#### THE SMALLER BUSINESS PROBLEM —

For many years, each Congressional session has seen the introduction of legislation designed to help smaller businesses Much of it, obviously, has been impractical; some has been hare - brained, and none has been found generally acceptable.

Now, however, the situation may be changing. According to the American Retail Federation, "there is a growing sentiment in the Congress for the 'reinvestment of earnings' principle to stimulate the growth of small business." Under that plan, businesses, within prescribed limits, would be able to retain and reinvest more of their earnings. Support has come from members of Congress, representing both of the parties.


There is no question but what the tax laws are the principal barrier to the growth of the small business with modest financial resources. A small or medium - sized retailer, for example just doesn't have enough money left after the tax bite to go ahead at better than a snail's pace.

The current proposal, it is true, would somewhat reduce the government's tax revenues in the beginning. But, in the long run, it would increase them. Sometimes fish do venture into the bottom layer. They will do so only because they are pursuing food; chased by predators; or out of pure obstinacy. When this happens the fish are poisoned by the gas, or suffocate by lack of oxy-gen, or both. Then they rise to the surface quickly.

Sometimes they are found on or near the top, still fresh, but bloated and with eyes bulging because their swim bladders expanded with the sudden rise.

Fishermen take large numbers of such fish in nets. Usually they declare that their appearance on top was caused by the lake "turning over." But you now know the real reason.

It is also said by those fishing in late summer or early fall, that an unpleasant odor on the lake is caused by its "turning over." A-

How To Clean Car Upholstery

Woman's work can be done ... and far easier than it used to be. Here are some tips on removing stains from car upholstery: To get rid of grease and oil




Then vacuum, With dry-cleaning fluid and absorbent cloths, clean spot from the outside edge toward the center. If the stains have just clothes, then dry clean any remain-

Loosen chewing gum with clean-ing fluid or absorbent rug-cleaning powder. Remove what's left with a knife, Vacuum the powder or go over the spot again with the clean-

Spilled ink? Don't use milk! It adds a stain of its own. Sponge first with cool water, blot up spot with dry rags. If this doesn't work, make a solution of one part denatured alcohol and two parts of water. (First test it on a concealed upholstery part to make sure it, too, won't stain.) Then, sponge, dry, rinse, blot. While permanent-type inks never disappear entirely, this method can lighten the stain. If your puppy had an accident in the car, sponge the area lightly with warm salt water (½ cup salt to 1 quart water). Soak dry with rags, rinse, dry again. Spilled ink? Don't use milk! It

Finally, for candy and chocolate stains, use clear lukewarm water. Sponge from outside of spot to center, Soak dry with rags, sponge again with detergent suds, and soak dry. soak dry.
