## West Wind

If you feel so inclined you may see and hear the next governor of Texas in Olton today. Although six candidates aspire to that office, Price Daniel and Ralph Yarborough are the only serious contenders and they both are scheduled to speak in Olton today.

In view of Pappy's fizzle-outs in Lubbock and Amarillo, one of the two Olton speakers appears to be almost a walk-in. So why not go and meet your next governor today.

If you are wondering which one of these two I think will be elected, I'll frankly tell you that I do not know. But I will tell you that I do not believe that Price Daniel has ever given the people of Texas a sound, logical reason for deserting the green political pastures of Washington for the goat pens of Austin.

Why would a sane man turn back to the people the highest gift within their electoral power with no more explanation than that he has decided he wants to educate his children in Texas? He had these children when he went to Washington.

Mr. Daniel's political chicanery is almost unprecedented. To give his campaign plenty of jet propulsion at the take-off, he goaded unsuspecting Texans into a postcard primary of which he was sole election judge. Now he is giving us the old razzmatazz of serving us as senator while actually his heart is in the Texas gubernatorial campaign and his head in the Washington feed bag.

How much bunkum can be crammed down a bunch of country suckers? In the final analysis a man's vote is the result of a positive conclusion. Now, you draw your own conclusion and I'll draw mine.

Marshall Formby, member of the State Highway Commission, and several interested citizens met at Springlake Tuesday night to discuss various phases of the bond issue which will come before the electorate on June 23.

On that date, Lamb county voters will say whether or not they approve an expenditure of \$800,000.00 for the purchase of additional right of way along Highway 70 and 84 for the purpose of four-laning those routes.

Many facts substantiate the need of this major improvement, safety being the most important. Traffic fatalities on congested 2-lane highways are appalling, the largest per cent being caused by head-on collisions. Four-lane routes reduce the death rate more than one-half.

Another important factor supporting 4-lane highways is the time and motor fuel saved in the unobstructed flow of traffic. Furthermore, 4-lane routes attract more substantial business enterprises of all classes.

Unfortunately, some people think this entire bond issue will be spent immediately for additional right of way. The fact is that it may not all be spent for several years. Bonds will be sold only as money is needed for right of way purchase and only the amounts sold will bear interest.

Let's get in step with adjoining counties and vote out the 2-lane death traps and save that life that may be your own or someone in your family.

I am glad to report this week that I have been advised by the resident highway engineer that Earth's paving contract will be let on June 13 at Austin and that Earth will be the first job scheduled to start after that date. We should begin see dirt moving about July 1 according to the authorities.

The three men will own the largest turkey operation in Springlake as they received 3,500 birds last week and expect 6,500 more in the near future.

Four other men in that community who are taking a part in the turkey business are Ronald Cleavinger, Orville Cleavinger, Edd Dawson, and H. F. Axtell. All plan to stock 1,000 birds each with the exception of Axtell who is stocking 2,000.

## Several Meet To Discuss Approaching Bond

Interested citizens from several communities met at the Springlake Baptist Church Tuesday night to discuss the approaching \$800,000 bond election which has been called by the County Court for the purpose of four-laning Highways 84 and 70.

Marshall Formby, member of the State Highway Commission discussed the subject from the State level after which a question and answer session brought out many phases of interest as it pertains to Lamb County.

The meeting was presided over by Mayor V. T. Tanner of Springlake who introduced the speaker and other guests.

The election will be held June 23. Scheduled to be widened if the election carries is 32 miles of Highway 84 extending from Hockley County to Bailey County and 30 miles of Highway 70 running across the north end of the county from Hale County to Bailey County.

