## Iowa Youths To Study Texas Farming

Dennis Hull and Larry Wade, of Grinnell, Iowa arrived by train in Plainview Sunday to be part of an exchange FFA program between the Grinnell chapter and the local chapter. While here they will live on the farms of J. J. Colter, Orville Cleavinger, and Ed Dawson.  
 Dennis and Larry were chosen according to scholarship merit, chapter points in FFA projects and activities, and extra curricular activities. They were honor students in Grinnell High School from which they graduated this year. They were among the fifty-five to sixty boys who participated in the national FFA there.  
 This is the boys' first trip south. They remarked that the country was one of "level and wide-spread, and that the corn crop (our feed) looked rather small."  
 The boys live on Iowa farms. Dennis' family farms 320 acres. He has two brothers and a sister, all of whom are younger than he. His family's farm is a little larger than the average Iowa farm. His plans are to attend Iowa State University this fall, majoring in Veterinary Medicine, and minoring in Vocational Agriculture, and finally teaching.  
 Larry's family farms 240 acres. He and his brother, who will be a sophomore student at Grinnell High School this coming fall, assist in farming. He plans to major in Farm Management at Iowa State University in September.  
 The youths will remain in the area for a two weeks duration, where they will assist in farm operations, and learn the techniques and practices of our type farms. At home they live on comparatively small unit-type farms, where the average farm in the county is 130 acres approximately. Their nearest neighbor is one-eighth mile away, with four families to the section of land, where our farm families are more scattered.  
 The two young men mentioned a few of their FFA projects, selling fruit (Texas oranges); making containers for Memorial Day; and having concessions at the County Fair every third year. The boys pay half of the expenses for the trip, the FFA chapter pays half, and board and room are furnished as a courtesy to them by the family with whom they reside while here.  
 Two local young men, Davey Haberer and Ken Dawson, are presently in Grinnell, Iowa, where they are learning the activities of Iowa farming. Davey is working on a dairy farm; Ken is working on a large agriculture farm.  
 Gene Gaston, Springlake-Earth High School Vocational Agriculture instructor mentioned that he will take the two Iowa youths to Tech this week, where they will be shown through the campus and especially the departments in which they are the most interested.  
 They will be taken on a West Texas Round-Up sometime during their visit here.  
 They are taking slides and will present discussions and pictures when they return home June 26.  
 Dennis and Larry remarked, "We like this Texas weather better than ours, the humidity in Iowa is always high. We expected it to be very dry here, so we were amazed when we saw the lakes." "(caused by the recent rains.)"

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## Area Flooded With Rains

Torrential rains fell in the area Wednesday night and Thursday, flooding towns and farms with six to eight inches of rain and some hail in parts.  
 The nearest reported tornado was at the Pleasant Valley Gin, where a short wave tower was knocked down, five cotton trailers were demolished, and a roof was lifted from a bar-acker building which housed Latin American workers; however no injuries were incurred.  
 In the Dodd and Big Square areas, some hail was reported. Spotted hail was reported in the Hiss and Lazbuddie areas. In Lazbuddie, high winds ripped branches from trees, some high lines were snapped, high winds toppled T. V. antennas, and the electrical service was temporarily interrupted.  
 On U. S. Highway 84 between Amherst and Sudan, the roads were closed; also U. S. Highway 70 between Muleshoe and Earth, was closed Thursday, with business houses west of Earth isolated by water. Brown and Jordan report the following damage:  
 Parts of the floor were damaged, and will have to be redone. One hundred cases of oil were water-soaked; the warehouse was waist deep in water; the basement was flooded, where all records were water soaked and ruined. The extent of damage has not yet been determined.  
 Farm Chemical Company is completely isolated. Norman Hinchliffe is on vacation, so it is unable to estimate the damages there.  
 Barton Bros. Gin was surrounded by water, but had no water inside the building.  
 O. D.'s Pump Co. was closed Friday, but has been open for business since that time, and reported some water in the floor and wet filling cabinets, but no other damage.  
 ESS Co. and the Body Shop were surrounded by water, but damage, if any, has not been reported.  
 The Livestock Show Barn is closed at the present time, and the scheduled Welding Course could not be held there due to the rains.  
 At the Price Hamilton farm, ten miles west of Earth, 6" of rain was reported with only a sprinkle of hail, and no crop damage.  
 Five miles east of Earth, James Sanderson reported approximately 5" of rain, with no hail.  
 A little less than 6" of rain fell at the Gardner Sanderson farm seven miles north of Earth. Melvin Bock, four miles west, and one mile north, reported 8" of rain, and a small amount of hail, making the cotton appear "ragged."  
 Farm to Market Road #1057, between Earth and Dimmitt, was closed Wednesday night by the Texas Highway Department. The Hodge Lake, several miles north of Earth is still over the road, and cars have detoured on the cemetery road or the Springlake School road when traveling north.  
 Lightning struck a pole at the home of John Laing, Jr., two miles east of Earth, Thursday night, splitting a part of the pole. Approximately 7" of rain was reported there.  
 It was reported that there was quite a bit of hail, south of Bonnie Haberer's.  
 One Earth resident, M. R. Burton, assisted them in moving their furniture and all household goods, as well as the hot water heater, to the Henry Lewis garage.  
 The exact amount of damage to the house is unknown, but the floors are buckled, the carpet has been removed, as it was a total loss, and the storm cellar caved in. The water was reported as 7" to 8" in the Burton home at the time they left, however they are expected to move back soon.

