Migrant Health Clinic To Be Held August 30

The fourth meeting of the Migrant Health Clinic will be held Monday, August 30, from 7-9 p.m. in Earth Community Building. Approximately 170 persons were immunized at the last meeting. The Migrant Clinic is sponsored by the Young Homemakers' Chapter, with the assistance of Dr. C. H. Bausman, local nurses, nurses from Lubbock, and several FHA girls. It is the combined effort of the Clinic to give health protection to migrant workers and underprivileged people through medical advice, immunizations, booklets, and films.

Local Youths Uncover Mystery Skeleton

Four local boys, on a leisurely Sunday afternoon arrowhead expedition, were given quite a shock when they discovered the arm of a skeleton poking above the ground. The boys, Wayne Stockard, Jimmy Stockstill, Floyd Henderson, and Wayne Henderson, were on property adjoining the Halsell Ranch, seven miles west and one mile south of Earth when they came upon the bone.

The boys uncovered other bones and took them to Mrs. Bob McCaskill, science teacher at Springlake-Earth School, for an attempt at some sort of identification. Mrs. McCaskill in turn, called Deputy Sheriff Earl Clark, Dr. C. Thomas Richardson, dentist and Dr. C. H. Bausman, M.D., all of Earth, were summoned to help with the identification. Dr. Richardson and Dr. Bausman speculated the skeleton as being a female buried between 10 and 20 years.

The doctors statements brought about speculation that the skeleton might be that of 21 year old Mrs. Andrea Phares, who disappeared from her Hale Center home on May 4, 1955. After an argument with her husband, C. W. (Bill) Phares, Mrs. Phares left in the couple's late model car. He followed her in another automobile but failed to catch her. Months later her jewelry was dug up from near a bridge close to Cotton Center, Texas Rangers said Phares told them he buried it after finding it in his pocket several days after Mrs. Phares disappeared.

The car she was driving was found abandoned near Hale Center the morning after she disappeared. Phares was arrested in January, 1956 after his brother, Jack Phares accused the brother of once privately admitting he killed Mrs. Phares. Jack Phares also took officers to a spot in the sandhills near Olton where his brother had driven after the disappearance of Mrs. Phares. Jack said his older brother had simply stopped the car and gazed over the hills without explanation.

A Plainview grand jury refused to indict Phares and he was never prosecuted. The skeleton was also examined by Dr. F. E. Green, director of West Texas Museum in Lubbock. Dr. Green said, after close examination the bones were "that of an Indian Male." He said his statement was based "largely on the condition of the lower teeth which are worn and ground down." He declined to estimate the age of the skeleton or the time it had been buried, but did relate that buffalo bones were found nearby.

Several Local Men Receive Hand Injuries

Not very good poetry, but with the rash of accidents that have plagued the Earth-Springleake area recently it is reason enough to encourage poetry writing as a safety precaution rather than any normal customary activity in the area for awhile.

Among those involved in recent accidents are... Nat Bearden was rushed to the Earth Family Clinic by his son-in-law, Jack Dempsey, following an accident while mowing the lawn at his home Sunday afternoon. The accident occurred as Bearden reached down to pick up a piece of wire in front of the mower. Somehow his fingers became entangled in the blades. His index finger was badly mangled and required several stitches. He is reported as doing nicely... A Springlake man, Bob Boone, also received injuries while standing near an anhydrous ammonia tank several days ago. Somehow Boone's thumb was caught in the sucker rod on the rig, causing deep cuts on his right hand which required 8 stitches to close the wound... A third accident occurred Sunday as Dean Jones, local farmer, was attempting to hook a boat trailer onto a pickup hitch, when his hand was suddenly caught between the two hooks, cutting away a large portion of his flesh. The accident occurred at the Jones home north of Earth. It required minor medical attention... Les Watson, who was involved in the fourth incident, cut his fingers while operating a lawn edger at his home... Connie Eagle accidentally shot his hand Monday while in a field near Earth, shooting at targets. He was taken to Earth Family Clinic where he was treated and released... Paul Chance was also injured a few weeks ago when his hand was accidentally intangled in a hay baler. Chance was taken to West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe for treatment. He is reported to be improving.

