## Margaret Wilborn Receives Commission

Margaret Wilborn, Earth, was among seven senior nursing majors at Texas Women's University to be commissioned into the United States Army Nurse Monday, November 16, on the campus. ## Warning System Advised For Farm Power Failures

Farmers raising poultry or swine under present-day confinement methods should maintain a dependable warning system to alert them to power outages, suggests W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer. Commercial suppliers cannot guarantee constant service in the face of storms, floods, sleet, and other uncontrollable phenomena. Also service is often interrupted by mistakes made by the farmer. Switches are accidentally turned off. Circuits are overloaded. Fuses are blown. In such instances, being aware that something is amiss can very easily save a full year's farm income. Allen reports development of an emergency warning system to help avert problems associated with electrical power at the circuit actually operating the fan, controlling the lights, or powering any other necessary equipment. It can be placed immediately ahead of the fan controls in the building. It can be equipped with a sensor which activates an alarm if the temperature exceeds a predetermined setting. The temperature monitor gives extra protection in cases of a broken fan belt, a burned out motor or a defective control. Any of such events could reduce the ventilation inside the building. When an emergency occurs, a weather-proofed speaker sounds off. Aimed in the direction in which it is most likely to be heard, it continues to "Howl" until it is manually turned off. The speaker is powered by a solid state oscillator from a 6-volt fence controller battery. The solid state oscillator is preferred for its ability to operate on low power, says the engineer.

## Decision Nearing On Watershed Project

The fate of the Running Water Draw Watershed will be decided soon.

The flood control measure covers 7,000 acres of land in the northeast corner of Lamb County. County sponsors of the project are the Solland Water Conservation District (SWCD) and the Lamb County commissioners' court.

Frank Struve, vice chairman of the SWCD board of directors, represents the Olton Zone which covers all the watershed activity in the lower Running Water

Draw in this county.

Approved in May, the action constitutes authorization to provide federal assistance in the installation of the works of improvement as funds appropriated for this purpose are more available.

Joe Blevins, district conservationist, said needed requirements of land treatment in the water shed is in good shape.

According to Struve, land rights for the four structures in

the Lamb County are being secured now.

Congressman Bob Price presented testimony on the project before the House Subcommittee on Flood Control, giving support to the measure. Price said of all the problems facing the residents of the watershed, none is in greater need of solving.

Floods occur here every three to five years, inundating more than half the flood plain. Recurring floodwater with its attendant sediment and resultant erosion has significantly affected land use in the watershed proper.

If fully implemented, the watershed will check soil erosion and excessive water runoff on rural land will be halted. Destructive floods will be stopped, drainage conditions of the land in agricultural areas will be improved, and more efficient irrigation systems will be instituted.

In addition, more water will be supplied for the growing municipal needs of the area; fish and wildlife resources will be enhanced; new recreation opportunities will be created.

Price said benefits accruing to the watershed project have been compared to the cost ratio is 2.6 to 1.0. "The need for this project is great," Price concluded. "The costs are reasonable and the benefit are substantial."

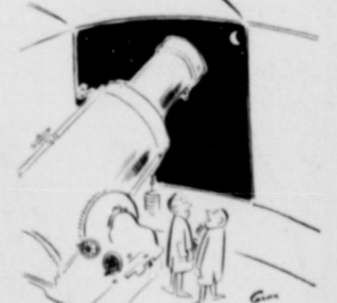

Brush a jelly-roll pan, 10 x 15 inches, with oil, line it with wax paper, and oil the paper. Separate 7 eggs. Beat the yolks with 1/4 cup sugar until the mixture is pale in color and thick enough to "ribbon." Beat in 1 1/2 cups ground walnuts and 1 teaspoon baking powder. Fold in egg whites, stiffly beaten. Spread the batter in the prepared pan and bake the cake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 15 or 20 minutes or until it is golden. Cool the cake in the pan, cover it with a damp towel and chill it.



