"Taint So"

This week a rumor was started, quite by accident. It was the kind of rumor that we all shudder to hear. I'm referring to the rumor which was circulated throughout the area, regarding our school cafeteria which according to the rumor was the filthiest lunchroom in the State of Texas. (And Texas is a full, oversized state, which has more than just a few acres.)

I first heard this rumor Monday, I (like I'm sure most parents) shuddered. By Tuesday night I was unable to sleep, as I was plain worried. What I couldn't understand was why neither of my children knew anything about this, but several parents had said their children had told them that their teacher had read a written message in their room to that effect.

THE ANSWER IS SO SIMPLE the area Lunchroom Supervisor came by last Thursday just as the Junior High group had finished eating. It seems this group had spilled some milk, dropped napkins and in general had more than their share of accidents at lunch that day. As she came in she stated that it was the filthiest looking lunchroom in the State of Texas, referring to the somewhat careless way the Junior High students had left the serving room. Mr. Usery being the Junior High Principal was in the line of fire and caught the blame, in turn prepared a written article for the Junior High students. Telling them of the scolding about the dirty lunchroom in order to put over the point of how necessary it was for them to be more careful in their eating habits. The point most students remembered was the statement that we had the filthiest lunchroom in Texas. They failed to remember that the statement was made only because of overall untidy appearance of the tables left by the students, before the lunchroom ladies had a chance to clean it up. But without any reflection on the food prepared in the kitchen.

I was much relieved to get the real truth of this rumor. Springlake has regular periodical inspections and as long as we have nothing but a few cartons of milk turned over by accident, this won't hurt our Janes and Joes as long as our kitchen, cooking, silver and serving dishes are clean.

It was brought to my attention this week that a number of unwanted stray dogs are being dumped on the School Campus almost every week without fail.

These dogs each without Rabies shots, I'm certain are being dropped by folks, who failed to consider the seriousness of this act. It stands to reason that one puppy dropped on the Campus would be in a position to do more damage there than any other place it could be dropped.

This practice of dumping unwanted dogs on our Campus should cease as of now. Faculty members have enough trouble keeping the Marys and Johns from biting each other, without having the added problem of keeping the dogs off both Mary and John.

Springlake School Stands To Gain Back \$1175 Under Bill Proposed In Senate

AUSTIN, February 28—Under a bill proposed in the Texas Senate, three school districts in Lamb County stand to gain back \$2,745 in losses incurred in transportation costs during the 1955-56 school year.

Of this total gain in their appropriations, the Olton district would get \$1,896; Spade would get \$674; and Springlake district, \$1,175.

Senator Andy Rodgers, District 30, of Childress said today that some thirteen school districts in eight counties in District 30 stand a chance under the bill to gain back \$17,358 lost last year because of the failure of state transportation aid to equal current operating expenses. Senate Bill 102 is

designed to eliminate a section of the present Transportation Law which limits school transportation expenditures to a 1949-50 formula plus ten percent.

"The trouble with the formula under the present law is that it penalizes school districts which, for one reason or another, had a very low bus transportation cost in the 1949-50 school year," Senator Rodgers said. "Normal rises in total cost, such as purchases of new buses and equipment, have since made the old formula extremely unrealistic in most cases."

Of the 298 school districts in Texas which would be immediately aided under the bill, 13 are in District 30.

City Commission Votes To Buy Street Maintainer

The City Commission met in a regular meeting at the City Hall Monday night.

An ordinance which was passed February 6, providing for and requiring the cutting and removal of all noxious weeds on all lots and pieces of land, also in the streets and alleys in the City, was read (This ordinance will be found elsewhere in the paper).

CITY BUYS MAINTAINER

The Commission voted to buy a maintainer from Plains Machinery Co. at Lubbock for \$6200. This maintainer will be used to maintain the City Streets and alleys. D. M. Allen was hired to run the maintainer, although due to ill health, Hershell Hulky is operating the machine until Allen is able to do so.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE No. 40
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR AND REQUIRING THE CUTTING AND REMOVING OF ALL NOXIOUS WEEDS ON ALL LOTS AND PIECES OF LAND, IN THE STREETS AND ALLEYS IN FRONT OF OR ABUTTING THEREON IN SAID CITY. Be it Ordained By The City Commission of the City of Earth, Texas:
Section 1. That hereafter every property owner, occupant, lessee or agent of same, is required to keep their premises and property occupied, free from noxious and growing weeds, and shall cut and remove the same as often as the growth and conditions of same may require.
Section 2. That it shall be unlawful for any occupant, owner or agent of any lot or piece of land to suffer or permit any noxious weeds to grow and remain upon such lot or piece of land, or in the street or alley in front of or abutting there-

on; and such occupant, owner or agent who fails, refuses or neglects to cut or destroy such noxious weeds, after five days written or printed notice from the Sanitary Officer, shall be fined in a sum not less than Five Dollars and not more than Fifty Dollars, and each time that such occupant, owner or agent shall fail, refuse or neglect to cut or destroy such noxious weeds, after receiving the notice above provided for, shall be a distinct and separate offense.
Section 3. In cases where such lot or piece of land is vacant and the occupant, owner or agent shall refuse or neglect to cut or destroy such noxious weeds after five days written or printed notice from the Sanitary Officer from said City, or his agent, or in the case where the owner is unknown or is a non-resident, and there is no non-resident agent, and the said noxious weeds are not cut or destroyed in five days after notice has been posted on the premises affected thereby, the Sanitary Officer of said City shall cut or destroy said noxious weeds on the lot or piece of land, and the street or alley in front of or abutting thereon, or employ men therefor, and shall keep an account of the cost thereof and report the same to the mayor and council, and the Mayor and Council shall levy a special tax and assessment for such cost against the lot or piece of land so benefitted and involved and enforce the collection of the same in the same manner as for the repairing and building of sidewalks in said City.
Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force in five days after passage and publication as required by law.

