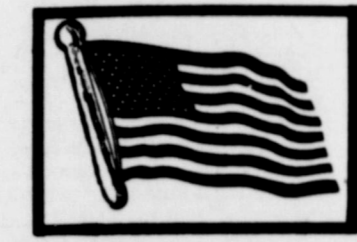

Damage Heavy In Car-Trailer Pickup Collision

An accident, involving a pickup and a car hauling a loaded horse trailer, occurred Tuesday evening about 6 p.m. four miles north of Earth, resulting in minor injuries and heavy damage.

A 1963 Chevrolet Impala Coupe, pulling a horse trailer containing two horses, driven by Weldon Barton, Earth, pulled from a dirt road and was struck by a 1961 Chevrolet pickup, driven by Willis Stansberry, Rt. 1, Friona, and owned by W. G. Sanderson.

The car and trailer were going east and the pickup was traveling north on the FM road. The pickup crashed into the car, whipping the trailer around. The trailer was left leaning at an angle against the bed of the pickup, having been torn loose from the car. The horses were not injured.

Barton's head struck the windshield, resulting in a deep head laceration. Stansberry suffered injured ribs and arm.

Damage to car and trailer was estimated at \$3,000 and damage to the pickup between \$700 and \$1,000. Deputy V. L. Smith, Jr. investigated.

The meeting next year will be hosted by the Hub City Odd Fellows and Rebekahs, Lubbock.