Dust the cold cake generously with sifted confectioner sugar and turn it out on a board covered with two overlapping sheets of wax paper. Carefully strip the paper from bottom of cake. Spread cake with 1 cup heavy cream, whipped and flavored to taste with sugar and vanilla. Roll up the cake, using the paper as an aid, slide the roll onto a flat serving platter. Sprinkle with more confectioner sugar. (Rum or almond flavoring is also good.)

**SUDAN MAN ON CATTLE FEEDERS BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

James E. Davidson, Manager of Sudan Livestock & Feeding Company, was named to the board of directors of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association at the annual meeting held in Amarillo last week.

Speakers at the two-day meeting expressed optimism that the expanded feeding industry of the South Plains is on solid footing and with wise management will overcome the present economic conditions.

**Senate Approves \$55,000 Limitation in New Farm Bill**

A several months battle over a proposed farm bill was concluded Thursday when a new three year farm bill was voted into existence by the United States Senate. Passage of the bill by a 48-35 vote, overruled a proposed \$20,000 limitation for farm subsidy payments and approved a \$55,000 limitation. Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin said of the new bill, "It will give farmers an opportunity to take greater advantage of shifts in market demands from commodity to commodity by moving away from fixed crop acreage toward greater leeway in crop plantings. Now, for the first time, a \$55,000 limit has been set on money growers of corn, wheat,

cotton and other feed grains can be paid for holding land out of production. The new bill, as approved by the Senate, will be in effect for the next three years. It is estimated to cost \$3.5 billion over the next three years. Lamar Aten at the ASCS office in Littlefield said he expected to learn about the rest of the farm bill within the next three weeks. Again this year, acreages won't be limited, there will be no penalties for over-planting, and all the produce will be eli-

gible for price support. But Aten said he didn't expect more cotton to be grown in Lamb County next year. He added that he wouldn't be surprised if the cotton acreage is down a little and there is an increase in feed grains. Lamb County had 198,000 acres eligible for cotton this year, and farmers planted only 165,000 acres to cotton. This pattern is expected to hold for the 1971 crop. Lamb County has 1,450 farm operators and 2,125 individual farm numbers.

**Alaska Seeks World Markets**

New markets in Europe and the Orient will be served with Alaska seafoods by air, it was announced by Whitney-Fidalgo Seafoods, Inc., salmon packer and seafoods processor.

It has leased a major new quick-freezing and cold-storage plant at the Anchorage International Airport to receive and process up to 80,000 pounds of frozen fish daily. The company said it will deliver fresh and frozen products overnight to major cities in Europe and the Far East, utilizing the services of eight international airlines that fly via Anchorage between the U.S. and foreign destinations.

**Evergreens Need Care**

Weather injury, especially during the winter, can inflict serious damage to evergreens, explains Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Evergreens are particularly susceptible to winter drying in areas such as West Texas where the relative humidity is low, says Janne. This damage occurs in late winter or early spring before new growth can get started. Strong winds and low humidity desiccate the foliage because the plants are unable to replace the moisture given off by the leaves through excessive transpiration.

According to the horticulturist, visible symptoms of winter drying depend on the severity of the injury. Sometimes only the branch tips will be dead; at other times entire branches or even the whole tree or shrub may turn brown and die. In windbreak plantings, dead plants are often found next to apparently healthy ones. Janne explains that the best precaution against drying of evergreens this winter is to plant them in a well-drained, fertile soil. Since this isn't always possible, the next best thing is to provide adequate soil moisture.

Homeowners and gardeners often store the water hose at the same time they put away the lawn mower for the winter, points out Janne. Landscape plants still require moisture even though wintry weather has made the scene. To prepare evergreens for the winter and reduce weather damage, Janne outlines these steps:

1. Water trees and shrubs thoroughly at regular intervals throughout the winter, especially where they are protected by wide overhangs on homes.
2. Use a mulch to prevent surface evaporation and to keep the soil warmer. Evergreens have difficulty taking up moisture when the ground is cold.
3. Maintain a fertile, well-aerated soil to encourage deep root growth. Compacted soil hinders good root growth.

