County Will Pay

The controversial paving project at Earth will be paid for by the County Commissioners' Court as soon as Governor Dolph Briscoe signs House Bill 2248, which was passed by the House of Representatives near the close of their work session at the end of May.

Clarence Kelley, commissioner of Precinct 2, said Tuesday that as soon as the Governor signs the bill, and as soon as the highway engineer and contractor satisfy the paving job and gets it up to specifications, the

county will pay for the work.

Controversy arose over the project after the county received a bill on the paving, and could not pay for it because they, as a governing body, did not take competitive bids on the project. The city of Earth had contracted for work done within its city limits, and had talked with Kelley about jointly paving a county road going to the Springlake Earth School, and had consulted school officials about paying a portion of the paving expenses.

With all three involved, they figured to get a cheaper rate.

Because of a breakdown in communications, the matter was never brought before the commissioner's court, and legally, the county could not pay for the work which was contracted by the city of Earth.

"I want to thank everybody for being patient", Kelley said Tuesday, "and I'm glad we're finally going to get this matter settled."

Kelley said the contractor plans to go

out and get the road up to specifications as soon as the Governor signs the bill.

County Judge Don Joyner said, "We surely do thank Mr. Bill Clayton for working with us on this matter, and we're real appreciative of him for helping us solve this problem." He continued by saying this now allows the county to pay for the paving legally.

This act is limited only to this case, and will not apply to any previous action, nor any action to follow.

REA Loan

Congressman George Mahon announced he has granted an REA loan to Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Inc. in Littlefield.

The loan is for \$2,241,000 at 2 percent interest, to finance service for 658 additional consumers, to finance 93 miles of distribution line, 2 miles of transmission lines and to finance system improvements, including sub-station facilities.

Counties included are Lamb, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Hale and Hockley.

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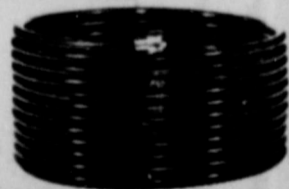
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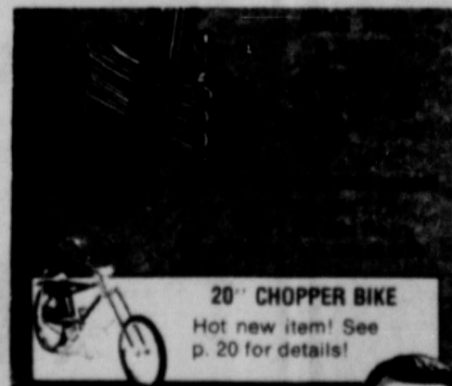


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Donna Smith Honored Goodman Reunion Held With Shower

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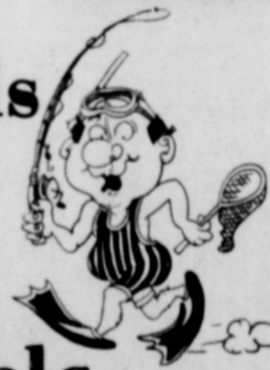

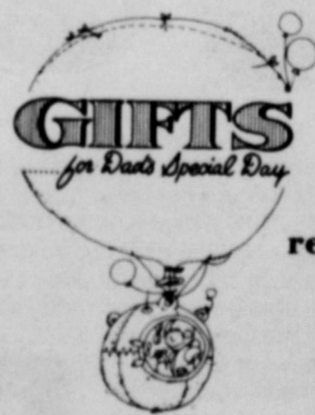

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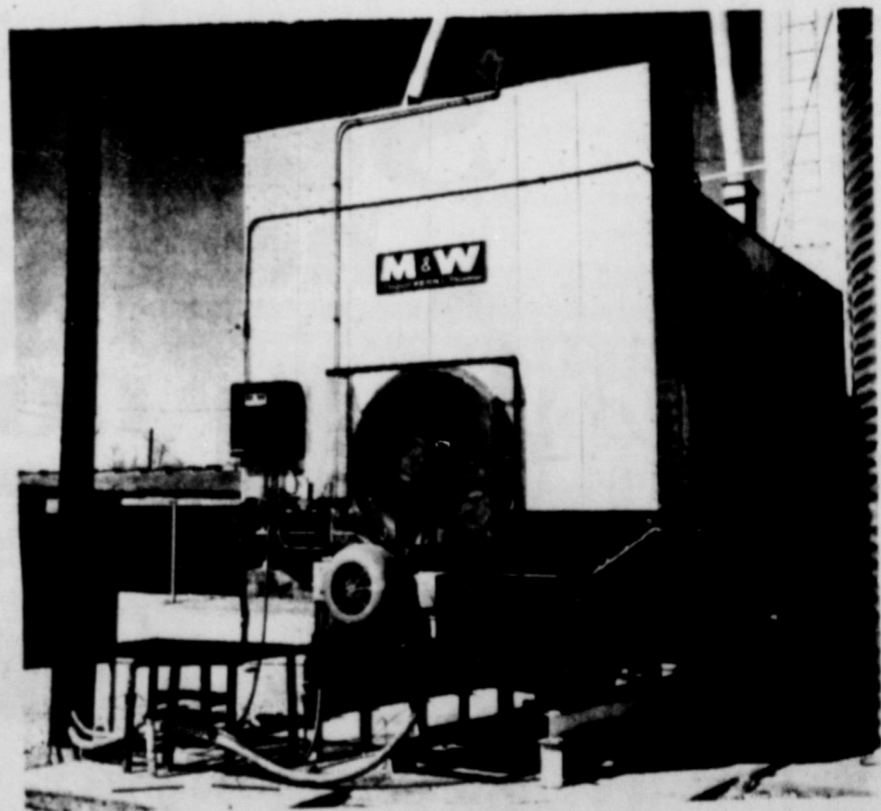

1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
About 1 cup soft bread crumbs, divided
1 package (12 oz.) frozen spinach soufflé, thawed
Rinse, pat dry and remove stems from mushrooms. Brush outside portion of caps with melted butter mixed with lemon juice. Place on a shallow baking pan. Sprinkle inside of each mushroom with 1/2 teaspoon of the bread crumbs. Fill caps with spinach soufflé; sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350° F.) until golden, about 15 minutes.
Yield: About 30 stuffed mushrooms.
