January Is March Of Dimes Month For State of Texas

Gov. Allan Shivers this week issued an official proclamation designating January as March of Dimes Month in Texas.

The signing ceremony was held in the Capitol in Austin with Gov. Shivers and Adj. General K. L. Berry, 1956-57 March of Dimes Campaign Chairman, participating.

Gov. Shivers' proclamation was: "The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has made tremendous strides in the past few years in developing the Salk Polio Vaccine which will prevent polio, and in the further development of equipment, medicines and technicians which can care for those who unfortunately have been stricken with this dread disease. Yet, our people still need more services. We must educate everyone to assure that all those susceptible to this disease takes advantage of the Salk Vaccine. We must assure the continued treatment for those already stricken.

"Let's finish the Job is the slogan for the 1957 March of Dimes Campaign and no other slogan could be more appropriate for Texans.

"Now, therefore, I as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the month of January, 1957, as March of Dimes Month in Texas, and urge every Texan to contribute generously to the March of Dimes.

Earth Co-op Gin, Inc. Stockholders To Meet Friday P. M.

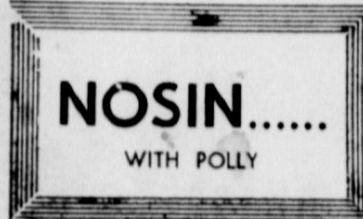
A meeting of the stockholders of the Earth Co-op Gin, Inc., will begin at 10:00 a.m., Friday, January 11 at the gin office.

Every Citizen Is Urged To Pay His Poll Tax Before January 31 Deadline

Judge Ralph Yarborough of Austin has called on "Every Texan who loves his country and loves Democracy" to pay his poll tax before the January 31 deadline.

Yarborough in a speech at the Dallas County Records Building, said:

"Poll taxes must be paid by January 31, 1957, in order to qualify a person to vote in the United States Senate race, many mayor's races, many wet-dry elections, many school board elections, and elections on bonds, higher taxes and constitutional amendments."

He added: "Control of the United States Senate will hinge on the vote in the special Race in Texas this spring. Never before have the people of Texas faced one single race in which issues of such world wide importance are at stake. Issues, the United States, and the world issues that affect the future of Texas will be at issue in this one race this spring. No man or woman can afford to be without a poll tax this year, the price non-participation in our government is too high for anyone to pay. Every instinct of good citizenship demands that every person be qualified this year," Yarborough added.

Republican hard money and high interest rate policies will be at stake, and so will Democratic issues of ninety percent of parity, lower interest rates and expanded opportunities for the aged. The peace of the world hangs on the balance point in the middle east, and Texas will elect a Senator who will hold the balance of power in the United States Senate," Yarborough said.

"I plead with every Texan who loves his country and loves Democracy to pay his poll tax now so that he may vote in the Senate and other races this year," Yarborough said.

TRAFFIC VIOLATORS BEWARE W. F. Williamson New City Marshall

W. F. Williamson has recently been appointed City Marshall of Earth due to the resignation of Bill Rudd.

Williamson has been city water manager the past 19 months.

Williamson announced he would be subject to call 24 hours a day within the city limits of Earth. Williamson stated, he would issue parking and speeding tickets and had accepted the position to help Earth Citizens and Teen-agers, so that a Highway Patrol would not have to be stationed in Earth.

Williamson also stated that everyone has given the fullest cooperation, especially the Teen-agers in abiding by the speed limit laws and parking, he only urged that everyone stop at the caution light before coming onto Main Street. He added, this might save an accident of not only one car but two.