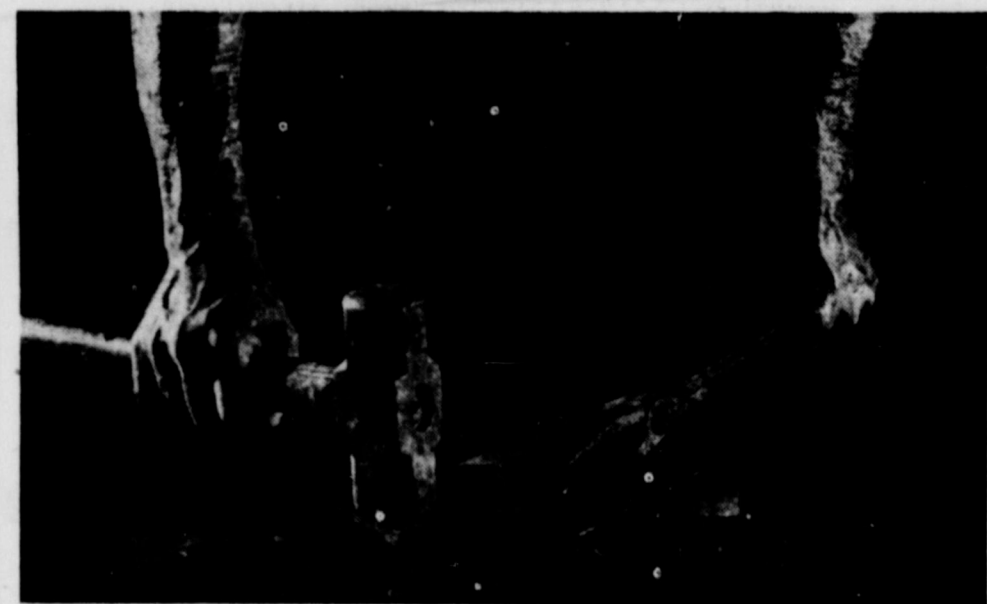

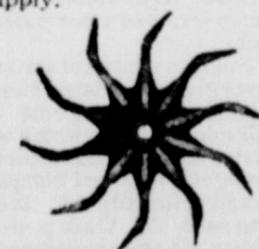

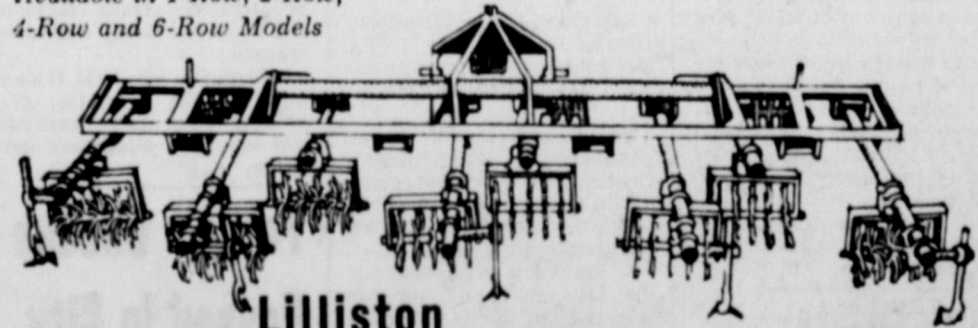

Mrs. Jimmy Craft Becomes U. S. Citizen Friday In Naturalization Ceremonies In Lubbock

Among the nineteen persons who became U. S. citizens in a naturalization ceremony Friday afternoon in U. S. District Court, Lubbock was Nabuko Craft, better known to Earth residents as Mrs. Jimmy Craft. Judge Joseph B. Dooley presided.

James G. Allen, Dean of student life at Texas Tech, congratulated and welcomed the new citizens. Dean Allen said, "I should like to congratulate you on the special quality of your citizenship. You have chosen it for yourselves, unlike those of us who received our citizenship at birth, from our parents. You have chosen for yourselves a citizenship which allows much abuse, much freedom, and much responsibility."

The class was presented by James A. Curry, Dallas, examiner for the Immigration and Naturalization Service. John A. Lawther of Fort Worth, U. S. District Clerk, administered the oath of citizenship and led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, to conclude the ceremony.

Mrs. Craft, a native of Fukuro, Japan, came to the U. S. in 1957 as a bride of Tom Craft, whom she met while serving as his secretary in the Air Force in Japan. Tom was killed in 1959, in the crash of his crop-dusting plane. Jean, as she is called by her many friends, later married Tom's brother, Jimmy, who was named at the recent Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet as Outstanding Farmer of 1962.

Both are active members of the Earth First Baptist Church where Jean, with a lovely soprano voice, sings in the choir, and on many occasions has presented special solos.

The couple have two sons, Timothy Lynn, 2 years, 4 months old, and Gene Glenn, two weeks old. They farm near Lubbock.

When interviewed at the Earth News-Sun, the radiant new citizen kept repeating, "I am so happy to be one of you. I am no longer an alien." When asked about her feelings on giving up her Japanese citizenship, she said, "No one likes to give up all rights to her native land, but I do not regret what I have done, as I have wanted to become a citizen since I first came to this country. The freedoms and opportunities here are beyond imagination to those who do not know what the United States has to offer. I wouldn't trade places

with anyone."

When asked of her first impressions of West Texas, she replied that the flat, open country was disappointing, with its dull scenery, but that the people of the area made up for the lack of scenery with their kindly welcome to the community. Her friends now say that she has a deep Texas drawl, with a Japanese accent.

Jean loves American food, especially barbeque, hot dogs and hamburgers. In her menus at home, she says she still relies on many rice dishes, and at times orders desired Japanese food items from Denver, Colorado.

Her present desire is to create a Japanese-style garden at her farm home, even though husband Jimmy thinks it impossible as she wishes to go to Colorado to collect the necessary rocks needed in the construction.

Queried on the subject of women and clothing in her native land, she said that with the importing of fashions from Paris, and Italy, the modern Japanese woman is up-to-date, if not more so, than the average American fashion-conscious woman. Silk and wool dominate the clothing market, followed by cotton, nylon and dacron. She laughed as she remarked, "Jimmy won't let me wear

anything but cotton!"

On the subject of the differences in American wives and Japanese wives, she remarked that the Japanese wife is more humble and polite with little opportunity to voice opinions, and some still walk several paces behind the husband, but here in America, wives are equal, and enjoy a true partnership marriage. American men are nicer to their wives, normally speaking. She said, "I am afraid I am very spoiled now, and wouldn't know how to act when I should return to Japan for a visit."

