Cal Farley To Be Guest Speaker For C. of C.

Tickets are now on sale for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet which will be held at the Springlake School cafeteria Friday, April 6 at 7:30 p.m.

Cal Farley, founder and president of Boys' Ranch near Amarillo, often called "America's greatest foster-father," will be the guest speaker.

Mr. Farley saw the beginning of Boy's Ranch in 1939 when he bought the abandoned courthouse at Tascosa. Six homeless boys from the streets of Amarillo were the first residents of the ranch.

Seeing the dire need for proper supervision and training for homeless boys across the nation, Farley sold his tire business in 1947, putting thousands of dollars of his own money into this project and dedicating the rest of his life to helping homeless boys find "A Shirttail to Hang On To."

During the evening, awards will be presented to the outstanding citizen of the year and to the outstanding boy and girl of the senior class.

Master of ceremonies is Bill Mann. Invocation will be led by Rev. H. S. Salley.

Dinner will be cooked and served by the school lunchroom staff. Dorothy Wood and Oletha Sanders are in charge of decorations.

Welcome will be by Phil Raught and introduction of guests by Jarvis Angeley. M. E. Kelley will be in charge of introduction of officers and directors.

The Melody Mises of Springlake School will furnish the entertainment. Leon Dent will introduce the speaker, Cal Farley.

Announcements to be made by Paul Wood. Benediction will be by Guy Kelley.

Two Burglaries Totaling Over \$1000 Occur Tuesday

A break-in at Whites Store sometime after midnight Monday was discovered Tuesday morning. Deputy sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. investigated.

Entrance was gained by cutting a hole in a corrugated tin door at the rear in which tires are stored. A lock was then removed from an inner door leading into the store.

Taken in the robbery were guns, watches and tires valued at approximately \$1000.

The break-in was discovered at 8 a.m. Tuesday morning by store employees, Ambrose Flores and Fred Falcon.

Paul Poyner, manager, was quoted as saying "the thieves took only my best quality merchandise."

The Earth Drive-In Theatre was the scene of another break-in the same night.

A window in the ticket office was broken and an electric telephone tape recorder, model T. T. 2 valued at approximately \$150 and belong to General Telephone Company of the Southwest was taken. The theatre snack bar was also entered, the cash drawer pried open and several cartons of cigarettes were taken.

Ted Borum, discovered Tuesday night that a microphone valued at \$49.50 had also been taken in the Monday night robbery of the Earth Drive-In.

The same method of operation was used at both places.

A futile attempt was also made to gain entry through a rear door of Rutherford and Co. Manager Bill Bryant discovered the broken lock on the rear door when he opened the store Tuesday morning.

A report late Tuesday afternoon from Swisher County officers said that part of the loot taken from the Auto Store burglary had been found on a road near Tulla.

Billie Sol Estes Freed On Bond Faces Bankruptcy Proceedings

Billie Sol Estes, a former resident and farmer of the Earth area, was released on \$100,000 bond Monday, after spending four days in the El Paso jail.

News sources reveal that Estes and three of his associates are charged with conspiracy and transporting fraudulent mortgages from Texas to California in multi-million dollar deals.

Weldon Barton is quoted as saying "Estes came here in 1948 or 1949 with a house-moving truck. He was selling surplus Government barracks buildings and I brought one from him."

Roy Neal was quoted to have said "Estes was a peculiar sort of person and a wild operator. My office at that time was half of the Roberts Barber Shop. Estes would often come in to use my phone for long distance calls to promote the anhydrous ammonia, already his business."

Estes farmed a half section of land eight miles north and one mile east of Earth, known as the Cook place.

During the big cotton crop of 1949, Estes helped several farmers in the area haul their cotton to distant gins as the local gins could not get the large crop ginned. The trailer in which he hauled the crops was a fantastic sight.

It was made from the skids and dollies of his horse-moving equipment and sides were built on it of boards and chicken wire. It is said to have had a capacity of 25 bales and when loaded, the center of the load sagged within a foot of the road.

