Bank Deposits Indicate Rise In Economy In Area

Bank deposits at the Citizens State Bank in Earth at the close of business on Thursday, December 31, 1970 were \$3,986,151.25. This figure showed an increase of \$551,856.76 over the end of the year's business in 1969.

When the local bank opened for business Monday, there was a line of depositors waiting. This stream of business continued through the entire day and by the end of the day bank deposits had jumped to \$4,658,559.69. Business continued to soar through Tuesday but the exact total was not available at press time Wednesday.

Norlan Dudley, president of the bank said deposits of more than one million dollars were handled on Monday of this week. He reported this to be the record deposit made in several years during one business day. The deposits reflect a definite rise in the economy of the area.

Cotton and grain crops have been excellent in the Earth-Springleake area this year. Lamar Aten, manager of the ASCS office in Littlefield, stated there is still a little cotton out in the fields and that they expect a total of 171,000 bales of cotton for Lamb County. The Earth-Springleake area has a total of 33,758 bales and still have a scant bit out in the fields.

Crops have been better this year than any year since 1964 according to reports from the Littlefield ASCS office.

Registration Renewal Applications Due In Mail

AUSTIN—If you own one or more of the more than seven million motor vehicles in Texas, there is some important mail coming your way early in January.

It is your registration renewal application. This is the second year of operation for the new, easy computerized registration procedure devised by the Texas Highway Department.

Last year, the system greatly reduced bothersome waits and long lines which plagued vehicle owners at county tax offices and substations in years past.

Prospects are that the system will work even better this year. Also, it is not necessary to present last year's registration receipt of the certificate of title. The renewal application you will receive in the mail is all you will need.

Registration begins February 1 and continues through April 1. The renewal application will arrive in the mail in a slender envelope marked, "Important—This Is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

The application is a three-part form with instructions printed on it. One important thing to remember is THE CARD SHOULD NOT BE TORN APART.

After the registration period begins February 1, each vehicle owner can take the renewal application and the fee to his county tax office, or he can order his plates by mail.

If the owner wishes to register by mail, he should send the entire three-part renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to the local county tax office as early as January with the understanding that his license plates may not be mailed until February 1.

The additional \$1 charge covers cost of handling and postage.

Owners are to receive their plates by mail before the April 1 deadline, then they must

send the renewal form, fee and \$1 for each vehicle to be registered to the local county tax office by March 1. This allows 30 days for delivery of the plates before the April 1 registration deadline.

If the owners decide to go to the county tax office or substation, he will find shorter waiting lines. All he needs to take with him is the renewal application and the fee. He will then receive his new plates and part of the form as his receipt.

Another part of the form is retained by the county and the third is sent to the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin. However, the owner may decide to register his vehicle, by mail or in person, use of the renewal form will be more convenient and timesaving.

The current registration system is the product of much work and planning. The system began to take shape in 1967 with the installation of the first computer equipment by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Highway Department.

18 Year Old Voters Register

Thirty-one voter registration certificates to Lamb County youths ranging from ages 18, 19 and 20 years were issued by Herbert Dann, tax assessor-collector, shortly after Dann received his official notice on Tuesday, December 29, from Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. that youth of this age group had been given the right to vote in federal elections only. Many of these had made application for voter registration prior to the official notice.

Following the notice received

by Dann certificates are now being issued at the time application is made to all applicants 18, 19 and 20 years of age and to those persons who are not yet 18, but will be 18 before March 1, 1972.

For persons in this category, the voter registration certificates are stamped or written in red ink across the face: **FEDERAL ELECTIONS ONLY UNTIL 21 YEARS OF AGE**, and the birthdate is written in.

The birthdate is necessary since a person becomes eligi-

ble to vote in federal elections on one date and in state and local elections on another date.

Although there are no scheduled federal elections in the voting year 1971, there always exists the possibility of a special election to fill a vacancy in a federal office. Otherwise, young voters under 21 years who gained a right to vote in federal elections under the Voting Rights Act of 1970 will have to wait until 1972 to exercise their new right.

City Receives \$2,973.45 Sales Tax Revenue

A check in the amount of \$2,973.45 for the city sales tax of one percent was received by the City of Earth from Austin recently.