Since farming is the mainstay of the Earth area, and the Craft family, she revealed that with very little land to farm, the Japanese are still using hand labor and a few small tractors to till the land. A plot, 30 feet by 30 feet, is considered a good farm with some of the more fortunate owning several of these plots on which they plant rice, barley and wheat. Farm work is done jointly by the entire family. Due to lack of facilities and land, the people neglect their farms to enter modern-day industry, exporting manufactured items.

Jean's family, including her parents, who are teachers, two sisters and two brothers still live in Japan. Her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs.

Kan Matsumoto, attended Baylor University in 1958-59 where they received their master's degree in English. They are now teaching in the Baptist College, Yokohama, Japan.

Mrs. Kan Matsumoto was one of several children, who survived the bombing at a Hiroshima grade school. She was badly burned from the radiation blast and will carry scars the rest of her life. The Japanese children and civilians alike were taught to hate all Americans during the war, with propaganda tales of terror and lies. Following her visit as a student at an American college, Mrs. Kan's opinion of Americans greatly changed, and she now loves America and its citizens.

Jean reports that young people in Japan are hungry for better education and many wait two or three years for entry into Japanese colleges. Citizens Jean studied four years in Music College, Tokyo majoring in voice.

Present at the naturalization ceremony was husband Jimmy and Mr. and Mrs. George Laing, Earth.

To a new citizen, fellow Texan and charming friend, best wishes and congratulations from the entire community are extended to Mrs. Jean Craft.