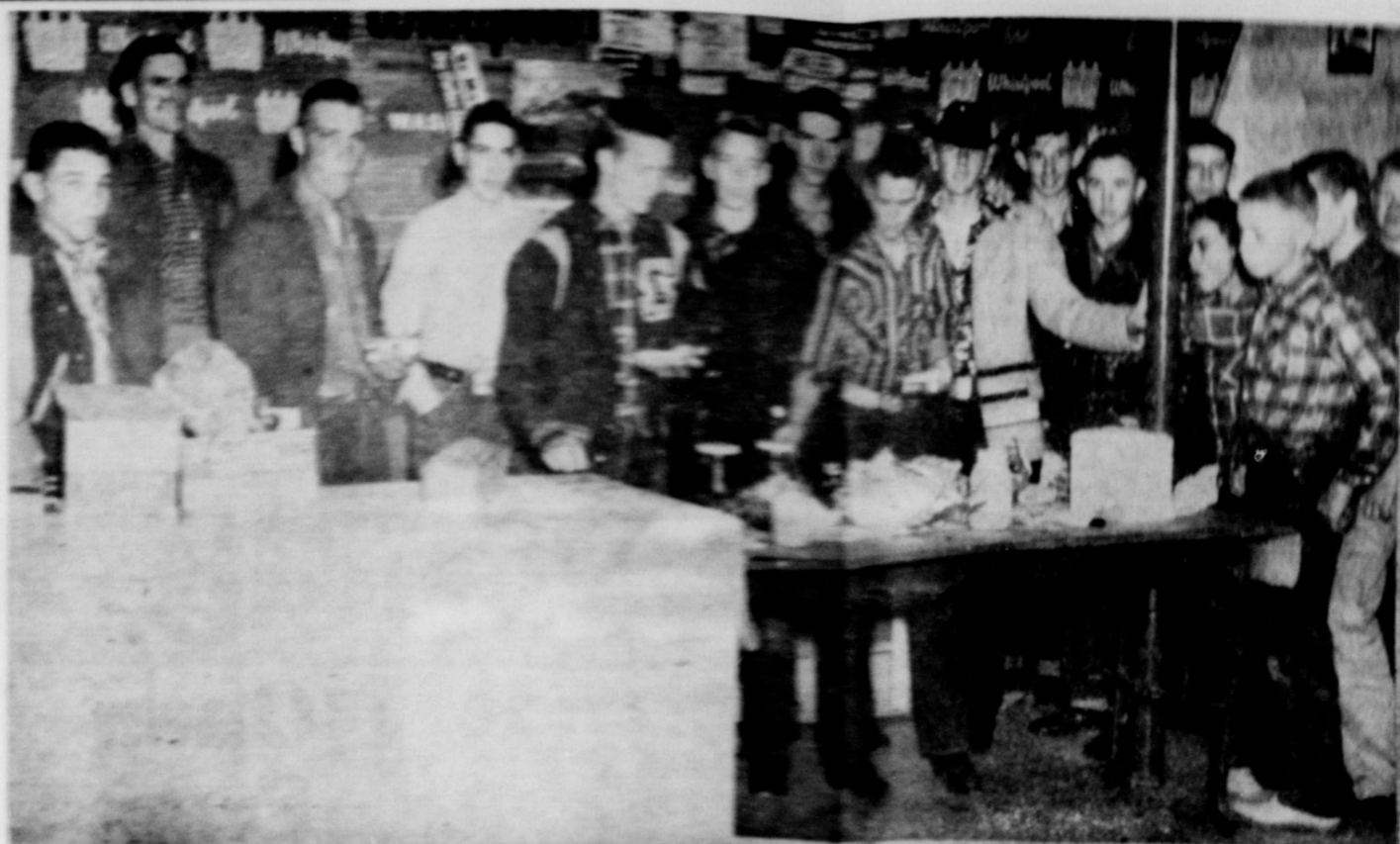

Begin Search For \$5000 Hoblitzelle Award Winner For Advancement of Rural Life

Five regional committees representing every section of the state have begun their search for the winner of the \$5,000 1957 Hoblitzelle Award for the Advancement of Texas Rural Life.

The award will be presented to the Texas farmer or rancher who has made the most notable contribution to agriculture in the state for the three-year period from January 1, 1954 through December 31, 1956.

Presentation of the Award, consisting of \$5,000 cash and a gold medalion, will be made at the Annual Field Day and Awards Dinner of Texas Research Foundation at Renner, May 22, 1957.

The purpose of the Award is to encourage and to give suitable recognition and financial reward for personal accomplishment in the field of rural life improvement by a farmer or rancher. "Dr. C. L. Lundell, director of the Foundation, reports.