My Trip to Mexico

One of the most rewarding experiences that I have ever been able to have since entering the ministry, in the way of working in a new field of service, has been my recent trip to Mexico on the National Crusade of Evangelism of the Methodist Church in Mexico.

Of the 48 ministers and 1 layman to make the trip, 29 were assigned to the Central Conference which operates out of Mexico City, and 20 were assigned to the Frontier Conference out of Monterey.

I was assigned the Central Conference and traveled to Mexico City by airplane on July 27.

We were in orientation for 3 days before making the trip with our "Host Pastor" for the week, to our local church for our preaching services.

I was assigned to the Actopan Circuit with three ministers, each of whom had a three point preaching circuit. Things may be slow in Mexico but not where I was. We were in the general location about 50 miles north of Mexico City.

Sometimes the Interpreter would get in contact with me before the service but usually we met for the first time as the service began.

The real clue for such a Crusade as this is to have a good interpreter and for that interpreter to know something of the spirit and concern of the one to be interpreted. Such was not my lot and I had a total of seven during the week where the plan had called for only one.

The work that I had been assigned was in the very fertile farm lands of the valley between the two long ranges of mountains north of Mexico City.

I also moved out of the valley on several occasions and held services in some churches and homes of the communities of people who were not as well off financially, as even the poor of Mexico.

I preached at least once and sometimes as many as four times in the communities and villages of El Arenal, Chicasco, Tezontepec, Mixquahuala and two small communities that I never did find out what or where they were.

In every community we would carry out an extensive program of house to house visitation and I didn't wonder at all when on one occasion, one minister led me across two canyons to visit a family "that had not been coming very much."

The food and culture was all new to me but I felt that I "climaxed" myself quickly and was able to take most of their chili peppers.

On one occasion as I turned

down an extra helping of chili for my scrambled eggs, my host informed me that with such a timid stomach, I would never be able to speak Spanish.

I lived with a family in El-Rosario. The Quintin Reyes family was a very wonderful experience to me, keeping their 12 year old daughter home from a boarding school in Pachuca for the week because she had had some basic English and her presence would give me a "voice" other than during my preaching.

Enita meant much to me because of her spirit and because of her concern that I be comfortable during my stay in their home. She gave up much for that week that I was there.

I found the people to be very hospitable, receiving, and loving.

We had our questions to answer about our Race Riots, Kennedy's Assassination, Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic as well as the Bracerio Program, but we were not Statesmen except for the Kingdom of God. I did explain as much as I could and would then move on to other subjects.

I returned to Mexico City on Monday, August 9, and met my wife at the airport.

We spent the next few days taking various tours of the City and its outskirts, before returning to Shreveport for our children and then back to Earth.

The invitation was an honor for me, coming from Bishop Eugene Slater, and it was all made possible by the very kind act of the Official Board of the Earth Methodist Church, who financed the expense.

I was both and all, impressed, frustrated, shocked and thrilled by what I experienced.

I realize that God is needed and is present, in many, many circumstances and situations. He is in need of workers in all areas and with all peoples. I felt that in a very small way, I was able to share with some very dear people, my living faith in Him.

A farmer, Carthel had resided in Lazbuddie Community three years. Survivors include the wife, two sons, Malcolm and Eddie, both of the home; three daughters, Mrs. Leonard Duncan,