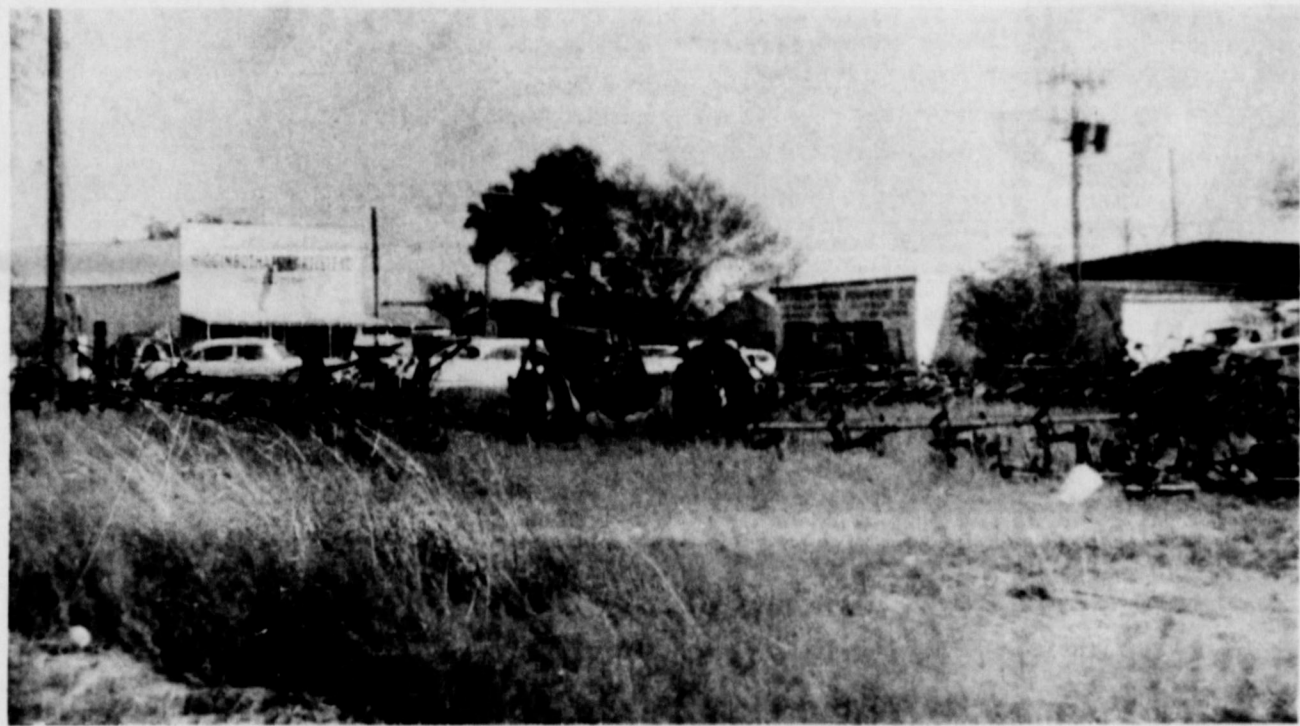

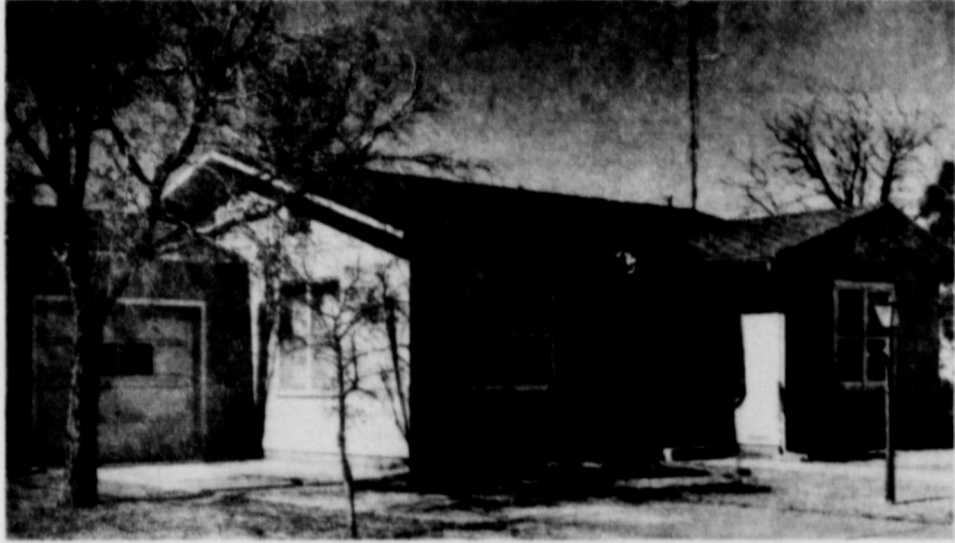
BOYS LIFE SUBSCRIPTION

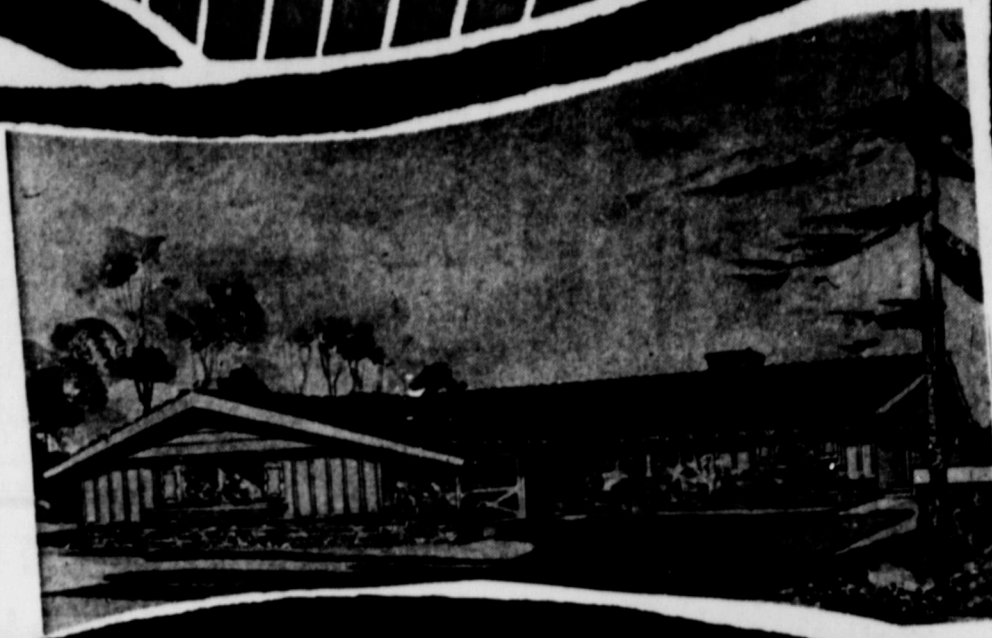

Water Pollution And Conservation Rank High In Modern Life Today

Water conservation and pollution inevitably rank high on any expert list of current problems of modern life.

