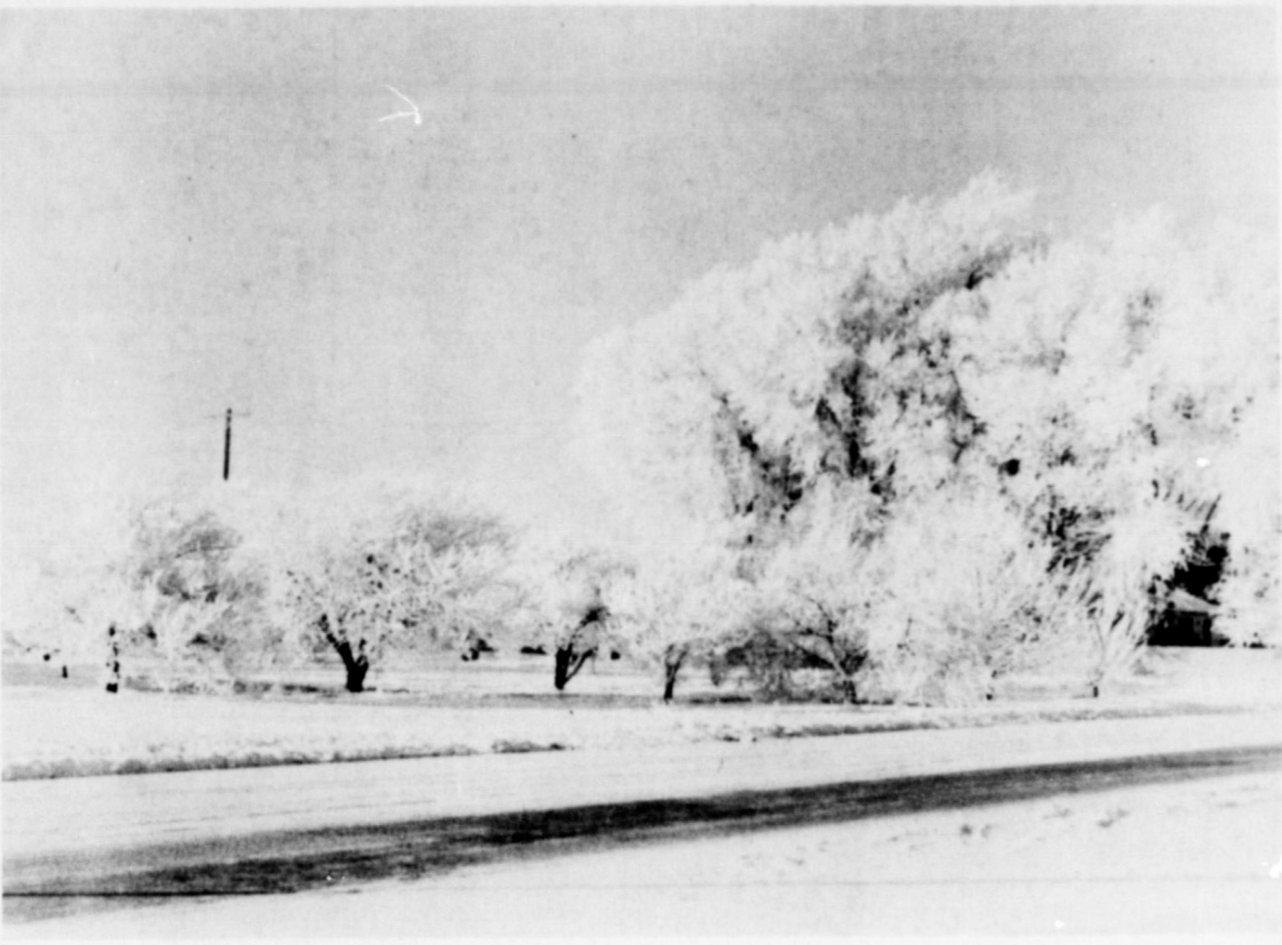

Deadline For School Census January 31

Annual School Census for the Springlake-Earth Independent School District in fast drawing to a close, as the deadline is Monday, January 31. Mrs. Marvin Sanders is in charge of the census.
This school census is taken each year to determine the number of school-age children living within the district. It is required by state law, and parents are required to give the information asked.
Mrs. Sanders emphasized that an accurate count of children who will be 6 years old or before September 1, 1966, is important in order that the school can make definite plans for next fall.
All residents in the school district are urged to cooperate with the census taker in compiling the count.
The final census reports will be tabulated in February.
According to Mrs. Sanders, information obtained by the census is used by the school to determine probable needs for the coming year. The school must know how many teachers will be required, the number of textbooks needed, teaching supplies and other materials.

