Knight Rest Home Observes 5th Anniversary in Littlefield

Mrs. Knight, owner-manager of Knight's Rest Home in Littlefield, announced this week the celebrating of their 5th anniversary in their present location in Littlefield.

The modern red brick and tile fire proof nursing home covers a complete area, and was constructed to encircle a large space, shutting off strong winds so as to allow patients to rest in the sun many months throughout the year.

The Knight Rest Home has been classified as a class two home, placing it next to the highest ranking homes in Texas. The Rest Home has 36 bedrooms, 3 large lounges with combined recreational rooms, equipped with televisions, an office, and 2 nurses' stations, providing space for 48 to 55 patients.

Morning and evening church services are held each Sunday, with denominations rotating weekly. Singing is provided every Sunday.

Mrs. Knight's experience in caring for the elderly goes back 22 years ago, when she began keeping a few patients in her home.

In 1955, she opened the first Knight's Rest Home in Amherst,

and operated it with the help of six or eight employees. In 1960, the present Rest Home in Littlefield was built. Mrs. Knight continued to operate both homes, securing the assistance of her daughter, Mrs. Jean Bundickas, Assistant Manager of the Littlefield home. She managed to operate both homes until June in 1963, when she closed the Amherst home, devoting all her time in the operation of the Littlefield "home away from home."

At present every room is occupied. Some of her patients have been residents at Knight's Rest Home for as many as 12 years, some 8 and 9 years.

She currently has a staff of 26 employees, with two licensed nurses on duty and one registered nurse on relief.

In looking back over the 22 years Mrs. Knight said, "I have never refused a patient's admittance, money or no money, and it has somehow always worked out. I could go farther and say that it has been a tremendous success, not so much in financial gain, but rewarding in the knowledge that we have succeeded in making 'a home away from home' for many lovely senior citizens."