Thomas, Messer In Mishap

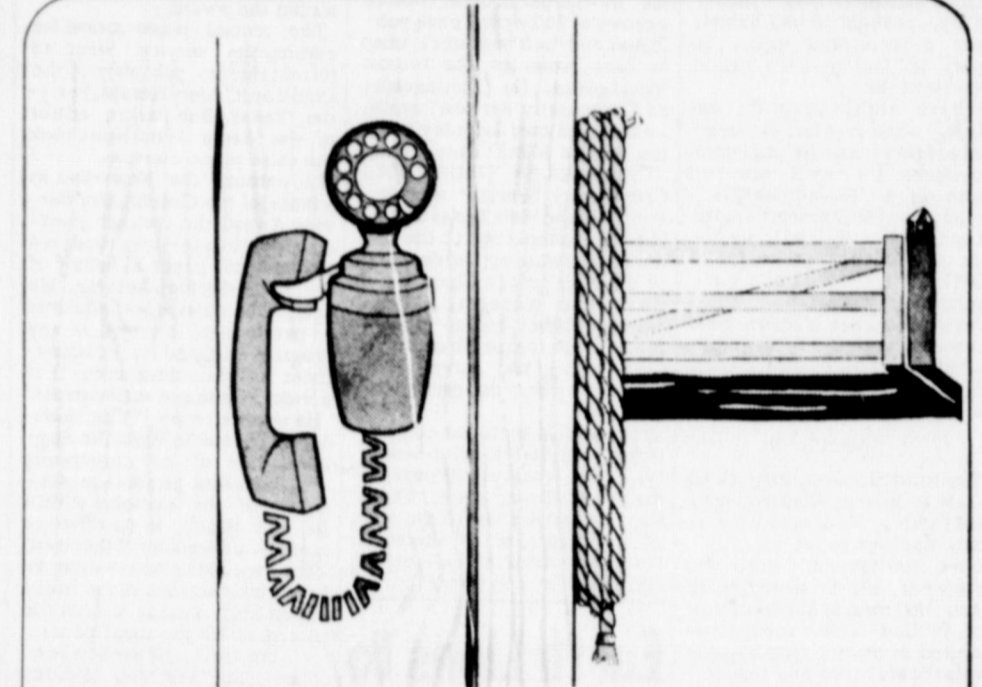
James Thomas and Doug Messer were involved in a two-car collision August 14 in front of the Marshall Kelley home on Highway 70.

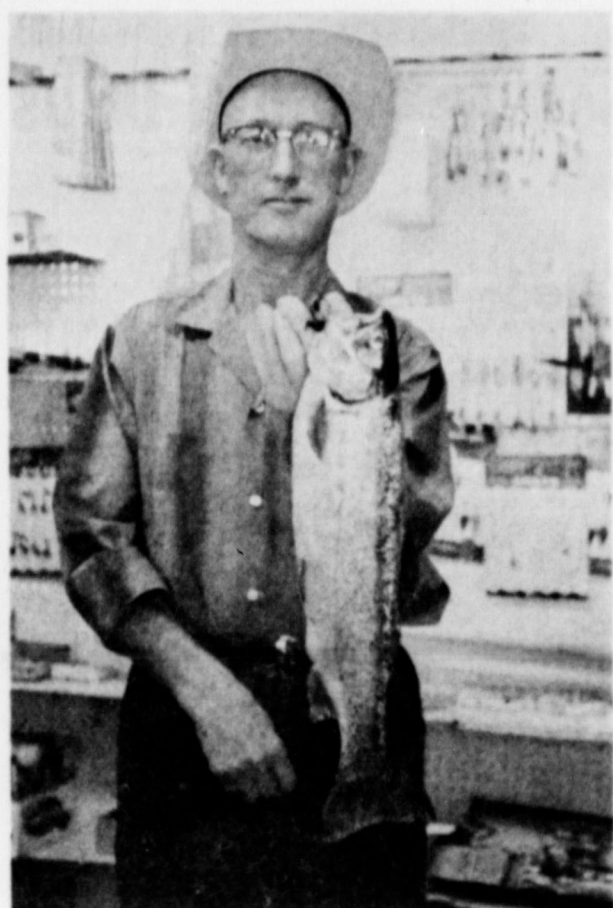

The local Wolverine team has 14 veterans returning from the strong '64 Bi-District Team, they should show experience and strength.

