Agreement With Rural Electrification General Telephone Reaches Working

An agreement has been reached between General Telephone Company of the Southwest and the Rural Electrification Administration on the form of contract to be used for extended area service between cooperative telephone exchanges and exchanges owned by General, it has been announced by R. E. Blatz, district manager for General.

Blatz explained that "extended area service" is a charge and service arrangement whereby subscribers in different exchanges can call each other without a toll charge. The agreement between REA and General has to do with the contract principles involving apportionment of costs between the exchange owned by the cooperative and the exchange owned by General.

In published bulletin, REA set forth several points of consideration for its borrowers. The bulletin states that "before deciding to provide extended area service, a borrower should make the following determinations:"

1. That sufficient community of interest exists between the exchanges to justify the additional investment and the annual carrying charges thereon.
2. A borrower must ascertain that EAS is desired and will be used by a substantial number of subscribers in the exchanges involved. Otherwise, the provision of such service would favor a few at the expense of many who would have to pay increased monthly rates for a service of little benefit to them.
3. Where there is any question of the need for EAS, it may be more prudent to establish service initially on a toll basis and subsequently, study usage.
4. Because of the possible adverse effect of EAS on the feasibility of REA loans, all EAS agreements are required to be made subject to approval by the Administrator.

A part of the contract form to be used by General and REA states that "Proof of public interest and required approvals shall be a prerequisite to the effectiveness of the agreement."

In defining certain terms, the contract form states "Public interest means that the resulting service arrangement and charges will be mutually and reciprocally advantageous to a substantial majority of the subscribers of each exchange. Required approval by ordinance or order of the regulatory body having jurisdiction over either rates or service of both or either party. Required approval may also, at the request of either party, include written evidence of approval of a substantial majority of the subscribers of one or both exchanges."

Blatz said his Company has 22 requests from cooperatives for extended area service. Each case will be reviewed and studied on its own merits and this may take considerable time. He said his company's policy would be to handle these requests on the basis of the order in which service was initially established.

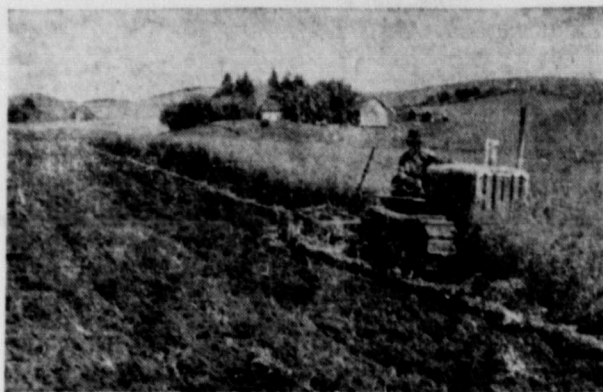

Organic Matter Frees Phosphate Fixed in Soil

Without phosphorus all life would cease, much as a flame dies when there is no air to support it. This vitally important element, so essential for plant and animal growth and reproduction, is one of the least abundant elements in most soils.

Seeds, milk, meat, eggs, plant tissues, bacteria, fungi, animal cells, and everything else that originates from life contain phosphorus. The ultimate source of this phosphorus is the soil. The production of plentiful crops of high nutritive value frequently depends upon the addition of phosphate fertilizers to the soil.

These additions to the soil, however, usually have only a very temporary beneficial effect because the action of certain soil components changes the phosphate into forms not readily available to plants, according to Dr. Sieling of Massachusetts in CROPS AND SOILS. Some experiments have shown that only 5-10 per cent of the phosphate added to acid soils reaches the crop for which it was intended. This is due to a process called phosphate fixation.

To obtain a high production level of high quality crops, the fixed phosphate must be released in a constant and increased amount. Research has established that organic matter is an important substance in preventing fixation and in releasing the phosphate already fixed.

As soils in the humid region become more and more acid because of cropping and natural weathering processes, the iron and aluminum compounds become chemical traps. These catch any phosphate that happens to be wandering about in the soil solution.

The more acid a soil becomes, the more traps become set for catching and holding the phosphate until it is released by another process.

