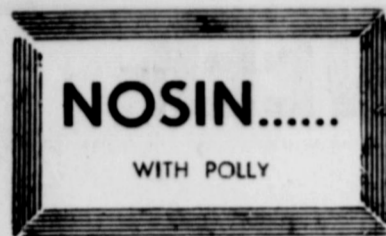




## Annual Lions Clubs Queen Contest April 2

An expert trick caster is William S. "Bill" Carter of Dallas. Every fisherman aspires to become an expert at casting. But not for the same reason Bill did. Most of them want to master the art in order to place a tempting lure right in the exact spot where we think the fish are located.

But not Bill Carter.

Actually, although he is an expert caster, Bill Carter doesn't rate himself even as an average fisherman. In fact, he goes fishing very little.

No siree, Bill Carter wanted to become an expert with the casting rod for an entirely different reason. His one and only goal was not to take fish but to catch the

eyes of the guys who buy fishing equipment. You see, Bill is a tackle salesman.

So Bill learned to cast, and to cast expertly. Now he gets the undivided attention of everyone when he takes rod and reel in hand.

Bill learned to cast from every conceivable position. He learned to cast with the reel in his shirt pocket, detached from the rod. He learned to cast with the lure in his hand, on the ground, even between his teeth.

Whether it is a between the legs cast, or his bow and arrow cast, or any of his wide repertoire, all are accurate casts.

Naturally Bill uses a rubber casting plug, without hooks, for

his trick casts, for safety reasons. But his bull's-eye accuracy is amazing.

At 20 paces Bill can wind the lure around a person's extended arm — at the elbow, at the wrist, or about the finger, with the ease that comes only from a marksman.

He can flip a cigarette out of a "target's" mouth, at 20 paces, without the subject realizing he's been "robbed."

We've been told that Bill can pop the ashes off a cigarette without disturbing the fog itself. That too, at 20 paces, mind you.

So proficient has he become, and so frequently is he called upon for demonstrations, that Bill now has devised a black light stunt whereby some of his casting tricks are done with the use of fluorescent and gantron material.

A truly great guy with the casting rod is Bill Carter.

Where did he learn the techniques? When we asked Bill Carter about that he surprised us again. He said, "Indoors whiling my time away waiting for prospective customers to come to my hotel room to see my display of fishing equipment."

Bill, who is approaching the half-century mark, is now and has been for 20 years, a tackle representative. Not content to sit idly by in

a big sample room, waiting for buyers to come view his merchandise, Bill assembled a rod, reel, and practice plug and began to practice casting between the rows of his display tables, then he tried casting between doorways, and down hallways.

It wasn't long before he had dead-eye accuracy.

Then, for variety, he tried different methods of casting. First thing he knew he was demonstrating his products in the aisles of the stores he called on. That's when he began to get the undivided attention of his customers and the store's customers.

It is not unusual for Bill to give as many as 50 trick casting demonstrations a year before service clubs, meetings of outdoorsmen, boy scouts, 4-H and FFA clubs. In fact, his first public demonstration was entertaining veterans in a hospital.

Bill makes no charge for his trick casting demonstrations: "It's good for business," says Bill, "and besides I love to do it."

Right now the gear that Bill "talks with" and about, is Zebco's new, black and white balanced rod built especially for Zebco's Model 33 black and white reel.

Bill says the dual unit makes a beginning fisherman look like a

pro. He's stretching his line there of course, but we must admit the combination does wonders for any fisherman.

Bill has been with Zebco for seven years; Glenn L. Evans, Inc., for 20 years and the Newton line Co. for 20 years. Other connections are with the H. A. Whittemore Co. Tackle Industries, and the Sta-Dri Boot Co.

He makes all sports shows in his sales area, which includes six states: Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas. In fact, it was at the Dallas News' Sports Show, several years ago, when Bill Carter gave yours truly his first casting demonstration.

Lest one gets the idea that Bill never goes fishing, he reminds us that he is a member of the Texas Game Fishing Club and journeys to Canada with the club on its annual pilgrimage, and to Acapulco every year for the Sail Fishing Tournament.