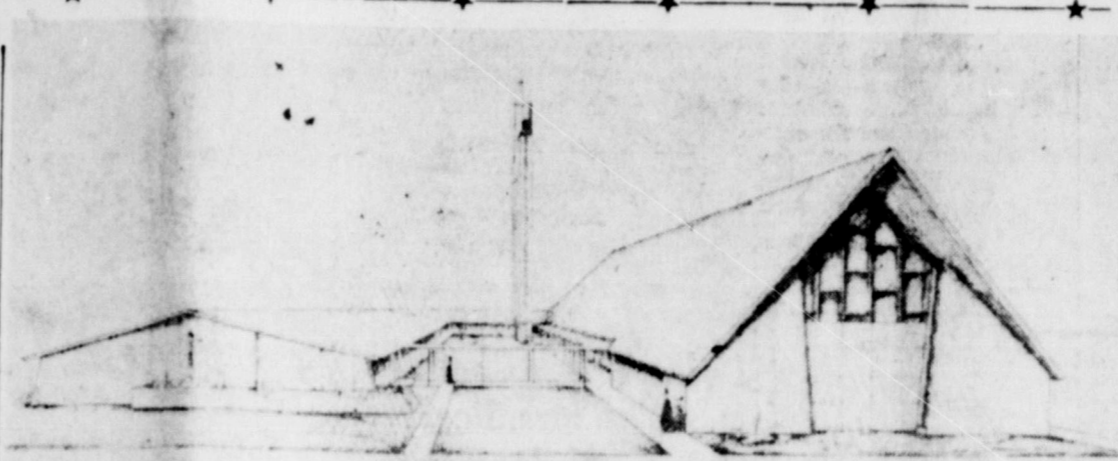
The Taylors said that when the incident occurred, there was a tremendous pop and it appeared as though the tractor would go up in a ball of fire.

### Hot Weather A Threat To Egg Quality

COLLEGE STATION, June 3 —When daytime temperatures hit 90 degrees, egg quality will hit the skids unless egg producers make some changes in management practices, says Kenneth Schlamb, extension poultry marketing specialist.

From not until cool weather in the fall refrigeration is a must if high egg quality is to be maintained. Schlamb says that 55 degrees F. is the optimum temperature for maintaining proper egg environment. Too, eggs must be gathered more often during hot weather with three times a day gathering as a minimum.

Low quality is costly to producers selling on grade. "A" quality eggs of similar size normally bring four to six cents a dozen more than B quality eggs. Eggs can be properly cooled for as little as 10 cents a case.

Adequate cooling, points out the specialist, is no substitute for frequent marketings. Even with good refrigeration, eggs should be delivered to the grad-

Good cooling, says Schlamb, means getting the animal heat out of the egg in the shortest possible time and at the lowest cost. A cooling unit containing a tray for holding wire baskets with space underneath for storing eggs in cases is the most desirable cooling equipment. Added egg income from the use of such a unit will soon retire its cost.

### A Life's At Stake

How good are your brakes? Good enough to save your life in an emergency? Did you know that nearly one-fourth of the cars inspected in one safety check were in need of servicing?

Studies show that though modern automobiles come equipped with the best in brakes, automobile owners don't always keep them in first-class condition (in one nationwide check of more than 1,000,000 vehicles more than 250,000 were reported as unsafe).

How can you tell if your brakes are working properly? The best way, according to American Brakeblok, which produces brake linings for U. S. cars and trucks, is to have them inspected periodically by a good mechanic. You can get a quick idea if they need work by checking the speed with which you can stop your car.

For example, a car with perfect brakes and tires, traveling at 40 miles an hour, will go about 75 feet before even a fast-acting driver can bring it to a complete stop. If it's traveling at 60 miles an hour it will go 160 feet from the time the driver decides to put on the brake until the instant the car stops.

Brake shoe engineers today offer the following suggestions for braking your car:  
1. Look well ahead when you're driving, to anticipate braking situations as they arise.  
2. Slow down when approaching red lights. Don't speed up to intersections and then jam on the brakes.  
3. Shift into second when going down hill—or into first if the hill is unusually steep. It's safer, and saves brake wear and tear.  
4. If there's too much play in your brake pedal—if it goes down farther than it should—get your brakes checked immediately. If it goes down all the way to the floor, better stop at the first garage.  
5. If retiming is necessary, get the best available. Don't take chances.

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### Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey Runs For Re-election

San Augustine, Tex., June 8.—Soil and water conservation and greater protection for Texas families through good services and stability in government are the major issues on which Lt. Gov. Benn Ramsey will campaign for re-election this summer.

Ramsey, who is touring the state preparatory to officially opening his campaign, said, "Soil is the storehouse of agriculture and industry. Water is the key to both."

"People throughout Texas have made great strides in soil and water saving practices in the past 10 years," he added. "The state must give full assistance to equitable plans for conservation at the local level if we are to maintain a sound economy and reach our true potential."

