Wolverine Band Take First In Marching Contest

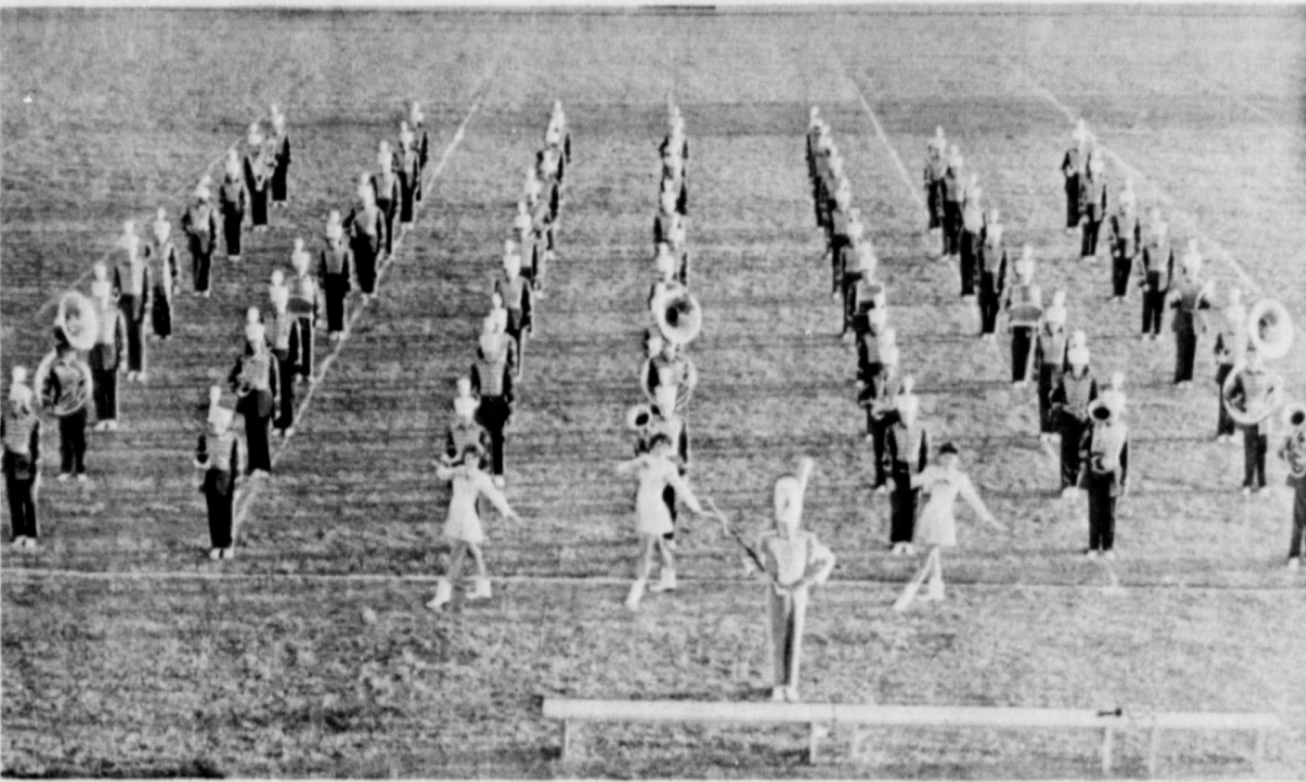
The jubilant Wolverine Band returned home from Lubbock last Tuesday afternoon with a Division I rating in Class A competition in the Interscholastic League Region I Marching contests.

Winning first place in their class along with Springlake were Ralls, Petersburg, Idalou, Seagraves and Hale Center. A II rating in Class A was received by O'Donnell, Kress Tahoka, Sudan, Sundown and Crosbyton High Schools, Plains High School was given a III rating.

The Springlake Band was awarded a first last year in the contest, competing against 12 bands in class A.

Approximately 3,050 students in 43 bands participated in the days marching events at Jones Stadium.

Judges for the contest were F. R. McIntyre, Odessa School Frank Pearsall, Iowa State College and Melvin Montgometry, Snyder High School.

Lamb Cotton Allotment Is Increased

Figures received this week by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. from the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee office, revealed a 21,630 acre increase for 1964 in the base cotton allotment for the 23 counties in PCG's territory, or slightly over one percent. The area's total base allotment in 1964 is 2,132,499 acres as compared to 2,110,499 in 1963.

