He is reported to be in fair condition.

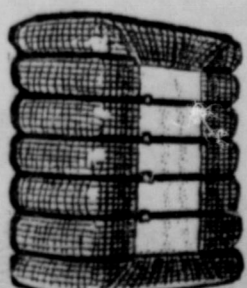
Corner Cafe Opening Termed A Success

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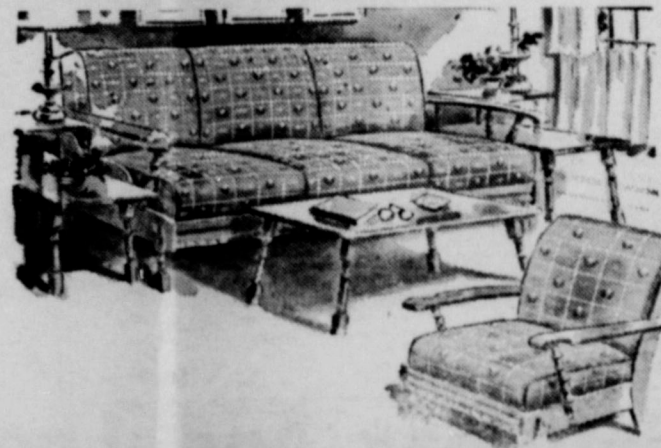
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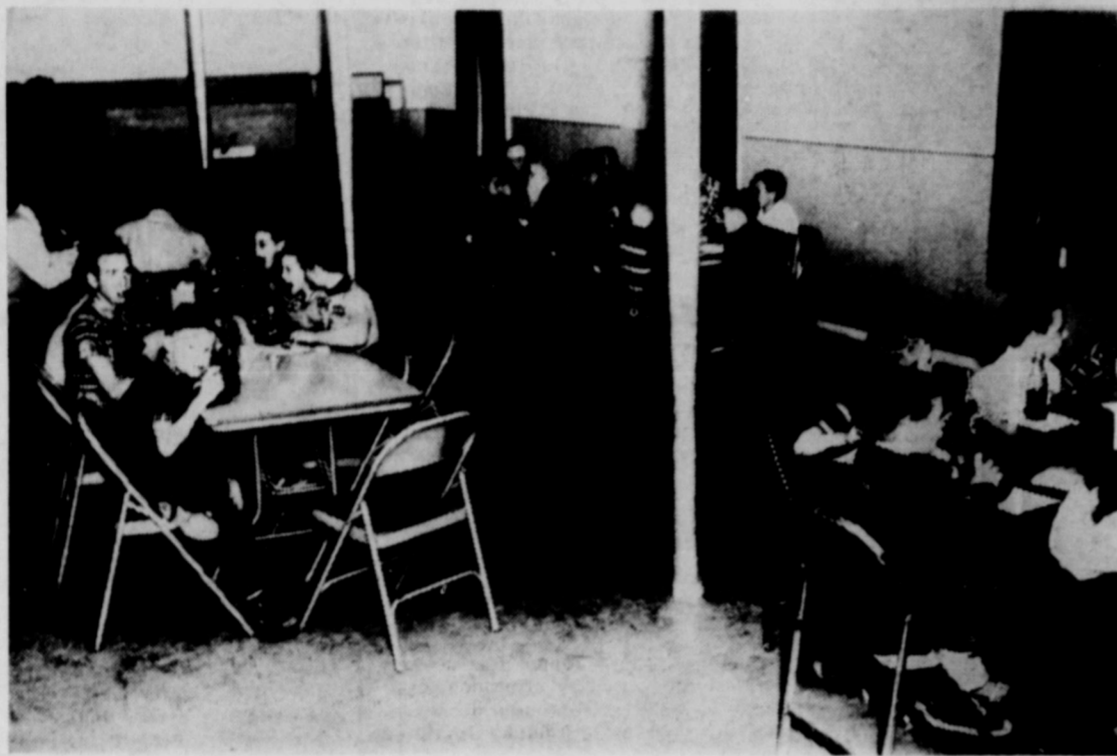
Wolverines To Tackle Farwell Steers

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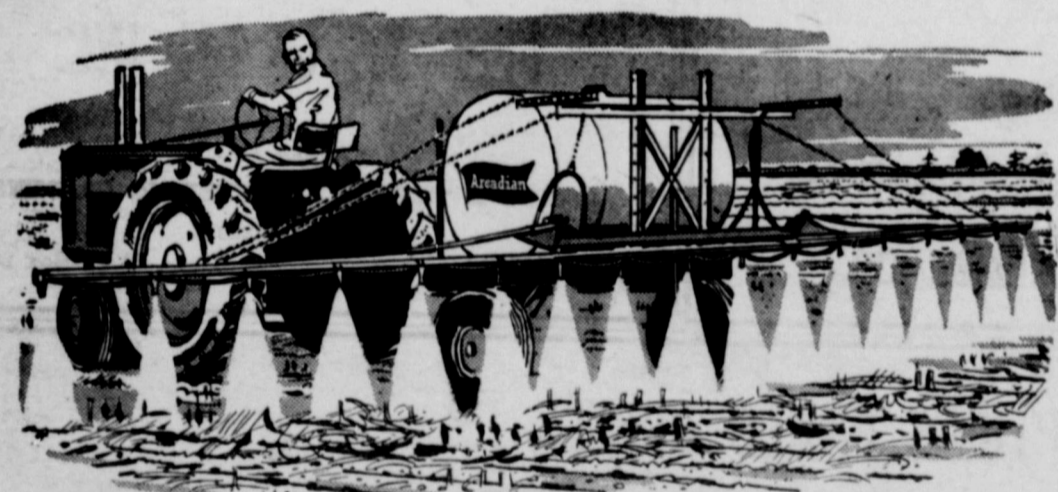
