Taking this potential into consideration, however, has been Robert E. Wilson, associate professor of Education Administration at Temple University in Philadelphia. Professor Wilson says, assuming that the federal government shares the major burden of financing schools in the future, and also shares the concomitant responsibility for operating of schools, by the year A. D. 2000 a superintendent of schools could handle these common administrative problems in the following simplified manner:

Parent: I want my child's teacher changed.

Superintendent: I only work here; see your senator.

Citizen: My school taxes are too high.

Superintendent: See your congressman; finance bills originate in the lower house.

Teacher: Our arithmetic books are worn out; can we order new ones?

Superintendent: This is election year; no additional expenses this year.

Citizen: Kids are cutting across my lawn on the way home from school and have damaged my petunias.

Superintendent: Don't bother me. File your list of damages with the United States regional court of claims.

Parents new to the District: What school will my child attend?

Superintendent: The U. S. office of education does not distribute its building and pupil allocation until August.

Janitor: I want a raise.

Superintendent: See your congressman; finance bills originate in the lower house.

High School Student: But why can't we have a pep rally?

Superintendent: This is an election year; White House directive dated Jan. 4 forbids all rallies that might detract from nominating convention rallies.

Parent: How many days do we get for Christmas this year?

Superintendent: Maybe I don't have to answer that question; did you vote in the last national election?

Parent: That teacher kept my child after school just for throwing a paper wad!

Superintendent: Detention for paper-wad throwing upheld by United States Supreme Court, Althouse vs. Union School District, T.381, 1976.

H. T. Ray In Serious Condition Following Two Car Collision

H. T. Ray, 49, year-old teacher at Springlake Junior High School remains in a serious condition in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, after being injured in a two-car collision four miles east and one mile north of Earth about 12:30 p.m. Sunday.

Ray was rushed by ambulance to the Littlefield Hospital Clinic, following the accident, and was later transferred to Methodist Hospital Monday night where he underwent major surgery.

Ray suffered a broken collar bone, broken pelvis, several fractured ribs and other possible internal injuries.

The 1954 model Chevrolet, driven by Ray and traveling east collided with a 1950 model Buick, belonging to Ted Rowan, and being driven by Gene Jones, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Jones of Springlake. The Jones boy was traveling south, and as the two cars approached he in the intersection the Buick hit the Ray car on the drivers side throwing Ray out of the car.

Both vehicles were considered a total loss.

The accident was investigated by Highway patrolmen James Freeman and John Bentley of Muleshoe, also Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith was present at the scene.

Patrolman Bentley stated that no tickets have been issued, due to the fact that investigation is still underway.

Smith reported Norman's car completely demolished.

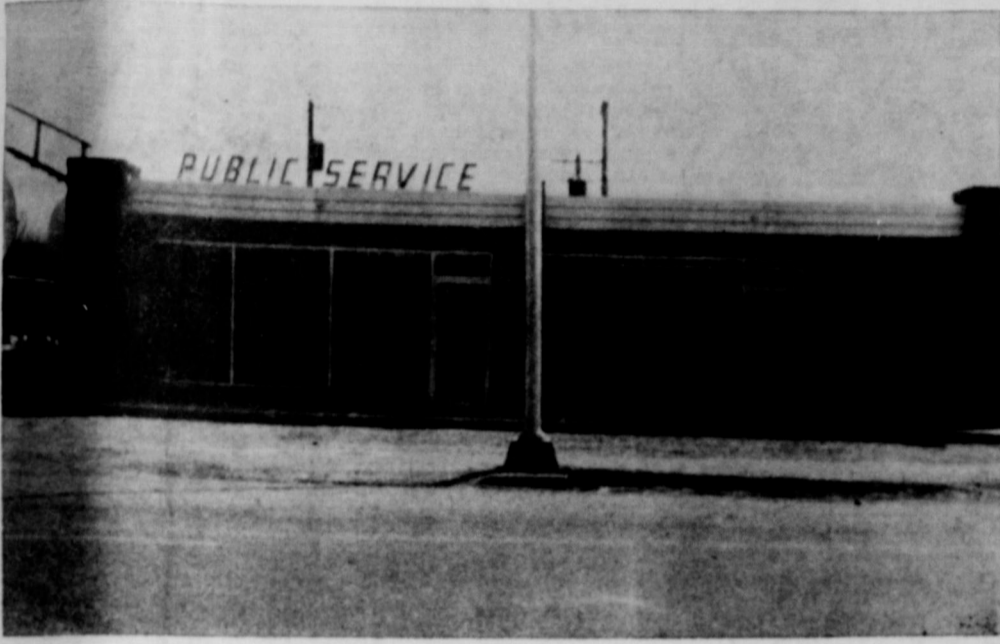
No Injuries Received Tuesday In Two Pickup Collision

Rites Held Sunday For W. T. Clayton

Funeral services for W. T. (Bill) Clayton, 58, were conducted at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Springlake First Baptist Church, with Rev. G. T. Jordan of the Chalk Baptist Church officiating.

