High school principal Bob May measured their hair and was assisted by Mr. Conklin and Melvin Chisum.

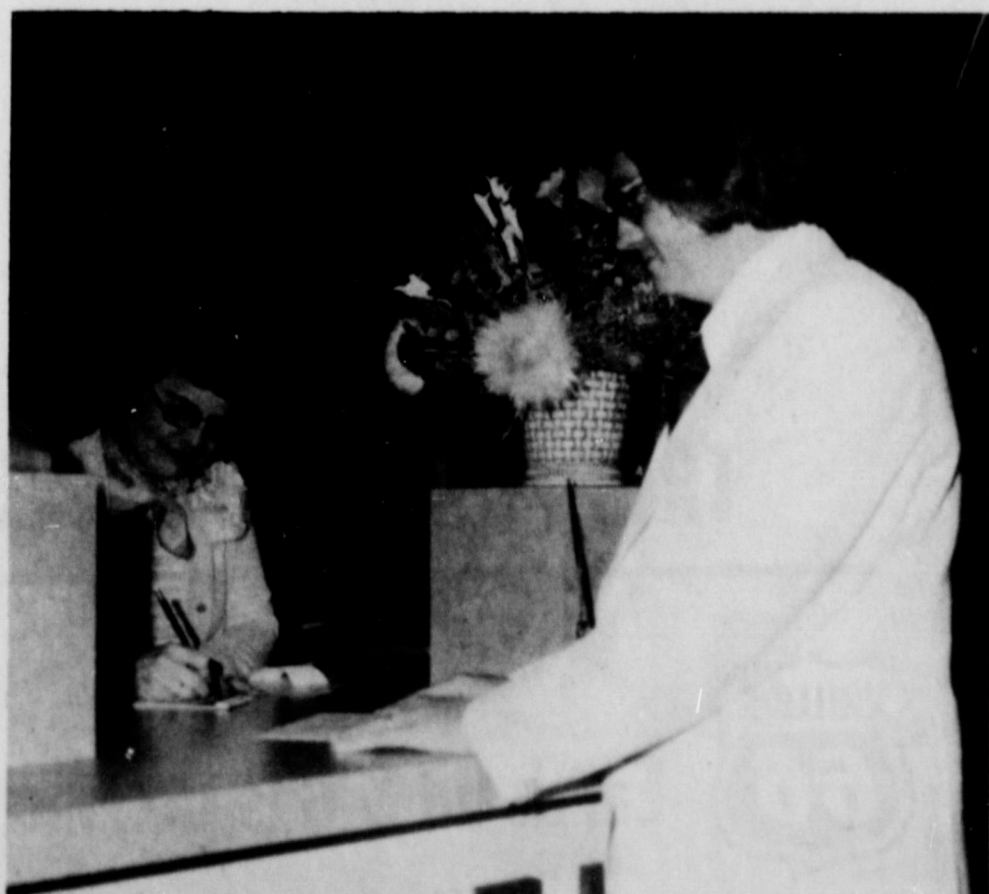
The boys were to resume where they left off. Ball players would be qualified to play ball if their grades permitted their participation.

But there is still a long way to go to really beat the odds against lung-damaged youngsters. There is still the cure or control for cystic fibrosis to be found. And, for the children living with C/F today, the need for a cure is right now.

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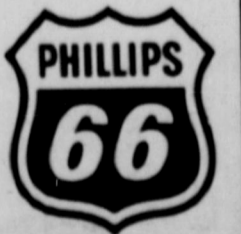

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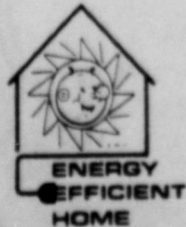

