#### Wild Animals Don't Make Good Pets

breeds do not usually make good pets, and in a large percentage of cases this experience ends tragically for both owner and animal, according to Dr. Thomas E. Vice, veterinarian from San Antonio who does extensive exotic animal practice.

"The most common wild animals procured and kept as pets are in the carnivore family: Bobcat, ocelot, margay, fox, racoon and skunk," Dr. Vice said, "These animak are solitary animals in nature. The only times they become at all social is during mating and rearing of the offspring. The mother of these species will drive her own offspring from her territory when mature and later fight them to defend this territory. It is not hard to understand then why one of these animals which was so cute and friendly as an infant suddenly becomes mean and unpredictible when it matures. Those species which are not social by nature cannot be socfalized to a human environment. They can be tamed to a point, but never domesticated. In addition, this is a needless drain on such endangered species as the cheetah, ocelot and margay. Unfortunately, there are those who profiteer in the capture and sale of the animals to the unsuspecting public and the problem becomes another example of man's inhumanity to animal," Vice

ality in these animals from the time of capture until they become a household pet. In many instances it reaches as high as 70%. This is due mostly to the physical and psychological stress placed on the animals as well as a general lack of knowledge and concern of proper nutrition, handling, housing and parasite and disease control by the owner. It is not uncommon for me to see a bob kitten or young racoon whom someone has just purchased in such poor physical condition from hookworm anemia and poor nutrition that it

cannot be saved," he said.

"One of the most common misconceptions concerning the nutrition of carnivores is that they eat only meat. A wild carnivore doesn't eat just meat, it dats whole animals. This includes bone, vitamins, fat, protein and all the trace minerals in that animal. Owners thus fail to feed a complete diet in most cases. Another practice which almost always happens with the wild carnivores and monkeys is declawing, defanging and castration. As these animals become mature they become unpredictable; so in an attempt to make an already unsatisfactory pet less tramatic they are brought in

can no longer cope with the animal," Dr. Vice said.

"I realize that regardless of this or other articles people will still want their own unusual pets, but I would urge the public to think twice about the problems and obligations of owning such a pet," Dr. Vice

Of course windows should harmonize with the architecture of the house, but each window also should be functional for the area it serves.

For example, casement windows are frequently preferred above a kitchen sink be ause they're easy to opera at arm's length. Bay and bow windows add light and additional space to a room as well as a more generous view of the outside. For privacy, awning windows placed

high on a wall are ideal. Fortunately for homemakers, today there are complete factory-made window units available in a variety of materials.

Basic stock window styles include the following types: Double-hung - a two-sash window with one above the other, moving up and down. Casement—the sash is hinged at the side to swing out, and generally is operated by a rotary opener.

Others include: Gliding-the window sash slides back and forth on a track. Awning -sash is hinged at the top to open out and provide a shield from the rain. Hopper-similar to awning but is hinged at the bottom to open in, and is often used in basements. Fixed - a sash that doesn't move for rooms where light but no ventilation is needed.



When you're cooking holiday turkey for your family, certain rules apply for the safe handling of poultry or meat. Following a few simple rules can it has been cooked. For this keep illness from spotling the

As a starting point, consumers must realize that the federal inspection mark of wholesomeness means that the meat or poultry came from healthy animals and was inspected throughout the packing operation. But the inspection mark only helps assure the wholesomeness when the poultry leaves the packing plant.

All foods, including meat and poultry, contain some bacteria. The inspection mark means that the product is wholesome, not that it is germ free. Few, if any, foods are germ free. Proper handl ing and cooking, however, will keep these micro-orgainsms at safe level.

The internal temperature of contact with the product after the roast or bird is the proper test for sufficient cooking. Fresh beef should be cooked to a temperature of 140 (for rare) to 170 degrees (for well done). Turkey should be cooked to an internal temperature of 180 to 185 degrees. The stuffing inside the turkey should be brought to 165 degrees.

> Leftovers should be covered tightly and refrigerated or frozen promptly. Whenever possible, large quantities should be put in several small containers rather than one large one in order to speed cooking. The meat or poultry, any stuffing, and the broth or gravy should be stored in the refrigerator in separate containers.







#### Driving Drunk Can Wreck Your Holidays

New Year's are traditionally the upcoming holiday season. the season to be jolly, but for an estimated 70 Texans it may turn out to be a time to be drunk and dead as a result of a traffic crash.

The Texas Safety Association issued its estimate of the toll drunk drivers will take during the holiday periods in a news release from its Austin headquarters.

TSA stated that recent studies released by the Department of Transportation and other agencies points to the fact that during festive periods more than half of all drivers drink alcoholic beverages.

"This does not mean," said J. U. Parker of Houston, President of the statewide safety group, "that a majority of drivers on Texas' streets and highways will consume enough alcohol to be dangerous on the highways. But it does call for extra attention by motorists to be alert to the dangers of drinking and driving.

