Farmers Reminded To Report On Overplanted Cotton

Lamar D. Aten, Jr., Lamb County ASC manager, is reminding farmers of this area that after a producer is notified for the first time that he is overplanted in cotton he only has 20 days within which to come to the ASC office and put up a deposit for a remeasure or plowup check. If he fails to do this within the 20 day period he must appeal to the ASC Committee giving reasons for not reporting within the time limit, and if reasons are not sufficient producer's farm will be considered overplanted for 1957; farmer will have to pay penalty and will not be eligible for price supports.

The Lamb county ASC manager also states that if producer comes to this office within the 20 day period, makes deposit for check on amount of cotton he has plowed up, but fails to plow up enough upon it being measured, he will only have 7 days to finish plowing up enough cotton to bring him in compliance with his cotton allotment, and advise the ASC office of this additional plowup. There will not be another 7 day period and producer's farm will be considered overplanted. Farmers are, therefore, urged by Mr. Aten to destroy enough cotton on their first plowup.

An Accident Can Prove To Be Very Expensive

A fall on the farm or ranch can cost a rural family more money than a fall in prices on the agricultural commodities markets, according to the Texas Safety Association.

The Association points out that falls are the leading source of all injuries to farmers and ranchers in Texas.

However, injuries from all mishaps are expensive. In fact, a recent study shows that the average medical costs of such injuries runs \$105 per accident. Piled on top of this is, in many cases, the necessity of hiring extra labor or suffer a serious loss of production, besides pain and discomfort.

Common sense and good house-keeping can substantially reduce hazards according to the Texas Safety Association.

Around the yards and corrals, pick up loose wires, boards and scrap metal. Don't allow nails or hangers to protrude unnecessarily. Keep hand tools in safe racks. In the home, keep stairways clear of objects and well lighted. Have a stepladder or kitchen stool handy for reaching high places. And, don't carry a "lazy man's load" that will block your walking view.

Ralph Ussery Doing Grad Work At Tech

LUBBOCK — A total of 453 teachers and school administrators from six states are enrolled in Texas Tech for the first term of the Summer Session, the Registrar's Office reports.

Doing graduate work are 22 faculty members from seven colleges and universities: West Texas State, University of Texas, Rice Institute, Sul Ross State, Wayland Baptist, Lee College (Baytown) and Tech.

States represented besides Texas are New Mexico with 10 students, Arizona with two, and Colorado, Oregon and Washington, each with one.

For once the women do outnumber the men in a Tech statistical breakdown. There are 243 women educators enrolled, compared to 210 men teachers and administrators.

Lubbock quite naturally leads in representation by towns, with 153 enrolled. Twelve are from Levelland, and eight each from Odessa, Plainview, Brownfield and Denver City.

Women Prove More Studios Than Men at Tech

LUBBOCK — For the perennial question "Are women more studios than men at Texas Tech?" the Registrar's Office has come up with the perennial answer—"Yes". At least that's what figures on Spring Semester grade-point averages indicate in an analysis announced by the Office.

Tech's 1,694 undergraduate women had a 1.47 grade-point average while the 5,259 undergraduate men mustered a 1.23 average. The overall undergraduate average was 1.29. For those more familiar with the letter system of grading, 1.00 equals a "C", 2.00 a "B" and 3.00 an "A".

Farmers and Ranchers Urged To Control Weeds In Grass Planted On Soil Bank

Farmers and ranchers who have obtained stands of grasses on their Soil Bank land are urged by the Supervisors of Lamb County Soil Conservation District to control weeds on these plantings.

Recent checks of these plantings by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service show that in most cases exceptionally good stands have been obtained. Weed growth in most fields have reached a point that shading and use of moisture has become critical to the young grass plants.

It is very important, aside from Soil Bank regulations, that weeds and voluntary feed growth be controlled. Control of shading and moisture use will give these grasses a good chance to survive the first hot summer and dry, cold winter, should these conditions exist.

Mowing or shredding of fields seem to be the most practical control. Shredding will probably give the best results but mowing is satisfactory if a shredder isn't available.

Weed control is also important on land which grass plantings are to be made next year. If the cover crop has been planted then weeds and cover can be mowed or shredded. If the cover hasn't yet been planted then the land should be clean and the cover crop drilled in the near future. Experience with grass plantings this year has clearly shown the need for drilled cover for best results.

Hot Weather And Overweight Don't Go Together

College Station — Those extra pounds may add up to added discomfort during the hot weather months ahead. Some careful planning now plus lots of will power will lighten the load.

There is no safe way to get rid of excess weight overnight. Extension foods and nutrition specialists remind us that there are some important factors to consider in starting a weight reducing campaign.

First, check with your doctor before starting any plan to lose weight. Many factors play a part in whether a person should reduce and how fast he should lose weight.

Studies have shown that the most effective weight reduction diets are low calorie, high protein and low carbohydrate. However, a variety and a balance of essential foods is still needed by the body.

Nutritionists point out also that it's easier for a person to stay on a reducing diet which includes a variety of foods as well as foods which are familiar to the individual.

