

# First Graders Must Have Immunization

Mrs. Dorothy Wood, Springlake School Nurse announced this week that all students entering the first grade at Springlake School will be required to have a successful immunization against smallpox.

Parents or guardians are asked to show evidence or bring a certificate from your physician to school when you bring your child to register.

It is also recommended that your child have a series of diphtheria and polio immunization. If given in infancy a recent booster will be sufficient.

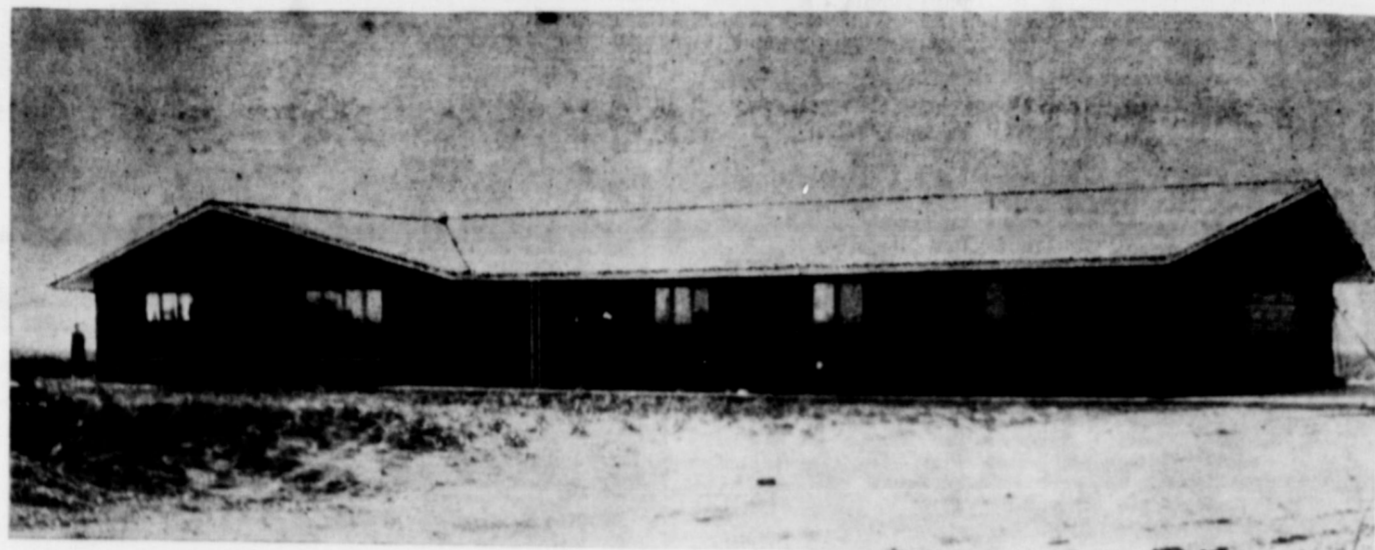

# Farm Trailers Must Have License Plates

All County Tax Assessor-Collectors in Texas received a notice this week of the passage of House Bill 1982 on June 6, 1961, amending the Motor Vehicle Law on farm trailers.

Since farm trailers and farm semi-trailers are exempt from the Certificate of Title Act, the only prerequisite for the issuance of license plates is for the farmer, rancher or cotton gin owner to execute and file with the County Tax Assessor-Collector the application for Farm Trailer license plate (Form 78) and pay the \$5.00 fee.

The farm trailer license plate is issued for farm trailers and farm semi-trailers with a gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds but not exceeding 10,000 pounds. Trailers with gross weight of 4,000 pounds or less are exempt.

Deadline for the application to be filed and the fee paid was not known at press time.

## Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains  
Research Foundation

Three popular varieties of wheat are being used in a milling quality test, comparing the quality can be maintained at a high of dryland, at the High Plains Research Foundation. The purpose is to determine whether milling quality can be maintained at a high level under irrigated conditions. Dryland wheat is favored by bakers because of its consistently high milling quality.