Burial was in the Springlake Cemetery under the direction of Hammons Funeral Home of Littlefield.

Clayton and his wife Mrs. Myrtle Clayton, and two other couples, were on a hunting and rock collecting trip in the mountains near Salida, Colo., when he suffered a fatal heart attack, about 4:30 p.m. Thursday.

Clayton, a resident of the Springlake Community for about thirty years, was born April 23, 1902 near Chico. He married Miss Myrtle F. Chitwood, September 6, 1924, at Electra, and moved to Megard where he worked with the Gulf Oil Company until 1931.

The Claytons then moved to their farm, one mile east of Springlake, which they had purchased in 1924. He was engaged in farming for thirty years.

Mr. Clayton was converted and joined the Baptist Church in 1926. After moving to Springlake, he became very active in the Baptist Church at Earth, where he was ordained as a deacon and served as Sunday School Superintendent.

In July, 1948 the First Baptist Church at Springlake was organized in the Clayton home. Clayton being one of the first recognized deacons, served in many capacities and was very active until his death.

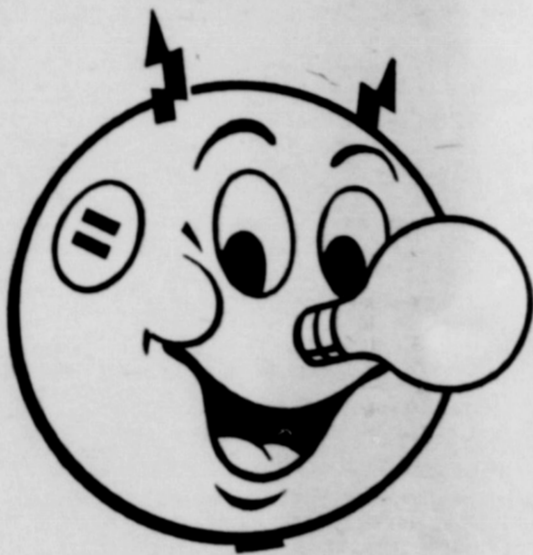

Patrol Investigates 8 Rural Accidents During August

The Highway Patrol investigated 8 rural accidents in Lamb County during the month of August, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks have accounted for 1 persons killed, 8 injured, and a property damage of \$6,140.00.

This brings the total for the year in this county to 5 persons killed, 34 injured, and a property damage of \$38,021.00.

Prior to the first of this month there had been a total of 1,088 fatal accidents in Texas. These tragedies resulted in 1,342 persons losing their lives.

The back to school bell has already sounded for Texas school children. They will be using our highways and streets to and from school. Motorists should drive with more caution and care than ever before.

Sergeant Lawson pointed out that at the present rate of traffic fatalities, half of the elementary school children in Texas will be involved in a motor vehicle accident before they reach the age of 21.

Fifteen persons were killed and 240 injured in rural traffic accidents involving school buses in Texas during 1959.

State laws regulating traffic in regard to school buses read as follows: "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits from either direction any school bus upon meeting or overtaking bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

The Sergeant stated, "The driver of the passing vehicle is responsible for taking the due caution. He is responsible for knowing that his proceeding past the bus will not result in endangering any lives."