A good breakfast is always important, even in a reducing diet. Each day's food intake should include two to three cups of milk (may be skim milk), one or more servings of meat, fish or poultry, one egg (or at least four or five a week), two servings of vegetables (one dark green or yellow), two or three servings of fruit including one citrus, at least one tablespoon of butter and two or three servings of bread or cereal.

If you're really concerned about losing weight, get a calorie chart and start counting your calories. Remember that you can reduce the number of calories amazingly by omitting rice desserts — like pie, cake and doughnuts.

Veterans To Get Refund

AUSTIN — More than \$16,000 in fee refunds will soon be in the hands of Texas veterans, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder said.

The fees were collected by the Veterans' Land Board from ex-servicemen buying land through the Veterans' Land Program. Some transactions were not completed, but until now fees could not by law be returned.

Commissioner Rudder recommended to the Legislature during its last session that the law be changed to authorize refund of these fees.

"I want to commend the Legislature for giving the veterans the just refund of their money," the Land Commissioner remarked.

A total of \$16,271.80 will be returned to 229 veterans who have submitted fees since the Program reopened in October, 1955, but who did not complete their transactions. This is an average of \$71.06 per veteran. The largest refund will be \$100, the amount each veteran must pay in fees. Several will receive the full amount.

Half of the \$100 covers closing expenses, \$25 is appraisal fee and \$25 is a contract service fee.

The Veterans' Land Board began mailing refunds this week. Most will be mailed within several weeks, Commissioner Rudder said.

SCOT Scans Bomb Blast Affects in Texas

AUSTIN — The technical committee of Sportmen's Clubs of Texas will initiate a study to determine whether radio active fallout from nuclear bomb tests is sufficient in Texas to endanger wildlife.

Cecil Reid, SCOT's Executive Secretary, said Val Lehman, King Ranch wildlife manager and chairman of SCOT's technical committee, plans to name a sub-committee to study any possible affect of the radio active material which has been declared dangerous to wildlife in other parts of the country.

Reid said one of the current concerns in the states where the fallout is more pronounced is that no research has been done to accurately weigh the hazard. He said

north central states in the path of the wind pattern from the Nevada proving ground's suspect substantial danger to game and fish and possible harm to persons eating game and fish. Reid suggested the greatest danger to Texas might come through radio active material contaminating the Gulf stream and thus reaching tremendous marine resources.

SCOT's Executive Secretary pointed out fallout is radioactive when nuclear fission products, chiefly from A and H bombs, adhere to particles of dust and rain drops that fall to earth.

"We are confident that Texas has not been affected to any marked extent, and possibly may not have any taint whatever," said Reid. "But it is our duty, and our privilege with the talented technical committee at our disposal, to definitely determine the actual threat, if any." He pointed out that twelve-man technical staff embraces many national figures in the wildlife field.

Reid also said the technical committee, which meets in Austin Thursday to set the stage for SCOT's board meeting Saturday, will look into possible detrimental

affects of insecticides on wildlife as well as humans.

He explained that present programs oftentimes kill not only undesirable types but also the parasitic and predatory types of insects. These latter kinds feed on plants and thus create the natural insect balance.

He said rain washes the insecticides off the plants and soil into the lakes and streams, destroying fishes and fish foods and very easily upsetting the food chain of fishes.

He said the older types of insect control chemicals, which preceded the present popular fog and dust types, which are not soluble, may have to be re-utilized. They, he explained, destroy insects with chewing and sucking mouth parts. In this way, the chemical will eliminate the insects through ingestion rather than by contact.

He said the old entomological pattern of "controlling insects through nature", may have to be revived, since a growing number of insect pests of economic importance are becoming resistant to recently used agricultural insecticides.

How Wrong Can a Collectivist Be?

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

from LYNDON B. JOHNSON
U. S. Senator

OUR WORLD: The shakeup in Russia has stirred the world. A hard struggle for power among top communists has been going on since Stalin's death. Molotov and several other "old Bolsheviks" appear to have lost.

Khrushchev stays on top. Most observers believe he is not totally powerful, as Stalin was. But he is in the saddle. How high and how long he will ride remains to be seen.

So far as the free world is concerned, the "who" in Russia is less important than the "what". The nature of communism has not changed. Individual communists may rise and fall. But the communist idea remains a deadly threat to free people everywhere.

Disarmament talk continues. The United States has proposed conditions that tests of nuclear weapons be suspended for ten months. Effective inspection and control would be a basic part of the plan. They are vital.

The U. S. must remain strong.

We can never deal effectively with the communists if we are weak. Strength is the language they understand. The American people know that.

The defense appropriation bill passed by Congress reflects that knowledge. We must cut out waste. We can do that without trifling with our national security.

OUR NATION: As for appropriations, we have continued to make cuts in the President's budget. Most of the important appropriation bills have been passed. Some are in conference between the Senate and the House.

If we split the difference in appropriation bills in conference, total cuts in the budget to date are \$4,445,000. Even that includes only the reduction made in the foreign aid authorization bill. Further cuts are expected in the actual appropriation bill.

