Ellis died at 5:40 p.m. Wednesday in South Plains Hospitalin Amherst, after a lengthy illness.

Ellis was born in a log cabin in Montague County, Texas, in 1879.

In the spring when he was four years old, he and his family went to Oregon in a covered wagon. They traveled four months -- many streams were not bridged, so it was a long journey. When they reached the Cascade Mountains and the Columbia River, they could go no farther without help. They "loaded" their possessions on a flat boat and went around the mountains, and on to Portland.

They lived in Oregon seven years, between Salem and Portland. Then the family boarded the train for Montague County, Texas.

In his younger days, Ellis taught school in Texas and Oklahoma for thirteen years. He had, as then called, "first grade" certificates to teach in Texas and Oklahoma.

Ellis married Goldie Faye Morris on June 12, 1915, in Lawton, Oklahoma.

In 1924 and 1925, he lived in Lubbock County and bought land near Earth (before the town wasnamed) from the Halsell's. In 1929 he thought he would retire in California, where he could "see things grow," but the depression came, and he began work again. He bought eighteen acres of unimproved land where he had a fruit orchard, walnut trees, etc. The Ellis family had a good home and a well. They lived there until 1943 when they sold their property.

From 1946 to 1956 they lived in Ukiah, California, where they built and operated a motin Modesto, until 1960 when they returned to Lubbock County, their former home. The Ellis family moved to Earth in 1964.



Following the program, stories were read and acted out by those attending. This will be done on several occasions at



Ricky was selected as outstanding student in his class of Agricultural Economics by the faculty members.


He was selected on his ability in classes, with a grade point average of 3.68, integrity. character, leadership and honesty.