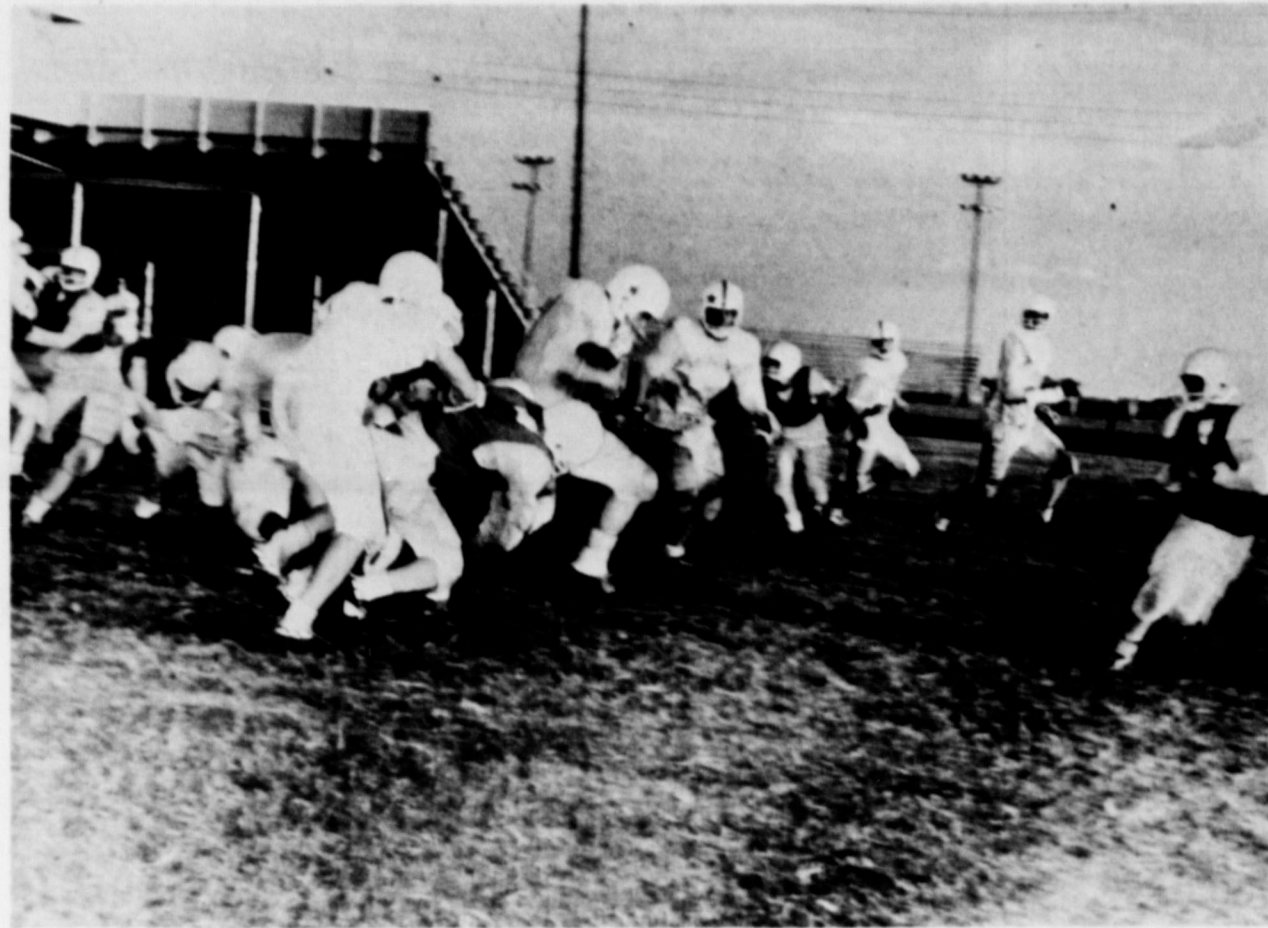

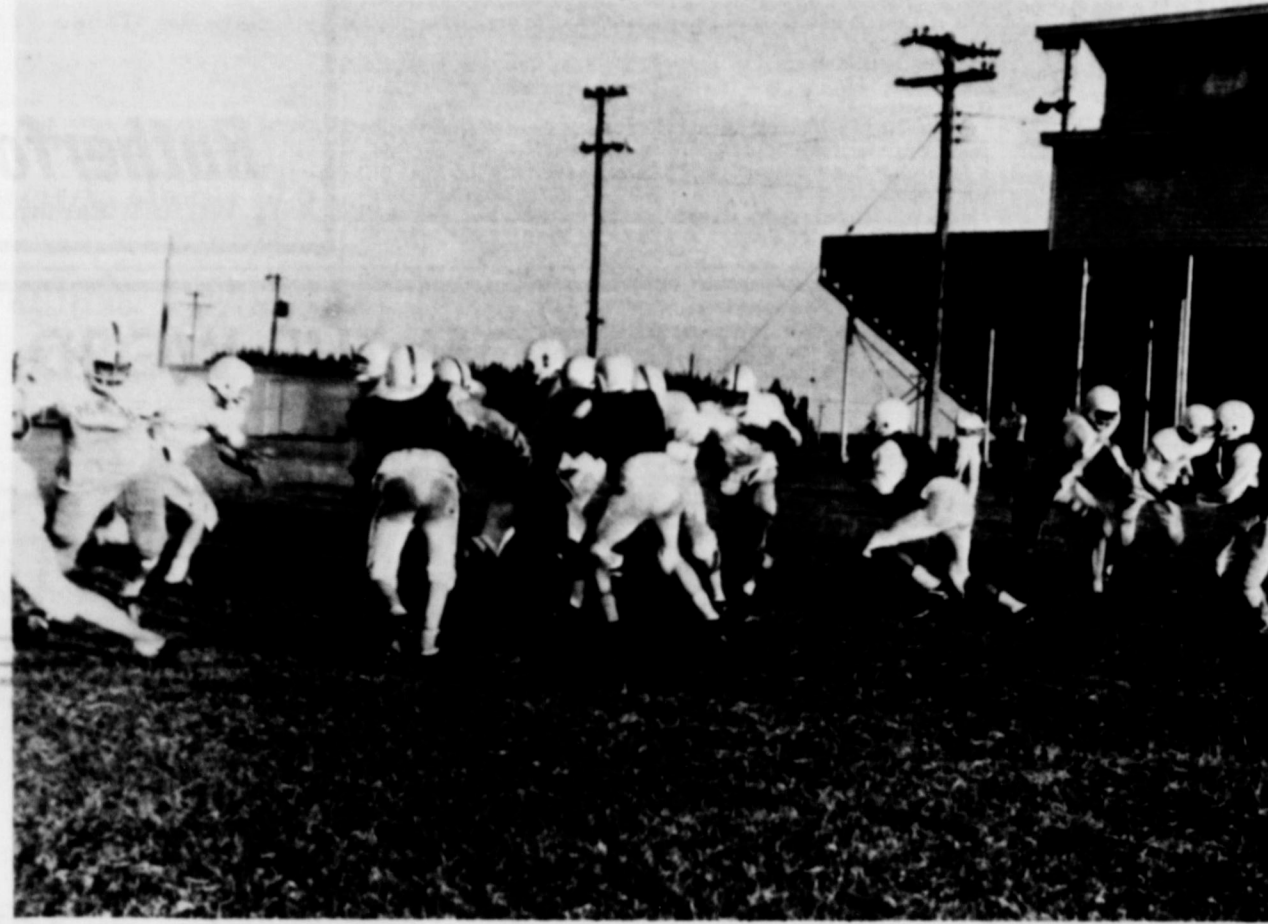

