The farm, located one mile west and one and one-half mile north of Springlake, is being farmed by Glasscock, who said he left his tractor parked along side of his irrigation well, bor dering the road, as he quit work

Glasscock discovered the tractor missing when he went out to start his irrigation water at 7 o'clock, Saturday morning, He notified Deputy Sheriff W.A. Hatfield and other county law-

men, who joined the search. The Texas Rangers have been called in to assist in tracking down the tractor, which is valued at approximately \$4,000. Glasscock and lawmen traced the tractor where it was driven down the road, to a place a mile and a half east of Spring-lake, on Highway 70, where it was loaded on a truck, and dri-

ven away.



### Robert L. Hite Invited to Silver Anniversary Reunion of Doolittle's Tokyo Raiders

washington, D.C.--Rob-ert L. Hite of Orange, Texas has been invited to the Silver Anniversary Reunion of the Doolittle Tokyo Raiders, which will be held April 14-16 in the Ala-meda-Oakland, Calif. area. The B-25 raid on Ja

The reunion brings together those active and former members of the Air Force who flew with General Doolittle April 18 1942, on the first bombing raid against Japan.

The theme of the 25th Anniversary Reunion will include a tribute to the general, who was born in Alameda, and to the U.S.Navy, which played a vital part in the operation. The Navy carrier "Hornet" and her escort ships carried the Air Force crews and their B-25s from Alameda to within striking distance of

Hite, today manager of the Holiday Inn at Orange, was co-pilot on Crew 16 with Lieutenint William G. Farrow as his pilot on the Tokyo Raid. Hite bailed out over Nanchu, China, and suffered a broken ankle. He was captured and held a prisoner by the Japanese for 40 months, Hite served again during the Korean War and completed his second tour of duty in November

Now a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force Reserve, he enlisted as an aviation cadet on September 9, 1940, and was commissioned on May 29, 1941. His military decorations in-clude the Distinguished Flying Cross, two awards of the Purple Heart, the Chiang Kai Shek Medal and the Chinese Order of

Skip-Row Planting Report Released by A&M

Skip-row farming has become a popular means of increasing cotton yields in Texas since the change in government cotton allotments in 1962, James Mulkey. Jr., Texas A & M Univer-sity Experiment Station soil scientist, has pointed out, The amended regulations

This change has caused a major shift to systems employing four fallow rows. The four-row fallow system will take some cotton land out of production. but still offers some yield advantage, Mulkey pointed out. Cotton and guar were planted

in nine skip-row and interplant systems to investigate the yield potential of these systems and the feasibility of interplant cotton, planted in four row skips with two rows of guar. Cotton planted in the 2X4
