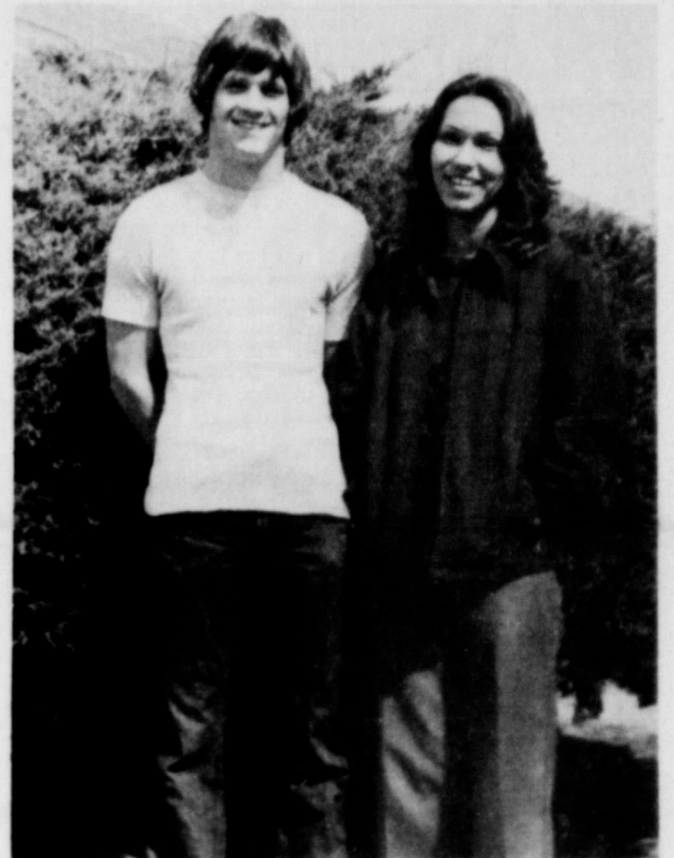

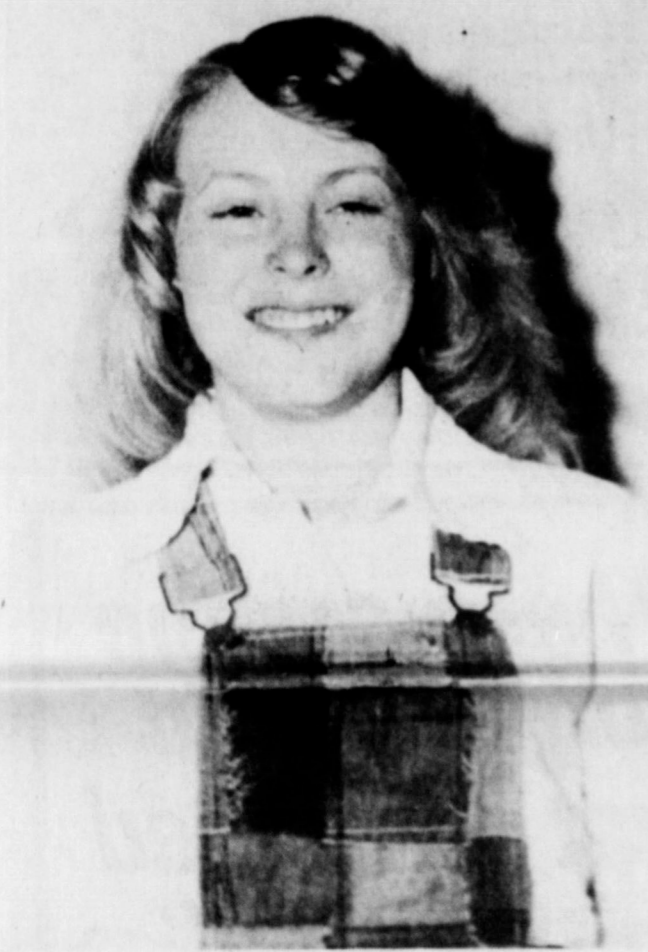

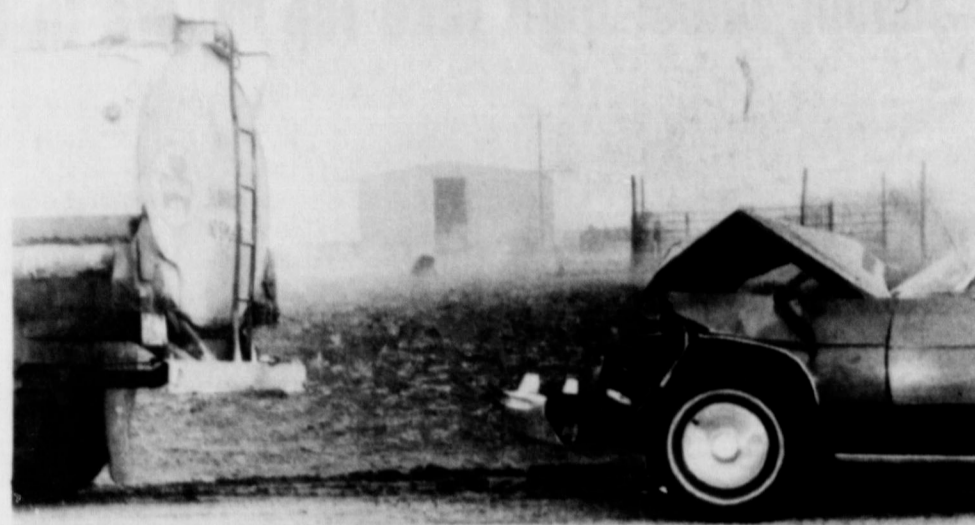

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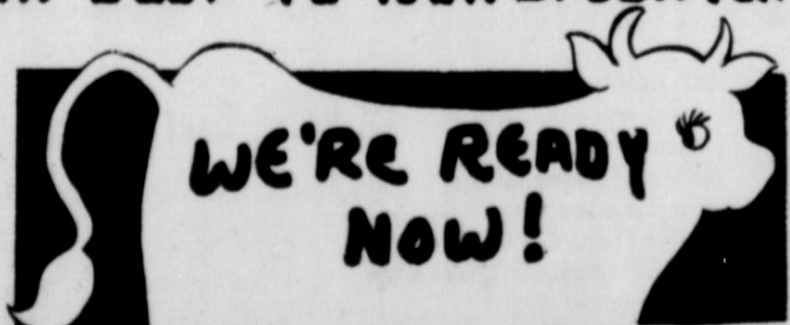
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Weather