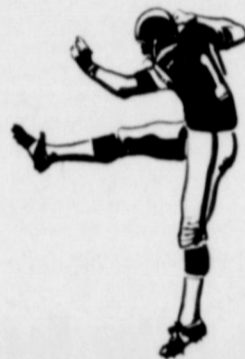

**COUNTY RECEIVES FOR AUGUST
Over 46 Thousand In Rebate Checks**

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday that an analysis shows that his procedure of rebating city sales taxes monthly rather than quarterly has turned out to be a real help to Texas city government. Since the monthly rebates began in April, 1975, the Comptroller's Office has turned back to the cities 19 percent of their allocation 60 days sooner and 41 percent 30 days sooner than they would have gotten it under a quarterly system, Bullock said. "This means these cities can put their money to work faster, earning interest or providing services," the Comptroller

said. "The city sales tax money belongs to the cities in the first place and never should have been held in Austin until the end of a quarter." Bullock mailed checks totaling \$66.6 million Wednesday to the 855 cities and towns collecting the one-cent tax as their September rebate. He noted that city sales tax rebates have totaled \$230 million so far this year, nearly 18 percent ahead of the \$195 million rebated during the same period in 1975. The rebate check received for the city of Earth for the period ending September 3,

1976, was in the amount of \$1,465,51. The five towns in Larab County received rebate checks in the total amount of \$46,085,76. **Insatiable Appetite**

USDA Schedules Cotton Hearing

A proposed amendment to the Cotton Research and Pro-

motion Order will be considered at a public hearing, with sessions in four major cotton producing areas, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced today.

According to officials in USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, the purpose of the hearing is to receive evidence on a proposed additional cotton research and promotion assessment, reimbursement to USDA for referendum expenses up to \$200,000 from producer assessment funds, and payment to USDA for supervisory administrative costs of up to 5 employee years annually.

Under the proposal, the additional assessment would be four-tenths of 1 percent of the gross sales price for each bale of cotton, starting with the 1977 crop. Currently, an assessment of \$1 per bale of cotton sold if collected from producers. Beginning with the 1978 crop, the rate of the supplemental assessment could be increased by the Cotton Board and the Secretary of Agriculture, but could not exceed 1 percent of the gross sales price for each bale of cotton.

The proposed amendment is based on the amended Cotton Research and Promotion Act, approved July 14 as Public Law 94-366.

Any interested person may testify at any of the four hearing sessions, which will be continued beyond one day if necessary. The first session in Memphis will start at 10:00 p.m. local time, and the following three will begin at 10:00 a.m. Sessions will be held as follows:

Voter Registration Drive Directed At Young Texans

AUSTIN--Workers in a state-wide voter registration drive are making a concerted effort to reach young Texans, according to Secretary of State Mark White, who is directing the registration project. White says statistics indicate

Texans between the ages of 18 and 20 participate in elections less than any other population segment, with the 21-24 year bracket following close behind. "We have contacted officials in virtually every high school

in Texas, and we are now trying to organize registration drives in most colleges," White said. "Young Texans represent a large pool of the electorate that remains untapped, and we hope to register a large percentage by

the October 1 deadline for registering to vote in the Presidential election."

White contends that most people, regardless of age, tend to vote once they complete the process of registering. "Studies indicate that between 80 and 90 percent of registered voters do vote," White said. "All it takes to register in Texas is filling out a postcard, so if we can get our message to the people, we should see an upswing in Texas voting performance, which has been falling steadily for more than a decade."

Registration applications are available through county tax assessors or by calling White's office in Austin toll-free at 1-800-292-9602.

"Anyone interested in helping us register voters, especially young Texans, can get in touch with us at this number," White said.

REPLACING OR CORRECTING VOTER CERTIFICATES

If a voter certificate is lost or destroyed, the voter should give the registrar a signed Statement of Loss, and the registrar will issue a replacement certificate. If the replacement certificate includes a name change or a change in precinct, it will not be valid until the 30th day after the Statement of Loss is received.

To change or correct the information on your voter certificate, present the incorrect certificate to the registrar, who will issue a new, corrected certificate.

WHERE TO VOTE

A registered voter casts his or her ballot in the precinct of residence as described by the governmental unit holding the election. The county precinct number is recorded on the registration certificate.