The gross amount collected in the three month period was in the amount of \$3,018.27. The state retained \$148.61 and the state fee was \$60.37.

The gross amount collected in the last quarter was \$3,250.03. However, the difference is not considered too significant as business is still considered good in Earth.

DWG Names Clark Manager

A new general manager for Dimmitt Wheat Growers' elevators, farm store and fertilizer operations has been named by Dimmitt Management Company.

He is Billy Ray Clark, long-time cooperative manager and former "Citizen of the Year" in Hale Center, who has served the last six months as a senior credit analyst with the Lubbock branch of the Houston Bank for Cooperatives.

Clark succeeds Glen Hammond as manager of the large cooperative's elevators and farm supply facilities in Dimmitt. Hammond is moving to Port Lavaca, where he will manage a new fertilizer terminal for Farmland Industries. Before joining the Houston Bank for Cooperatives last year,

Clark was general manager of West-Tex Grain & Milling at Roscoe for two years. Prior to that time, he was manager for 11 years of Hale Center Wheat Growers, Inc.

Clark, 44, is widowed and has two children, Tonya, 13, who is an eighth grader, and Greg, 11, who is in the fifth grade.

A native of Chillicothe, Clark graduated from high school there in 1944, then served 20 months in the U.S. Navy in World War II, including nine months overseas as a radarman. He was assigned to the USS Marquette ARK 95.

Returning from the war in 1946, he entered Texas A&M where he received a bachelor of science degree in agricultural economics in 1950.

At Hale Center and Roscoe, Clark was active in both civic and church work.

He served as a city councilman at Hale Center, was chairman of the city's first Community Fund drive, served on various committees of the Chamber of Commerce, was a member of the Hale Center Agricultural Development Board, and worked with the 4-H and FFA organizations there.

A member of the Hale Center Lions Club for 13 years, Clark was named "Lion of the Year" in 1963. He is a past president and past secretary of the Hale Center Club, and served as a member of the district governor's cabinet.

In the Baptist Church at Hale Center, he served on the personnel committee two years, was on the finance committee for a new church building and was the superintendent of the adult Sunday School department.

At Roscoe, he served as the first president of the Roscoe Community Improvement Association, and was the assistant superintendent of the Adult

Department of the First Baptist Church.

During his career with cooperatives, Clark has represented two districts as a director on the Houston Bank for Cooperatives advisory committee; has been a member of the board of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives, a director of the Rolling Plains Committee of Growers' Seed Association, an advisory board member of Producers Grain Corporation, and a representative on the Plains Co-op Oil Mill advisory board. He is a member of the National Society of Accountants for Cooperatives.

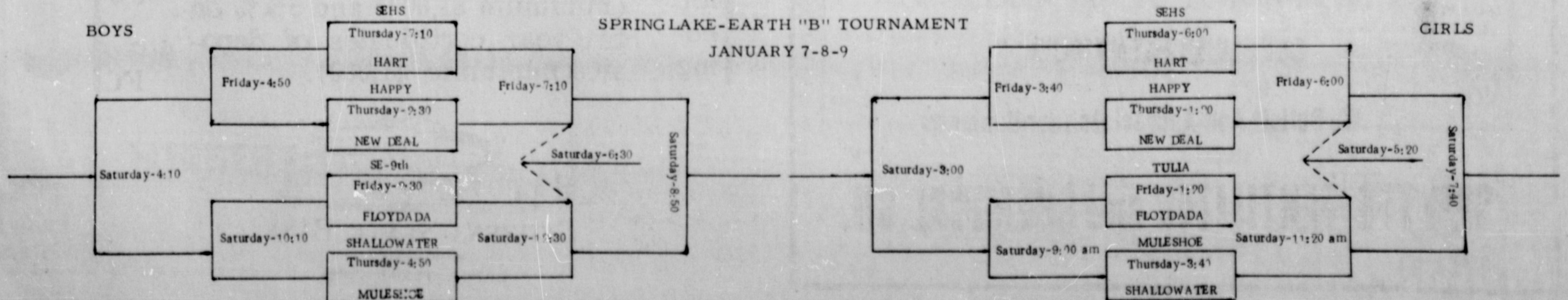
Earth Super Save reported plate glass windows broken in their building.