Meeting Held Monday Night

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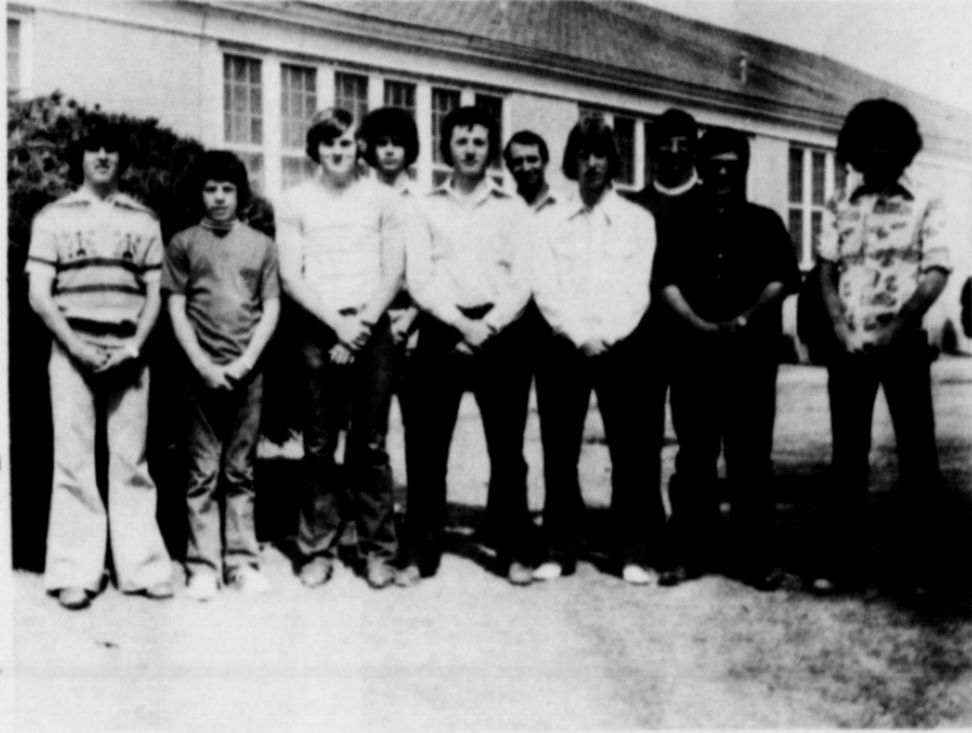
Installation Services Held By TOPS

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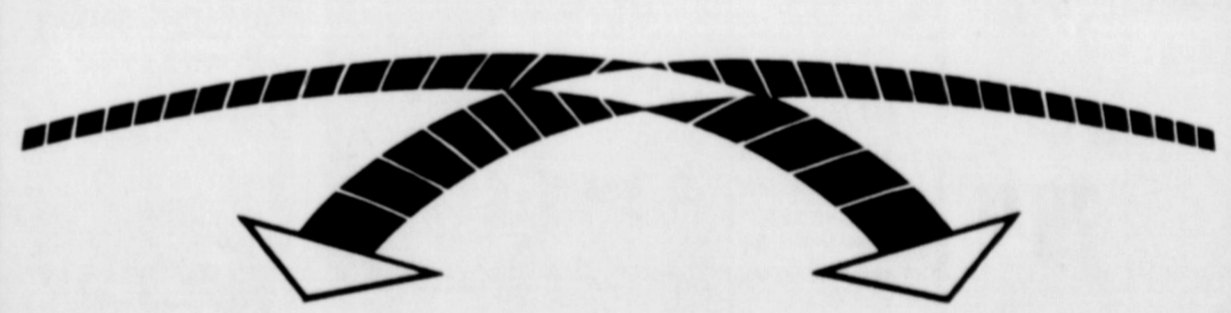

