time according to John C. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office. Hutton states, how-

ever, that only those persons whose claim was denied because they did not work one and one half years out of the last three should refile their claims. A previous denial for any other reason would not be altered by the recent change in the law.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Earth on Nov. 5, 1958 at 11 a.m. at the Citizens State Bank and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

## Small Grain Diseases Take Heavy Toll In Texas Crop

Collage Station. — Small grain producers in Texas lost an estimated \$15,471,000 because of plant diseases in 1958, Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, said rust accounted for most of the losses but that blight and smuts also were of considerable importance.

Wheat growers lost and estimated 6,410,945 bushels; oat producers 5,138,293 bushels and barley losses due to diseases were estimated at 193,821 bushel. These losses, pointed out Smith, were suffered by producers but others also lost because the grains never entered the channels of trade. Too, market grades of the harvested crops were lowered due to the plant diseases.

Smith said disease losses were overlooked by many growers in 1958 because of the high total state production. Rust became established in South Texas on oats during the early part of the growing season and increased fairly rapidly during late fall and early

winter. Cool weather during the spring season slower the spread to the north. Light infection of wheat stripe rust developed in south and central Texas and later reached epidemic proportions in the major wheat areas of north-west Texas.

The plant pathologist suggested that small grain growers by using a combination of seed treatment and crop rotation could cut the losses. He also pointed out that some small grain varieties had resistance to the diseases and recommended that they be used in areas where adaptable.

Smith suggested a visit with the local county agent for more details on small grain diseases and possible control measures.

The report consists of an explanation and six tables, one on averages of fiber properties per grade, averages fiber properties per staple, averages Pressley per Micronaire, Cross Class of grades with staple, micronaire and fiber strength, cross class staple with micronaire and fiber strength and cross class micronaire with fiber strength.

The Quality Report is being gathered and printed to give buyers and textile mill officials more up to date information on the kinds and types of cotton being produced in this area, Pfeifferberger said.

to interest more mills and buyers in High Plains cotton, by giving them correct data on it" he said.

In the first report which covers gainings prior to October 1, 1958, white cotton accounted for 88 percent of the High Plains crop with 73 percent Middling white and above.

Light spots totaled only 12 percent with 11.3 percent being middling light and above. Full spotted cotton was only 0.1 percent. The average staple length was 32.1-32nd of an inch with 69.7 percent being one inch and longer. Only 3.6 percent fell below 15-16

inch. Micronaire average was 4.3 with 96.5 percent above the tenderable micronaire limit of 3.5. The majority of the crop, or 71.7 percent fell between 4.0 and 5.0. Pressley fibre strength average 79,000 pounds per square inch with 64 percent between 75,000 and 90,000 pounds.

