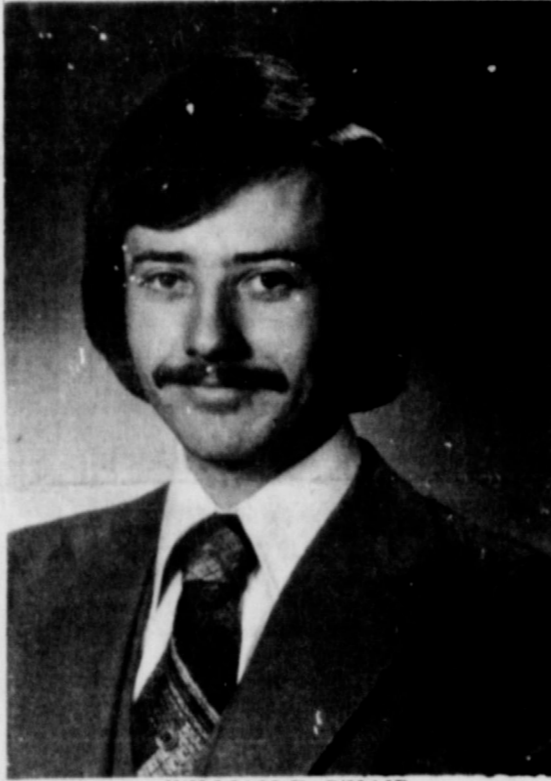
The meeting was called to order and the reading of the minutes were approved as read.

Anyone interested in coaching either of these teams may contact Joe Miller, Jerry Jones or Henry Ford. Deadline for signing up will be May 5.

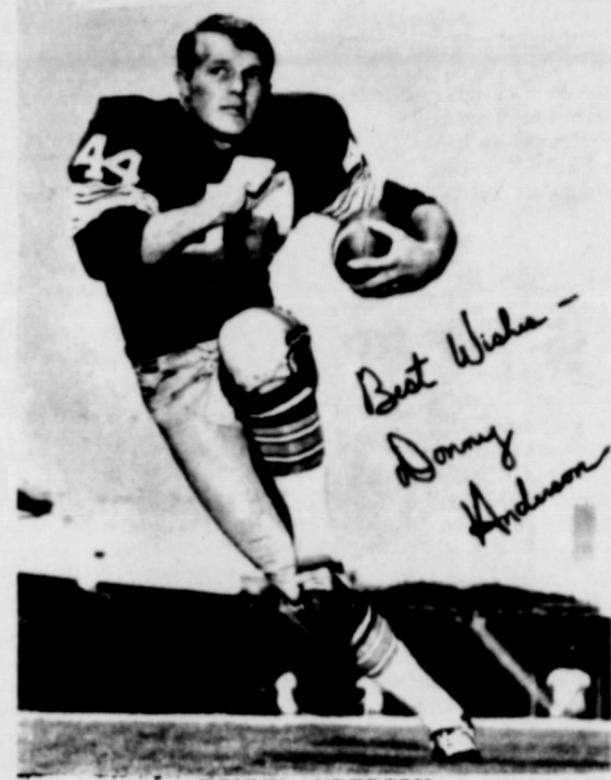
## MHA Bellringer Campaign

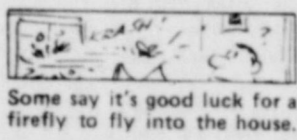

## SPS Survey

According to Sam Thomas, manager of agriculture development for Southwestern Public Service Company, 4,373,850 fat cattle were produced in the SPS service area for 1977. This production, revealed in a recent survey conducted by SPS, is the third highest in the history of the industry.

The survey which has been conducted since 1963 is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to production of fat cattle in the southern great plains area.

"During the 1977 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,734,740 head and is barely 10,000 head under the peak year of 1974 when 2,742,250 capacity was in use. This dropped to a low of 2.6 million in 1976 and present indications are that the 1978 year will see a new peak in feedlot capacity use," stated Thomas.