Evergreens display a beauty all their own and add much to the winter landscape. They can maintain this beauty only if they are cared for properly, adds Janne.

## Catfish In Cages, It's Possible

Catfish in cages? Doesn't sound very realistic, but to the people in the catfish farming industry it could mean an easier method of production with increased profit.

The culture of channel catfish in cages has been developed by Dr. H. R. Schmittou, an Agricultural Extension Service Fisheries specialist at Texas A&M University. Assisted by Don Steinbach, an Extension fisheries demonstration assistant, Dr. Schmittou has proven that cage culture is feasible for production of catfish on both the commercial and private levels.

The phenomenal growth of the catfish industry itself over a brief period of eight years with increasing acreages in Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, California and Texas has indicated the demand for this new and improved method of production.

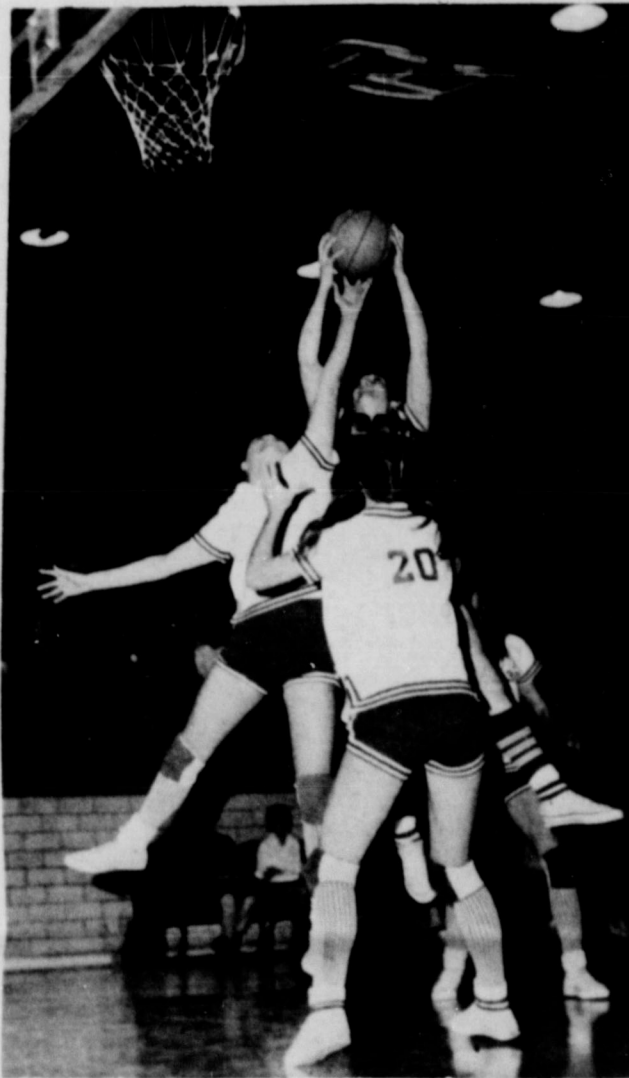
The cage culture system is advantageous over the conventional system in a number of ways. Cage culture is suited to practically all types of water environments, ponds, lakes, mining pits, reservoirs, streams, irrigation canals, estuaries, tidal streams, bays and other waters may all be used for production.

More intensive cultures using the cage culture system are permitted where otherwise only a lesser level of culture would be possible. Also, in the same water where the catfish are being raised in the cages, other species of fish may be raised in the open water.

Parasite and disease problems are made cheaper, easier, and treatment more efficient by simply enclosing the affected fish in the cage with a plastic bag and applying the treatment material inside the enclosure rather than in the entire body of water.

