## City Receives First Application Of Insecticides

The city of Earth received its first complete application of insecticide Thursday night.

The dusting machine and personnel on Littlefield were employed by the City Commission and both the streets and alleys were sprayed, using the same insecticide that was recommended by the state, and used in Olton after the recent tornado there. This is also the same insecticide used in Littlefield.

Although the results of the spraying were not up to what the City officials expected, they state they intend to keep trying until they effectively combat the mosquito menace.

The entire town will again be sprayed when weather conditions are favorable and will continue to be sprayed at regular intervals all summer.

In the South Plains Area there is a mosquito that lays its eggs in tall grass and weeds and the eggs hatch when moisture falls.

Barrels, tires and other containers that will catch and hold stagnant water are also excellent places for the mosquito to lay its eggs, as well as lakes that have been filled either from overflow irrigation water or rainfall.

The City Commission ask that all residents of the area help to control the mosquito and other pes- tery insects by destroying all possible breeding places.

Following are a few suggestions that area residents can follow to help minimize the danger caused by the mosquito.

1. Farmers should spray the edges of lakes on their farms with a diesel fuel and DDT mixture.
2. Rural and city dwellers should check their yards, vacant lots, and other surrounding for anything that could possible catch and hold rain water.
3. Air conditioners that have a float and pump should be checked as they afford a perfect breeding place for mosquitos because they always hold water.
4. Vent pipes on cess pools should be screened to keep mosquitos out.
5. Tall grass and weeds should be cut as they afford a breeding place for mosquitos.
6. Doors and window screens should be made "mosquito tight."
7. Under no circumstances should children be allowed to swim in lakes that have been sprayed because some chemicals in sprays might be harmful.

## Red Cross First Aid Class To Begin Friday At Earth Community Center

The first meeting of the First Aid Course will begin at 8 p.m. Friday June 21 in the Community Building.

The beginner course in First Aid is offered to adults who are 15 years of age or more, and have completed the ninth grade in school or its equivalent.

A minimum of 18 hours is required to complete the course with two hour sessions once or twice a week. It can be given at four hour sessions over a 4 or 5 week period.

The certificate earned remains valid for three years. Those who have had the course can be assistants to the qualified instructor and recertify themselves at the same time a larger number can be instructed.

A minimum of 12 hours is required for the advanced First Aid Course and is offered to anyone who has completed the Standard Course. Police and Fireman will be required four extra hours.

Dr. F. B. Faust of the Faust Clinic will instruct this course. Any person who has previously completed First Aid Training is invited to attend and assist with instructions.

The American Red Cross Text Book has been completely revised since World War II. Although it is common knowledge that there are several methods of applying First Aid, it is desirable to learn one technique well rather than to learn all methods and not be able to apply even one.

## Earth Pony Team Wins Over Friona

The Earth Pony baseball team, composed of boys 13 and 14 years of age, won their first game in league competition Monday, winning over Friona in an extra inning affair 18 to 11 at Friona. Earth won last week's game over Lubbock by forfeit, giving the locals a 2 won no loss record in league play.

Friona got off to an early lead, scoring three runs in the first inning off of several errors, but they made only one hit off of winning pitcher Jerrell Hadaway, who gave up only five hits for the game. Earth came back in the second inning to score eight runs. Friona closed the gap in the third by getting 3, but Earth in the fourth increased their lead by scoring three runs on three successive hits and an error. The score stood 11 to 6 as Friona came up in the sixth inning. They scored four times, closing the gap to 11 to 10.

In the last half of the seventh, last inning, Friona tied up the game with a lone run, in the first over time inning Earth came back with a roar to score seven times on seven clean hits, including a three run cleanly hit home run by Norman Clayton. In the last of the eighth Hadaway walked the bases loaded without an out, and then proceeded to calmly strike out the side without allowing a run and completing a thrilling win for Earth.

Stanley Irvine, second baseman, led the Earth hitters with five hits in six times at bat, with Norman Clayton supplying power with four hits out of six at bat, with a double and home run included. Hadaway, in chalking up his first win of the season pitched brilliantly in the tight, but frequently got himself in trouble by wildness. 16 batters, exactly half of the total outs of the game.



## 1957 Cotton Measurement To Begin June 12th

The measurement of the 1957 cotton acreage began about June 12. We expect to employ about 25 extra men to do the field work and about 10 extra office workers to compute the acres and send out notices. We will train these employees to the best of our ability, but we know that some errors will be made before the measurement work is complete, so we ask your cooperation and help in order to avoid as many errors as possible.

The crop reporters will be instructed to contact the farm operator or a representative on the farm before the measuring is started. If you want to personally assist in the measuring, please tell your employees to so advise our reporter.

It is very important that all the

land that has been planted to cotton be measured, even though part or all the cotton has been destroyed and the land replanted to feed or some other crop, so please show the reporter all the land that has been planted to cotton during 1957. The land actually in cotton will be measured separately from the land where the cotton was destroyed, so you will not be charged with the part that is destroyed except to bring the planted acreage up to the allotment.

Areas of land in the cotton will field that are not in cotton will be deducted provided they are at least .2 chain width and contain at least .1 acre. The width will be measured from a point one-half the row width from the stalks of cotton. This means that if you have 40 inch rows, it will have to measure 200 inches from the stalks of cotton on one side of the area to be deducted to the stalks on the other side.

If you should have excess cotton acreage in 1957, we have advised that you will be allowed 20 days from the date of notice of excess cotton to destroy the excess, and that the county committee cannot extend this date more than 10 days. The extension must be based on a written request from you and it must be because of reasons beyond your control that the excess was not destroyed. In the event you want to deduct the irrigation ditches, we suggest that you make them 200 inches wide early in the year. We will give you other information about this when you are sent the official "Notice of Measured Cotton Acreage."

We expect our reporters to be as courteous and cooperative as possible with you. They will have definite instructions about measuring the crops and will be glad to explain their reasons for making