Practical farmers have long observed that loss of organic matter in soils caused phosphate deficiency and consequent crop failure. Others have found that management practices which traditionally included the addition of large amounts of barnyard manure were adequate for great crop production, even though the manure was known to be low in phosphate. Various organic materials other than manure may serve as well as a source of organic matter for this purpose.

So life goes on because the important element, phosphorus, is available in the soil—made available by other life processes in a self-perpetuating cycle of interrelated chemical and biological reactions. So another new, important function for organic matter is disclosed, to be added to many other important actions it has in maintaining good soils.

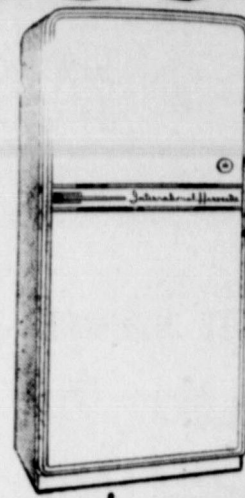

Automatic equipment for delivering fresh, cool, clean, running water to the point of consumption is your greatest asset for keeping your poultry enterprise in the money making column. This fact is proven by two successful poultry raisers in Randall County, Texas.

Mr. Glenn Laing who raises 5,000 broilers under one roof at the same time uses an electric pump to deliver fresh, clean water to the broilers. "Chickens grow faster when they have plenty of water and rapid growth is a 'must' for the broiler raiser," says Mr. Laing.

Mr. Harry Widick, a neighbor of Mr. Laing's in Randall County has over 500 laying hens in cages. He maintains a flock average of 80% production and he contributes this

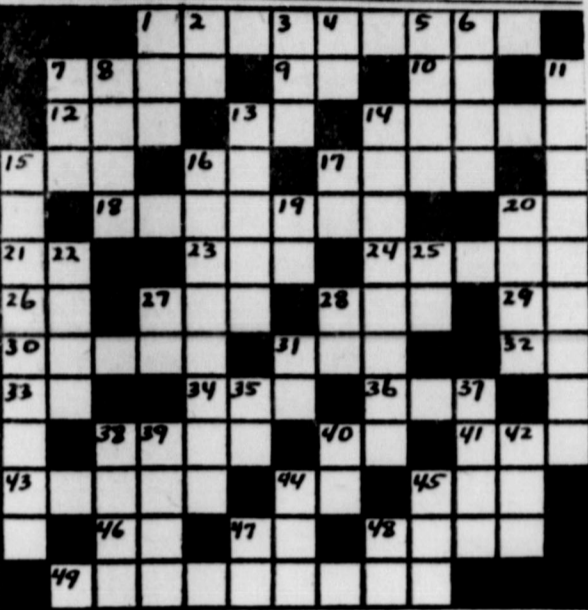
high percentage to the constant supply of clean, fresh water running for his laying hens. The water is allowed to circulate through the trough and on out to the trees around his poultry house. The water runs slowly, carrying away trash and impurities that normally collect in a water trough of that type. This means healthier, disease free, chickens, and time saved because the watering equipment needs less cleaning.

Proper feeding is essential to high production but it is the water that enables the birds to make the most profitable use of the feed. The water should be cool in the summer -- warm in the winter. Feed is expensive, but water is inexpensive and when it is pumped electrically under pressure, a few cents spent on fresh, clean running water really puts your feed dollar to work.

