First speaker on the program was Dr. Levon L. Ray, Professor and assistant director of research, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Lubbock. He discussed planting better cotton varieties for quality and profits.

Dr. Robert B. Metzger, Area Agronomist-Cotton, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock, talked about improving cultural practices to

improve micronaire production.

Roy E. Childers, Jr., Area Agricultural Engineer-Cotton Mechanization, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, showed slides and discussed ways to cut costs by stringing and handling seed cotton in the fields.

The future of cotton production in the immediate area was the subject of Marvin Sartin, Area Economist-Management, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock.

Billy C. Gunter, District Extension Agent from Lubbock, was last on the program and gave the final wrap-up on all the subjects covered.

The program was sponsored

by County Agricultural Agents in the South Plains Development Area, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas A&M University.

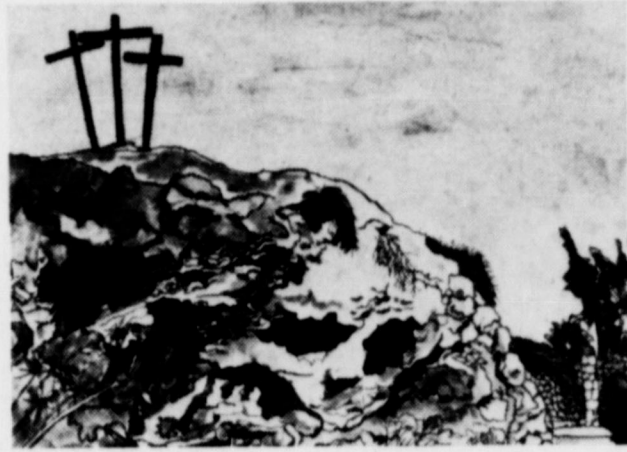

Tree Care Wards Off Diseases

One of the most prized possessions of a homeowner is a healthy shade tree. But a tree needs special care if it is to remain beautiful and disease-free.

Trees are subject to various disease-causing organisms such as viruses, bacteria, fungi and nematodes, points out Dr. Walter Walla, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Furthermore, trees are affected by drought, root system damage, nutrient deficiencies, misuse of pesticides and storm damage.

"Any of these factors can injure a tree, often seriously enough to kill it," says Walla. "Drought damage is especially a common problem. And by the time a homeowner can tell that a tree is suffering from water shortage, it's usually too late."

Construction injury is a common ailment around and near new homes, buildings or paved areas. Such injury is first indicated by a dieback of twig and too early a shedding of leaves in late summer and early fall.

Chlorosis is another common symptom in trees and often is the result of insufficient iron. Light green or yellow leaves signal this condition. Iron chelate or iron sulfate can be applied as a spray on smaller trees or like a fertilizer on larger ones to correct iron deficiency.

Walla cautions homeowners to use special care with weed killers and other pesticides. "Indiscriminate use of such materials in the general area where trees are growing can be costly. Trees have a vast network of feeder roots that can easily absorb such chemicals, killing a part or the entire tree."

For more information on shade tree diseases, Walla suggests a copy of an Extension Service publication on this topic which is available at any county Extension office.

Motorist Must Stop For School Busses On Streets and Rural Hwy.

AUSTIN--A reminder on the State law about motorist stopping for school buses was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said the law, which applies on city streets as well as rural highways requires motorists moving in either direction on the same roadway or street with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing top red lights on the bus are in operation.

He said the problem is becoming more serious in cities due to increased use of school buses in urban school districts.

There are only two exceptions to the law on stopping for loading or unloading a

school bus: Those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway (divided by median or physical barrier) are not required to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir said the problem of school bus accidents is of concern to law enforcement officials and educators throughout Texas. Only a few weeks ago, the Travis County Grand Jury urged the news media to publicize the law about stopping and not passing a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

The grand jury noted that serious criminal charges might result if a motorist disregards this law.

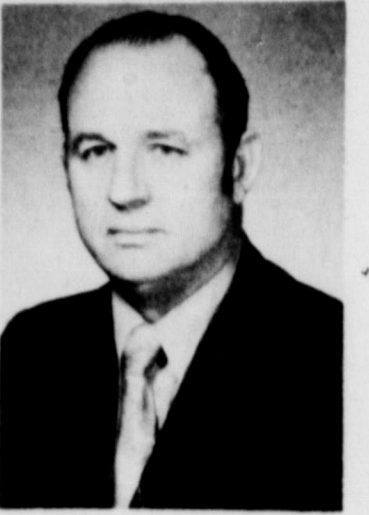
Bill Mann To Head School Administrators

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Injunction Restrains Optometrist From Practicing In Littlefield

Following about three and one-half hours of testimony in the district courtroom April 10, District Judge Pat Boone, Jr., ruled in favor of a temporary injunction to restrain Dr. Craig Wallace from practicing optometry in the city of Littlefield or within a 50-mile radius of Littlefield, with the exception of Lubbock, until the case can be heard by a jury.

Judge Boone said, "I find no fraud, no breach of contract, therefore Dr. Wallace will be enjoined and restrained from practicing optometry in the city of Littlefield and within a radius of 50 miles of Littlefield with the exception of Lubbock for the duration of this law suit. The temporary injunction will be effective upon the posting of a \$25,000 bond by the plaintiff Dr. Bill Armstrong, as prescribed by law."

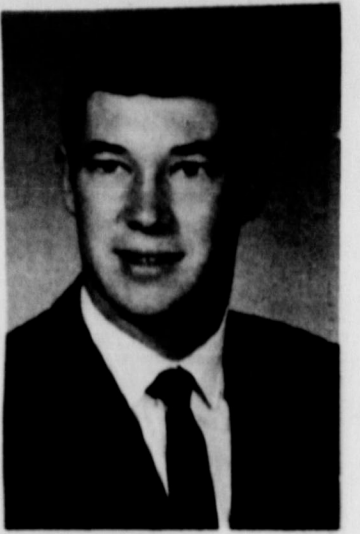
He was selected on his ability in classes, with a grade point average of 3.68, integrity, character, leadership and honesty.