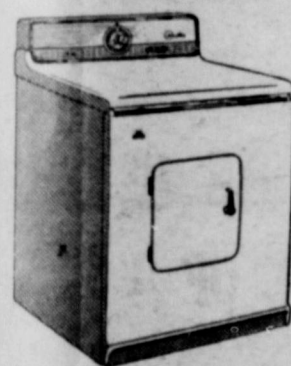

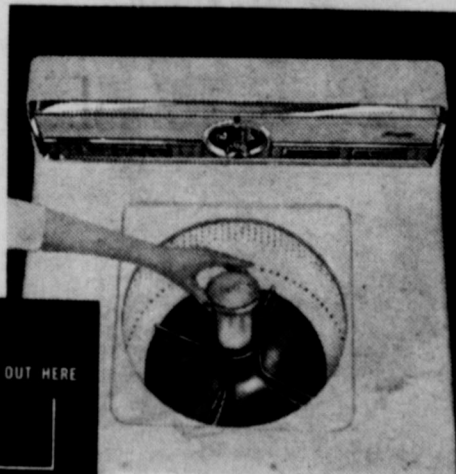

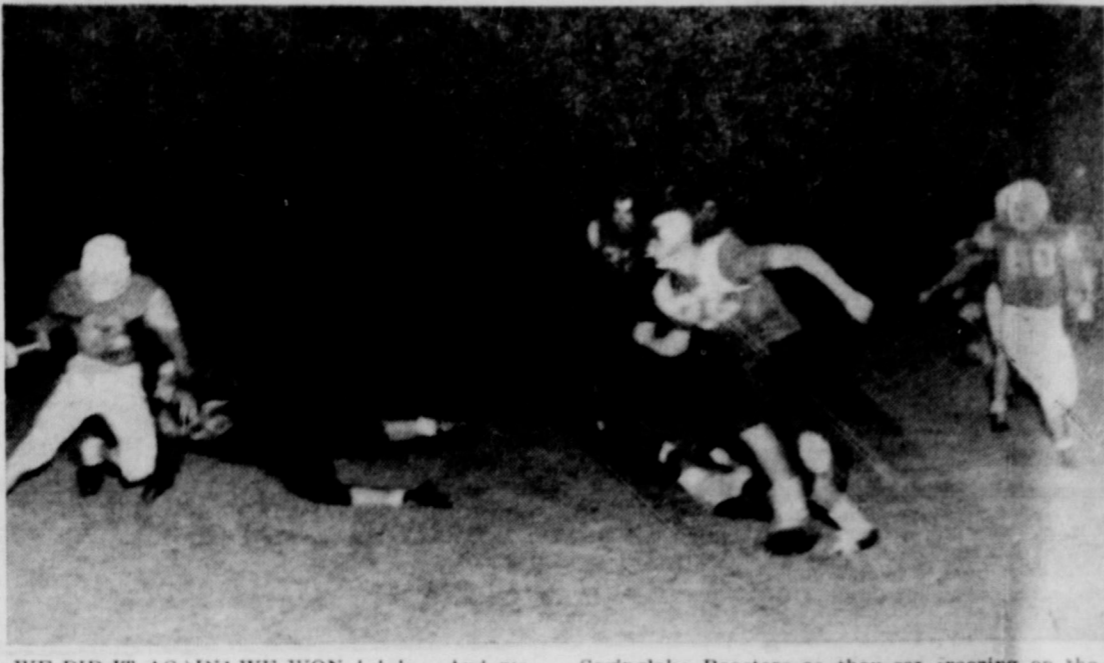

# Springlake Upsets Anton 12-6

In one of the South Plains upsets of the year, the Springlake Wolverines rose Friday night to down Anton, on Anton's home field 12 to 6. It was a mighty victory for the fighting Wolverines, for Anton had been considered a dark horse candidate for District honors behind Farwell, and Springlake had been picked to finish in the cellar. The sport writers of Lubbock, and nearly everyone who had predicted the score, gave Anton the victory by a large margin. But the Wolverines evidently didn't read the papers, for not only did they win by score, but completely dominated the game in statistics. They played "ball control," something they had not been able to do all year. They stopped Anton's big yards rushing and 26 yards passing for a total of 91 yards while Springlake ran up a total of 289 yards, allowing them only 65 yards from scrimmage.

The first quarter looked as if Anton would roll over Springlake and control the ball. After receiving the kickoff Anton made one first down, then lost 17 yards by a fumble in the backfield which they recovered. The Bulldogs had to punt, and Springlake couldn't move the ball. Tom Messer went back to punt, but it was blocked, and Anton recovered on Springlake's 35 yard line. The Bulldogs immediately marched down the field in 11 plays for their only score with J. L. Smith going the final yard. The points try failed when Oren McGrew, Anton's leading ground gainer, fumbled the pass from center. Anton used the single wing for the first time and they were rough in carrying out their plays. They changed back to the old familiar T formation in the last half, but Springlake still stopped them, giving them only 5 yards in the last quarter.

Springlake came right back after Anton's touchdown and started a march of its own. They had the ball on their own 15 yard line and went the 85 yards in 7 plays. The drive was featured by fine runs by the backs. To start off the drive, Joe Neal Ellis passed to Tom Messer for 12 yards. Then Norman Clayton, who showed the best offensive game of the year, broke loose behind fine blocking for 28 yards. Dean Jones, who also ran hard all night, made 14 yards and 7 yards on successive carries. Ellis ran for 14, then behind beautiful blocking in the line. Norman ran 15 yards for the touchdown. The try for points was no good. The score came in the first minutes of the second quarter.