Mothers' March of Dimes Campaign Scheduled for Monday

The Earth March of Dimes campaign is now in progress.
The main portion of the drive will not come until Monday night, January 31, when the Mother's March of Dimes will be held. It is sponsored by the local Young Homemakers Club, assisted by Lena Hite.
The chapter need workers to help them with the drive. Anyone wishing to offer their services are urged to contact Mrs. Neil Pounds, chairman of the Mother's March of Dimes by telephoning 257-5501.
Ross Middleton is chairman of the Earth March of Dimes Campaign.
Lamb County campaign chairman of the 1966 March of Dimes Campaign to fight birth defects is Mrs. Addie L. Abernathy. She said, "I believe there is nothing more important than making sure every baby born in this county has the best chance to develop into a normal, healthy person."
"We hope that the one-night Mother's March will be at least as successful as it was last year and that is why we have decided to conduct this year's campaign in the same manner instead of having a drive over a ten day to two week period," stated Mrs. Abernathy, a school teacher in the Littlefield school system.
"The shocking fact that the nation's recent German measles epidemic will be responsible for between 15,000 and 20,000 birth defect babies this year should remind us all of the seriousness of the birth defect problem," said Mrs. Abernathy.
"German measles despite the heavy toll, is responsible for only a few of the many hundred birth defects known to medical science, defects which occur in an estimated 250,000 American babies each year," she added.
Mrs. Abernathy pointed out that March of Dimes, supported scientists have been at work on the German measles problem for some time and that \$318,852 in March of Dimes funds is now going into accelerated research to perfect a vaccine.
While supporting this and other scientific investigations into birth defects, the March of Dimes is also expanding what is already the largest single national source of private support for the diagnosis and treatment of birth defect victims. Now in operation at medical schools and community hospitals are more than 50 centers where medical experts are developing better methods of treating children with birth defects.
"It's not enough just to be against birth defects," concluded Mrs. Abernathy. "We must be for babies who survive, for babies who survive normally and for the best possible care of babies who are born defective."

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Poll Tax Receipts Deadline Drawing Near

The sale of poll tax receipts has zoomed to a total of 161 receipts sold at the city hall through Tuesday.
The deadline for obtaining poll tax is Monday, January 31, just four days away. The fee is \$1.75 per person.
This is an election year with a number of national, state, and local elections upcoming.
Herbert Dunn, Lamb County Tax Assessor and Collector stated Sunday that approximately 2,000 persons in the county have gotten their new receipts.
Citizens must have a poll tax receipt to be eligible to vote in city, county and state elections.
To be eligible to vote in Texas, a person must have lived in the state for one year, the county for six months, and in the precinct 30 days prior to an election.
To be eligible for the poll tax exemption, a citizen must have been 60 years of age by January 1, 1960, or will have reached their 21st birthday during 1966. However, these exemption slips must be secured by January 31. They may be obtained at the County tax collectors office in the Lamb County Court House.
Poll tax receipts may be obtained at the City Hall, Earth or Springlake-Earth High School office.

One third of the contributions raised will remain in Earth-Springlake Communities for local use, to be administered solely by the local service unit committee.
The remaining two thirds of the money will be used to finance the many state and local services that are available through the Salvation Army, and to continue the program from the Division Headquarters at Dallas.
In the event, the local committee should run short of funds prior to the time for the annual campaigns, money will be made available to the local committee by the state board in order that these services may be continued locally.
Listed are a few of the state and local services available, emergency relief for disaster victims, clothing, food, and fuel for the distressed, meals and lodging for transients, Christmas and Thanksgiving baskets for the needy, medical, dental, and ear and eye aids, shoes and clothing for children, youth recreational programs, help for the blind and deaf, nutritional aid for school children, temporary assistance to families, scholarships and other student aids, hospital care for unwed mothers, temporary assistance to families, scholarships and other student aids, summer camp for boys 8 through 14, assistance for parolees, spiritual and material aid in time of major disaster, a missing persons inquiry service, low-cost residences for young women, character-building youth activities, service to hospitalized veterans, aid to service men and women, and rehabilitation centers. There are other state services that are too numerous to mention.
It was also brought out that .90 cents of every dollar contributed to the Salvation Army, remains in the state of Texas, and is used for actual welfare work.

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Six Inches Snow Reported In Earth-Springlake Area

Subdued sounds reigned over the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle Friday as a chilled public crawled through a muffling carpet of snow, left by the first real blast of Old Man Winter's fury this season.
Snow mounted to depths as high as 10 inches in some Panhandle cities Thursday night and Friday morning. The deep white mantle was accompanied by the most frigid temperatures since January 1963.
In the Earth-Springlake and surrounding area, approximately 6 inches of snow had accumulated by Friday noon, this was more snow than all the other snows combined thus far this season. According to Thurlo Branscum, the snow came at an ideal time, and was greatly needed by farmers of the area.