On plans for protection of Texas families, Ramsey said the government must effect rigid rules of conduct and exacting controls over blind forces of influence. Ramsey cited the need for (1) strict curbs on lobbying; (2) stiff narcotic penalties, with life imprisonment or death penalty for the second conviction on charge of selling to minors; (3) eliminating loan sharks; and (4) an unceasing watch to assure families their insurance policies are sound.

Ramsey, who spearheaded the move to rid the insurance industry of "parasites" and eliminate fraudulent investment schemes, said the results have been tremendous.

"Time and experience," Ramsey said, "will determine whether the barricades in our new laws are high enough and solid enough to keep ruthless speculators from preying upon the public."

### Spanish Paella Now Made Easily



Company coming? Here's a dish that's exotically appealing, easy to serve to a group, and not too difficult to prepare. It's a traditional Spanish favorite called "Paella" — the word means "iron pot" — named for the chafing dish in which it is prepared. Thanks to frozen foods, preparation is as easy for the hostess as the serving is for a host who hates to carve. To blend all these ingredients, the Spanish secret is a few tablespoons of Spanish Sherry — either a medium Amontillado or a sweeter Oloroso. This version is named Jerez Paella, after the city which is home of all true sherries. For festive mood, serve a glass of whichever sherry you use in preparing the chicken-and-sea food delicacy.

- Jerez Paella**  
(Tested recipe serving four)
- 1/4 cup of Spanish olive oil
  - 1 medium onion, chopped fine
  - 1 large garlic clove, crushed
  - 1 package Birds Eye Quick-Frozen Chicken Breasts
  - 1 package Birds Eye Quick-Frozen Drumsticks
  - 1 package frozen shrimp
  - 1 cup pre-cooked minute rice
  - 1/4 teaspoon powdered saffron
  - 4 tablespoons Spanish Sherry
  - 12 slices spicy dry sausage
  - 6 thin strips pimento
  - 6 thin strips green pepper
  - 1 package quick-frozen green beans or peas
  - 3 bouillon cubes

In a 4-quart casserole or iron pot, heat one-fourth cup of pure Spanish olive oil, saute a finely chopped Spanish onion and a crushed clove of garlic. Then flour the thawed parts of chicken and brown in the oil. Remove the chicken temporarily, saute one cup of pre-cooked rice in the oil for five minutes, or until the rice begins to brown, adding another tablespoon of oil if needed.

Dissolve 3 bouillon cubes in two cups of boiling water and add 4 tablespoons of Spanish Sherry — don't sacrifice flavor with inferior sherry. Pour over the rice, sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon of powdered saffron. Stir, then replace the chicken, along with 12 thawed shrimp, and 12 thin slices of spicy sausage, preferably hot Spanish. Add green beans if Amontillado Sherry is used, or peas with Oloroso.

Place 6 thin pimento strips and 6 thin slices of green pepper on top, salt and pepper to taste, then cover and simmer gently on top of the stove 30-40 minutes until ingredients mix well.





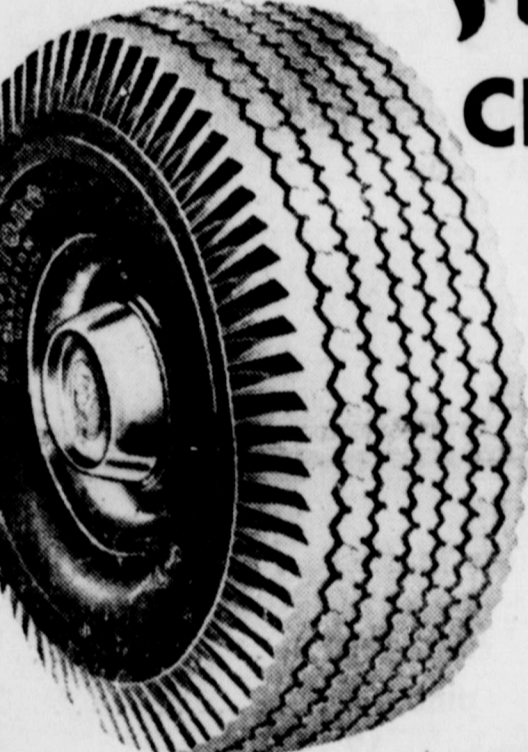