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County Has 171 Formal And 3 Common Law Marriages In '70

Don Cupid was busy with the love arrows during 1970 as the marriages in Lamb County were slightly above the number of marriages during the previous year.

There were 174 marriages registered in 1970, including three common law unions and in 1969 there were 169 marriages.

The recognition of common law marriages went into effect in January, 1970, and Lamb County's first couple to regis-

ter were two 21-year-olds who acknowledged that they had been living together almost five years.

The second couple to register an informal marriage was a serviceman in uniform who was due to report for duty the next day and said he and his girl didn't have time to be married in a regular ceremony.

The third couple was a 16-year-old boy and a 13-year-old pregnant girl who couldn't be married because they were under age.

Census In January On Consumer Buying - Home Improvement Rate Hike Upcoming

Questions on consumer buying and home improvement expectations will be asked by representatives of the Bureau of the Census in this area during January, according to Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Bureau's regional office in Denver.

The questions are asked four times yearly as part of a nationwide effort to collect information as a guide to Federal agencies and other groups in developing programs based on consumer spending patterns. A sample of residents in this area will be asked if they expect to buy a house, car, or major appliance during the next year and if they have made recent purchases of these items. Homeowners will be

asked about home improvements and repairs during the last three months and any planned for the future.

In the third quarter of 1970, the survey indicated that consumer spending plans were little changed from the second quarter, while the percentage of families expecting their incomes to decline within 12 months had increased for the fourth quarter in a row.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept confidential by law and will be published only in the form of statistical totals.

The Census Bureau representative in this area is Mrs. Rosemary McNeese of Amherst.

Auto owners will be getting notice this week of the new insurance rates which they will be paying after January 1.

News won't be so bad as first anticipated. While an average statewide increase of 23.4 per cent had been recommended by the State Insurance Board staff, it now appears that the jump will be between 12 and 18.6 per cent.

Board calculations indicate companies will get an after-tax rate of return of six or seven per cent of total assets. Companies wanted an increase of 27.7 per cent, and are not expected to be overjoyed with the "compromise."

Lubbock SWPS Jones Station To Have Addition

A 14% addition to the area's electric generating capability in mid-1971 and plans for still another major power production unit in 1974 highlight a nearly 20-million dollar construction program for 1971, announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

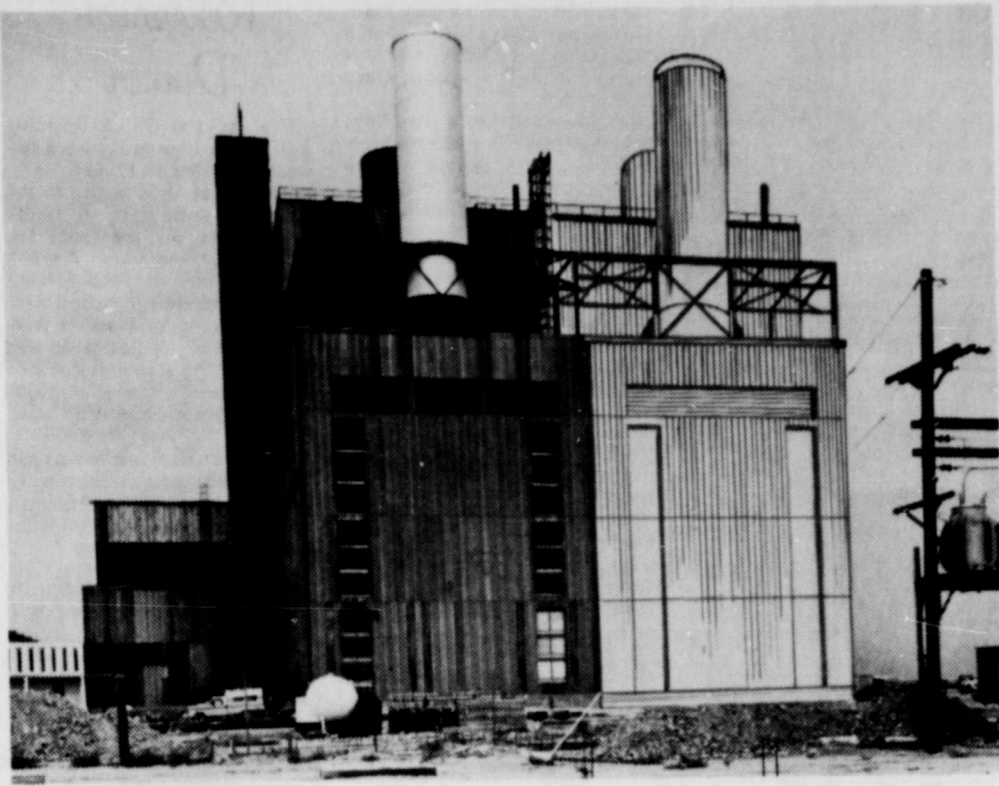
The addition to electric generating capability in mid-year will come about when the first unit goes into service at Jones Station, located southeast of Lubbock. The 256,000 kilowatt generator will be the largest single unit on the company's system and will put the company's total power-producing capability at nearly 2,000,000 kilowatts. That's more than twice what it was 10 years ago.

