This hospital would have to secure a staff of registered nurses, vocational nurses, nurses aids, lab technicians, an administrator, office personnel and janitor. Some of these can be trained during construction. Some will move here seeking employment, It is for certain that they cannot be induced to move here without a hospital. This will offer jobs for local people as well as offering an opportunity to move new families into our community. All this would be equal to having a new industry locating here.

Another answer would be to locate doctors now practicing in the area or neighboring large town. Why would any of these come here? There are some very good doctors in larger towns that are young and cannot build a successful practice due to the popularity of others and because of specialization in larger towns. It is beginning to be a trend for the general practitioner, and even those with some residency in surgery, to move to smaller communities such as ours in order to build a satisfactory practice. Hospital districts are being created just for the purpose of building a larger hospital to replace smaller privately owned hospitals, and this has already been done in this section of the country. The popularity of hospital districts is spreading and many new ones are being formed all over the state. We cannot be sure that it will not be a possibility in