Estes when released Monday returned to his palatial Pecos home and is said to be in day and night conferences with business associates.

Several Lamb County farmers may suffer financial losses.

Estes owns elevators in Lamb County and was associated with at least two fertilizer companies in the county.

F. F. Bozeman of Springlake has been named as a defendant in the suit, which concerns purchase of anhydrous ammonia tanks and trailers purchased from the Superior Manufacturing Company of Amarillo.

The suit charges that Bozeman is in default of balance payments of \$62,927.

County chattel mortgages show that Bozeman purchased over a half million dollars worth of the tanks.

Guy Nickels of Sedan has not been named in the suit. County records show over a million dollars worth of tank purchases, most of them from Superior Manufacturing Company.

Two mortgages are on file by Estes showing the old Ben Smith Elevator at Olton as collateral on two \$900,000 notes to Commercial Solvents Corporation, an anhydrous ammonia manufacturing company.

News sources reveal that individual farmers will lose only if they fail to receive delivery of the anhydrous ammonia paid for on advance orders.

A spokesman at the Earth Fertilizer Company owned by McSpadden who was arrested along with Estes and also released Monday had no comment at this time. The two local men operating the Earth Fertilizer have done a splendid job and had no connection other than to do a swell job managing the business here.

M. O. Carter is reported to be slightly improved. He is due to undergo cardiogram tests this week.

Messenger Fined, Sentenced On DWI Charge

Benjamin Messenger, driver of a car involved in an accident Sunday morning, March 25, west of Earth 1.8 miles, was found guilty in Lamb County Court of DWI charges. He was fined \$150 and costs, plus 6 months in the Lamb County jail, according to Earth deputy sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr.

Smith was injured as he was helping direct traffic around a wreck scene in which Alonzo Olivarez, 23, Earth was killed and three others injured.

The Messenger car collided with the death car, knocking it into the State Patrol car. Then Messenger's car crashed head-on into the patrol car. Smith was thrown over the door and fell back on the state patrol car.

Not thinking he was hurt, he helped load the victims into the ambulance. He was brought to hospital later with a whiplash injury and sprained knee.

Smith has been released and is back on the job.

