1 box Sure-Jell fruit pectin Yield: about 6 medium glasses (3 lbs. jelly)


Measure sugar and set aside. Measure juice into a large saucepan. Add Sure-Jell to juice in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. 





Delicious Cinnamon Bread Spices Winter-Weary Appetites

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

WITH spring in the air, treat your appetite to a change. A new dish, a new bread-anything to freshen up the menu-that's what most of us want. So try this really delicion innamon bread. You'll enjoy it.

Cinnamon Bread

One cup milk, 1/4 cup margarine or butter, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast); 1 package or cake of yeast, active dry or compressed, 1 egg, beaten; 41/2 cups sifted, enriched flour.

Scald milk. Stir in margarine or butter, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into large mixing bowl (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm water for compressed yeast). Sprinkle or crumble-in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in luk2warm milk mixture and beaten egg. Add sifted flour and stir until mixed

Turn dough out on lightly floured board and knead 8 to 10 minutes, or until dough is smooth and elastic, and does not stick to the board. Place in a greased bowl and brush top lightly with melted shortening. Cover with a cloth.

Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 45 minutes. Punch dough down and turn out on lightly floured board. Divide dough in half. Roll each half into an oblong bout 8 x 10 inches.

Brush lightly with melted margarine or butter. Sprinkle with of cinnamon mixture. Roll up tightly, as for jelly roll. Seal by pinching together firmly. Place sealed side down in

godly individual is also unheard of Dr. Foreman And yet we can speak of godly men and ungodly ones. So we can speak of more or less godly na-tions, nations whose trend and direction is toward God or away from him.


Is God on Our Side?

We always like to think, especially when we are at war, cold or hot, with other nations, that God is on our side. We like to Chink that we are God's people and the other side, the enemy, is not. The truth of the business is that no nation is either completely right or completely wrong no nation fully carries out God's will and no nations wholdefy it. No nation in the ly world today is composed entirely of Christians, no nation in the world today is without Christians in it. But having said all this, we can still say truly that God is on the side of some people and nations more than he is on others. In the Old Testament we have a good example of a nation that made this mistake of supposing God would be for them hatever they did, and they were whatever they did, and they were dreadfully dismayed when they discovered that they could lose wars and generally "eat bitter-mess." Many Jews thought God had let them down when such things happened; but the prophets knew better. Azariah, a proph-

et in King Asa's time, put the truth in a nutshell. "The Lord is with you while you are with him," he said.

Leadership in the Church

King Asa's times, and the times of President Eisenhower and Queen Elizabeth, are not so very far apart after all. What What was needed for a godly nation in the days of Asa? The need that the prophet mentions first is "teaching priests." There were plenty of priests who went through the liturgies and made sacrifices but what the nation needed was teaching priests, religious leaders who could teach the law of God that is to say, priests who could show the people what religion meant in daily living, in dealings between man and man. So long as religion stays inside the church, so long as religion concerns it self only with the Other World, so long as religion tries to confine itself to what is exclusively apiritual, it will not be Biblical, and it will be powerless to build a godly nation. 



Godly Nations Lesson for April 24, 1955

WE MAY as well admit that no such thing as a "godly na-has ever been seenif you take the word "godat its full meaning. A godnation, 100 per cent, would be where every citizen kept God's commands. where every act of Congress (or of Parliament, of dewould be such as God would fully For th approve. matter of that, a hundred - per cent godly individual is also unheard of Dr. Foreman And yet we can speak of godly

men and ungodly ones. So we can speak of more or less godly na-tions, nations whose trend and direction is toward God or away from him.

Is God on Our Side?

We always like to think, espe cially when we are at war, cold or hot, with other nations, that God is on our side. We like to think that we are God's people and the other side, the enemy, is not. The truth of the business is that no nation is either completly right or completely wrong no nation fully carries out God's will and no nations whol-ly defy it. No nation in the world today is composed entirely of Christians, no nation in the world today is without Christians in it. But having said all this, we can still say truly that God on the side of some people and nations more than he is on others. In the Old Testament we have a good example of a nation that made this mistake of supposing God would be for them whatever they did, and they were dreadfully dismayed when they discovered that they could lose wars and generally "eat bitter-ness." Many Jews thought God ness.' had let them down when such things happened; but the prophets knew better. Azariah, a proph-

et in King Asa's time, put the truth in a nutshell. "The Lord is with you while you are with him," he said.

Leadership in the Church

King Asa's times, and the imes of President Eisenhower times and Queen Elizabeth, are not so very far apart after all. What was needed for a godly nation in the days of Asa? The need that the prophet mentions first is "teaching priests." There were plenty of priests who went through the liturgies and made sacrifices, but what the nation needed teaching priests, religious leaders who could teach the law of God that is to say, priests who could show the people what religion meant in daily living, in dealings between man and man. So long as religion stays inside the church, so long as religion concerns it-self only with the Other World, so long as religion tries to con-fine itself to what is exclusively spiritual, it will not be Biblical, and it will be powerless to build a godly nation. 


