Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Research results at the High Plains Research Foundation will be presented at an open meeting of the Farmers' Union of Hart at the American Legion Hall, Thursday, March 24 at 7:30 p.m. Ralph Putrell, president, announced.

Theron Morrison, chairman of the program, has extended an invitation to all farmers and businessmen in the Hart area. Members of the staff at Halfway will present the 1959 research results by means of color slides, and question periods will follow each phase of the program. Staff members speaking are Dr. T. C. Lorenz, director, soil fertility; Dr. Earl Collier, assistant director and chief agronomist, development of new crops; Delbert Langford, variety and cultural tests; James Valliant, recharge well, irrigation economy and bench leveling; and Dale Price, weed control.

All wells at the High Plains Research Foundation are now connected by underground concrete lines with the addition of 2158 ft. of 15-inch line. This line added to the existing 4950 feet will now service all but a small area of the farm. Also 1291 feet of 12-inch seal gasket concrete line has been installed. Another 2800 feet of underground line will complete the system so that no open ditches will be needed for irrigation. Research has shown losses in open ditches because of evaporation, and deep percolation is very high in the High Plains. Underground concrete lines eliminates these losses and adds to ease of operation.

Three of these locations are on Pullman clay loam on three types of land surface, as follows: (1) sloping land, (2) bench land, and (3) gentle sloping land.

A fourth location is on Amarillo clay loam in the Southern part of the Foundation farm.

These blocks are placed at depths of one, two, three, and four feet. Available soil moisture data will be released at weekly intervals with the hope that it may be helpful to farmers in deciding whether to preplant irrigate.

Yields of castor beans at the High Plains Research Foundation reached an all time high in 1959 with an average of 1,829 pounds per acre for eight varieties. The highest yield was obtained with Baker 102 with 2,197 pounds per acre.

Castor beans are proving to be an important cash crop on the High Plains, and with prospects of greatly expanding acreage, there is much demand for information concerning adapted varieties and production practices. For the third consecutive year the Found-

Type Or Print Information On Party Line... Income Tax Returns

Failure to type or print your information on that Federal income tax return for 1959 could cost you a lot of money.

This word came today from Howard O. Nichols of Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock.

"Right here in this area hundreds of taxpayers had to be located last year so Uncle Sam could pay them refunds amounting to several thousand dollars. This business happens every year," Mr. Nichols says, "because people either don't write legibly, or they move to new addresses and neglect to leave forwarding addresses with their postmasters."

Mr. Nichols said that Revenue is using more electronic devices than ever this year to speed work, but hurriedly scribbled numbers such as 1 and 7 and carelessly closed loops in letters e, l and f, often short circuit the entire IRS production line.

"So type or print your return and notify your postmaster of your new address if you should move. These simple precautions will save everybody lots of time and money," Mr. Nichols said.

What Does The Bible Say About The Word of God?

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

The Bible is the greatest and most wonderful book in the world. It is the only book that contains the mind of God and the way of salvation. When you open the Bible and read, you have before you Divine Wisdom written. The Bible is the Word of God. "When ye received the Word of God which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the Word of God." (1 Thess. 2:13) It was written "not in words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost teacheth" (1 Cor. 2:13).

There are various symbolic names applied to the Word of God which help us to understand and appreciate its value.

Lamp and Light

"Thy word is the lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path" (Psa. 119:105). Ignorance and sin are darkness, but the Word of God is light to dispell them. The sinner is under the "power of darkness" (Col. 1:13), and he is delivered by the Word of God. Our Saviour has "brought life and immortality to light through the gospel" (II Tim. 1:10). The piercing ray of God's word is "a light shining in a dark place" (II Pet. 1:19). All men should study the Bible diligently, for "the commandment is a lamp; and the law is light; and reproofs of instruction are the way of life" (Prov. 6:23).

Mirror

Paul said: "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord" (II Cor. 3:18).

The Word of God is a mirror that reveals man to himself. You can see yourself just as you are with all your spiritual and moral imperfections and blemishes as plainly as you can see your natural face in a mirror. The man who sees these things and fails to make

proper corrections, "is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass; for he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was" (James 1:23-24). On the other hand, "whoso looketh in to the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed" (James 1:25).

Yes, the Bible is the greatest book in the world. Other books give instruction, but only the Bible gives Divine Instruction. Only its teachings are infallible. It is the most glorious Light in this world. Everywhere the Bible has gone, civilization has thrived. Without its precious counsel men have been kept in ignorance and poverty. Only by study of the Bible can a man know his spiritual condition. Only by obedience to its demands can his soul be purified. "Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you" (John 15:3).