Tolk also revealed plans for the second 256,000 kilowatt machine at the new facility. A twin of the one which will go into 1971 service, the new unit has been ordered from Westinghouse Corporation. Ground will be broken for the second unit in 1972.

"We don't propose to get into any bind insofar as adequate power supply to serve our customers is concerned. It takes longer to get electric generating equipment these days, so we've put our order in to adequately meet our requirements. We are noting an increase in number of customers throughout our service area, an indication that we are returning to a growth pattern, and we want to have the electric power supply that will stimulate that growth," Tolk said in making the plant expansion announcement.

Jones Station is named for Clifford B. Jones, president-emeritus of Texas Tech University, and a director of Southwestern Public Service Company since 1945.

When the two units are in service, Jones Station alone could serve a city three times as large as Lubbock or Amarillo and it is just one of eleven

generating facilities on Southwestern's interconnected system.

There has been no power shortage problem in Southwestern's service area. In 1970, for example, when some sections of the area were plagued with brownouts and voltage reductions, Southwestern's customers were able to continue to use electric power without restriction and the company passed through its summer peak period with reserves that exceed the peak

demand by more than 20%. The 1971 Jones Station addition is designed to provide adequate power reserves during the three-year period until the 1974 unit is completed. 1971 will be Southwestern Public Service Company's Golden Anniversary Year. The company was incorporated at Roswell, New Mexico in 1921 as the Roswell Public Service

Company. Its service area now covers 45,000 square miles in parts of four states and it serves 225,000 customers. It has an investment in plant and equipment that is now approaching 500-million dollars and it has been adding to that investment at an annual average rate of 20-million dollars for the last ten years.

J. T. Woodson President Of Texas Farm Bureau

WACO--(Sp)--The new president of the 121,158-member Texas Farm Bureau is a successful North Texas "dirt" farmer and beef cattle producer.

He is J. T. (Red) Woodson of Gober in Fannin County. Woodson was elected president by TFB delegates at the organization's convention in November in Fort Worth. He succeeded Sidney Dean of Victoria who had served for three years.

Woodson farms 1,950 acres, 890 of which he owns. A diversified farmer, his principal commodities are cotton, wheat, feed grains and Hereford cattle.

The new Texas Farm Bureau president is as much "at home" on a tractor or handling cattle as he is behind a desk. As such, he brings to the presidency of the state's largest farm organization a broad background of practical farming experience and personal understanding of the farmer's and rancher's problems.

Woodson served as a member of the TFB board of directors from District 4 from 1957 until he was elected to the pres-

idency. He was vice president from 1960 until 1966. A leader in the Fannin County Farm Bureau since he joined the organization in 1951, Woodson served as membership chairman and was president of the county unit in 1955-56.

A native of Gober, Woodson graduated from high school in nearby Bouham and attended Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, taking pre-med courses. He also attended East Texas State at Commerce. Returning to his hometown in the early 1920s, he operated a gin for 14 years before making farming his life's work.

Woodson is active in local church and community affairs. He is a member of the Gober Baptist Church and his wife is a member of the Gober Christian Church. Both are workers in community improvement programs. He is also a Mason.