RIDING CLUB NEWS — Earth's Riding Club In Lubbock And Brownfield

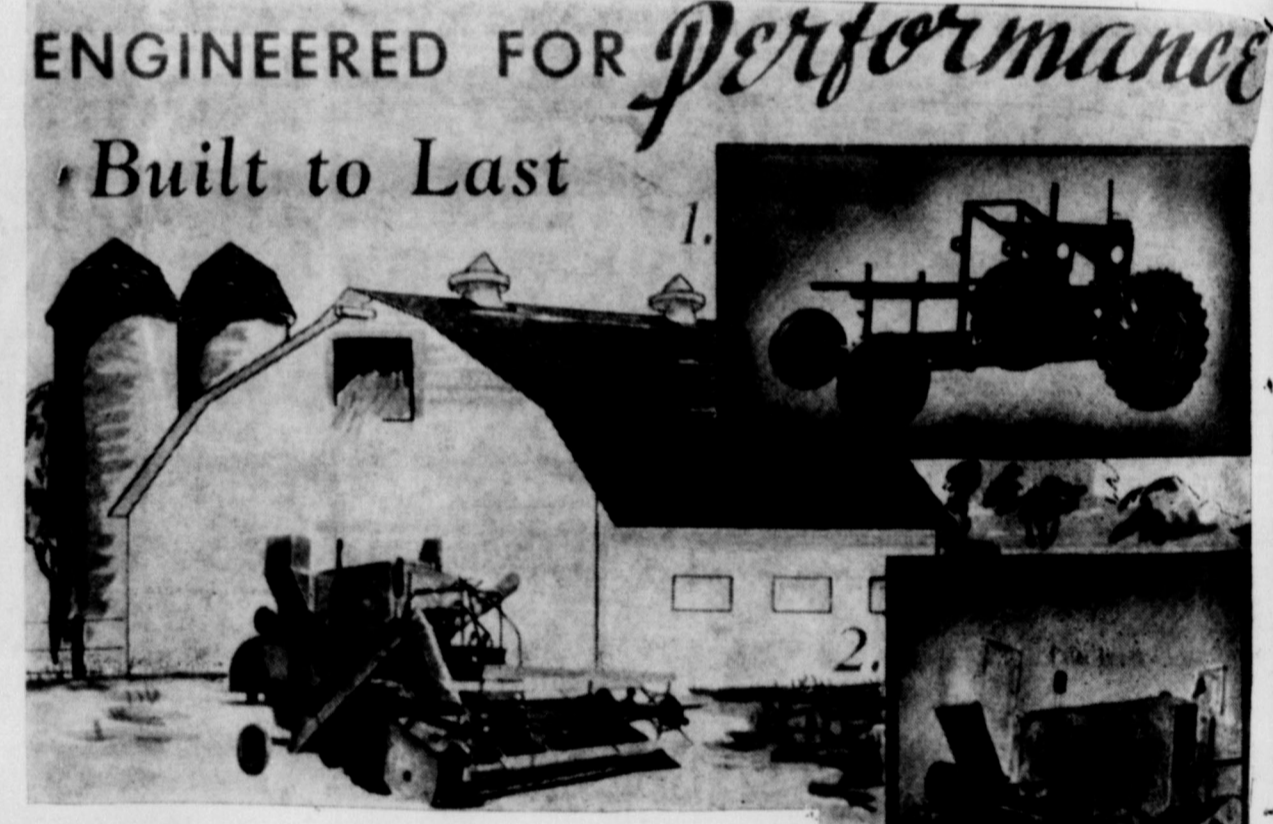

AUSTIN, Tex. — Despite the big news about final passage of the huge tax bill, news about Hascom Giles stole the spotlight from the Legislature the past week.

This time events took quite a different turn. The climax came when a 75-year old, retired mail carrier, John Cass Adrian, was arrested and charged with attempting to extort \$800,000 from the former land commissioner.

Filing of the charge against Adrian was preceded by a series of events, all kept secret, dating back to February 1. Giles reported receiving two letters, prior to the one Adrian is charged with mailing, in which the writer each time asked for \$5,100.

Travis County Sheriff T. O. Lang revealed that the first letter, received by Giles before he was indicted, threatened to expose documentary evidence unless \$5,100 was paid. With this letter was a crude drawing. It directed Giles to acclivert south of Austin where he was to leave money, wrapped in a burlap sack. He was to drop the money there at 4 p.m. on Feb. 4. Included was a promise to return the money in 30 days - after using it "to pull a deal on the border" that would net \$100,000.

As Giles was out of town, he did not receive the first letter in time to act. When the second letter arrived, dated Feb. 9, it directed Giles to leave the money in the culvert by 4:30 p.m., Feb. 11, or "the evidence could not be bought at any price."

A trap was set. Giles drove to the drop site and left \$70 in a burlap sack, as deputies watched the area. No one stopped to pick up the sack. But a man later identified as Adrian drove by. After 36 hours of waiting, Giles returned to the culvert and picked up the money.