Springlake controlled the ball the remainder of the half, driving down to Anton's 10 yard line, but could not score. The Wolverines came out in the second half, and after receiving the kickoff, drove 53 yards in 10 plays for their second touchdown. Once again the march was sparked by the fine run-

ning of Clayton and Jones with Jones scoring from 11 yards out. Clayton had a 25 yard run in the drive, with Ellis adding 15 and Jones another 12.

In this third quarter the fans witnessed one of the best goal line stands ever seen in this area as put up by the Wolverines. Anton received the kickoff after Springlake's touchdown, could not move the ball, and punted on fourth down. Springlake fumbled the punt and the Bulldogs recovered on Springlake's 44 yard line. Anton immediately marched down to the 4 where the Bulldogs had first down and four to go for the touchdown. On the first play McGrew plunged to the one. Smith was stopped for no gain on the next play, then McGrew was stopped for no gain, then on fourth down and still with a yard to go McGrew was not only stopped but thrown for a two yard loss. It was a wonderful display of defensive strength. But that's not all of it. On Springlake's first play from scrimmage, the ball sputtered out of the carrier's hands, and Anton recovered on Springlake's 10 yard line. After that bad break you might think the Wolverines would be discouraged and fold. But they did just the opposite. Leading by just six points, our boys dug in and stopped the Bulldogs cold again, giving them just four yards in four tries.

It was a wonderful display of spirit and determination on the part of our boys.

The rest of the game was anticlimatic after those two stands, and they broke the spirit of Anton. The Bulldogs could do nothing in the last quarter, handling the ball but seven times and gaining only 5 yards. Late in the game Ellis intercepted a pass, and that was the ball game.

This game was a team effort. Ev-

en though the backs had a wonderful night, the line was breaking them into the open. The leading ground gainer was Norman Clayton who probably played his best over-all game of his career. He carried the ball 12 times for 101 yards and an average of 8.4 yards per carry. Dean Jones followed with a 5.7 yards per carry on 13 carries. Joe Neal Ellis carried 9 times for 5.4 yards per carry and Gene Stephens carried 13 times for 4.2 yards average. The line was tremendous on both offense and defense. They opened holes big enough to drive cotton strippers through. It would be difficult to single out linemen for special mention, but Rayburn Ott was constantly in Anton's backfield. Gaylord Latham and Earl Keilar were tremendous. Jerrel Hadaway is coming along fast

as a fine lineman. All the boys were just wonderful. Not only were we pleased with their play, but with their tremendous spirit and hustle.

The Wolverines have a week off this week, but they meet the strong Farwell Steers a week from Friday, November 14, in Wolverine Stadium in the closing game of the year for Springlake. Farwell is leading the district, and the Steers were undefeated until last Friday when Friona barely beat them 15 to 12 in a non-district game. The Steers will be tough, but if Springlake plays like it did last week, and continues to hustle all out, Farwell will be in for a tough night of football. Our boys don't have to take a back seat to anybody, not even Farwell.

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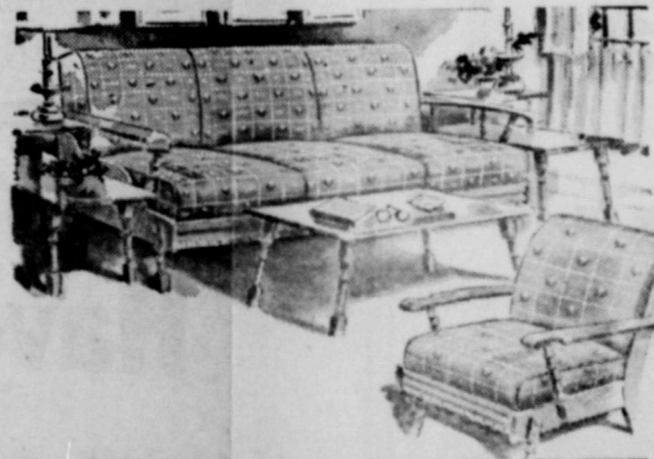

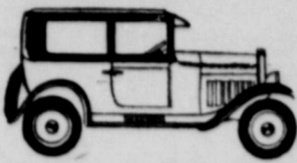