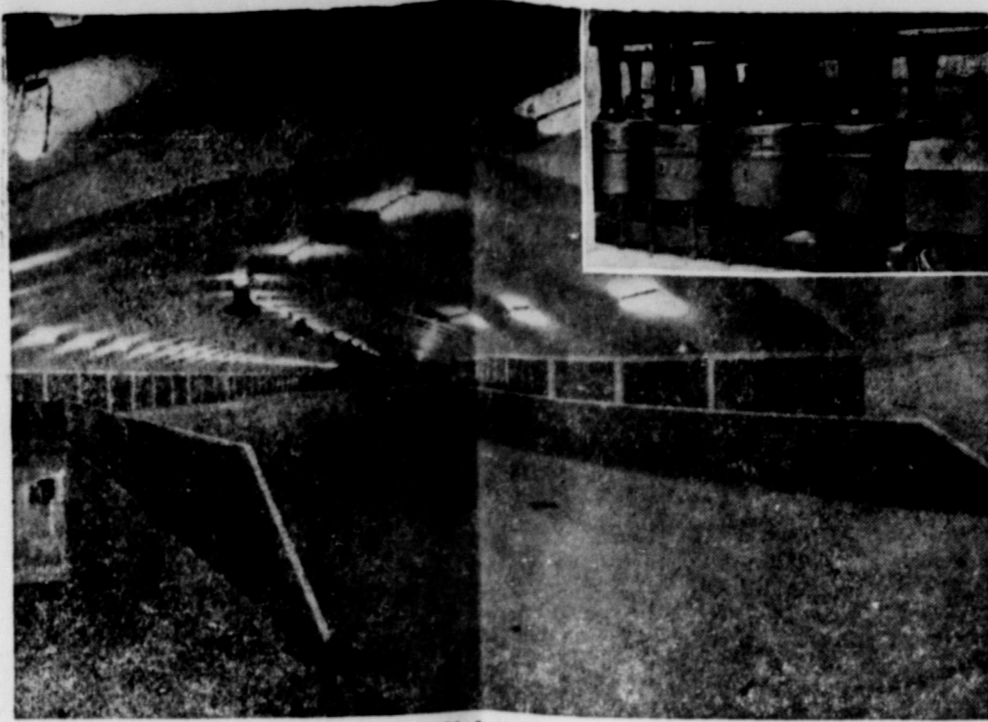
Regional committees throughout the state have been named to receive and to make nominations of

the candidates for the Hoblitzelle Award. In the Panhandle-Plains area, the regional committee is headed by Jason Gordon, Farm Chemicals Inc., Plainview. Other members of this committee are: Myles A. Kelley, Soil Conservation Service, Pampa; and Casey Fine Texas Technological College, Lubbock.

Nominations will be received by the regional committees through March 1, 1957 and may be made by individuals, groups or agencies. IT'S THE LAW in TEXAS

PARTNERSHIP OR CORPORATION
 Thinking of going into business for yourself? Perhaps you and Bill Smith have decided to operate a business together. Should this be done as partners or as a corporation. The answer to this problem involves many legal questions. Perhaps the most important factor is that the business or personal acts of either you or Bill may be binding upon the partnership. The corporation, however, can act only through its officers and agents, and then only within the limitations granted by the articles of incorporation. As members of the partnership both you and Bill will be liable for all the debts of the business. In case you have business losses, the creditors of the partnership, and all of the personal assets of either you or Bill, or both (except a few exempt by law), in order to satisfy the partnership debts.

On the other hand, if you form a corporation the creditors may go only against the assets of the corporation so that the most that either of you can lose is the amount you have invested in the business. The creditors could not touch the property which either of you own personally and individually, outside of your corporation stock.

In event of the death of you or Bill, it would be necessary to liquidate the partnership, but in the case of a corporation the operation of the business is not affected by the death of an owner (stockholder). The firm continues as the same business with the heirs of the one who dies substituted as the owner of the stock.

Of primary interest to you and Bill will be the amount of income taxes you have to pay. In a partnership, each of the owners of the business includes on his individual income tax return his proportionate share of the total income shown on the partnership return. This is because the partnership is not recognized as a taxable entity. The corporation is recognized as a taxable entity, so it pays a tax on the amount of its net income, after the salaries of you and Bill and other expenses. Then you of course pay individual income taxes on your salaries.