In elections not involving an entire county, precincts and polling places may be combined. The local newspaper

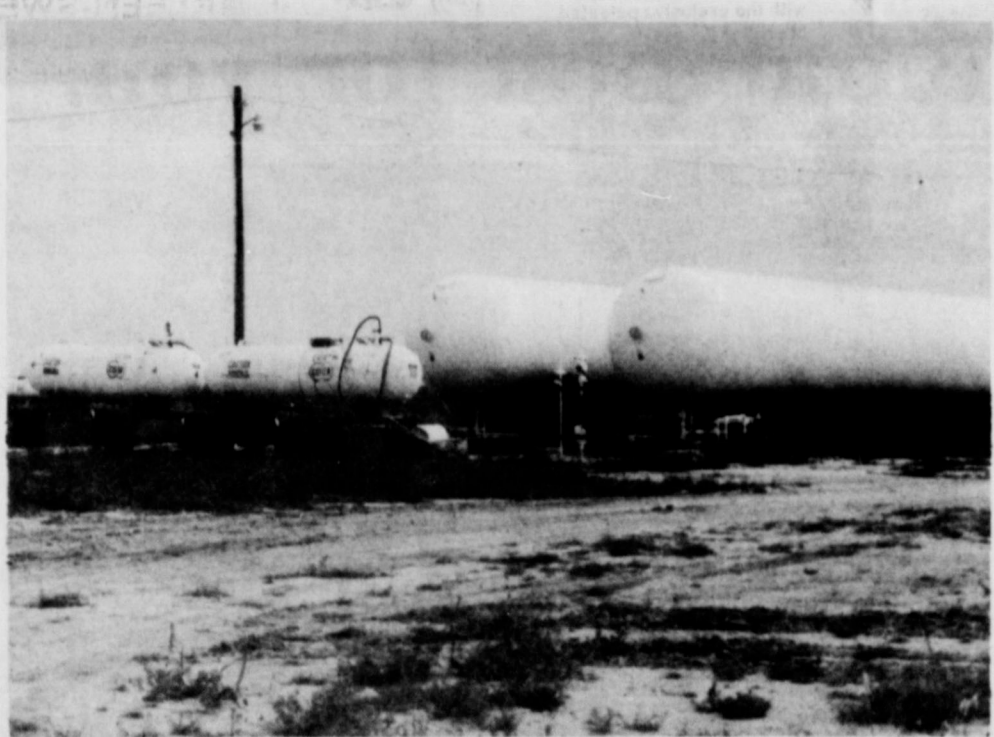

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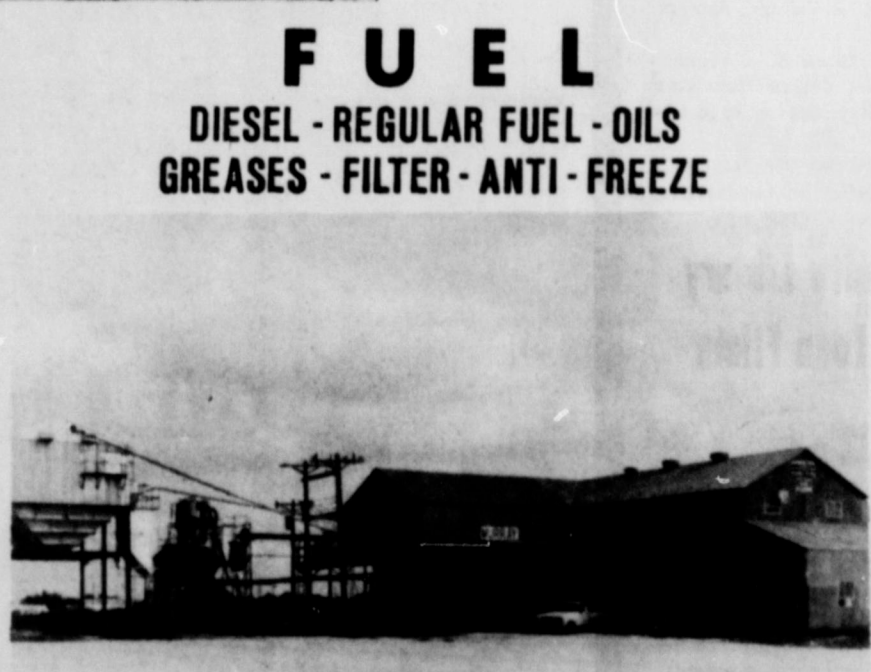

The films may also be borrowed for the use of schools.