These are base allotment figures and do not include acres received through the Release and Reapportionment program which yielded an additional 91,684 acres for the High Plains in 1963. According to Donald Johnson, Executive Assistant, Plains Cotton Growers, there is nothing to indicate that this figure will be substantially different for the 1964 crop. The increase for the High Plains came in spite of the fact that the state's total allotment for 1964 was reduced 30,657 acres, from 6,869,104 to 6,838,347. According to Johnson the increases High Plains acreage is the result of the state ASC Committee making more efficient use of the states allotment. Johnson said the committee is to be commended for this action. The committee member from the High Plains is Frank Moore, of Plainview.

The national cotton allotment for 1964 was set at the 16 million acre statutory minimum, as it was in 1963. The original allotment for Lamb County for 64 is 185,910 acres, showing an increase of 1,016 acres over the 184,894 acres for this year. Castro county was increased 834 acres and Castro 885 acres for 1964.

Voting Tuesday On Cotton Market Quotas

Farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote in the referendum on cotton marketing quotas when they go to the polls, Tuesday, Dec. 10 to voice their opinion by voting. W. L. David, Chairman of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee explained the basic program choices as these: First, if at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve of quotas, then the quotas will be in effect for the 1964 upland cotton crop. Also, marketing penalties will apply to any "excess" cotton produced on a farm, and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments, he says.

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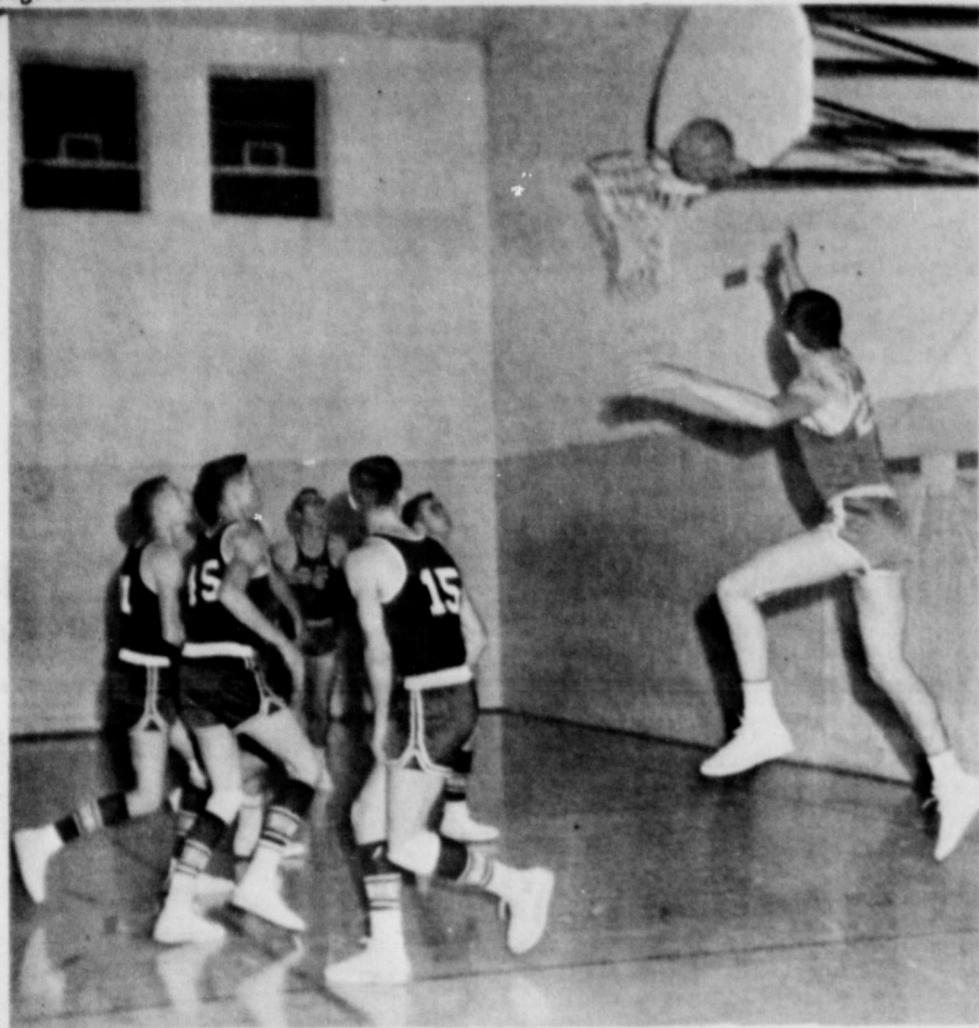
