

The two top students of the 1969-70 Springlake-Earth graduating senior class are Steve Sanderson, with a grade average of 95.81, and Kathy Lee, with a grade average of 94.583. These honor winning students have been named Valedictorian and Salutatorian and will act in those capacities at the Springlake-Earth Senior Baccalaureate and Commencement Exercises slated for May 24 and 25.

Steve, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James (Sandy) Sanderson of Springlake, has received many honors during his four years of attendance at Springlake-Earth High School. During his freshman year he was elected class treasurer, class valedictorian, played on the Wolverine B football and basketball teams. ## Mike Wages To Vie For State Honors

Mike Wages, 18-year-old senior from Springlake-Earth High School has succeeded in obtaining the honor of representing the local school at the state UIL Literary Finals which will be held on the campus of the University of Texas in Austin Saturday, May 8.

Mike began working toward the state contest by entering and placing first in the district UIL meet which was held Friday, April 10, at the local school. By capturing first place honors in district competition, he was then eligible to participate in the regional UIL meet which was held Saturday, April 25, at Coronado High School in Lubbock. He also placed first in regional competition.

The district and regional contest examinations for the Inter-scholastic League consisted of fifty questions pertaining to advanced science studies. Mrs. Mary Patterson, Springlake-Earth science instructor coached Mike to prepare him for the three events. She is expected to accompany the local student to Austin for the state competition.

Mike, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Wages of Earth, is the second Springlake-Earth student who in the past two years has had the honor of participating in state UIL competition. In 1966, Mrs. Patti Parker, the former Patti Robbins, participated in the state shorthand competition.

## Primary Elections Set For Saturday

Experts on moods of the voters think that fewer than half the 4,100,000 Texans who registered to vote will take part in the primary elections, Saturday.

Precinct conventions, also slated for both parties Saturday, haven't produced a ripple of controversy state wide or county wide.

Since there is no contest for the governorship in the Democratic primary for the first time since primaries were begun, less attention is being given to statewide races. The Texas Election Bureau is estimating that 1,800,000 Democrats will vote.

Main attention has been going to two contested races. Lloyd Bentsen, Jr. of Houston is trying to oust Sen. Ralph Yarborough, State Rep. Bob Armstrong of Austin and Fred Williams of Houston are trying to defeat Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

The Yarborough-Bentsen race has proceeded at a fairly cool level. Little attention has been paid to the effort of David Brown of Sherman to defeat Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, or to the campaign by Connie Lawson of Taylor against Railroad Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey.

Lawyers are taking an active part in the two high court races. Hawthorne Phillips of Austin, Judge Matt Davis of Texasiana and Judge James G. Denton of Lubbock are seeking an open seat on the Texas Supreme Court. Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton and Earl Smith of San Angelo are candidates for an open place on the Court of Appeals.

Other statewide offices are uncontested. Here's show the May 2 Primary ballots will look:

### OF PANHANDLE PAPERS

## News-Sun Judged Best In News Writing, Second In General Excellence

The Earth News-Sun retained its rating as one of the most outstanding newspapers in the area in recent competition with newspapers in the Panhandle Press Association. An announcement of the top winning newspapers was made during the awards breakfast Saturday morning at the 61st Annual Convention of the Panhandle Press Association in Amarillo over the weekend.

Entering six of the eight categories available, the local newspaper won in two contests.

In news writing, among all the newspapers entered in the Panhandle Press Association, Mrs. Polly Middleton of the Earth News-Sun was named first place winner. There were no divisions in this category for small town newspapers, all were judged in one group regardless of the size of the newspaper or town they represented.

In general excellence contest, the News-Sun was named second place winner. This is a

coveted award as it is the one contest that covers the overall appearance of the newspaper including news, advertising copy, pictures, make-up and overall balance. This is the only category in the Press Association that is judged in two divisions. One is for newspapers with a circulation of more than 1500 and the other is for newspapers of less than 1500 circulation.

New PPA officers were elected during the convention. They are Don Nelson of Castro County News at Dimmitt, president; John Getz of State Line Tribune at Farwell, vice president; and Dave McReynolds of the Stratford Star as secretary-treasurer.

PPA directors are Trenton Davis, circulation manager of the Amarillo Globe-News; Kenneth Hogue of the Dalhart Texan; Bill Howe of the Shamrock Texan; Ed Bailey of the McLean News; Wendell Tooley of the Floyd County Hesperian,

and Jimmie Gillentine of the Hereford Brand.

George Hawkes of Arlington, president of the Texas Press Association, discussed TPA activities during the past year.

The convention was attended by 140 persons. The annual Globe-News luncheon, with Paul Timmons, political editor of the papers, presiding, had as main speaker, Lloyd Bergsma of Amarillo, executive secretary of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association. Bergsma discussed the Panhandle's emergence as a major cattle feeding area, and predicted continued growth and greater production refinements in the industry.

He said more than \$1.1 billion in fed beef cattle will be sold in the Panhandle this year. "The question in the mind of everyone regarding our beef cattle industry is where do we go from here," Bergsma said.

"I think we'll see a slightly slower rate of growth in the next few years, but tremendous improvement will occur in marketing and production techniques. "I predict that the Panhandle will soon become the cattle feeding capital of the world. "In the afternoon program session, Dale Johnson of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. at Lubbock presented a slide program on "Communications: Past and Present."

Jim Freeman of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Amarillo moderated a panel discussion on illegal narcotics activity in the Panhandle. The program was titled "It Is Happening in Your Town!" Panel members were Dr. Mitchell Jones, an Amarillo psychiatrist; Pat Donley of Lubbock, a DPS chemist; George Jones of the DPS narcotics division at Midland, and Dr. Dewey W. Yeager, an Amarillo physician.

The panel discussed narcotics here and then answered ques-

tions from the PPA members. Convention activities ended Saturday night with a banquet sponsored by area rural electric cooperatives.

The two-day convention began at 11 a. m. Friday. Pioneer Natural Gas Co. was host at the Friday luncheon and Southwest Offset Inc., sponsored the Friday evening social hour.