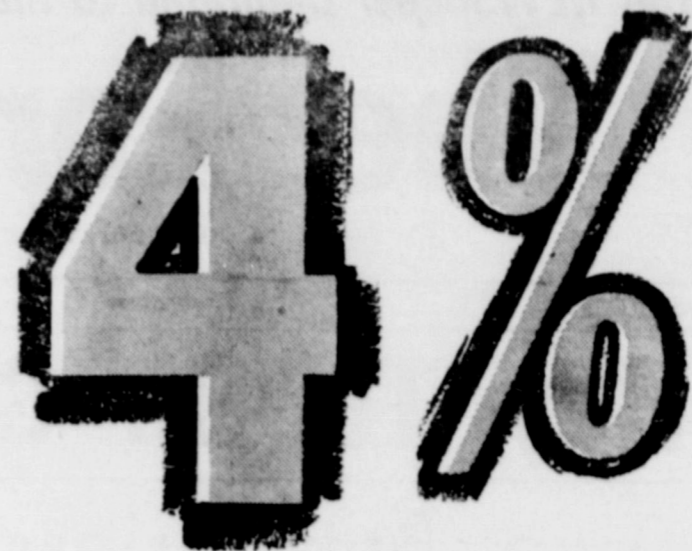

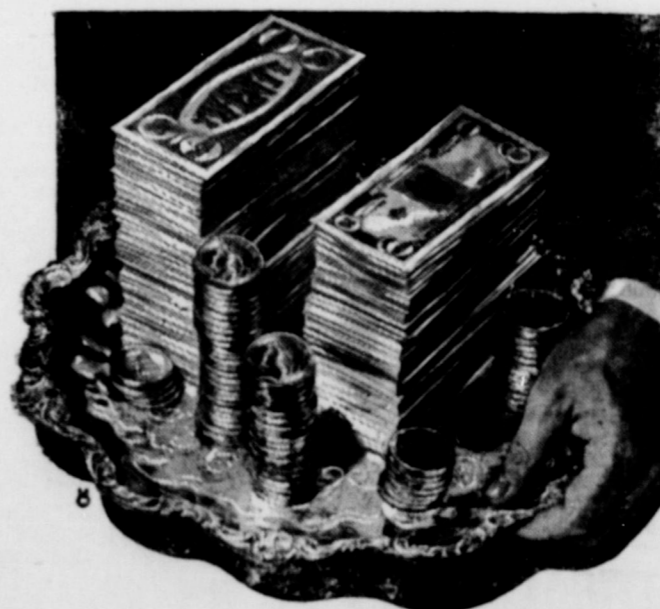
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Editorial:
THOMAS JEFFERSON

Thomas Jefferson was born April 13, 1743. He was the third president of the United States. He was president from 1801 to 1809. He is the author of the Declaration of Independence and the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom.

Jefferson was a tall, straight-bodied, loose-jointed man. He stood and walked straight and his shoulders were always square. He stood and walked straight and his shoulders were always square. He was hazel eyed and freckle faced; he had a long, high nose, and no one ever thought of him as handsome.

His father's name was Peter Jefferson, and his mother's name was Jane Randolph. He was the third child and eldest son in a family of four sons and six daughters. He was born at Shadwell, Virginia near the mountain on which he later built his home, Monticello.

When Jefferson was 28 years old he married a 23 year old widow, Martha Wayles Skelton, on New Year's Day, 1772. Of their six children, only two of them, Martha and Maria lived through their 18th Century childhood. He, Thomas Jefferson, died in 1826.