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## The Right To Be Different

Senate committee hearings on the so-called "Truth in Packaging" bill were enlivened by the appearance of a group of women representing the perfume, lipstick and cosmetic industries--which, as just about any woman will tell you, are very important industries indeed. Their testimony was in opposition to the proposed measure. Standardization of cosmetics, one said, would "destroy a woman's right to be different, her freedom to be an individual." Another observed that "To standardize packaging would be as catastrophic as to standardize women."

Such valid objections, of course, are not confined to these particular products. All manner of products would be subjected to broader and more arbitrary government controls. The cost of changing packages and containers to fit new rules would be very heavy, as representatives of the businesses concerned have testified, and this, like all other costs, would have to be paid by the ultimate consumer. More important, in the long run, is the adverse effect the bill could not help but have on the consumer's freedom of choice.

Existing laws, federal, state and local, give government abundant powers to prevent and punish the comparative few who misrepresent their products. Beyond that, the consumer is her own best policeman--it's a case of once bitten twice shy. And if strengthening of the law is needed, this certainly can be done without destroying or undermining so basic a freedom as that of choice.

## Lamb Has Produced Approximately 10,306,000 Barrels Of Oil

Texas has produced more than 27 billion barrels of oil during the past 69 years of recorded production, resulting in a state-wide distribution of income which currently averages about \$3 billion a year, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

With 203 out of the state's 254 counties producing crude oil, each section is marked by several prolific fields. "The widespread development of production in all sections of the state has been fostered by the state's oil and gas conservation laws," James L. Sewell, Association president, has pointed out. "By giving all fields in the state, regardless of location, a share of the market for Texas oil the Texas Railroad Commission has encouraged development of resources in every sector--both in drilling and in the building

of a transportation system to get the oil to refineries.

Lamb County, which has had recorded production since 1945, has had a total crude oil output of 8,602,000 barrels up to the beginning of 1964. Lamb County production in 1963 was 1,704,000 barrels at the rate of 4,700 barrels a day. An approximate estimation for the county over the past 19 years is 10,306,000.

Texas has 35 counties scattered over the state which produced at the rate of 25,000 barrels or more per day. The three largest are: Andrews, 195,000 barrels a day; Ector, 164,000 barrels per day; and Crane, 114,000 barrels per day. Gregg County is the only county that has produced more than two billion barrels of oil. Two had produced one billion or more up to 1965: Ector and Rusk. Andrews celebrated its billionth barrel this year.

## Rural Traffic Accidents For May Total 12

There were 12 rural accidents in Lamb County during the month of May, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one death, three persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$16,550.00. The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the first five months of 1965 shows a total of 34 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 14 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$32,760.00. "Due to a mail power shortage in the uniform services of the Texas Department of Public Safety, applications for the position of patrolman are now being accepted until July 6," announced the Patrol Supervisor. Examinations will be given throughout the state on July 14 and July 15. The four month training school will begin on August 31 at the Texas Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin.

## Money In Circulation At High Level In County

The amount of money in circulation in Lamb County, a prime factor in determining economic vitality, is at a high level, according to a new Government report.

At the close of the last fiscal year, it shows, the supply of money in local banks, which comprises the bulk of the currency in circulation, was equivalent to \$1,296 for every man, woman and child in the community.