Local Group Tours Purina Research Farm In St. Louis, Mo.

A group of people from each Purnia Dealer in his area, went to St. Louis, Missouri for a tour of the Purnia Research Farm, Laboratory and Mill, Monday and Tuesday, March 14-15.

The group left the Hotel in St. Louis by chartered bus to go to the farm located just outside of Gray Summit, Mo. The farm consists of 766 acres and has been in operation for 33 years. It is devoted entirely to research in the feeding of all types of livestock, poultry, game birds, pigeons, fish and fur bearing animals for profit. Before the feed has been put on market it is proven on this farm and other places such as Agricultural Colleges in different states.

The group was shown the different experiments being conducted at the present time. These also covered all phases of feeding.

They produce their own meat, milk, eggs. They hatch the eggs and run experiments on the effect of different rates of feed, also shown was the effects of fat soluble dye when fed to laying hens to produce different colored egg yolks such as red, green and the normal yellow.

The group visited the Youth Center where purebred hogs, cattle and sheep are housed for the purpose of 4-H and FFA teams to compete in Judging these animals.

Lunch and dinner was served at the farm, consisting of Beef and chicken raised on the farm.

Monday night the group enjoyed a show put on by employees of the Purnia Co. There were no professionals but the show was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. They rehearse one hour every day after their regular job is complete for the day. They are not hired for their acting ability at all and can only be in the show after they have proven to the Ralston Purnia Company that they can do the job they were hired to do. For an example one performer was a microscopic technician and IBM operator, office girls, plant foreman to name a few.

Tuesday morning found the party at Checker Board Square being conducted through the mill and Laboratory where feed and animals were examined to find out the effect on poultry and such like. They had a white rat that had a litter of rats every 21 days. They could tell exactly what ingredients were required and how much to keep the animal in top condition.

Moisture Adequate In Most of Texas

College Station. — Soil moisture in most sections of Texas is adequate to excessive with the entire potential plant root zone filled to capacity. However, points out Wayne Keese, extension irrigation specialist, moisture is inadequate for optimum planting conditions in the less favored areas.

Keese says most irrigated crops can effectively use moisture from the top 3 feet of a soil in good physical condition. Deep-rooted crops, such as alfalfa and cotton, will draw moisture from depths of 5 to 6 feet. Planting a crop with half the effective plant root zone supplied with moisture, adds the specialist, is like starting the season with half enough operating capital.

Keese cites the following advantages of pre-planting irrigation. Evaporation rates are lower during the winter months and this means more of the water will go into the soil. Too, water can be stored in the subsoil on more acres than can be irrigated during the summer months where limited amounts of water are available. This stored moisture will go a long way toward producing a good crop. Thirdly, more time and labor are available during the winter months for doing a good job.

The amount of water to apply depends upon the soil type and crop to be grown. Since most crops take from 80 to 90 percent of the

water used from the top 3 feet of soil it is important that this zone be filled to capacity. In exceptionally deep soils in good physical condition, deep-rooted plants may take significant amounts of water from depths of 4 to 5 feet, reminds Keese.

The engineer suggests a visit with the local county agent for more detailed information on pre-planting irrigation. Pick up a copy of L-357, "Soil Moisture Storage."

This final reminder from Keese, water is one of our greatest and most useful natural resources — use it wisely.

31 Per Cent Of Cotton Acreage In "B" Program In Lamb County

L. D. Aten, County ASC office manager, reports that thirty-one per cent of Lamb County's regular 180,738 acre cotton allotment has been placed in the plan B phase of the two-choice cotton program.

Figures released March 18, by Aten were unofficial but the office manager said they are almost complete and will change very little when the final tabulations are announced.

The county's final cotton allotment will be more than 2,000,000 acres, under plan A, the county has an allotment of 180,738 acres. Farmers who went plan B, receive 40 per cent more acres, but lower government price supports than those who went Plan A.

A total of 684 farms in Lamb County were placed in Plan B, giving the county an additional 22,437 acres for cotton which is 27 per cent of the total number of farms.

This compares with 578 farms, 22 per cent, which were placed in Plan B last year.

The 31 per cent of the county's regular allotment which went Plan B this year compares with 19 per cent in 1959.

Farmers who went Plan B this year are gambling that B-cotton prices will be as high as they were last year.

On a general basis, B-cotton sold on the open market last year about as well as A-cotton which was placed in government loan.