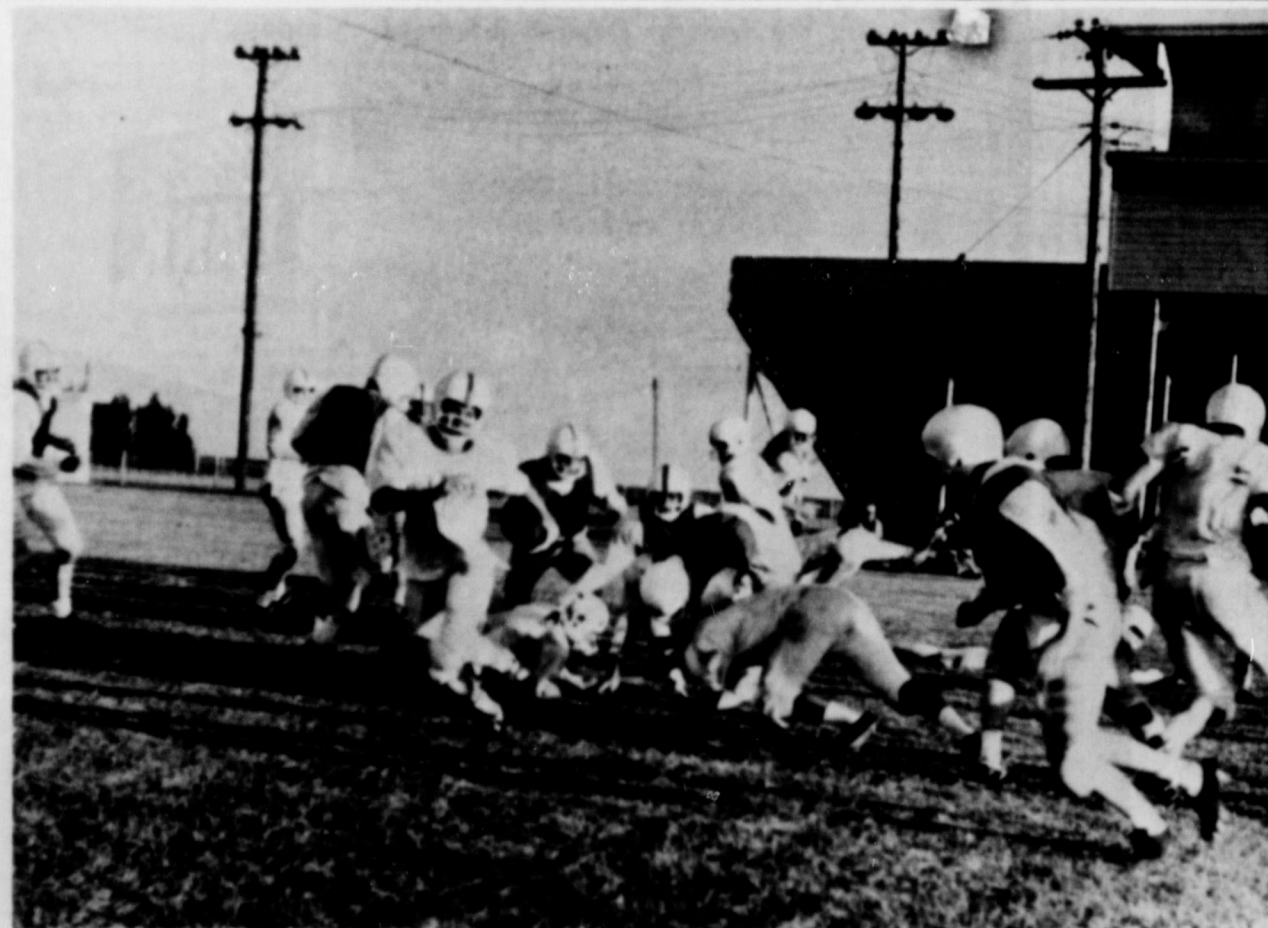
Haberer Wins All-Around Rider World Championship

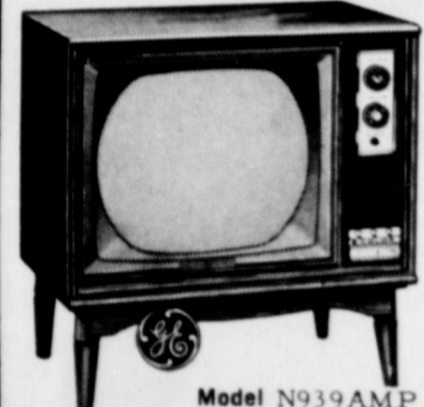

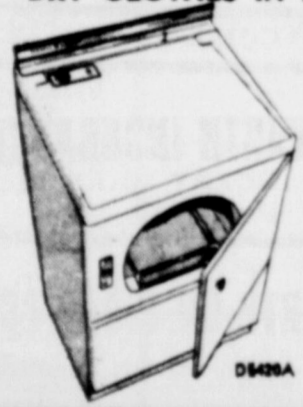

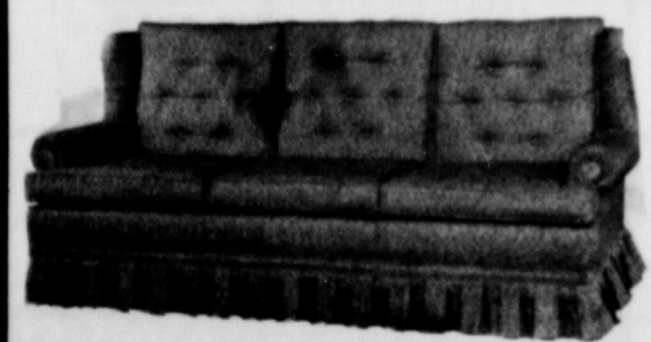
