These nuclear plants are constructed with almost 'failsafe' self-quenching safety mechanisms. And in normal operation, the nuclear plants emit less radiation to the environment than naturally occuring cosmic radiation. There is certainly no radiation problem posed by radiation emission from the red granite in the State Capitol building, but the Capitol emits more radiation than would a nuclear power plant.

The knowledge that a nuclear supplied with fossil fuel at the power reactor contains many moment, but within the next millions of curies of radioactive fission products has led to the conscious imposition of severe

safety standards by designers and operators. The release of even a small fraction of this radioactivity in any circumstances, including a serious accident, is so unlikely as to be deemed incredible by normal engineering judgment. Health



Census To Collect Information On **Employment Here**

A sample of households in this area will take part in a nation wide survey on employment and unemployment to be conducted the week of February 19-23 by the Bureau of the Census, Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Dallas, announced today.

The survey is taken monthly by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor. The households interviewed are scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all households.

Statistics on conditions in the labor force from month to month provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation. In December, for example, total employment increased by 280,000 to 82.8 million (seasonally adjusted), continuing the strong upward trend in evidence since mid-1971. Therevised unemployment rate for December was 5.1 percent, down from 5.2 percent in November and 6.0 percent a year ago. Information supplied by in-

dividuals participating in the survey is held confidential by law and is used only to compile statistical totals.