The survey also revealed that the 1978 feedyards doing custom feeding was one less than the preceding year but that this represented the consolidation of reporting yards. The total number of yards surveyed continued to fall with a reduction of six from last year. This too, reflects a consolidation but is the eleventh year it has occurred. There were 274 yards counted in 1967 as compared to 153 in 1978.

"The total impact of the feedyard industry on the business community reached 8 billion dollars in 1977," Thomas stated, "and the farm sale value exceeded 2 billion dollars."

The survey also showed that the packing plant annual slaughter capacity jumped from 4,990,680 to 5.4 million head and the number of plants increased from 17 to 20. Thomas also stated that 589,000 of this capacity is not in use but that this industry has made another estimated 8 billion dollar contribution to area business.

"The future of the feedlot industry appears to be the brightest of any period in its history, and this may not be good. Too many people believe this and with great majority acting together adverse reactions can occur.

## Evidence Needed To Get S.S. Card

"A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to show a new name must now present evidence of identity before the new card can be issued," Laura Peacock, social security district manager in Lubbock, said today.

"Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. This can no longer be done," Peacock said.

In addition to submitting evidence of identity, the person's application will be checked against the records at social security headquarters. If all the information checks out, a new card will be issued.

Peacock said the new rules are intended to help protect the person's social security record, assure that it is complete and accurate, and to prevent anyone else from misusing or abusing the person's social security number.

Evidence of identity should show the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information. All documents are subject to verification with the agency which issued them.

Since it takes 3 to 4 weeks to issue and deliver the new card after all documents have been submitted, Peacock said it is a good idea to apply for the duplicate card as soon as possible.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a Social Security Number," lists the kinds of evidence that can be used to establish a person's identity. Copies can be obtained at the Lubbock Social Security Office, located at 1205 Texas Avenue, Room 102, Lubbock, Texas, 79401. The telephone number is 762-7381.

Guest speaker was Tech's first and only conference All American in 1964-65. While at Tech he was named Conference three years in a row, won the Sportsmanship Award, football in 1965, finished Heisman trophy balloting, and in the same year named Sporting News' player of the year and leading Player in the Gator Bowl.

Person holds nine individual football records at Tech: longest kick return, longest run, most touchdowns caught in a single season, most touchdowns caught, most passes caught in career, single scoring, single season kickoff return and kickoff career record.

## Plunge Of Bonnie & Clyde

A Texas Historical Commission marker is located north of Wellington where, on the evening of June 10, 1933, the Pritchard family sat on their front porch trying to cool off in the summer heat. A new Ford coupe sped over a hill in front of their house, missed a detour and plunged 60 feet into the Red River.

The Pritchards rushed to the burning wreckage and caused the flames with water. Even after Clyde and Buck Barrow and Bonnie Parker identified themselves, the Pritchard family did not recognize them as desperadoes, only as people who needed help. Mr. Pritchard insisted they come up to his house where Bonnie's burns could be treated. To an offer of driving into Wellington for medical help, they were told, "no, we're hot."

While the Barrows retrieved an arsenal of weapons from the car, Pritchard's son-in-law, Vernon Cartwright slipped away for help. He and the Williamsworth County Sheriff had an ambulance follow them back to the house, still unaware of the true identity.

The desperados lay in wait and took the sheriff and police chief hostage, stealing the sheriff's car for their getaway.

As they left the Cartwright home, Clyde finished a roll of bills, offered to pay "for all the trouble we have been to you." Pritchard refused, saying, "If a man can't help another man in trouble things are in pretty bad shape."

Just over the Oklahoma border, they tied their hostages to a tree with

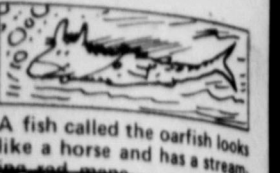