There was an additional amount of money, small by comparison, in the form of cash in people's pockets and in the cash registers and safes of business firms. The \$1,296 per capita that is on deposit in local banks compares with an average of \$1,288 per capita in the rest of the West South Central States.

The figures on the money supply and the way it is distributed have just been released by the Federal Reserve System in its first such report in two years. It lists the funds on hand in commercial and savings banks

## I. S. U. Students Tour Area Farms

An agriculture travel course group from Iowa State University, recently toured several panhandle cities and farms to observe farming methods in this area, among others.

On farms they observed general farming practices, irrigation techniques, equipment utilization, and studied cost and income figures.

Members of the tour were amazed at the intensity of this irrigated agriculture area, and the large scaled farm management incurred. The group visited the Holly Sugar Co. plant and feed lot; and farms of local interest in Dimmitt, before going into the Lubbock area, El Paso, New Mexico, and the western states.

## Former Resident Drowns In Lake Near Hereford

A former local youth, Vernon White, 22, now of Hereford, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. White, drowned Monday near Hereford. He and two other young men, Tom Carter, 21, and Roger Owens, 17, were using a homemade raft to remove farm machinery on a "dry weather" lake eighteen miles northwest of Hereford, approximately at 3:00 p. m. Monday. After retrieving the farm machinery from the lake which had dumped seven inches in the area last week, "the trio was playing on the raft and it capsized," Sheriff Lowell R. Sharp reported.

"The raft had been made of railroad ties and apparently capsized when two of the men got on the same side," the sheriff added.

Tom Carter, 21, who lived near the lake, was also drowned. Carter is survived by his wife, Joan.

The third young man, Roger Owen, swam to the shore of the nearly quarter mile wide lake in a futile attempt to rescue Carter.

Approximately twenty rescue workers removed Carter's body from the lake. Volunteer rescuers came from Canyon, Friona, and Hereford. White's body was found nearby a few minutes later. Both bodies were taken to Gilliland Funeral Home in Hereford.

Owen told the sheriff that he thought the lake was approximately eight feet deep where the raft capsized.

Mrs. White formerly was employed at the Earth Cleaners several years ago. Mr. White farmed in the area and the family had lived here for some time before moving to the Hereford area. Vernon attended school here for a short period of time.

