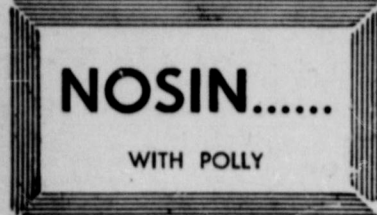




Several Local and County Elective Offices to Be Filled by Election In 1958

Henry Cody Now Sole Owner Of C. and C. Cleaners

Henry Cody has purchased the full interest in the C. and C. Cleaners from Raymond Clayton, effective January 1.

Cody has had several years experience in the dry cleaning business. He was in business in Springlake for eight years, before opening the C. and C. Cleaners here in early February, 1957.

He will be assisted by his brother, Carl Cody, who worked with him for five years in Springlake. Clayton will be employed by Abbott and Prichard, a tax survey company.

Though several elections of special local interest will be held this year, poll tax payments have been slow in Earth, according to information from City Hall. Deadline for the poll tax payment is January 31.

The City of Earth will elect a Mayor and three Aldermen, as the term of Mayor Roy Neal and Aldermen Carroll Blackwell, Clarence Kelley and Pete Parish will expire.

County offices up for election will include those of county clerk, County Judge and county treasurer.

County Commissioner Sam Cearley of Precinct two and Hubert Dykes, Commissioner of Precinct four, will face elections.

Five Justice of Peace posts are scheduled for election, including that of L. H. Staholpin, Earth in Precinct two.

Three Springlake School Trustees will be elected in April. The terms of H. W. Lewis and A. E. Wheatley expire and a vacancy exists due to the resignation of Pat McCord.

City offices facing elections in Springlake will include those of Mayor and Aldermen.

Though poll tax payments have been slow in Earth, the County Tax Assessor, Herbert Dunn, reports the payments for the County are running ahead of last year.

Formal announcements by candidates for the offices began this week, with announcement by Clyde Goodwin of Earth, of his candidacy for Commissioner of Precinct Two. Charles Jones has signified that he will be a candidate for reelection for the office of County Clerk and his formal announcement will be made shortly.

Lamb County Cotton Harvest Almost Complete

The cotton harvest is 98 per cent completed in Lamb County, according to W. R. Kimbrough, County Agent. He estimated that the county would gin around 160,000 bales for the 1957 season, compared to 177,000 bales in 1956.

Gin yards at Springlake, Olton, Spade and Littlefield still have several unginning bales on their yards.

Most local gin offices contacted Wednesday afternoon expressed the belief that the harvest was practically complete in this vicinity.

The County Agent stated that cotton damage over the county averaged from \$25 to \$45 per bale, due to the weather conditions in the early fall.

When asked for a prediction on the price of the 1958 cotton crop, Kimbrough said he expected the price to be about the same as for 1957, or perhaps a little higher.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 will hold its annual election of directors and County Committeemen on Tuesday, January 14.

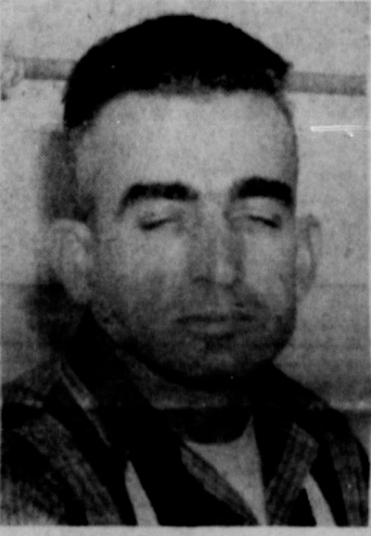

Snowfall Covers Area In Blanket Of White, Moisture Content Beneficial

Several inches of snow fell in the Earth and South Plains area Saturday and Saturday night. There was no wind to cause drifting and the large fluffy flakes fell softly, covering everything in a thick blanket of white.