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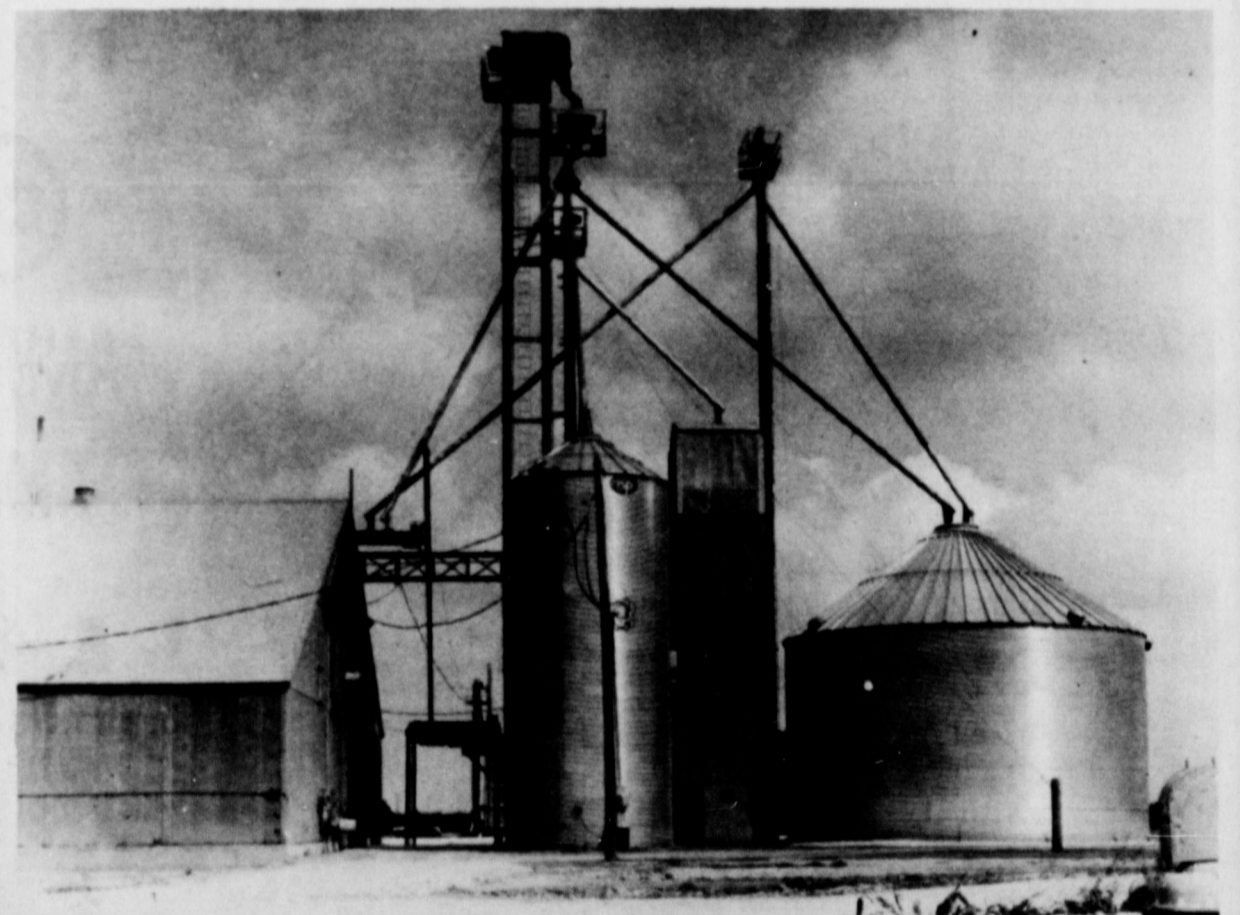

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature, amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."
