## Farm Facts

American farmers last year set a new production record. The total for crops and livestock in 1960 was 29% above the country's 1947-49 average.

This report comes from Rex Daly, chief of the Farm Income branch, Agricultural Economics Division, Agricultural Marketing Service.

Output was equal to that of Mainland China and almost 60% higher than that of the Soviet Union—the world's two other largest agricultural producers.

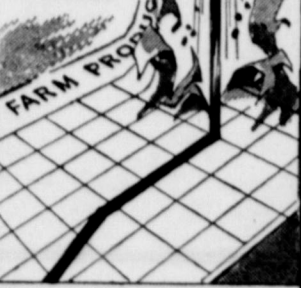
On a per capita basis, our production was double that of the Soviet Union. It was four times that of Mainland China.

Record output in the United States was accomplished with 30% fewer workers and about 5% fewer acres of crop land than in 1947-49. There was a 43% increase in yields per acre for field crops.

Production during the 1950's increased faster than population—27% compared to 19%. This resulted in big accumulations of wheat, feed grains, and cotton.

rise to meet the expanded requirements of the coming decade, Daly predicts.

Farmers can be expected to further increase the size of their holdings. Farms will become more mechanized. Fewer workers will be needed to produce the larger output.

What fascinated us most, however, was the way the Kings hit the Bingo baits which Dong English had so thoughtfully furnished Raymond Muchowich for use on his Party Boats.

We sent the Bingo baits on eight pound line on Ambassador reels... and brother did we have a ball! These 10-pound Kings beat that light-weight Garcia rod almost double.

Naturally you had to use a long, steel leader to keep the King from snapping the line immediately... but if you handled the fish right you could get him in close enough for gaffing. Sometimes it took a ten of fifteen minute battle. But who's to deny that that isn't the biggest fun of fishing?

So if you're going to the Gulf take along some King Bingos and you'll have the time of your life. They are a Mallet-type of lure, as opposed to the broader, Perch-type.

Another favorite is Luck-U. It is more of a Perch-type lure, not so lanky, and with a more rounded nose.

Doug is doing a lot of experimenting with artificials on the Gulf Coast and fishermen seem to be racking them in with these new baits.

## Former Resident Dies in Oklahoma

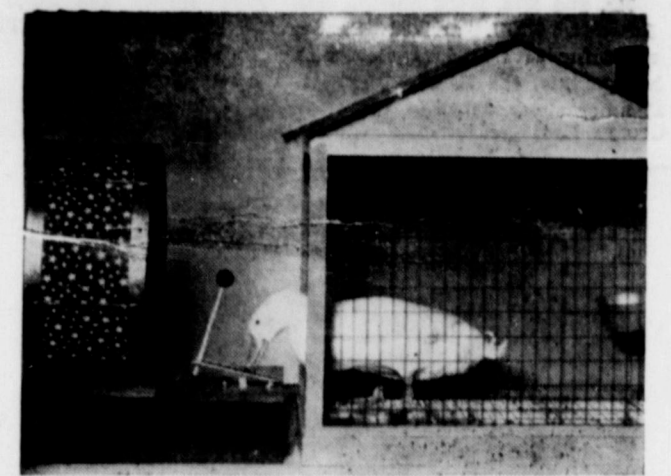

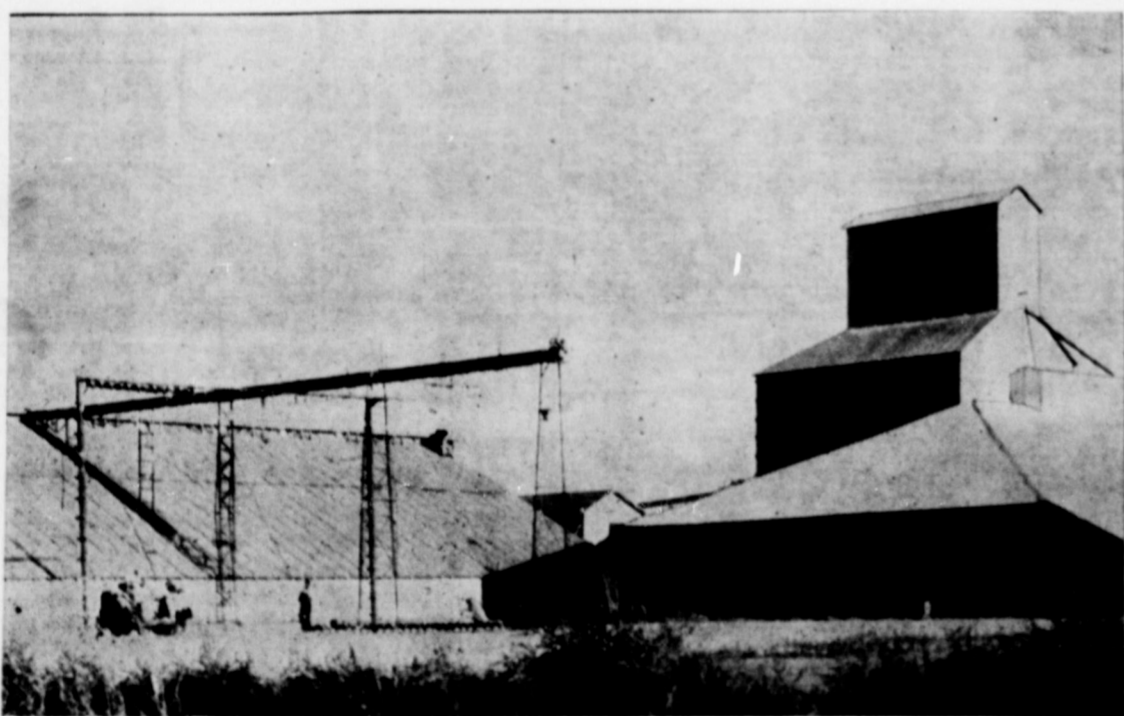

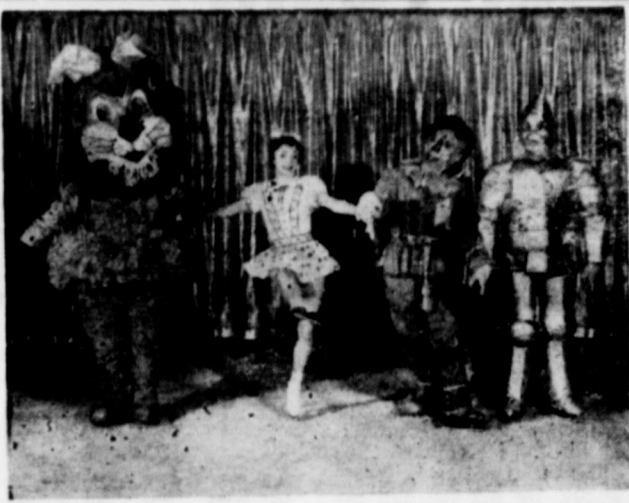