Better Sweet Potatoes Results of Texas Tech Research

LUBBOCK — Better sweet potatoes are expected to grace South Plains tables because of Texas Tech research.

In experiments by the horticulture and food and nutrition departments, 15 varieties of sweet potatoes have been grown and cooked for three consecutive years. The improvements are determined by experimental cookery tests made during the study.

Dr. George Elle, professor of horticulture, is studying sweet potato varieties from the producers point of view, while Dr. Mina Lamb, food and nutrition department head checks on qualities of importance to the consumer.

Cooking tests have been made by experimental cookery students, Miss Opal Wood, an instructor in food and nutrition, and Dr. Lamb in an effort to determine which varieties will be most acceptable

to local consumer use.

"The first year we cooked sweet potatoes by every conceivable method described in cookbooks; including deep-fat frying, pan frying, sweet potato pies, and casseroles made from stewed and baked sweet potatoes," Dr. Lamb said.

"Experimental cookery students rated stewed and fried sweet potatoes of low acceptability," she added. They considered the cooking quality of sweet potatoes to be entirely visible in the standard baked version. Consequently, baking her become the standard procedure for judging cooking qualities of the sweet potatoes.

Rating sheets are used to determine the consumer acceptability of the varieties, which are judged on general appearance, including smoothness of the skin, and the effect of size and shape upon cooking time.

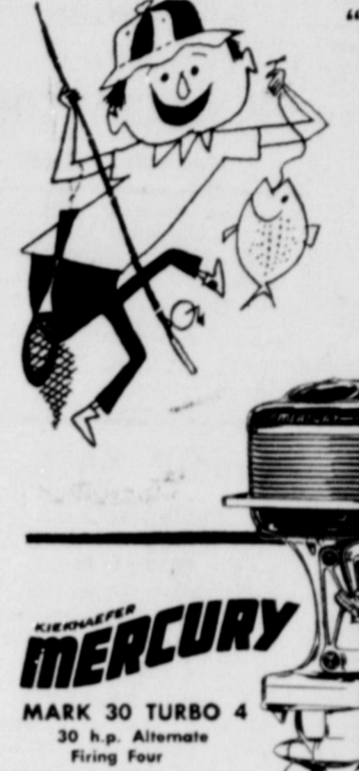

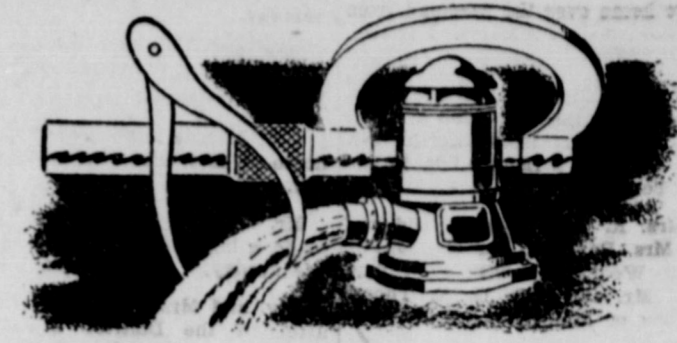

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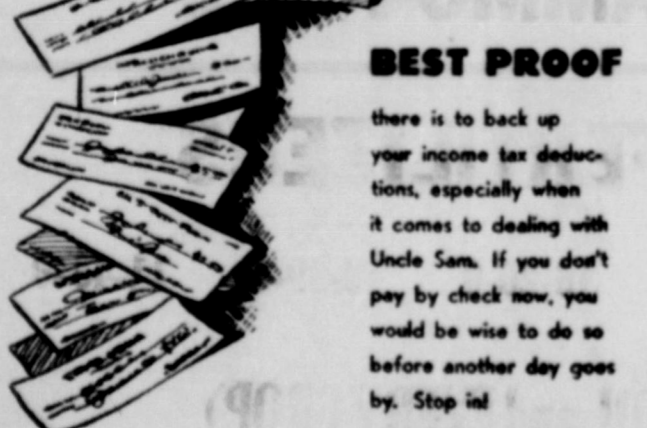

VANILLA NUT FUDGE

1 pkg. vanilla pudding powder... (no "instant" kind)
1 cup sugar
1-2 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1-2 Cup cut up nuts.

Mix in a 1-2 qt. saucepan until smooth the pudding powder, sugar and milk. Add butter and nuts. Cook and stir to a full, all-over boil. Lower heat, and keep stirring while mixture boils slowly for 3 minutes. Take off heat and beat until candy starts to thicken. Spread in a buttered 9x5-in. pan. Let stand until firm. Cut into 21 pieces.

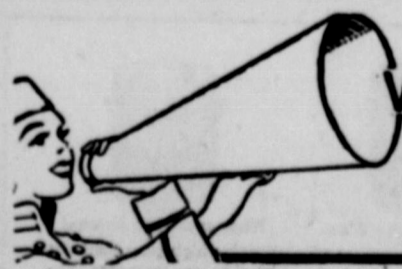