More than 10 million people now call Texas home. This rapid growth and the trend toward concentrated city living has resulted in a tremendous increase in the volume of waste being released into streams and lakes. Thus, water pollution has become a serious public health problem.

To meet the overall needs of the average Texas community, the municipal water plant must supply 140 gallons per person per day. Approximately 50 gallons of this daily total is used in the home. An equal amount is used by industry for washing and cooling, special processing and air conditioning.

Public needs--fire fighting, street cleaning, recreation and public fountains--account for 10 gallons of the daily supply. Commercial establishments use an additional 20 gallons for cleaning and service operation. Unhappily, ten gallons are lost through leaks and breaks in underground pipelines.

No matter what use is made of it, it is essential that water borne diseases such as typhoid and cholera have been pract-

ically eliminated by hard working engineers and city water plant operators intent on supplying safe water to the public at the mere turn of a tap.

U.S. Bureau Of Census Ginning Statistics

An analysis by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of U. S. Bureau of Census figures on cotton ginning, released recently, reveals that Texas produced 4,735,659 bales of cotton in 1962, which is more than twice the amount produced by the next leading state and over a million bales more than the next two leading states combined. The 23 High Plains counties in PCG's territory alone produced more cotton than any state in the nation, excepting, of course, Texas itself.

California ran second in production with 1,934,844 bales, followed by Mississippi and Arizona, with 1,685,754 and 1,456,657 bales respectively.

The 23 High Plains counties served by PCG ginned 2,328,293 bales, or almost half the Texas total; nearly 400,000 bales more than all of California, and over 15 percent of national ginnings. U. S. Total production of 14,859,968 bales was slightly above the 1961 total of 14,324,508 bales. Texas production fell 1.4 percent, or 65,112 bales below the 4,800,771 bales ginned

in 1961, while the 23 county High Plains area dropped only 7 percent, or 16,510 bales below 1961, when the final figure was 2,344,803. It should be noted that production in 1962 was achieved on 45,781, or 1.9 percent fewer acres, and still constitutes a gain in average yield per acre for the area.

Interesting to note in a study of High Plains production are figures on classings from the three classings offices of the U. S. Department of Agriculture cotton Clasing Division of Lubbock, Lamesa, and Brownfield. These offices, under the direction of W. K. Palmer, report an actual increase in number of bales classed, from slightly over 2,268,000 in 1961 to 2,274,610 in 1962. The area covered by these offices, however, does not coincide exactly with the PCG area.

This fact, together with the different methods used in compiling figures always cause a slight variance between Bureau of Census and Cotton Clasing Division totals.

Among counties in PCG's territory, Howard county had the largest decline in production, percentage-wise, with 48.4 percent. This county is almost entirely dryland and experienced a drought in 1962, Farmer county, which set a new record of 60,027 bales in 1961, jumped 33.8 percent to 80,328 in 1962 for the biggest production increase of the group.

Table I shows 1961 and 1962 production by states for purposes of comparison. Table II shows production in the 23 PCG counties for both years, plus the variation in bales and by percentages.