"In one major city in Texas where roadside spot checks were conducted recently," Parker pointed out," preliminary studies show 16 per cent of the drivers checked had blood alcohol levels of 0.10 per cent or more. In Texas a driver is presumed by law to be under the influence of intoxicating liquor if he has a blood alcohol concentration of 0.10 per cent

or more." "The motorists of Texas, for their sake and the sake of their ing other drugs, and those who passengers, need to recognize

Thanksgiving, Christmas, and the potential dangers during They need to be alert, ready to take evasive action," said Parker.

> "It also means," he continued, "that the sober motorist should do everything he can do to encourage law enforcement agencies and the courts to get the chronic drunk driver off the road and keep him off the road until he is capable of returning to sober driving."

Parkersaid that his organization knows that it is really best not to drink at all if you are going to drive; but because of the various studies that have been made, it knows many Texans do drink and drive.

"The Texas Safety Association, "Parker commented, "believes that it is in the best interest of these people to make available charts to show how much alcohol the average, healthy adult can consume before reaching a blood alcohol concentration of 0.05 per cent. While Texas law sets 0.10 per cent as evidence of intoxication, experts have found that many drivers lose their ability to safely handle a vehicle in traffic when they have 0.05 per cent blood alcohol level."

The safety association president cautioned that in using these charts Texans should realize that inexperienced drinkers, young drinkers, those usare ill may not be able to consume as much alcohol as indicated on the charts and still be able to drive safely.

"The Texas Safety Association hated to issue a release of this type because Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's are, and should be, times of joy, friendship, and family love. But we know, just as certainly as Christmas comes on December 25, and New Year's Eve on December 31, that driving drunks will rob Texans of the joy, friendship, and love that is rightfully ours," Parker

#### Texas Has Shortage Of Health Workers

Texas State Department of Health official and private health authorities are voicing increasing concern over the shortage and its effects on the health care available to Tex-

ans in the 1970's.

The severe shortage of health workers in Texas is outlined in a recent survey conducted by the Texas Health Careers Program of the Texas Hospital Association in cooperation with the Governor's Office of Comprehensive Health Planning. "The survey leaves little doubt that a critical shortage exists right now in an industry vital to the welfare of every man, woman, and child in the State," said Dr. James E. Peavy, Texas Commissioner of

In fact, at the time when Texas unemployment rates are very high, nearly 18,000 jobs in the health fields remain unfilled.

The study showed some 136, 992 allied health professionals and technicians were at work in Texas in 1970, but jobs were available for an additional 7,

positions. By 1980, health officials ex-

timate more than 52,000 allied health personnel above and beyond existing requirements will be needed to meet health demands of Texas' burgeoning population.

The shortage may be even greater than these figures indicate. The survey called upon employers to list the number of budgeted vacancies in their institutions. But in many cases, employers do not budget for workers who are not available. In addition, these figures do not reflect private industry and private laboratories or lesser employment categories. In assessing how such gigan-

tic needs are being met, Dr. Peavy noted that 457 allied health education programs throughout the States are turning out increasing numbers of graduates.







Cheese is an economical source of protein, vitamins and minerals. More than just a sandwich filler, it is nutritionally equal to meat, poultry and fish as a food to help children grow, to keep adults working at top speeds and to keep everyone feeling fit.

Convenience and versatility are special cheese features. It comes ready-to-serve, or you can use it to prepare gourmet dishes in only half an hour. It itself, cheese is a gold mine of flavor. Or use it as flavor flatterer for dozens of other foods. Add it to almost anything cookable and you have a delectable dish. Try to imagine macaroni without cheese, or Italian spaghetti, grilled sandwiches, fondues, and souffles. Cheese is almost their reason for being, the

With cheese, there's practi cally no waste. Half a pound served in a main dish provides sufficient protein for four people at that particular meal. And, what other food can be such a treat, even after it becomes a dry old scrap pushed to the back of the refrigerator? When it becomes hardened, grate cheese and use it to add to casseroles, top open-faced sandwiches or flavor other baked products.

Cheese varies greatly in flavor, color, texture and use. In fact, Mrs. Clyatt says, there are more than 400 cheese varleties in all.



"It's just as important for farmers to resample and test fields as it is for those who have never tested their soils at all," says C.D. Welch, Extension soil chemist at Texas A&M University.

Soils that were tested 5 or 10 years ago provided farmers with recommended fertilizer rates for optimum profit based on soil fertility levels of the individual fields at that time. "However, these test values may have increased or decreased so that old recommendations no longer fit field and crop conditions," points out Welch. According to the soil chemist farmers who use fertilizer successfully have their fields tested every two to five years. This allows for the detection of declines as well as excessive build-ups. If a field is used for intensive production, a soil est should be run more often. This also applies for fields with special problems.

Better soil management may have elevated soil fertility levels. If this is the case, a soil test will indicate the need for less fertilizer, says Welch. If yields above those expected were obtained, an increase in fertilizer application may be needed.


