Evangelist Mike Brumley to Begin 8-Day Revival Sunday at Earth Baptist Church

An eight day revival meeting at the First Baptist Church in Earth is scheduled to begin Sunday, April 16 and continue through April 23. Evangelist, Mike Brumley will do the preaching. Brumley is well known by sports fans, and especially baseball fans, who remember him as catcher for the Washington Senators Baseball team in 1964. At the height of his career in the major league, Brumley laid aside his catcher's mask, and made his decision to enter into evangelism, to serve on God's team in the gospel ministry. Richard Tate, a college student from East Central State College at Edmond, Okla., will lead the song services. Services will be conducted twice daily. Morning services have been set for 7 o'clock, to allow business people to attend morning services before reporting for work. Evening worship services are set for 7:30 p. m. Brumley is said to work for God in the same manner he

School Board Reorganized, Members Attend Workshop

Members of the school board met Monday morning at school, and canvassed the votes cast in the previous school board election. The group approved the count as correct. Newly elected members of the board, Weldon Barton, Jerry Kelley and John Bridges took the oath of office, with Roy Byers presiding. Following the oath of office, the board re-organized and elected officers for the forthcoming year. Those elected were Roy Byers as president, Orville Cleavinger was named vice president, and Guy Kelley was re-elected as secretary. The group heard and approved the reading of minutes of the previous meeting. They also voted to meet the current bills. In their short business session, they agreed to purchase a fence for the parking space for the Springlake buses. The fence will be a chain link fence with barbed top. A discussion was conducted on whether or not to become a member of the Media Center in Lubbock. The Media Center is said to have various advantages, such as film lending for free to its members. However, the cost involved in becoming a member was a factor in causing the local board to wait to be sure these advantages were worth the cost. The discussion was tabled until a later date. Following the meeting at school the group went to Lubbock, where they and school board members from more than 80 West Texas independent and consolidated school districts attended the 1967 School Boards Workshop at Texas Tech. Tech Education Prof. B. J. Fallon, coordinator of the workshop along with Education Prof. Weldon Backner, designed the meeting "to acquaint West Texas school board members with many of the state and federal educational tools available to their districts." "This session," Dr. Fallon said, "was to acquaint these new people with some of the aspects of their job, and to answer any questions they have about their new positions." The session was conducted by Dr. Beckner and Tech Education Professor Dwight Kirk. Roy Byers served on a four man panel to discuss School Board problems, along with President of the Board from Lubbock, Superintendent of the school at Seagraves, and a member of the Tech faculty. Norman Hinchliffe served as

Chairman of one of four study groups who discussed their ideas on the most pressing problems at present. Following the discussion, each of the four chairmen presented their compiled findings to the panel. The keynote address was by Joe Neely, director of vocational program development for the Texas Education Agency. The delegates attended panel discussions for the remainder of the workshop. Six discussions groups were held. The Number 1 group discussed state education legislation. The second group, the Federal legislation program, number 3 the governor's committee on public school education. Number 4, Board-Personnel relations, number 5, school boardmanship, and number 6, local school problems. All local board members, with the exception of Guy Francis Kelley attended the Lubbock meeting.

Wash Water Draining On Lawn Illegal Within City

City Dads announced this week their decision to enforce an ordinance prohibiting city residents to allow washing machine water to be pumped out on the ground. This decision was made following complaints by several city dwellers of the menace created by this carelessness. Deadline for compliance to this ordinance will be May 1. Following this date those who have failed to connect their washing machines to the sewer will have their city service discontinued. City Dads pointed out, that with the fly and mosquito season approaching, this health hazard must be eliminated. The city spent approximately \$5,000 last year in their effort to combat mosquitoes and flies, and prevent a serious health threat to the city. They ask the full cooperation of city dwellers, so that serious health problems may be kept down with less cost involved. "Facing realities sometimes is painful. John Deere Tractor Stolen Saturday Morning