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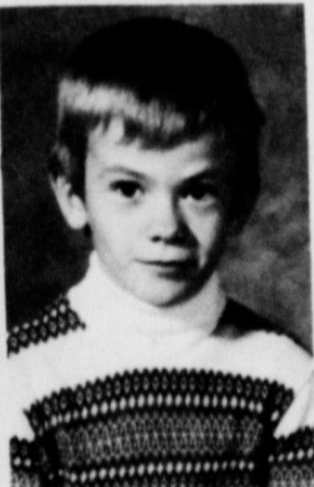

Local Student Makes Fall Dean's List

SAN MARCOS--Two Lamb County students are among the 3,400 Southwest Texas State University students whose grades earned them places on the fall semester Dean's Honor and Superior Honor Lists.

Placement on the regular honors list requires that a student be enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester hours of course work, excluding physical education activities, and that at least an overall "B" average is achieved.

The top academic listing, the Superior Dean's Honor List, requires grades of "A" in at least 12 of the required 15-hours of course work, and no lower than

a "B" in the other three-hour course. Inclusion on the superior honor list requires a 3.8 grade-point average or above on a four-point scale.

Undergraduate courses only are considered in the list's tabulation. "I" grades, a designation used to indicate incomplete course work, earned during the fall semester also disqualifies students from the scholastic honor rolls.

Local students whose scholastic averages placed them on the honor roll include John Andrew Rogers of Littlefield and Thomas San Miguel of Farth. Rogers is listed on the Superior Honors List.

Tetanus, Easy To Get, Easy To Prevent

With the return of outdoor activities the hazard of minor accidents, cuts and scratches increases. Most often these aren't serious but minor mishaps can be avenues for tetanus (lockjaw) infection if they are not treated properly.

Tetanus-producing spores can lie dormant in the soil almost anywhere. These spores can enter the body through the tiniest wound, a pin scratch, a bee sting or a small cut.

Tetanus spores may remain in the body for long periods without producing the disease. Or, they may produce poison effects in five to fourteen days, even though the wound has healed.

First signs of tetanus are irritability and restlessness. Muscles rapidly become rigid.

eventually causing a clenched-jaw leer that gives tetanus its popular name, lockjaw.

When symptoms appear, the outlook is grim, even with the best treatment. To help avoid the deadly consequences, be sure to clean all wounds thoroughly. Free-bleeding, surface scratches have less chance of producing tetanus than puncture wounds since tetanus grows best when little air can get to the spores. However, the best protection is to be immunized with tetanus toxoid. With immunization, the body manufactures antibodies that will fight tetanus. A booster is needed every 10 years.

In an emergency there is no time for immunization if someone isn't protected. If a person has no built-in immunity, a physician may inject tetanus antitoxin. An emergency shot is sometimes, but not always, effective.

The only long-range guarantee against tetanus is immunization with tetanus toxoid. Unfortunately three of every four persons' tetanus protection is not up-to-date.

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

Learn To Listen Most Effectively

A conversation has to have at least two parties, the speaker and the listener. Nearly everyone can be a speaker, but it takes extra attention to be a good listener. Mrs. Ilene Miller, a family life education specialist, contends,

"Many people listen far below their potential, but following some guidelines can help improve listening ability at least 25 per cent," she said.

Mrs. Miller is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Develop a positive attitude about listening to what others are saying. Concentrate on the person who is talking, rather than be preoccupied with your own thoughts and problems. Also, it takes concentration on the message to understand exactly what the person is saying," she explained.

Listeners need to consider the accuracy and source of what is being said. Is the speaker stating facts or giving his own opinion? Analyze his ideas and try to determine whether the speaker's feelings, experiences or position are influencing his statements, she said.

"Keep an open mind, and let the speaker finish what he is saying. You may not always agree with what he says, but it is important to keep an open mind and try to understand why the person thinks as he does. Asking questions may help him explain some statements which seem unclear to you.

"Be an active listener. Let the speaker know that you are interested in what he is saying by remaining alert and keeping eye contact. Facial expression often lets the speaker know whether he has his audience 'tuned in' or 'tuned off,'" the specialist said.

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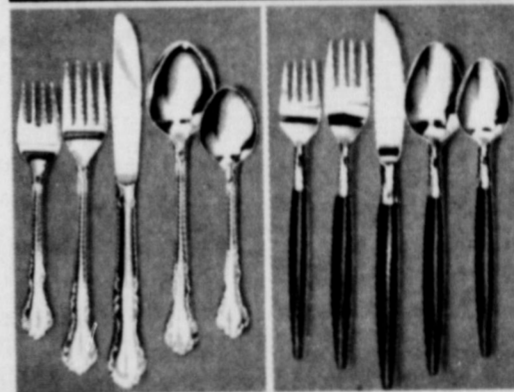