Snowfall amounts varied over Lamb County, according to county Agent Bill Kimbrough. He measured 12 inches of snow at Littlefield, nine inches at Pleasant Valley and 16 inches at Spade. Moisture content would vary with the snowfall amounts, but Kimbrough estimated that moisture content would average about one and one fourth inches.

Unofficial reports of snowfall amounts in Earth ranged up to 14 inches.

Highway travel Saturday night and Sunday was hazardous, due to

the icy road conditions. US Highway 84 between Muleshoe and Littlefield was closed temporarily Saturday night. There were no reports of major accidents caused by the weather conditions in our area.

Subsoil moisture conditions are the best they have been at this time of year for sometime. Dryland farmers in the county, who depend a great deal on the winter precipitation, were especially pleased with the snow. The moisture will also be of much value to wheat and other winter crops.

It was also noted that the snow fell evenly and as it slowly thawed, it would soak into the ground without excessive drainage.

Precipitation amount for Lamb County in 1957 was approximately 24 inches.

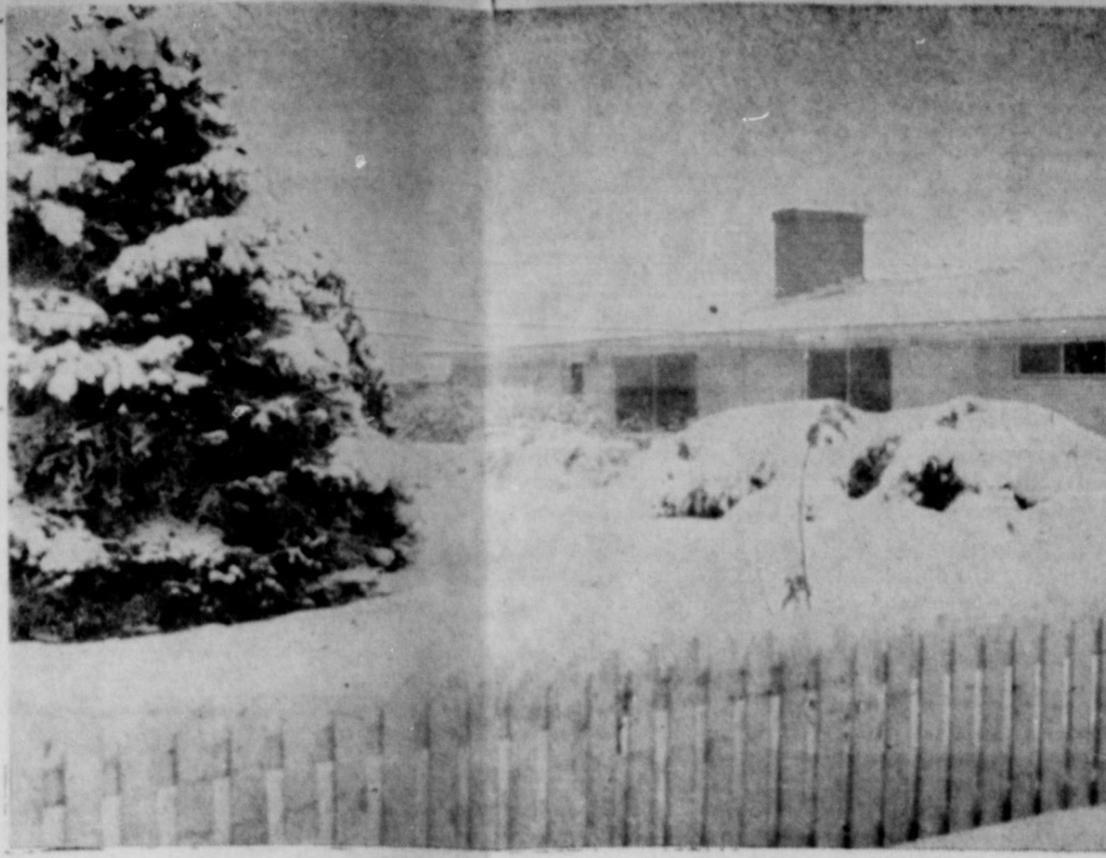