The people looked at the President's budget. They said it was too high. They demanded reductions. They are getting reductions.

OUR STATE: I made two talks in Texas recently. One was before the annual membership meeting of

the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce. The other was during the annual convention, in San Antonio, of the Texas Press Association. I thoroughly enjoyed both occasions.

Texas has the best editors of any State. They are well-informed. They are down-to-earth. They know the needs of their readers. At the San Antonio meeting, I was impressed all over again by their knowledge and understanding.

The editors told me they approve our budget-cutting efforts. They want the U. S. to talk — realistically — about disarmament. They want to save their sons from having to fight a war. They are thoughtful Texans, deeply concerned about the issues that affect them and their children. It was good to be with them.

Ancient Indian Spectacular To Be Presented at Fair

One of the world's most remarkable spectacles will be featured as a free attraction at the 1957 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 5-20.

The mysterious rituals of the Aztec-Mayan Spectacular will be presented twice daily on the Magnolia Stage, climaxed by the dangerous "ceremony of the flying pole."

This awe-inspiring ritual is performed by "The Birdmen of Teotihuacan." Dressed in feathered, birdlike costumes, these "flying Indians" climb to the top of a 100-foot pole. To the weird music of a flute and drum, the four fliers one by one go through an intricate dance on a tiny platform atop the pole.

They then leap into space, spinning head down, hanging by their heels from ropes wound around the pole. As they glide gracefully to earth, the ropes unwind in ever-widening circles.

Seldom seen outside a few remote villages in the jungles of Mexico, the strange ceremonial of the flying pole is among the oldest of the surviving native rites of that country, dating from the times before the Spanish Conquest. Fliers are trained from the age of 9 for this daring feat.

The colorful dances of the Aztec-Mayan Spectacular are performed by a troupe of 20, attired in authentic costumes. In addition to the daily appearance on the Magnolia Stage, they will be featured in three big Cotton Bowl shows during the fair. The first will be on Mexico Day, Oct. 7.

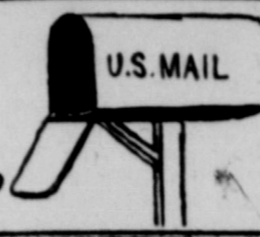

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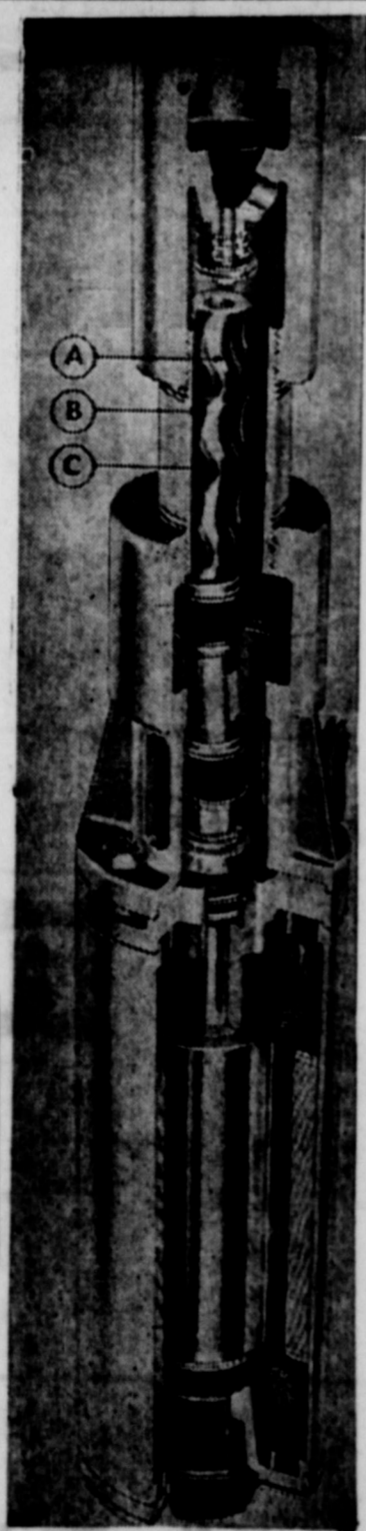

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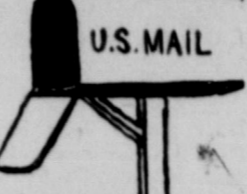

New Corn Hybrid Is Announced

College Station — A new early-maturing hybrid which produces good yields under conditions of low moisture and high temperature has been developed in the corn improvement program of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. This new hybrid, Texas 38, is a yellow double-cross with ears slightly smaller than other Texas hybrids. Its plants are usually about two feet shorter than the other hybrids and the ears are borne one to two feet lower. Because of its earliness, Texas 38 escapes some insect damage suffered by medium-maturing hybrids now grown, according to a leaflet just released by the Experiment Station.

This leaflet, "Texas 38—A Hybrid for Droughty Conditions," gives a full description and background on the new hybrid. It also gives lists and recommended uses as information on agronomic character as well as comparative yields of Texas 38 and the other hybrids.