If over a period of years the earnings of the corporation exceed reasonable salaries for the two owners, these earnings will be distributed to you and Bill in the form of dividends. The funds with which the dividends are paid have already been subject to tax in the hands of the corporation, but are again taxed on your individual returns when distributed. The income tax advantage or disadvantage of a partnership as compared with a corporation depends on the net income from the business, the salaries the owners receive, the amount of their income, and the requirements of the business for liquid funds.

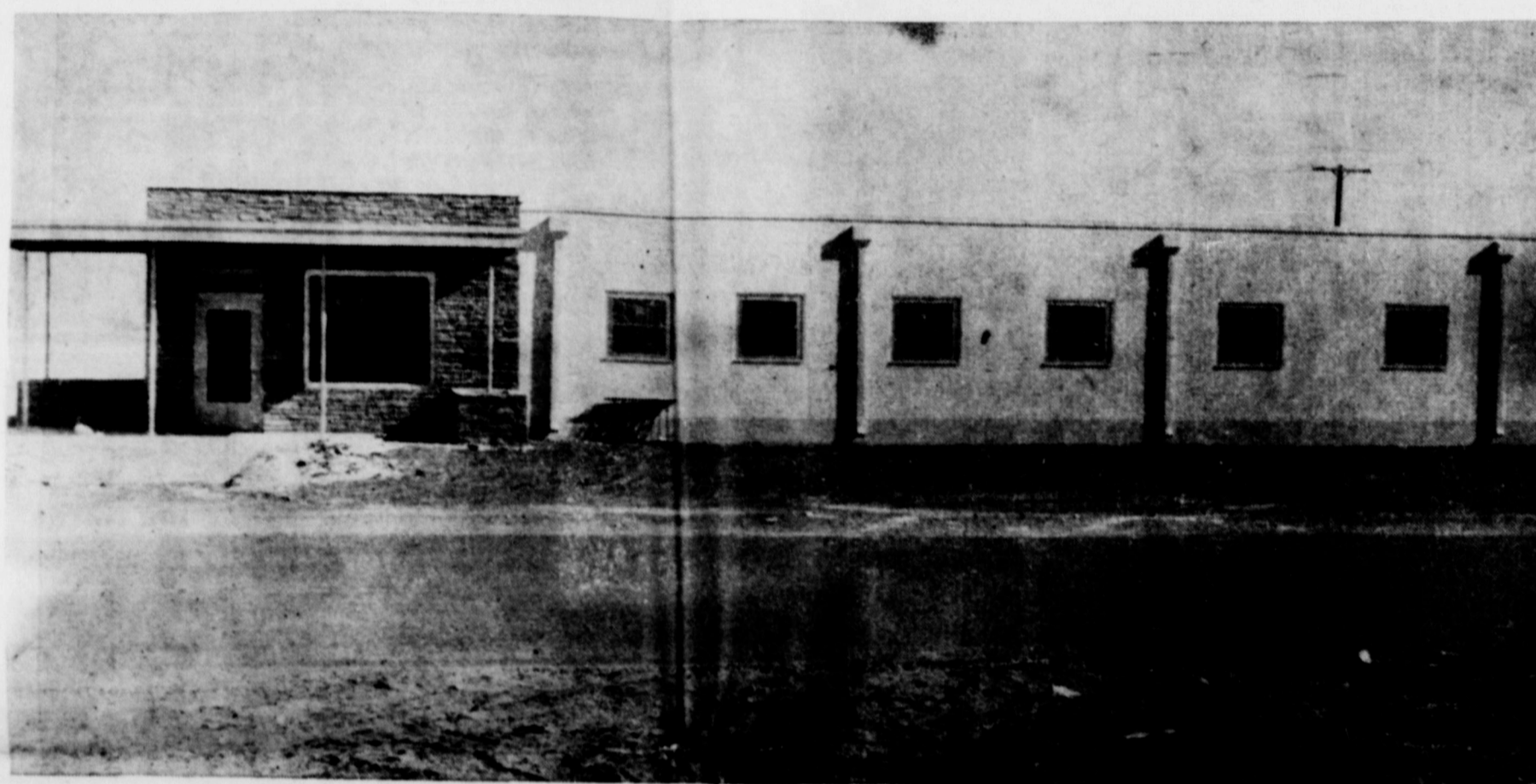

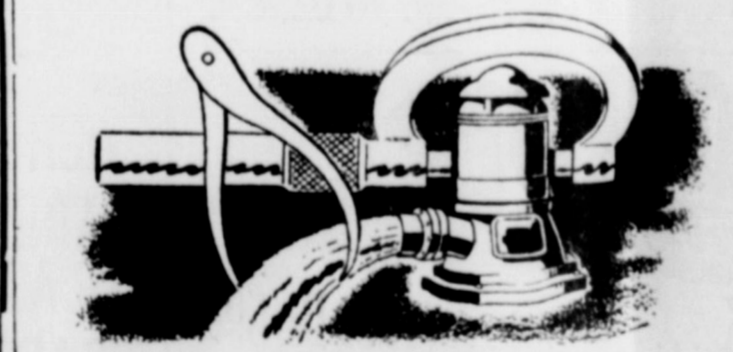

AUSTIN, Tex.—Austin is its every-other-January whirl. Inaugural festivities on the 15th will climax two weeks of fanfare traditional to the premiere of a new state administration.

Stepped up tempo in the Capitol began New Year's Day when scores of new officials took the oath of office. It rumbled this week as gavels banged in another Legislature.

Next week thousands more will arrive to "dance in the new governor." Their 1957 inaugural invitations are unusually elaborate—gold embossed and purple tasseled. Forty thousand were printed.

Other arrangements are similarly lavish. An hour long parade will precede the high noon swearing in ceremony in front of the Capitol. In the afternoon there'll be a band concert, then a reception at the Capitol. That evening Governor and Mrs. Price Daniel and Lt. Gov. and Mrs. Ben Ramsey will lead the grand march of state officials and their wives at the chief inaugural ball at Gregory Gymnasium. From there the official party will make a round of the four other balls over town.

Citizens of Austin pick up the check for this biannual spree. Estimated cost this year is \$15,000.

NEW LAND BOARD — Land Commr. Earl Rudder begins his first elective term with a re-organized board.

Sworn in with Rudder were William Gossett, El Campo banker, and L. E. Page of Carthage, former state commander of the American Legion.