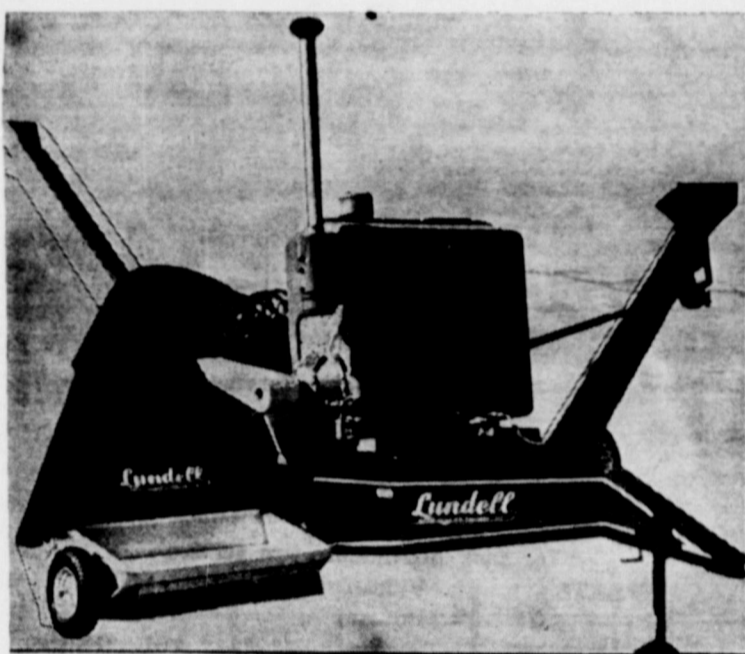

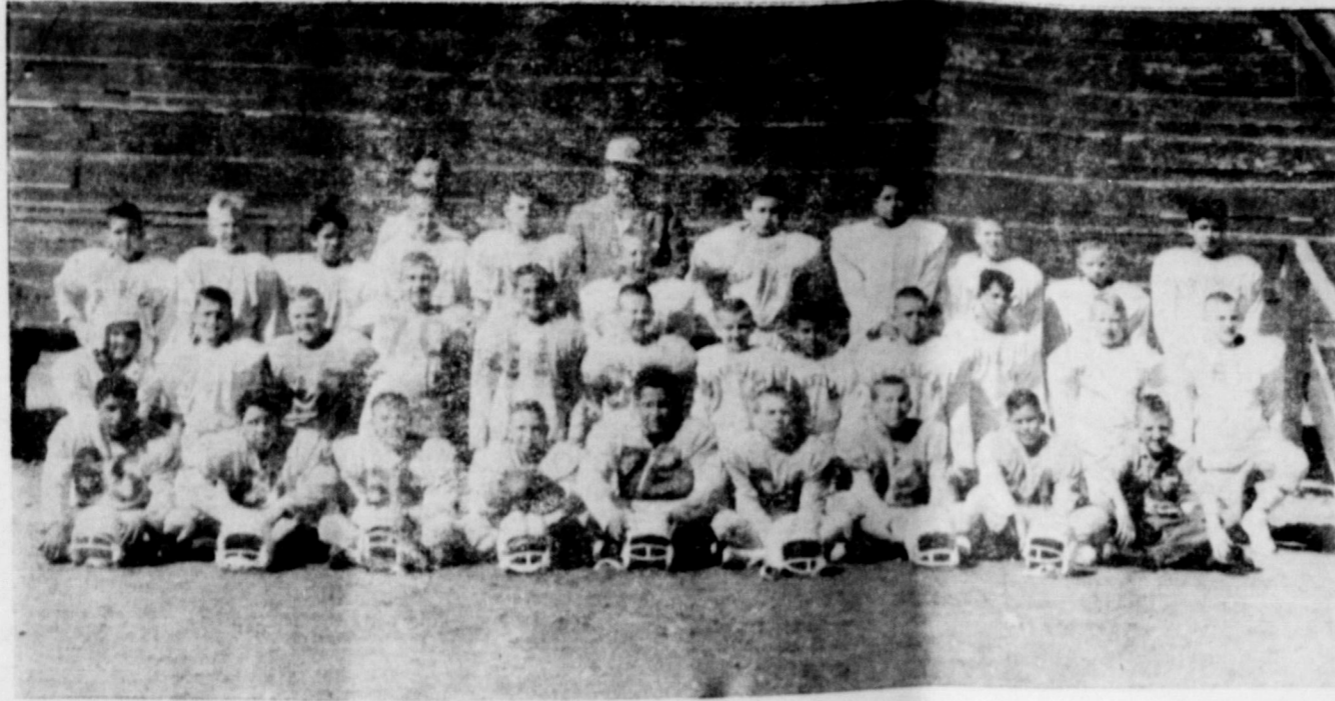
Mrs. T. T. Nichols Former Resident Dies March 27

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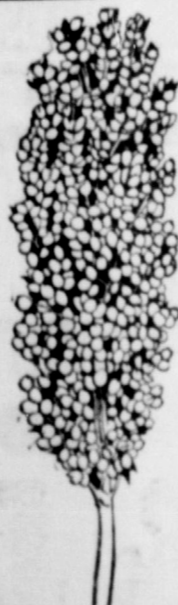

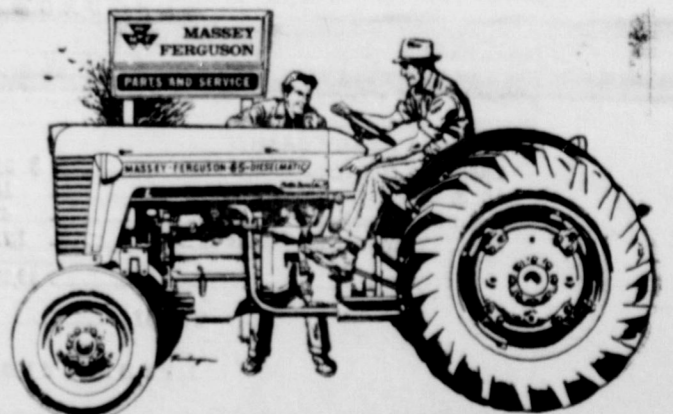