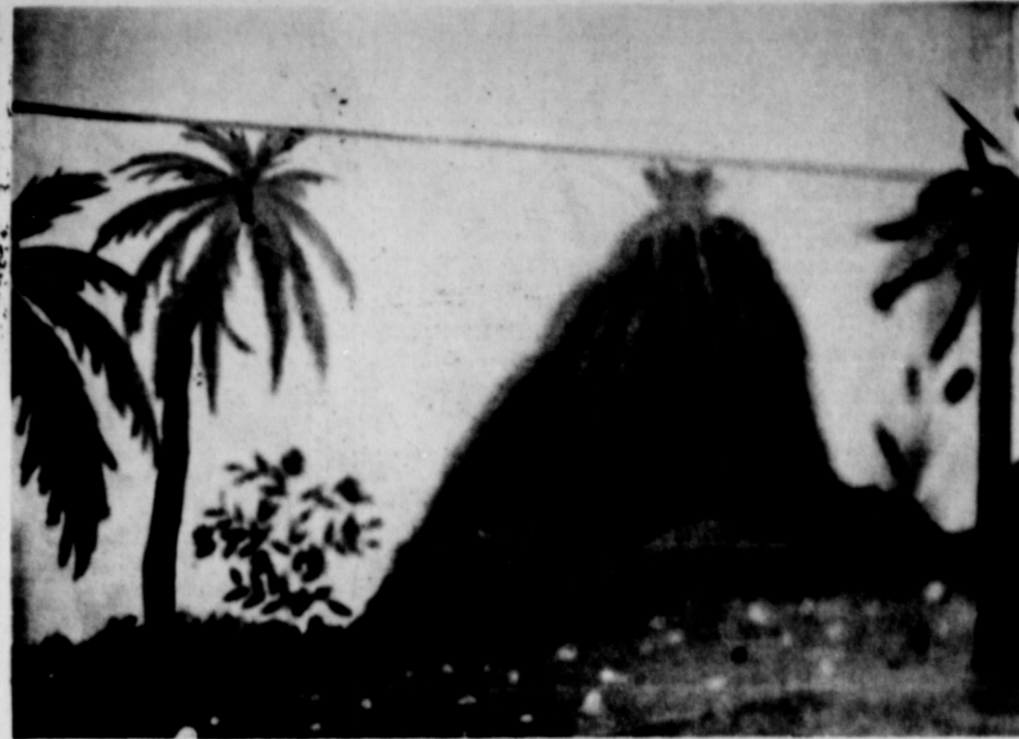

Grain Sorghum Industry Plans Extensive Midge Control Project

A concerned grain sorghum industry is joining together to underwrite an extensive midge control project according to Elbert Harp, President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. All segments of the concerned industry are collecting funds to initiate the work, beginning immediately.

Officials of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, the Texas Certified Seed Producers Association, Inc. and other interested people have held several meetings with the entomologists and officials of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to work out the details of an "Emergency Control Study," Texas Experiment Station and the Grain Sorghum Industry will conduct this project on a matching fund basis.

GSPA officials estimate that the area economy will suffer a loss of 30 to 50 million dollars annually if the midge damage should increase to 20% of the crop production. Although heaviest infestation has been in the South Plains of Lubbock, Terry, Floyd, Hale and Crosby Counties, the midge has left its mark on sorghum grown throughout the entire sorghum belt. It is a

great threat to the whole industry. Damage as high as 98% in 1962 was reported.

Permanent Pasture Now A First Crop

No longer is permanent pasture a second choice crop in Texas. Only a few years ago much of our permanent pasture was on land worn out from continuous row cropping, says Shannon E. Carpenter, area dairy specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Today, however, livestock producers are aware that good pasture is their cheapest source of feed nutrients, Carpenter says. Good soil is the basis for good pastures and since there is only about 10 acres of land for every person in America, it is vital that it be used wisely and with care. In Texas many acres have been turned to pastureland with the use of power equipment, and chemicals to remove brush.

The most economical way to harvest pasture is by letting the animals graze it, says Carpenter. Adequate grazing should be provided throughout the year rather than starving the animals at one season and feasting them at another. However it is difficult to maintain the correct amount of pasture for the satisfactory growth of animals the year round.

It takes good planning and good weather to have grazing the entire year and usually temporary pastures will be needed to supplement the permanent crops, advises Carpenter. The two biggest enemies of permanent pasture are lack of moisture and weeds he adds. Also, wise planning of grazing will help maintain