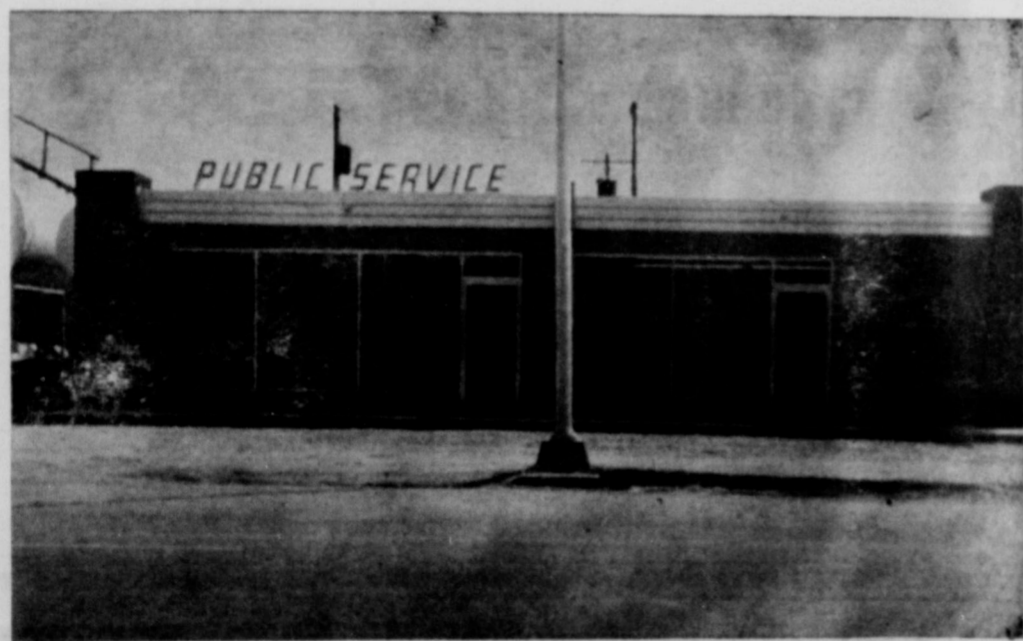

Texas Residents May Obtain Proof Of Age From Federal Census Bureau

Last year, 10,610 residents of Texas turned to the U. S. Bureau of the Census for help in proving they were born. These persons were among an estimated 30 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birth. The historical records of the Census provide the only source of this information for most of these 30 million people.

Proof of age or birth is needed today to collect social security and other retirement benefits. It is needed to obtain passports. It is needed to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. It is needed for some forms of insurance.

Since 1920, the Census Bureau has provided more than three and one-half million persons with cop-

ies of their Census records on age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship. Persons seeking such records of facts about themselves should write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburg Kansas, for a Census Records Search Application Form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search cost \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests and the ease or difficulty in locating the information.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later Cen-

suses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

Lamb County Soil Conservation News

Fred Albus, a Lamb County Conservation District cooperater, has established a vegetated waterway to control excessive runoff water with little or no erosion on his farm, 6 miles SW of Littlefield. Albus started his improvement program with this practice and with Federal cost-share assistance under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

After waterway was established Albus next had a diversion terrace constructed to empty the runoff water into the waterway with standard terraces being constructed below the diversion terrace to hold all moisture falling on the land below the diversion. Albus can now handle large rains without having his land erode and increase crop yields by holding moisture where it falls. Albus conservation program does not end here, he manages his waterway so that it will maintain a good cover and carries out a conservation cropping system to meet the needs of the soil improvement or maintenance of good physical condition, to protect the soil during critical periods when erosion usually occurs, to aid in the control of weeds, insects and diseases, thus increasing the productivity of the land and preserving it for future generations.

IT'S THE LAW — Motorists Advised To Stop For All School Buses

Thousands of school children are now trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for safety of such children.

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rules applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200.00 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are

naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, one necessarily has extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the left under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few special instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions pertaining to such movement in safety, and, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.

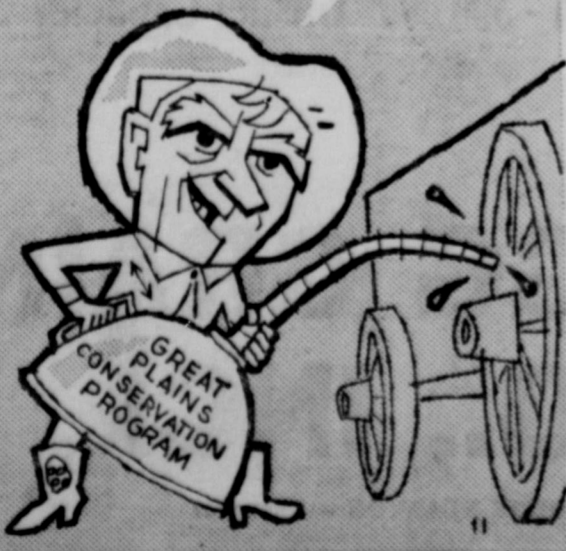

Letters to the Editor...



TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

By now it is probably common knowledge that there are in circulation in this community, and particularly within some of the churches, copies of the oath that is alleged to be taken by the Knights of Columbus, a fraternal benefit society of Catholic men in the Fourth Degree of their Order. For those who have not seen it, the copy I have reads, in part as follows:

"I do further promise and declare that I will when opportunity presents, make and wage relentless war, secretly and openly, against all heretics, Protestants and Masons, as I am directed to do, to extirpate them from the face of the whole earth; and that I will

spare neither age, sex or condition, and that I will hang, burn, waste, boil, flay, strangle and bury alive these infamous heretics.

"That I will in voting always vote for a K. of C. in preference to a Protestant especially a Mason, and that I will leave my party to do so; . . ."

"That I will not deal with or employ a Protestant if in my power to deal with or employ a Catholic. . . ."

"Copied from the Congressional Record of Feb. 15, 1913, page 3262."

If I may insert one minor correction at this point, the alleged oath is on page 3215, not 3262, of the Congressional Record. I do not claim that the version quoted above is actually the one that is in the Congressional Record. It is the one that has come into my possession, and it is very nicely printed in pamphlet form. Another copy I have is a carbon copy on typewriter paper, crudely done.

Before I quote excerpts prepared by the Library of Congress that were sent out by Congressman George Mahon of this District, concerning the fraudulent nature of this alleged oath, I would like to quote the true obligation, that of patriotism, of the Fourth Degree of the K. of C.:

"I swear to support the Constitution of the United States. I pledge myself, as a Catholic citizen and a Knight of Columbus, fully to enlighten myself upon my duties as a citizen and conscientiously perform them entirely in the interest of my country, regardless of all personal consequence. I pledge myself to do all in my power to preserve the integrity and purity of the ballot, and to promote respect for law and order. I promise to practice my religion consistently and faithfully, and to conduct myself in public affairs and in the exercise of public virtue, as to reflect nothing but credit upon our Holy Church, to the end that she may flourish and our country prosper to the greater honor and glory of God."

Could a more patriotic pledge be taken by any American citizens and churches? In fact the ceremonies and pledges of the Order of the K. of C. were examined by a committee of Free Masons in California, who said: "We find that neither the alleged oath nor any oath or pledge bearing the

remotest resemblance thereto in matter, manner, spirit, or purpose is used or forms a part of the ceremonies of any degree of the Knights of Columbus. The alleged oath is scurrilous, wicked and libelous, and must be the invention of an impious and venomous mind." Congressional Record, Jan. 29, 1915, p. 2721.

The fake oath first appeared in 1912, during a political contest for a Congressional seat in Pennsylvania between Eugene C. Bonniwell, a Catholic, and Thomas S. Butler. Even Butler repudiated the document by saying: "I believe the circulation of this paper known as the 'Knights of Columbus oath,' notwithstanding my sincere efforts to suppress it, and spurious as I believed it to be, was disadvantage to me and lost rather than gained votes for me." Congressional Record, Feb. 1913, p. 3219.

Mr. Bonniwell, a K. of C., lost the election and contested it on the grounds that the circulation of this false oath caused his defeat. Consequently, the fraudulent oath was printed in the Congressional Record merely as an exhibit, not as being the oath of the Order. In the report of the Congressional Committee on Elections which heard testimony in the dispute.

In its report, the committee said: "This committee cannot condemn too strongly the publication of the false and libelous article referred to in the paper of Mr. Bonniwell, and which was the spurious Knights of Columbus oath, a copy of which is appended to the paper." Congressional Record, Feb. 15, 1913, p. 3215-3221.

Many cases of criminal libel suits have been brought to court and won by the Knights of Columbus over this false oath. At the present time there is a case in the courts of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, over the publication of it. But for those who insist it is true, there is a standing reward of \$25,000 for anyone who can prove the bogus oath to be genuine, that it is or ever was taken, that Protestants or Masons are or ever were referred to, directly or indirectly, in any of the ceremonies of the K. of C.

I regret that this false oath is in circulation again, but I am gratified that people with whom I have talked were relieved to learn that it is false. They were skeptical of its validity when they read it, but had no information to assure them it was not true. I hope the contents of this letter will reassure others.

It is certainly to a person's credit to question such material, as we all know that many deliberate distortions of the truth are injected to divert people's attention from the really important issues. When this happens they are unable to discern the truth and cannot come to independent and informed decisions. Further information on this matter can be obtained by writing Congressman Mahon or the Library of Congress.