A 1963 John Deere diesel model 410 tractor belonging to Lynn Glascock of Earth was stolen during the early morning hours, about 4:45 a. m., Saturday, from the Gattys Brothers Farm. The farm, located one mile west and one and one-half mile north of Springlake, is being farmed by Glascock, who said he left his tractor parked along side of his irrigation well, bordering the road, as he quit work the night before. Glascock discovered the tractor missing when he went out to start his irrigation water at 7 o'clock, Saturday morning. He notified Deputy Sheriff W. A. Hatfield and other county lawmen, who joined the search. The Texas Rangers have been called in to assist in tracking down the tractor, which is valued at approximately \$4,000. Glascock and lawmen traced the tractor where it was driven down the road, to a place a mile and a half east of Springlake, on Highway 70, where it was loaded on a truck, and driven away. The tractor was loaded just a short distance east of the Walter Farris home, Mrs. Farris said she was awakened in the early morning hours by the sound of

a tractor. However, she failed to look out the window or investigate the sound further. A mail carrier delivering the early morning papers to Earth told lawmen he saw the tractor loaded on a red International long wheel base truck at 4:45 Saturday morning. Tracks indicate the truck, carrying the tractor, went east. Glascock is offering a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty person or persons. Anyone having seen or heard anything that might be of help is asked to please contact Lynn Glascock in Earth, or Deputy Sheriff Hatfield.

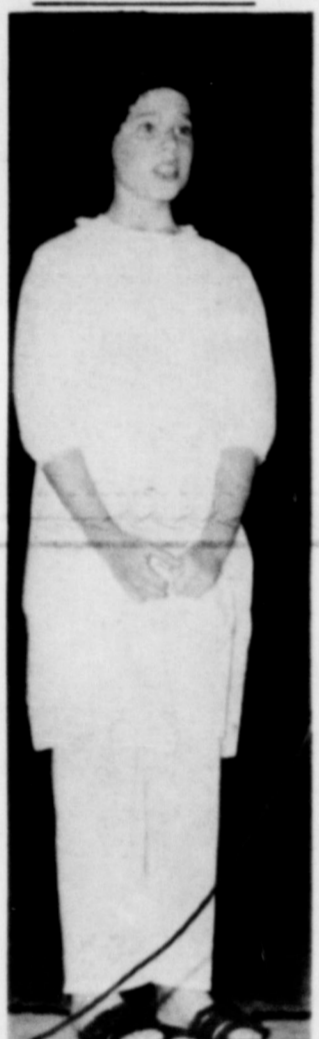

different skill, which were welding, plumbing, tool identification, and electricity.

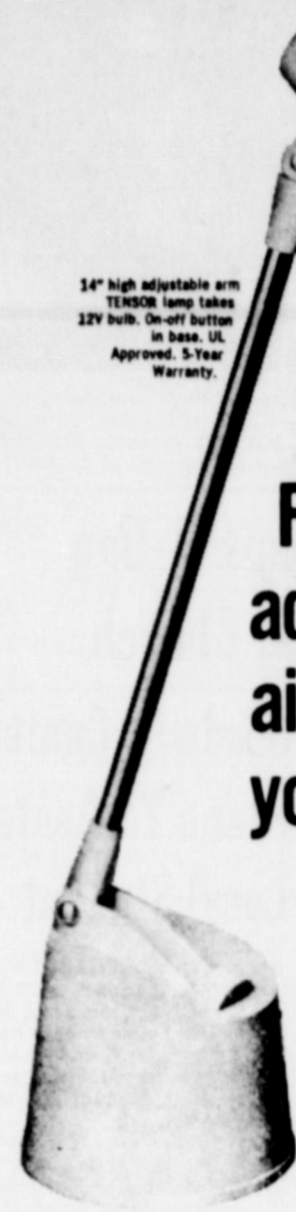
In the electricity portion of the contest, the boys were asked to wire up a toggle switch, controlling a ceiling fixture, and a du-