A third letter then came. It was dated February 11. It advised Giles that the writer was aware of the trap. It read "All three of us was watching you with field glasses when you placed the law on both sides of the culvert."

This letter directed Giles to prepare \$800,000 in \$20, 50 and \$100 bills for delivery at a place and time to be designated in a future letter. But the promised instructions were never received.

When arrested, Adrian flatly denied knowing anything about the extortion attempt. He was released after posting a \$1,500 bond. Trial was set for June 13.

MORE TAXES COMING

Jefferson Davis' birthday was celebrated by the Legislature. The solans handed Governor Shivers a tax bill! It levied an additional \$19,000,000 a year. Thus ended another bitter tax battle.

As finally voted, the measure provides \$57,038,000 added revenue for general purposes during the next two years. Also \$41,969,000 additional for road work. Tho it furnishes the funds to unblock the \$56,000,000 new money requirements of the \$1,525,000,000 appropriations bill already passed.

It's biggest take was from beer, and a bitter-end fight by beer partisans nearly wrecked the measure in its final stages. Their argument was based on fact that conferees dropped out of the final bill the Senate's "token" \$2,000,000 levy on "dedicated" natural gas and an intangible assets tax on gas pipelines.

On final passage the tax bill cleared the house only by a 72 to 67 vote and the Senate by a scarce 18 to 13 margin.

Included in the tax bill was a one-cent increase in the present four-cent gasoline tax; a one cent increase in the present cent cigarette tax; and an increase of \$2.30 per barrel, or six mills per bottle, on beer.

Senators voted a \$3.30 per barrel beer increase while representatives favored small increases in beer and wine dealers license fees.

Dropped on the final round were the House taxes on cigars, tobacco, trading stamps and an increase in the natural gas production tax.

Rejected were numerous Senate proposals for gross receipts

levied on manufacturers, hotels, motels, department stores, metals and chemical industries.

A \$6,500,000 cushion was given the general revenue fund for the next two years. This permitted passage of several small appropriation bills for new courts; for putting state employees under federal social security; another \$475,000 for legislative expenses; and grants to state agencies for further investigation of the Land Office and Veterans' Land Board affairs.

DIFFERENT MONEY PROBLEM

An entirely different money problem faced the State Board of Education.

Where to find eligible securities in which to invest a cash surplus of \$12,060,095 of its permanent fund was this board's problem.

SPENDING BILLS

Wrapped up near the close of the session was Senator George Moffett's bill appropriating \$7,000,000 for the construction of a new state courts building and a state office building in Austin.

It also provides \$500,000 for repairing and air-conditioning the Capitol; and \$500,000 for operation of the new State Building Commission.

All the money comes from the surplus of the Confederate Pension Fund, as authorized by a Constitutional amendment approved by the people last year.

The pension fund will have a further \$1,000,000 surplus after all Confederate widows' pensions are paid for the ensuing two years.

ACERS APPOINTED

Governor Shivers appointed his former executive secretary, Maurice Acers, as a member of the Texas Employment Commission. He succeeds Colonel Dwight Horton of Blanco.

Price Support Wheat Must Meet Minimum Requirements

Farmers who put wheat under the 1955 price support program must be prepared to meet more specific standards of grain sanitation.

Under the revised program of the food and drug administration, wheat does not meet the minimum requirements for food if it contains more than two rodent pellets per pint, or comparable amounts of contamination, or contains two per cent or more, by weight, of kernels visibly damaged by insects. Wheat on meeting these standards must be disposed of for non-food uses.

The same program based on minimum sanitation standards was in effect several years ago.

Most of the wheat that leaves Texas farms is clean grain—well above these standards. W. E. Allen, extension agricultural engineer, points out. The trouble lies with a relatively few exceptions, resulting from careless handling and storage.

Farm stored wheat offered as security for price support loans will be sample-tested at regular intervals and at time of delivery to the CCC. Except for the question of resale eligibility, the new requirements do not apply to 1954 loan or purchase wheat. If last year's wheat does not make the standards, it is not eligible for resale but can be delivered to CCC under provisions of the 1954 loan and purchase-agreement program.