City Election Filing Deadline March 6

With the filing deadline March 6, just a month away, no candidates had filed Wednesday noon in the forthcoming Earth City election which will be held on Tuesday, April 5.
The terms of Mayor M. E. Kelley and aldermen Dud Chesney and Wendell Clayton will expire. The only three aldermen remaining will be Donald Runyon, Eldon Parish, and Richard Stockstill, who will serve one more year.
The city election is held annually with a mayor and two councilmen elected one year, and three councilmen elected the following year, each to serve a two year term.
Kelley has served as Mayor for one term, Chesney has served one term, and Clayton has served two terms.
Neither man has announced their plans as to whether they will seek re-election.
The election will be held at the Earth Community Room on March 6.

Deadline For City Taxes January 31

City taxes for 1966 paid to date are \$15,217.99.
This figure is down from the same period last year when \$15,844.87 had been paid according to Mrs. Rubye Anderson, city secretary.
Collection of city taxes were a little less than 77 per cent complete at the first of this week.
Total tax roll for the city is up slightly over last year. Tax roll for 1965 is \$19,842.77, as compared with \$18,684.50 in 1964.
Mrs. Anderson says that people are just a little slower in paying their taxes this year than they were last year.
She reminds residents that they have through January 31 to make payments without penalty. A penalty of one percent each month will begin February 1.

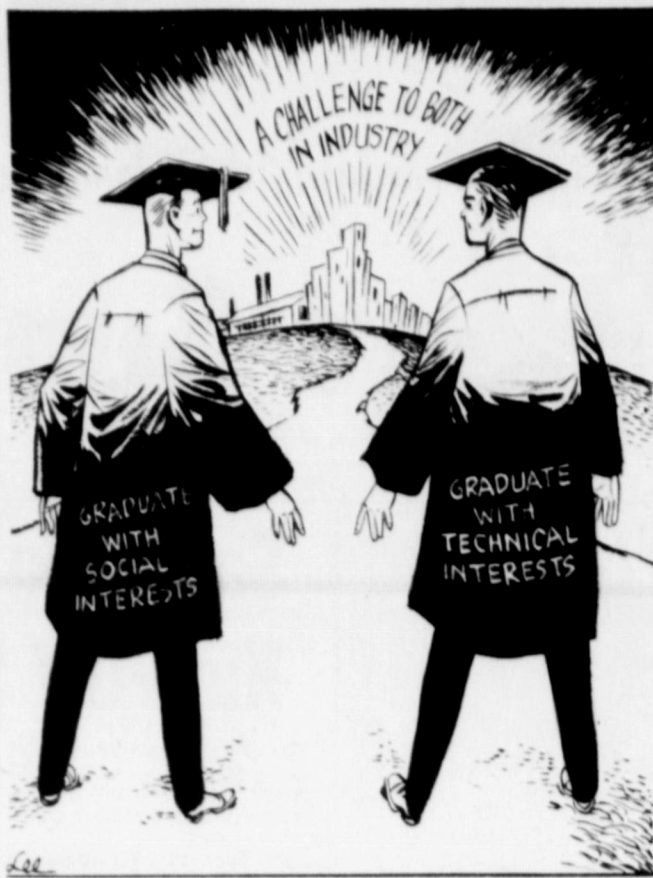
Jim Hardwick was elected president, Rex Clayton, Vice president, and Paul Wood, secretary-treasurer.

Woodrow Nelson, owner of Chem-Tex Farm Supply Store in Dimmitt recently sold three acres of land to the Western Canning Co., Inc. located in La Junta, Colo.

The Canning Co. is planning to begin construction sometime in February on a weighing, grading and salting station for pickles.

The station will be located in the East part of Dimmitt across the highway from the Chem-Tex Farm Supply Store.

Charles Hottel, Castro County Agent said that for the last two years, seven or eight different farmers have been growing cucumbers and selling them to the Western Canning Co. in Colo.

to be made into pickles. Hottel said the persons who have grown the cucumbers have liked the crop and he feels that the cucumbers will be good for the general economy of this area.

Truman Touchstone, a Dimmitt farmer who has been growing cucumbers for the past three years says that cucumbers are a good money crop.

With the pickle station coming into Dimmitt, it will be necessary for about 1000 acres


of cucumbers to be grown in the Dimmitt area. Only 200-300 acres of cucumbers have been grown in Dimmitt for the past two years.

Jack Tucker, manager of T