Next to fishing, Bill's love is golf. But even then his mind is on trick casting, for one of his favorite stunts is a trick cast made with a golf club. But he does them with other items, too — such as a landing net, a paddle, or a tennis racket.

Although Bill was born in Mont-

icello, Ark., he has lived in Dallas since he was 13 years of age. His parents (native Texans) moved back to Texas from Arkansas when Bill was only four. They first lived in Austin where his father, Lee Carter, once played short-stop for the Austin team in the Texas League. It was in Austin where Bill's initial interest in sports developed. His dad, by then, was employed by Caswell and Smith Jewellery Store, now known as C and S Sporting Goods.

Bill's schooling ended upon his graduation from Sunset High School in Dallas, where he lettered in football, (quarterback), baseball (short-stop) and golf.

His first job, naturally, was in a sporting goods store in Dallas. It was a part-time, holiday job run-

ning the elevator for Cullen and Boren, where his father worked for many years.

In 1937 Bill's dad formed Carter and Sons, a tackle representatives business, with his two sons, Bill and Frank as partners. Frank, 11 years younger than Bill, now lives in Atlanta, Georgia, where he has his own firm, Frank Carter Co., agent for sporting goods manufacturers.

Bill's dad passed away three years ago. Carter and Sons now belongs to Bill and three associates, Bob Speer of Irving, Eddie Choice of Dallas, and Lawson Richards of Birmingham, Alabama.

Bill's advice to those who want to learn to cast with accuracy is to practice, practice, practice. Then go out and try it on the fish.

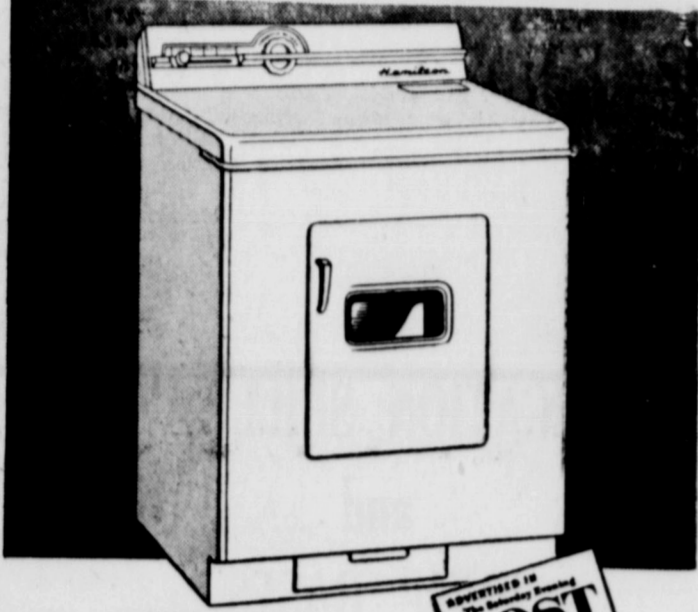

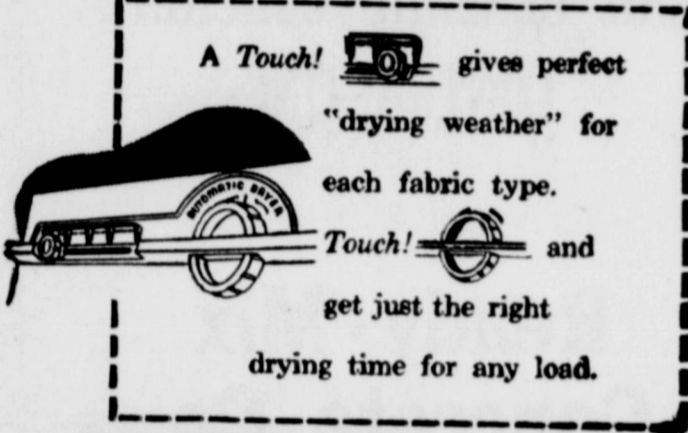

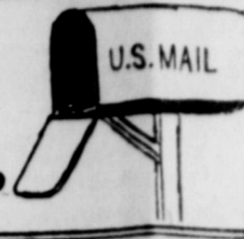

## Unused Allotments Community Concern

Colleg Station — Cotton is a commodity which creates a good "multiplier" effect in the economy, says Bob Cherry, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, because most of the cotton farmer's dollar is usually dropped into the money stream of the community. Though the dollar's identity may be quickly lost, it tends to circulate through all the avenues of trade and commerce.