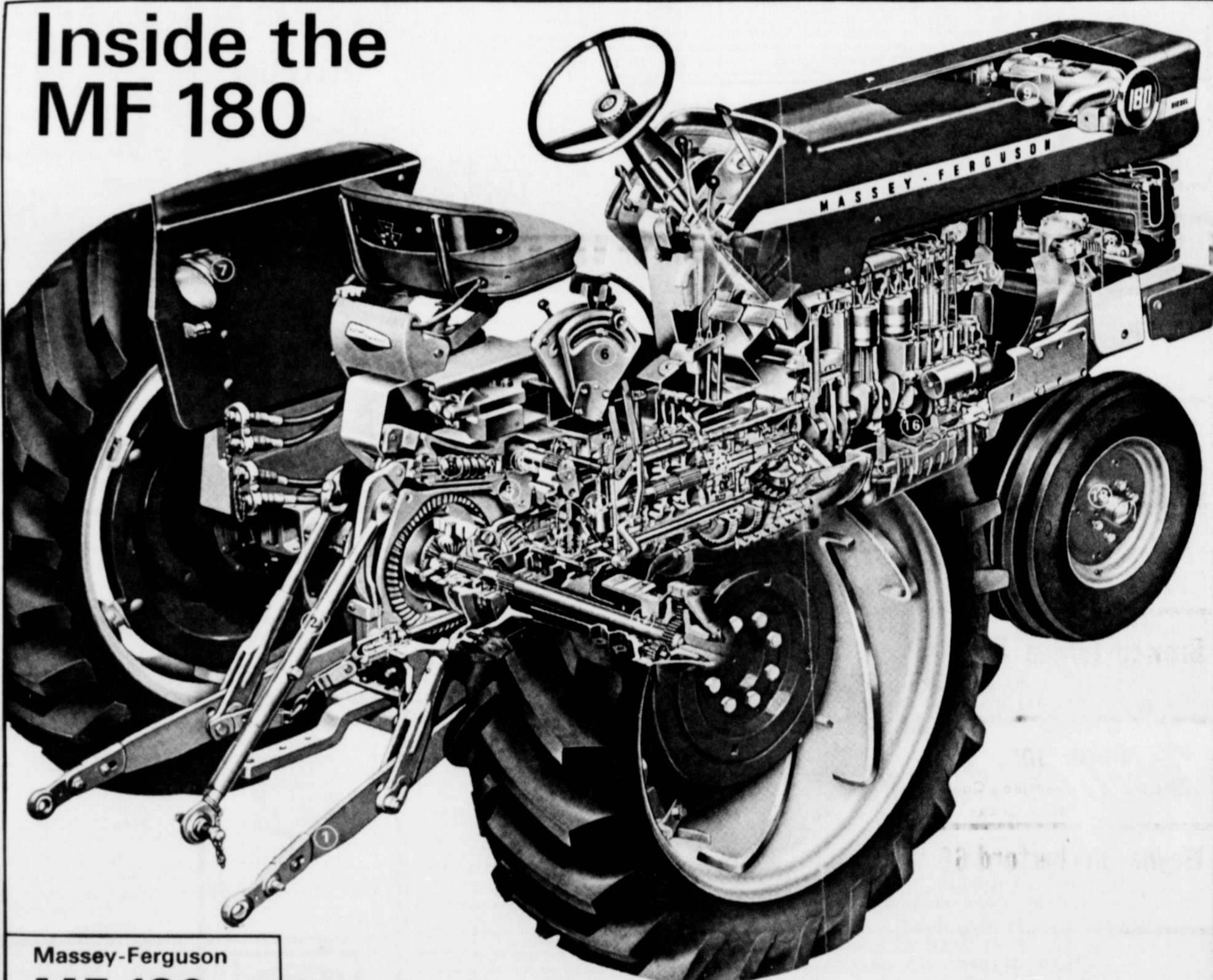

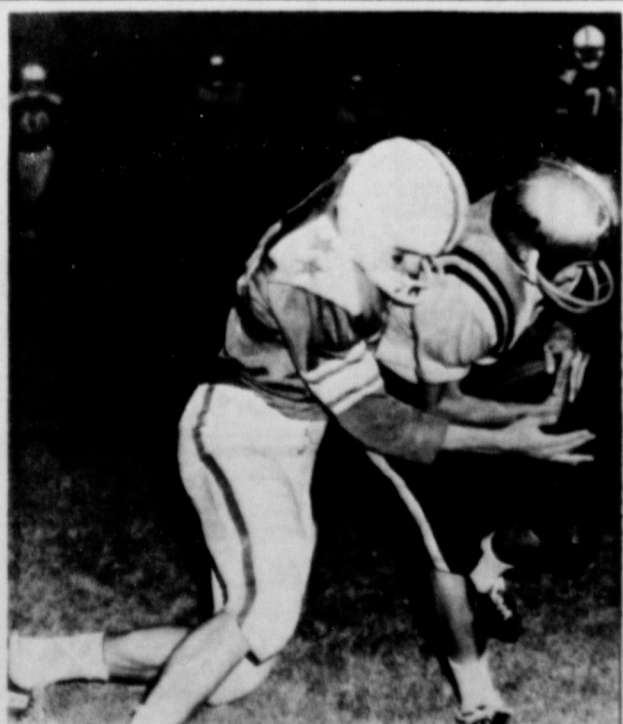

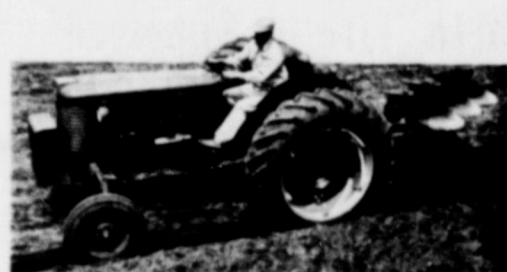

Family Bankruptcies Increasing As Over Used Credit Continues

COLLEGE STATION, --Over-use of credit is causing greater numbers of American families to file bankruptcy proceedings. These bankruptcies can usually be blamed on poor management in the family, rather than just a lack of money, says Mrs. Elsie P. Short, Texas A&M University Extension home management specialist.

"People are impatient to have the same prestige items and status symbols that the Joneses have. They are unwilling to wait a few months to accumulate the funds necessary--so credit is used. Bankruptcies result from flagrant misuse of credit," Mrs. Short adds.

American families have upped their short-term debts from \$8 billion in 1945 to \$70 billion in 1964.

Families may avoid the loss of available credit--caused by the abuse of the credit privilege--by establishing a clear plan or purpose for the use of their money. "This plan should be based on income. A family's security depends on spending within the bounds of income and certain priorities and limitations may need to be set up, the specialist emphasizes.

Nationwide, almost 140,000 families filed bankruptcy proceedings in 1963, the last year that statistics have been made available.