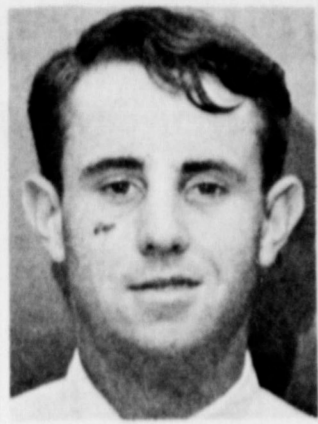
### Flying Award Goes To Sgt. Stuka

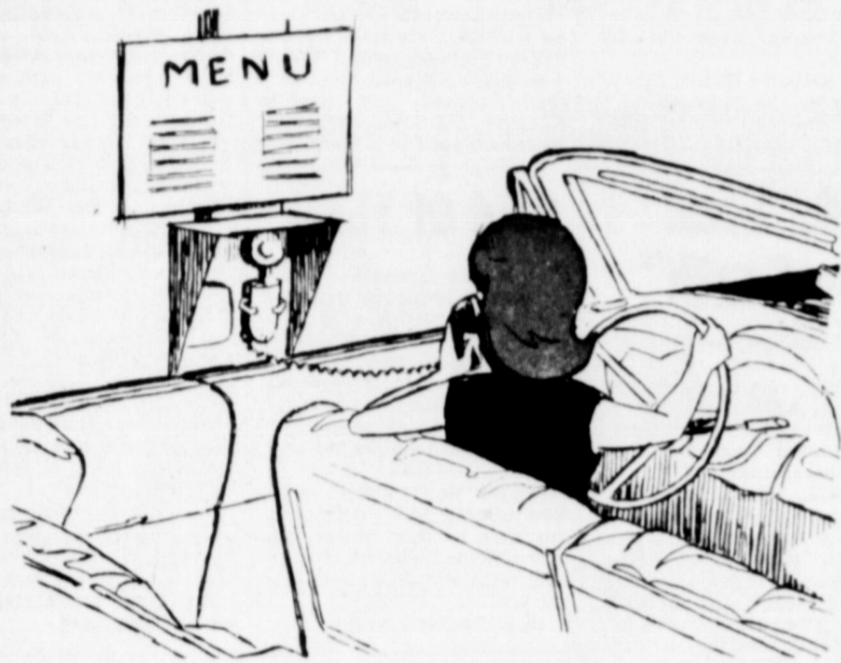

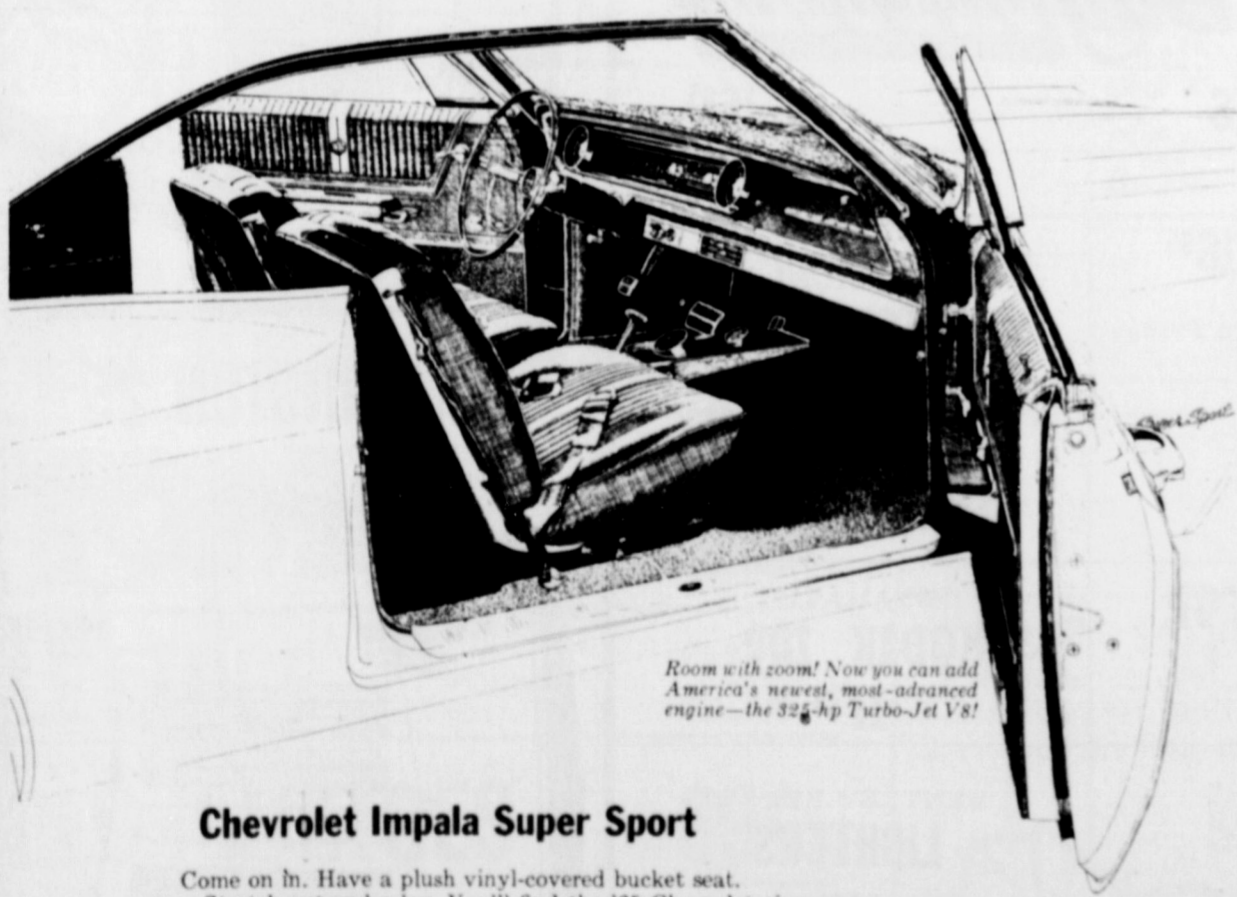

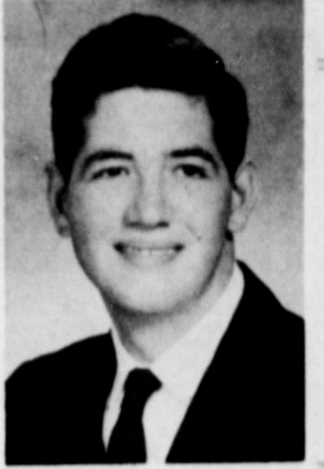
