\$1.3 Million Suit Filed In Littlefield Train-Bus Wreck

LITTLEFIELD--A suit, totaling \$1.3 million was filed Saturday against Santa Fe Railroad and bus driver Artis Ray Johnson, 68, charging negligence in the bus-train accident February 6, that killed seven students and injured 16 other persons.

The suit was filed by Mr. and Mrs. Larry Ortiz in behalf of their son, Edward, 17, and daughter, Aurora, 9, killed in the crash, and daughter, Betty, 15, injured.

Mr. and Mrs. Don Foley also filed for their son, Terry Don, 13, injured in the crash.

The Ortiz family asked \$1.25 million for the deaths and their daughter's medical expenses and the Foleys asked \$50,000 for Terry's treatment.

The suit charged the Santa Fe freight was traveling at an excessive speed, failed to reduce its speed at the crossing and did not provide sufficient warning devices at the crossing.

The suit also charged Johnson was negligent in his duties as a bus driver.

Johnson was cited by police for not having a chauffeur's license but no other charges have been filed against him. He was slightly injured in the crash and has remained in seclusion.

A police investigation of the case has been turned over to the Lamb County grand jury which has not convened.

An earlier suit, for \$600,000, was filed by three other families. The suit was against Santa Fe only and not Johnson.

From the three families filing that suit, two children were killed in the crash and 10 others injured.

Denham is survived by his wife, Jackie, three daughters, Vickie Lynn, Kimberly Ann,

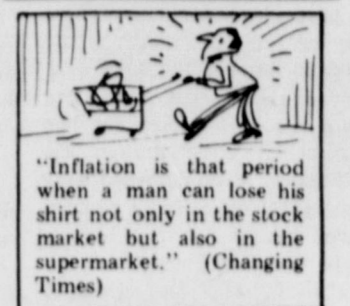
and Melinda Carroll, all of the home. He is also survived by