The loss of cotton income, on the other hand, can adversely effect a commodity's whole economy, points out Cherry. For that reason, adds the economist, communities can look upon unused cotton allotments as a matter of community concern. Last year, for example, about one out of each 20 allotted acres was neither planted nor put in the Soil Bank.

The law under which cotton farmers are now operating contains provisions for the voluntary release and reallocation of 1959 cotton allotments. Where the release is made, the released acreage is retained on the releasing farm as history and is used in figuring future allotments as though it were planted. But, Cherry points out, it will not qualify a farm for an old farm allotment as having planted cotton in one of the three previous years.

It is very important that released allotments be reapportioned and planted on other farms in order to hold county and state planting history. The released and reapportioned allotments must be planted if they are to remain a part of the acreage history for the county and state, emphasized Cherry.

Released allotments may be reallocated to any old or new cotton farm on which additional acreage is needed and will be planted. Any excess of released allotments in a county may be surrendered to the State Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Committee for reapportionment to other counties only after each cotton farmer in the releasing county has received all of the allotment he can plant.

Cherry suggests that farmers

contact their local ASC office or important part of the 1959 cotton county agent for details on this allotment program.

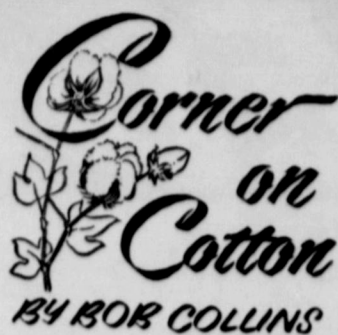

## Red Exports

The possibility of using the increased production at home doesn't seem likely, however, since Russia is currently exporting about 1.5 million bales to eastern Europe and the free world. . . . too, there is evidence in the Far East that Russia's pal, Red China, has been dumping textiles with Japan and India getting hurt.

## Yield Or Acres?

Apparently cotton yields in Russia are about one bale per acre. . . . the experts we talked with feel that the increase in production will come, if it comes at all, through the use of more land. . . . Right now the Soviet plans are to reclaim about 750,000 acres of wasteland, build a canal and irrigate at least 400,000 acres.

## Also Problems

Like you, the American farmer the Russian producer also has problems. . . . the Reds apparently haven't come up with a good insect control program and plant disease is a sizeable headache too. . . . of course he doesn't really worry about price. . . . his government decides what happens to his cotton after it's harvested. . . . price is no object. . . . but he does have some quality problems. . . . there are many difficulties and there seems to be considerable outside storage. . . . before ginning that lowers quality and on top of the cotton which he has to worry about meeting production quotas.

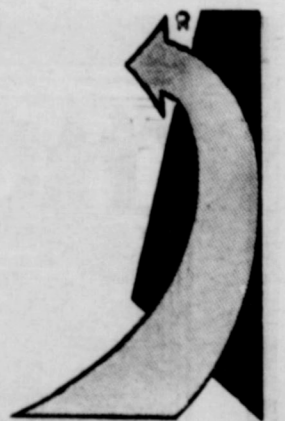
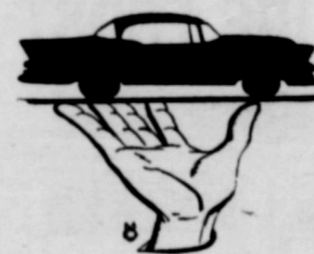

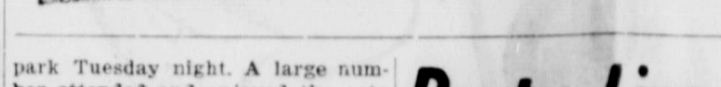
