How Citizens May Improve Traffic Safety Records

A Texas Department of Public Safety spokesman suggested that Texas citizens might better their traffic safety records by conentrating on the prinipal cause of all traffic accidents-attitude.

Major Harry Huthison, Regional Commander of the DPS, said that "There is no single cause to which all accidents, even preventable ac cidents, an be harged." He noted however, "That there is general agreement that the great majority of suh accidents are traceable to the attitude of those involved." 

Modern Building To House Springlake's New Post Office

Progress toward construction of a new and modern building for the Post Office at Springlake, has been announced by Postmaster General J. Edward Day.

"President Kennedy has called for an accelerated construction program of 2,000 new post offices to be built this year as a spur to the economy," the Postmaster Gec-eral said. "The masonry building that will be constructed at Spring lake will not only benefit the community by way of more efficient postal service but will help to implement the President's pr.

Mr. Day said the Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids to build and lease the ne post office to be located in center of town within a one-block radius of highway intersections. The building will contain 1,000 square feet of interior floor space, and ample all-weather parking and

mareuvering areas is provided. Under the Department's Co mercial Leasing Program, the site will be assigned to the successful bidder, who will purchase the land, construct the building according to departmental specifications and rent it to the Post Office Depart-ment for a basic period of 5 years, with one option to renew the lease. The Department's capital investment will be limited substantial'y to postal equipment. The building will remain under private owner ship, with the owner paying local

real estate taxes. Bids should be submitted to Vi E. Bell, Real Estate Officer, P: O. Box 1386, Lubbock, Texas, who will supply bidding forms, building specifications, lease provisions and other information.


