The City of Earth took on a new look Saturday as approximately 30 workers from the area gathered for a day of work to clean up the City of Earth.

Phil Raught, Clean Up Supervisor, assigned various clean up captains to work at designated areas to clean up the town.

Two county trucks were used in the clean up day as well as heavy equipment made available by commissioner Henry Lewis who aided in the towns clean up. Other trucks were donated for use in the campaign.

Mayor E. C. Kelley and others of the city employees assisted in the work-a-day clean up.

Approximately 40 to 50 truck loads of debris, tree limbs and other items cluttering the town were carried to the city dump, ridding the city of much of the unsightly junk which had previously cluttered the streets.

At noon local ladies whose husbands were working in the clean up campaign served lunch for the group from foods donated by the three local grocery stores.

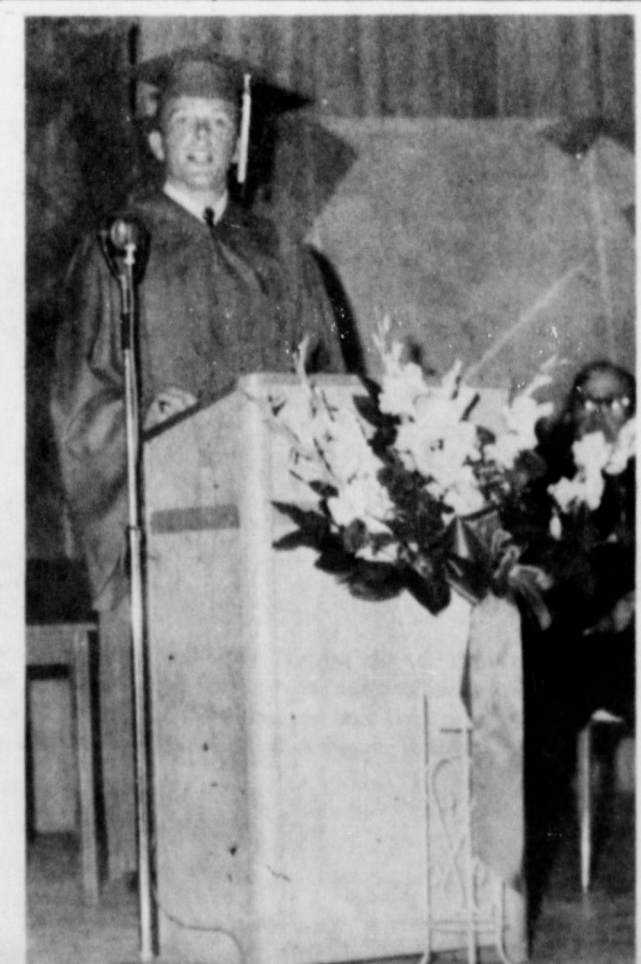
Earth Methodist Church School To Begin June 1

Mrs. Bert Andrew Dies In Car-Train Crash Tuesday

A 60-year-old Earth woman suffered fatal injuries and her husband was in critical condition late Tuesday night following an afternoon train-car crash in the south portion of Plainview.

Mrs. Bert Andrews died about 7:30 p. m. Tuesday in Medical Center Hospital Plainview of injuries received in the accident at the Santa Fe Railroad crossing in the 1200-block South Date St. in Plainview. Her husband, Bert, 65, was in critical condition in the intensive care unit of Lubbock's Methodist Hospital. He suffered chest and head injuries in the wreck, according to hospital attendants.

The couple's daughter-in-law and her two children, riding in the back seat of the vehicle, received only minor injuries. Treated and released at Medical Center Hospital were Mrs. Janice L. Andrews, 23, Pasadena, and her two children, Jina, 3, and Gerry, 19 months.

The wreck happened about 4:15 p. m. at a level crossing on FM Road 400, about three blocks inside the Plainview city limits.

According to Plainview police, the automobile, driven by Andrews, was traveling south, while the train was going to Plainview from Slaton and traveling north.

Police said the 1957 model auto struck the engine of the train and was knocked 68 feet by the collision's impact. Mrs. Andrews' body was thrown out of the car, while Andrews was found under the car, which was toppled onto its side by the wreck.

The Andrews' vehicle struck the train's "cow catcher" in front of the engine. Police said the train apparently was moving slow at the time of the collision.

According to investigators, the family was enroute from Earth to Lubbock, where they were to pick up their son, Jerry, Mrs. Janice Andrews' husband.

Mrs. Bert Andrews was taken to Medical Center Hospital where she died about three hours after the accident. Her husband was taken directly from the crash scene to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

Funeral services for Mrs. Andrews are pending at Franklin Bartley Funeral Home in Lubbock.

Mrs. Andrews had been a resident of the Earth area the past 12 years. She was a member of the Hillcrest Baptist Church at Mulshoe.

Survivors include her husband, Bert; two sons, Jerry Andrews, Padadena, Tex., and Joe B.