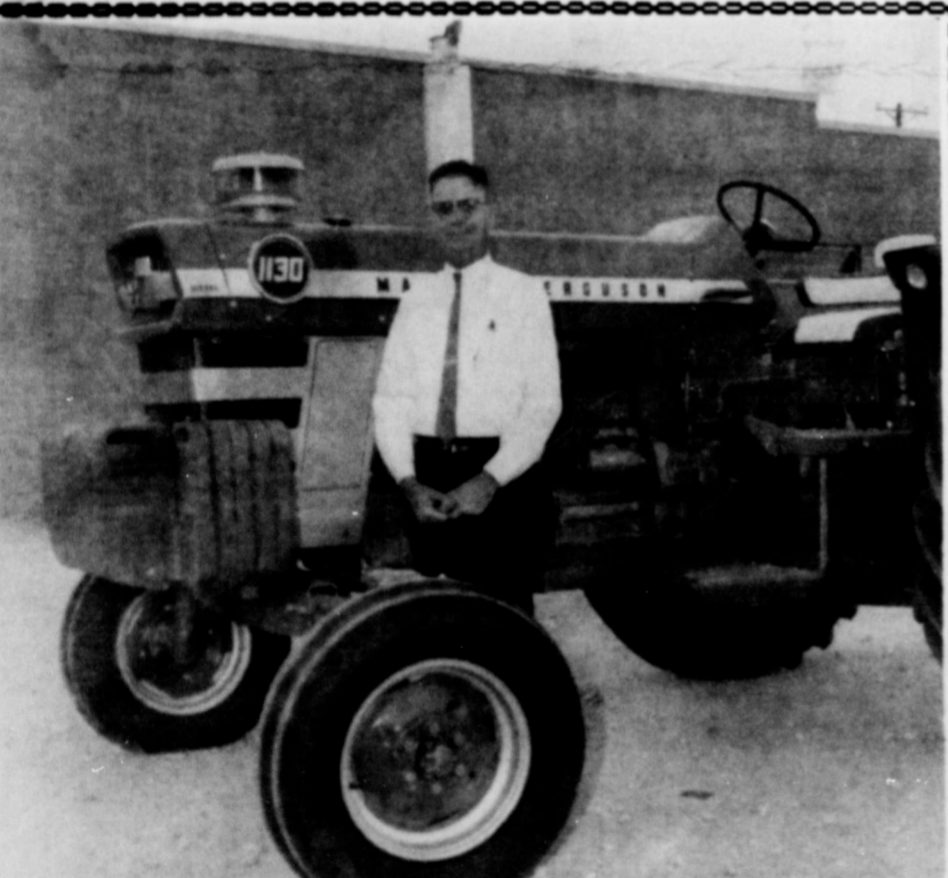

Recent developments in "combination chemotherapy" using more than one chemical at a time. The past year witnessed, for example, what has been described as a truly effective therapy for adult leukemia, accomplished via "POMP". The word is formed of letters in the names of the four chemical agents used: Prednisone, Oncovin, Methotrexate and 6-mercaptopurine. Although this treatment does not provide a true cure, it does produce regression of the disease, and marks a definite advance against adult leukemia.

Robert L. Hite Invited to Silver Anniversary Reunion of Doolittle's Tokyo Raiders

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- Robert L. Hite of Orange, Texas has been invited to the Silver Anniversary Reunion of the Doolittle Tokyo Raiders, which will be held April 14-16 in the Alameda-Oakland, Calif. area.

The reunion brings together those active and former members of the Air Force who flew with General Doolittle April 18, 1942, on the first bombing raid against Japan.

The theme of the 25th Anniversary Reunion will include a tribute to the general, who was born in Alameda, and to the U.S. Navy, which played a vital part in the operation. The Navy carrier "Hornet" and her escort ships carried the Air Force crews and their B-25s from Alameda to within striking distance of Japan.

Hite, today manager of the Holiday Inn at Orange, was copilot on Crew 16 with Lieutenant William G. Farrow as his pilot on the Tokyo Raid. Hite bailed out over Nanchu, China, and suffered a broken ankle. He was captured and held a prisoner by the Japanese for 40 months. Hite served again during the Korean War and completed his second tour of duty in November 1955.

Now a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force Reserve, he enlisted as an aviation cadet on September 9, 1940, and was commissioned on May 29, 1941. His military decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross, two awards of the Purple Heart, the Chiang Kai Shek Medal and the Chinese Order of the Celestial Cloud.

The resulting bomb damage was not great, but the action had far-reaching effects. Because of the raid and the threat of others to follow, the Japanese were forced to maintain fighter units for the defense of the home islands which had been intended for the Solomon Islands.

It was in the Solomons that the United States launched its first offensive against the Japa-

nese. The success of this offensive--the beginning of the road back for America--was assured when the United States gained air superiority in that area.