Aztec, Comanche, and Wichita were the varieties being grown in the test. Delbert Langford, Associate Agronomist of the Foundation, stated that this is a co-operative test with Dr. I. M. Atkins of Texas A. and M. and that Mr. Paschal Scottino of the Bakery School, Arlington State College, is analyzing the samples.

The irrigated plots were fertilized with 40 pounds nitrogen, 90 pounds phosphate, and 30 pounds potash. They were irrigated three times during the growing season a total of 12 inches. The same varieties on the dryland plots received no fertilizer or irrigation.

The dryland yields were: Wichita, 37.7 bu.; Comanche, 36.2 bu.; and Aztec, 32.0 bu. Irrigated yields were: Comanche, 55.7 bu.; Aztec, 55.4 bu.; and Wichita, 50.7 bu.

Tascosa, although not included in the milling quality determinations, was grown side by side with the other varieties and yielded 49.4 bu. dryland and 84.5 bu. irrigated.

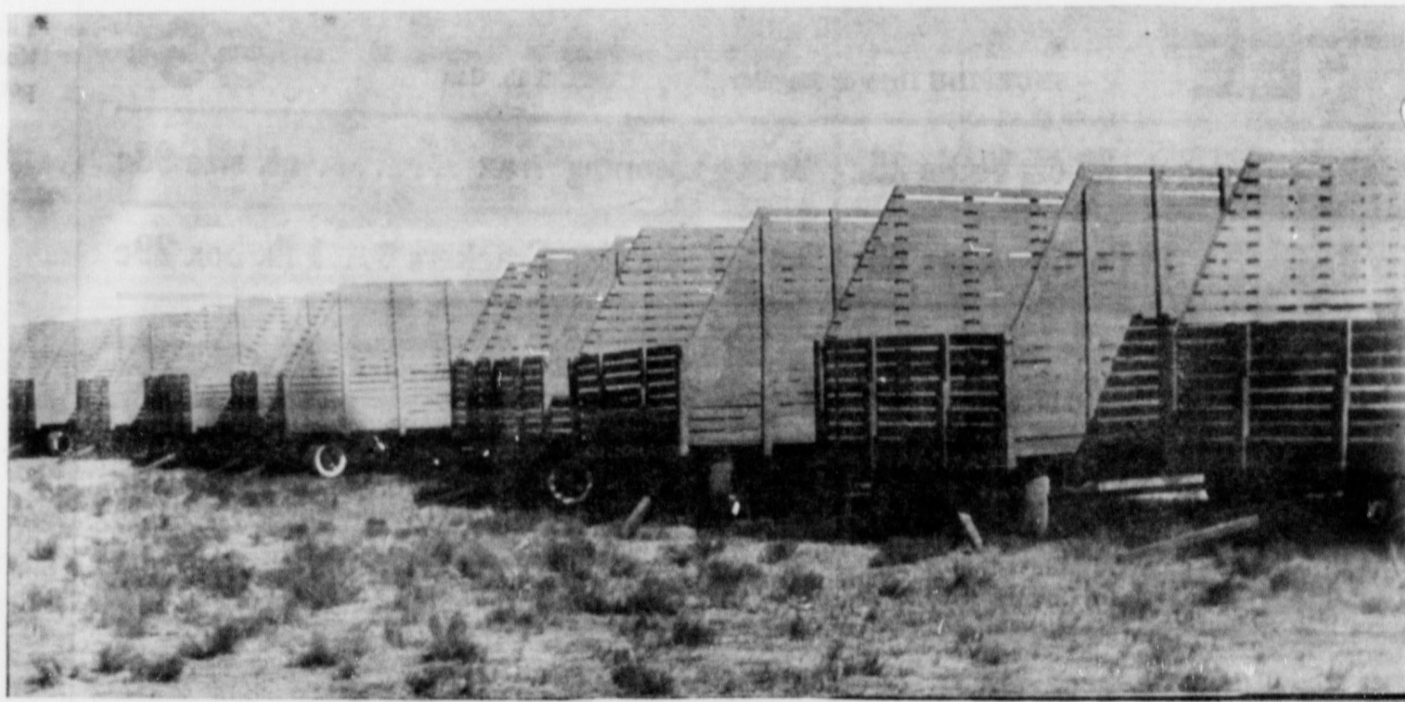