A new constitutional amendment dropped the governor and attorney general as ex-officio board members. Instead, the governor is required to appoint two "citizens at large," one versed in finance, the other in veterans affairs.

H. D. Barlow of Jourdowntown was appointed by Gov. Shivers to succeed Norvell as associate jus-

ice of the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals at San Antonio.

John F. May of Karnes City was appointed by Shivers to succeed Harrow as judge of the 81st district court.

Richard L. Dobie Jr. of Cotulla was appointed to succeed May as 81st district attorney.

Gov. Shivers also named L. D. Ratliff of Spur as judge of the 110th district court. And more

than a score of others were appointed to state agencies, commissions and college boards.

Another appointee, John Osorio of Austin, was elected chairman of the Board of Insurance Commissioners immediately after taking office as a member.

Also in the swearing-in news, through a novel coincidence were two old hands. Supreme Court Justice Robert Calvert adminis-

tered the oath to State Comptroller Robert Calvert. No kin.

SHEPPERD BOWS OUT — John Ben Shepperd left the attorney general's office and headed for Odessa.

He will be general counsel for extensive West Texas and New Mexico oil and banking interests.

And definitely no more politics, said Shepperd, who didn't run for re-election. He said he returned more than \$11,000 sent him in one day only, for a U.S. Senate campaign.

SHORT SNORTS — President Eisenhower, slated to visit West Texas on his "drought tour" next week likely will find plenty of dust. U.S. Dept. of Agriculture reports improved pasturage due to rains in the eastern two-thirds of the state, but downhill conditions in the west. Texas Railroad Commission set the state's January oil allowable at 3,421,053 barrels a day, same as for December. Statewide production remains at 16 days. Texas hunting fatalities dropped from 35 in 1955 to 18 in 1956, reports the Game and Fish Commission. Of the 1956 deaths, six were self-inflicted; 11 involved teen-agers.