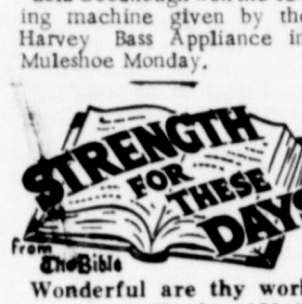

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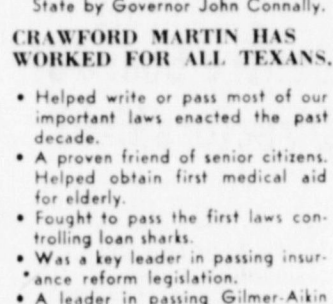

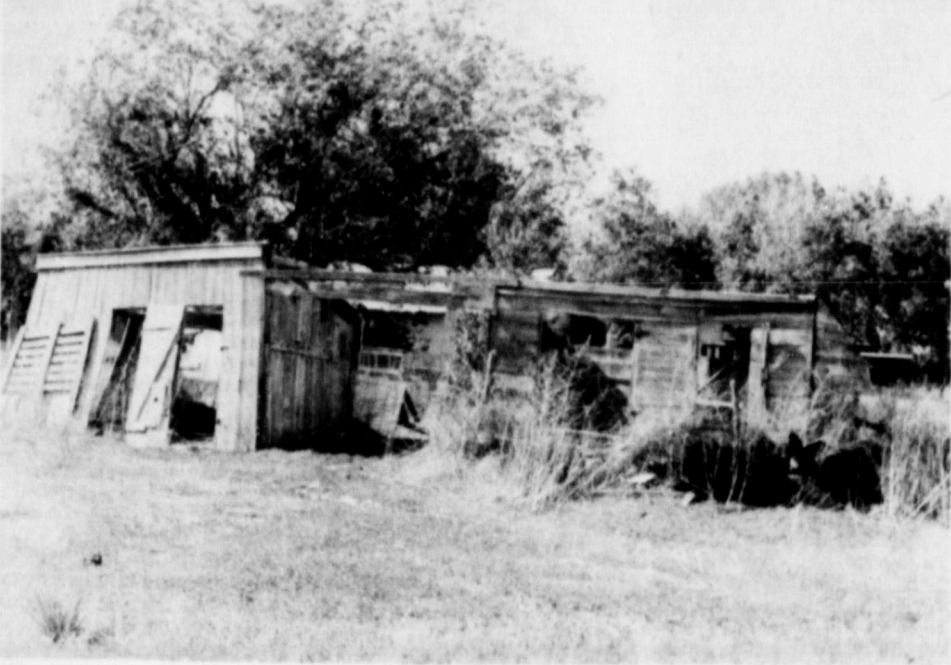

Benefits Of Tanning Are Almost Nil

One dermatologist (skin specialist) has predicted that suntanning some day will no longer be a "status symbol" and that people will quit basking their outer hides to a golden brown each summer.

The dermatologists have long known of the hazards of suntanning, such as premature aging of the skin and various freckles and blemishes.

But your doctor also knows that, whatever the future brings, some Americans today still are suntanners, and thus the American Medical Association suggests that if you must tan, do it without burning.

Gradual tanning with a minimum of discomfort is possible for most people. Gradual exposure to the sun is the safest and simplest method of acquiring an attractive tan. As a general rule, begin with 15 minutes exposure the first day, and increase the time by a few minutes a day. The time of day is important, with the midday period, when the sun is directly overhead, being the hottest for burning purposes.

Continued tanning brings gradual changes in the blood vessels of the exposed surfaces. The connective tissue of the skin degenerates, causing wrinkles and a coarsening of texture. The "V" of the neck becomes permanently reddened and freckle-like dark spots appear on the skin. These spots can sometimes be the start of skin cancer.

Sun bleaches the hair, too, and over a period of time the sunbleached hair becomes brittle and unmanageable. However, the damaged hair will eventually grow out.

The physical benefits of tanning are almost nil. The only beneficial effect of sunlight, other than the psychological lift of sporting a good tan, is the formation of vitamin D, and the American diet already provides an ample supply.

Man Saves Self After Snake Bite

Austin--The well-publicized snake situation this spring found at least one satisfied customer. A man phoned Dan Klepper, outdoor editor of the San Antonio Express-News, to thank him for describing what to do if a poisonous snake strikes.

The man was picking dewberries when he saw a rattler a split second before the snake bit him astride the knuckle of the middle finger.

Remembering what he read, the man did not panic, walked to his pickup and borrowed some ice from the first house

available. With his hand packed in ice, he drove to a San Antonio hospital where the incision-suction treatment was used

because the man was allergic to antivenim serum. Four days later the man telephoned Klepper his gratitude plus the report he was recovered.

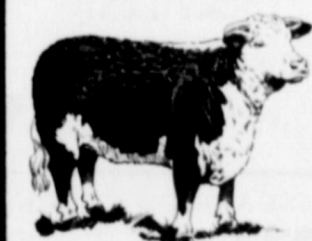