The major limiting factors may be categorized into waste disposal, nutrition, and parasites and diseases. Waste products of carbon dioxide, ammonia, urea, and feces build up rapidly and must be removed before reaching concentrations that harm the fish, warn the specialists.

To remove these concentra-

tions and insure optimum water quality, water from the surrounding environment is used to replace or dilute the water in the cage. The water exchange is based primarily on wind-induced currents or currents that the fish themselves create.

The problem of nutrition cannot be solved by just purchasing a "catfish feed". A nutritionally complete feed is required for use in cages. The most desirable is a floating pelleted feed which is relative-

ly adequate for trout. This feed is available to the fish with no feed loss inside the feeding rings in tops of the fish cages.

As the density of the fish in the cages increases, the probability of parasite-disease problems also increases. Most bacterial diseases, including Aeromonas and cotton-mouth (columnaris) disease, may be treated with a pre-treated feed. External parasites are easily treated by enclosing the cage inside a plastic bag and applying formalin for a short-term treat-

ment.

A very thorough knowledge and understanding of the principles for cage culture are essential for optimum production, says Schmittou. Such things as water pH and a change in temperature as well as the other limiting factors can ruin an operation in a matter of a few hours or days. On the other hand, a high profit potential awaits anyone with a good quality water source and the time and initiative that is required to raise channel catfish in cages, believes Schmittou.

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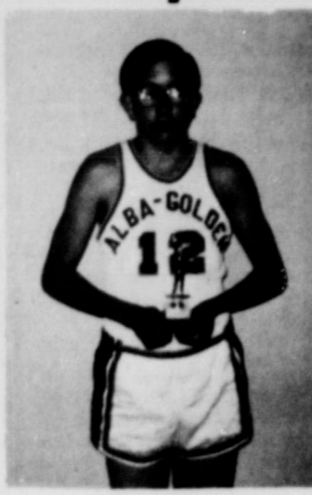
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## Former S-E Student Selected As Most Valuable Player

# Glue Sniffing Kills 15 Year Old Boy

A 15 year old boy looking for a cheap kick, instead bought death Wednesday evening when he purchased a 50 cent can of tire patch glue and went out behind the motel plant at Keeton Felt Company in Littlefield and placed a plastic bag over his head to sniff glue.

The youth, Onorio Galindo (Larry) Ortiz, was pronounced dead on arrival at Littlefield Hospital about 11:15 that night.

A Keeton employee, Roy Garcia, and a friend of Ortiz, said he was aware of the fact that

that Ortiz had bought the glue and had gone out behind the gin to sniff it.

Freddy Garcia, another plant employee, was moving trash from the plant to the dirt pile when he heard someone behind the dirt yelling "crazy things". When he went to investigate, he found Ortiz there sniffing something out of a bag and looking real sick. He rushed to get him some water. As Garcia returned, he said Ortiz stood up and yelled "I'm all alone", then fell flat on his face.

Lewis Garcia, a brother of Freddy, tried to revive him with mouth to mouth resuscitation. He did not respond and the group took him to the office where they called the police at 10:41 reporting a bad accident at the plant and requesting an ambulance.

One of the policemen, Cruz Hernandez, attempted resuscitation efforts also.

Dr. J. R. Fain pronounced the boy dead on arrival. He said there was no evidence of foul play and the boy's friends said he was sniffing glue.

A can of glue and a dirty plastic sack with one end open and the other end ragged from chewing was found on the second search of the grounds at the manufacturing plant.

Dr. Fain said sniffing glue damages the liver and lungs and that glue sniffing over a period of time can cause slow damage or that the acute toxicity to the liver can cause death in a matter of minutes after a person has sniffed glue for the first time.

The boy and his dad were both working at the Hart Camp Co-op Gin, but the boy had been dismissed from his job about the middle of the afternoon Wednesday.

Roy Garcia said Larry was not upset over getting fired, but that he was just getting high for kicks.