He is married to the former Ann Smith of Gober. They have two children, a daughter, Mrs. Caribeth Sutherland, who lives in Gober, and son, Larry, who resides in Sherman. The Woodsons have four grandsons.

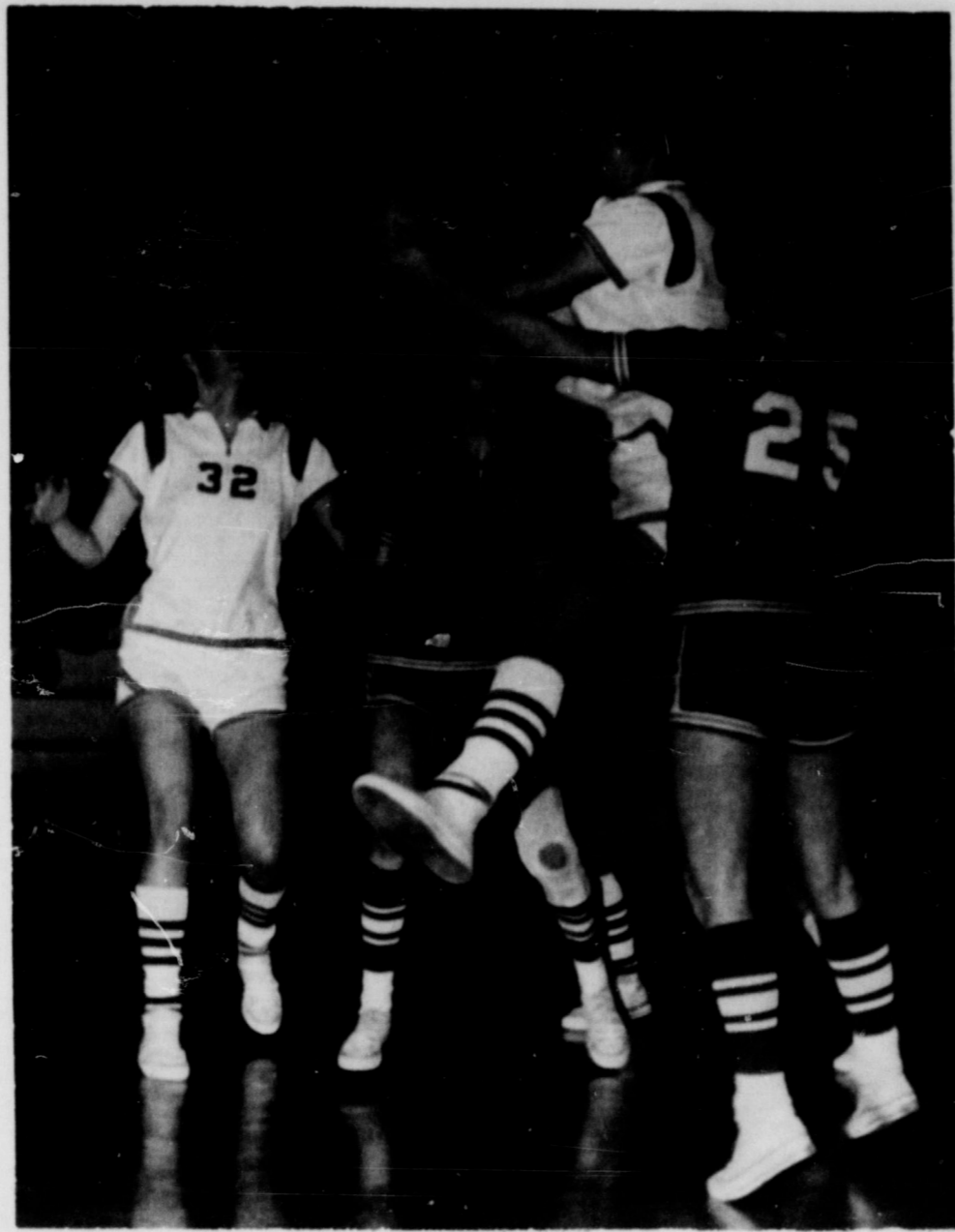
